Only Ten Women, Navy Nurses, Are Stationed On Attu

ATTU, Aleutians—The only women on Attu—ten Navy nurses—counted this November as an anniversary month. Eight of them arrived a year ago Thanksgiving day. The two others came a short time later.
On the whole they have liked living in this outermost of the Aleutians, a feeling just contrary to that held by most of the thousands of men of the armed forces stationed on the island.
"We've been busy with the job we came here to do," said Lt. (jg) Judy M. Wilson, the head nurse. "We have comfortable quarters and enough recreation and fishing to keep the days from being monotonous."
Miss Wilson, whose home is at Parkersford, Ida., entered the regular Navy in 1936 leaving a position with the Alaska railroad hospital at Anchorage. Her service since has included duty at Bremerton, Wash., and Earl Harbor.
A question concerning the social demands on the little group of nurses brought a frown from Miss Wilson. She said that even if they were the only women on

the island, they were there first as Navy officers and nurses. She added:
"And don't report that we go around wearing slacks. We wear uniforms."
Ens. Hazel Nyhus, of Forest City and Estherville, Iowa, also dismissed the social side of life on Attu with a slightly weary shrug. She preferred to talk about outdoor recreations. "We have two beaches," she said, adding that the handy vehicles were left from the ever-helpful Seabees.
The nurses, when they first arrived, accepted a job of accepting only general social engagements. This limited front policy was later relaxed to some extent and temporary social life.
Lt. (jg) Elaine Gallagher, of Phoenix, Minn., one of the original eight, and Lt. (jg) Phyllis Bandy of Shoshone, and Red Bank, N.D., a Navy doctor, announced their engagement last summer. The announcement was after Lt. Brady had recovered at the hospital from injuries received in the crash of a Navy PB.
The ten nurses have quarters in the Navy hospital area on Makarski Bay. This is one of the points at which United States amphibious forces swarmed ashore in May of 1943 to wipe out Japanese invaders of American soil in 20 days that saw some of the fiercest fighting in the war.
Only one other white woman had lived on Attu before them.

Mystery Of Egypt's 'Unknown Dynasty' Puzzles Scientists

CAIRO — The mystery of an ancient Egypt's "Unknown Dynasty" confronts archaeologists again today on the low east bank of the River Nile.
Fresh evidence discovered there compels them to reconsider the probability that the so-called First Dynasty of Egyptian king was not the first, at all. They may have been a royal house that preceded it, a line of kings even older than the shadowy royal figures who were thought to have been the oldest.
Archaeologists sometimes refer to it as the "Zero Dynasty."
The Mists of Antiquity
If its existence is established it will mean that Egyptian civilization goes back even further than known records have indicated. The known span is 5,000 years.
What raised the question again was the discovery of a burial ground, near the Nile, at a point midway between Cairo and the city of Helwan.
Two years ago — while Rommel's Afrika Korps was at the gates of Alexandria — Egyptian officials were notified that natives had uncovered some tomb found some pottery and other objects. The site was part of one of King Farouk's estates.
An archaeological team from the Institute of Antiquities, Zaki Youssef Bey, went to examine the findings. He realized immediately that a discovery of major importance had been made. But because of the war, excavation had to be postponed.
Work Resumed
Work has been resumed now. The results are important — an puzzling.
Zaki Bey found more than 2,000 tombs. Only about 200 were intact. The others had been broken into, centuries ago, and buried by grave robbers. Some had been reopened by Roman troops, who placed their own dead beside the gleaming white

skeletons of the long-departed Egyptians.
But from the few graves that survived there came a wealth of scientific material. The tombs yielded jewelry, necklaces, bracelets, beautiful alabaster vases and dishes, pottery, a huge flint sword, thousands of flint knives, finely-carved figures of Osiris and Isis, the god and his sister-wife, as well as some stone palettes used by the very artists who painted the decorations on these tombs.
Egyptian "Dog Tags"
They even found an ancient Egyptian "dog tag," an identification disc, oval-shaped and cut from ivory, hardly different from the metal ones used by American soldiers today.
Helixographs on the stopper of a perfume bottle and on an earthen jar apparently established the period of these tombs. The one inscribed on the stopper read "Iken," and the other "Adi." These are the names of the fifth and sixth kings, respectively, of the First Dynasty.
But on a stone limit in one of the tombs, Zaki Bey read still another "K" — a king's name. It has been discovered before in Egypt, but it does not belong to the First Dynasty, nor probably to any of the earliest known lines of kings.
Who, then, was King Ka? When did he reign?
Zaki Bey's immediate concern, he said, was not with this problem, but with one that, to him, was much more intriguing. These tombs, obviously, were First Dynasty. (Or earlier?) The names of the other two kings, the type and decoration of the objects found there, and some additional evidence, apparently fixes the period beyond question.
Concrete floorways
But some of the tombs were built of limestone. Huge limestone slabs shored up the earthen sides, provided partitions between the compartments, and were used as false doors and porticoes.
Limestone, Bey said, has not been found in use as a building material before the Third Dynasty. Here it was — and obviously by skilled architects — long before that period. Moreover, the structure of the tombs, themselves, with their sloping steps and sealed sections, and the entrances cleverly concealed by false doors — all this indicates a high degree of development in building.
Such developments did not spring into existence, full blown. There must have been antecedents for it, long years of evolution from simpler forms. Who were the ancestors of these architects? In what period were they working?
The questions have no answer, yet. It may lie in the Unknown Dynasty, in the civilization even older than ancient Egypt.

According to Crown Prince Olaf in London, the work of this mission so far has been highly successful. It is a significant move which spells increasing doom for the Nazi invader.

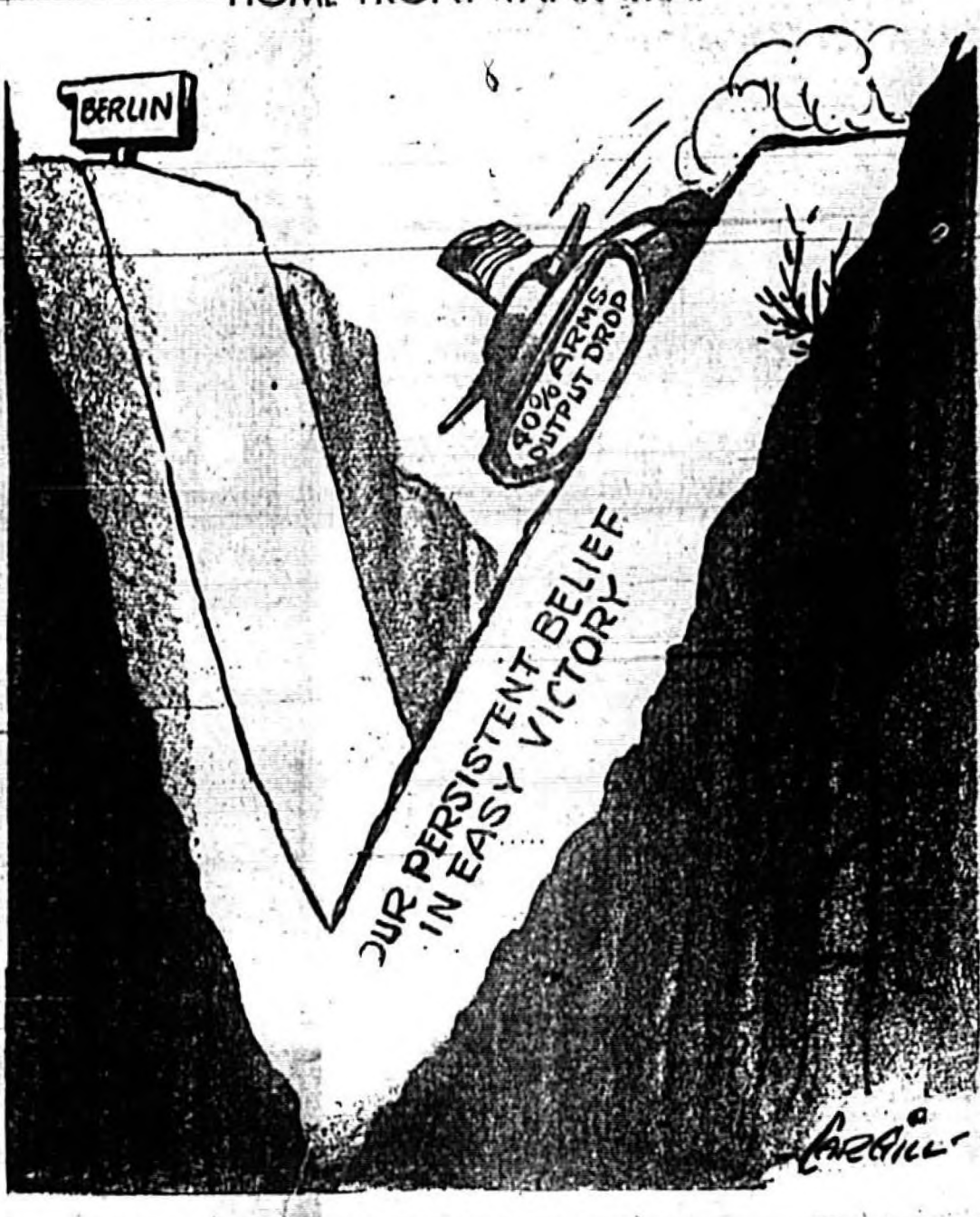

Women Should Learn To Carve Turkey

By CHARLOTTE ADAMS
 Associated Press Food Editor

A lot of women who've never carved before are going to carve the bird this holiday season—or not have the bird to eat, unless they just tear it apart, which is a messy and wasteful business. Because turkeys are so scarce, I'm going to tell you how to carve a chicken. It isn't hard, but it does take know-how.

First of all, be sure that the carving knife is sharpened to perfection. Before you start your carving career please take my word for it that a sharp knife is indispensable and thus improve your technique before you've even tried it!

Place the chicken on its platter before you with the legs to the right. Now insert the carving fork about in the center of the bird so its prongs straddle the breast bone. It remains there through the entire carving.

First step in carving is to remove the second joint and leg in one operation. Start through the skin between the thigh and the body, following the seam to the back bone socket. Now grasp the end of the drumstick with your fingers and with the blunt edge of the knife bend the whole piece down toward the platter. At this point you will see the ball socket, which you now cut with the point of the carving knife. Separate the drumstick from the second joint, or serve them as one piece, whichever you prefer.

The second step in carving the chicken is to remove the wing. Now the chicken is stripped of everything that gets in the way of carving the breast. Slice from the breast bone down and make your slices about an eighth of an inch thick. If you're trying to stretch the bird to serve a lot of people you may make the slices thinner, but if you do they'll resemble paper in flavor as well as appearance, and that's presumably not precisely what you wish to serve your guests.

Have a spoon handy to take out a serving of stuffing for each person. Here, by the way, is a stuffing which will dress in your chicken in holiday style.

SPECIAL STUFFING
 4 slices stale cracked wheat bread
 1/8 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 1/8 teaspoon sweet marjoram
 Dish of celery seed
 Salt and pepper
 1 cup chopped pecans
 2 slices crushed crisp bacon
 2 tablespoons margarine
 Milk

Crush or crumble 3 slices of the bread into the crumbs. Break remaining slice into coarse crumbs. Combine the two and mix with seasonings and nuts. Add melted margarine, salt and the egg, slightly beaten. Toss lightly. Add just enough milk to moisten and hold ingredients together lightly.

I belong to the you-do-it-better-when-you-stand-up school of carving. All the most magnificent men carvers I know stand for the operation. For a woman, particularly a small one, I think it's even more important. Besides, it adds an air of ceremony to the occasion and that's a proper air for one of our most American holidays.

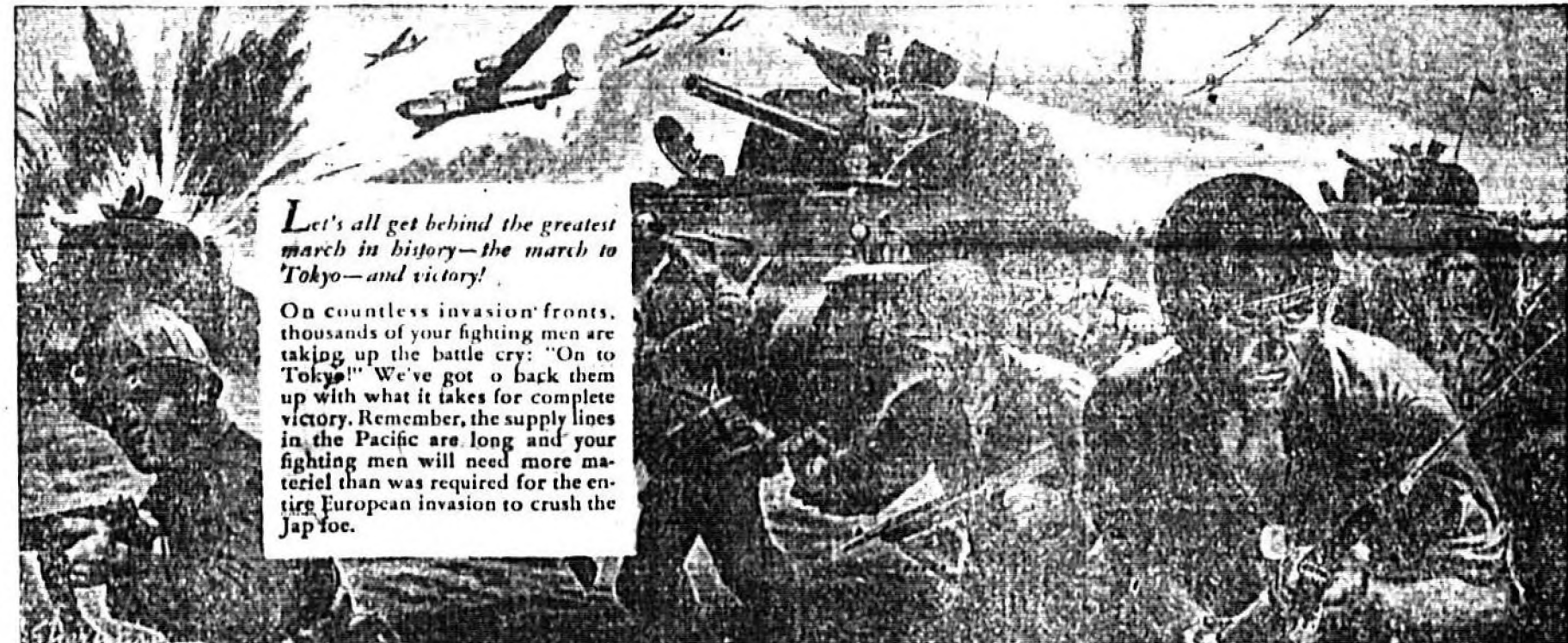

Cash For Jobs Asked House By President

Huge Sum Would Be Spent On Plans For Post-War Construction, Public Works

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (AP)—The Administration made its first request yesterday for cash to help get postwar employment rolling toward President Roosevelt's goal of 60,000,000 jobs.

The president asked congress to appropriate \$15,000,000. The money may be included in a deficiency appropriation bill before the end of the year, since congress already has approved the purposes for which it will be spent.

The idea is for the Federal Works Agency to solicit most of it up—not give it away, but lend it—among states, counties and cities on a population basis. They, in turn, would spend it on plans, blueprints and engineering for schools, hospitals and other public works.

Then, if employment needs a stimulant in the reconstruction period, contracts can be let and the projects started immediately.

The loans will be repayable when construction starts.

Statistics Show Cost Of War To Great Britain

LONDON, Nov. 29. (AP)—King George, wearing the tenth consecutive position of the current parliament, declared that Britain intends to "win the war by any means possible" in the United Kingdom forces fighting Japan.

When the European war ends, he said the ministers are preparing for civilian production in a transition from war to peace without in any way prejudicing the active prosecution of the war against Japan.

LONDON, Nov. 29. (AP)—The cost of Britain's five years of total war—the normal life of the nation obliterated, 15 per cent of the whole population casualties, the riches stored up by past generations dissipated—was described to the world today in a government white paper.

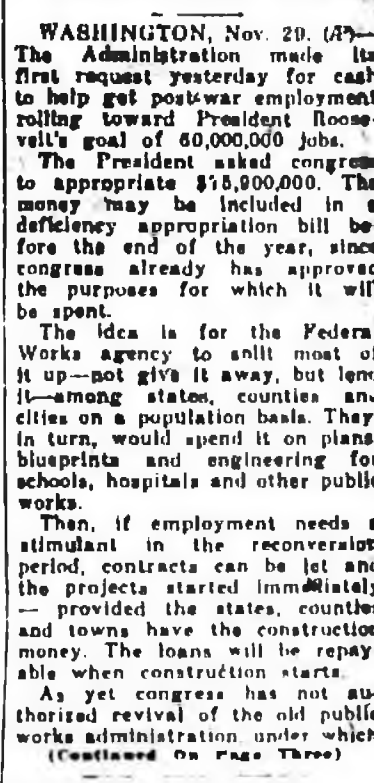

Inhuman treatment of South Sea island natives, children, to the Japs is related in a letter by Capt. I. Massey, G.M.C., U.S.N., to his parents in Orlando and revealed in The Herald by his cousin, Miss Mildred Williams of Sanford.

"During the aftermath of an attack on a Pacific island," he wrote, "we were talking to a few of the native kids and it's horrible how they were tortured. Kids 5 and 6 work day and night in the rice fields and only receive a handful of rice a day."

"One little kid has three big cuts on his stomach where a tap threw a hand grenade at him when he refused to work. Imagine that? We Americans are kings to them. Was invited to one of their huts while walking down the path and they came to my house and a regular feast. Every thing they own belongs to us Americans."

"But the most pitiful thing I saw was three large graveyards of little white crosses where 40,000 marines, sailors and soldiers had their lives. It's bad that we had to pay such a price for such a worthless island."

"There are plenty of Jap snipers still on the island. We are trying to starve them out, but they surely are desperate. They strike at night, killing men and getting their K rations. Even caught a few in the Army chow line dressed in army clothes from the dead boys."

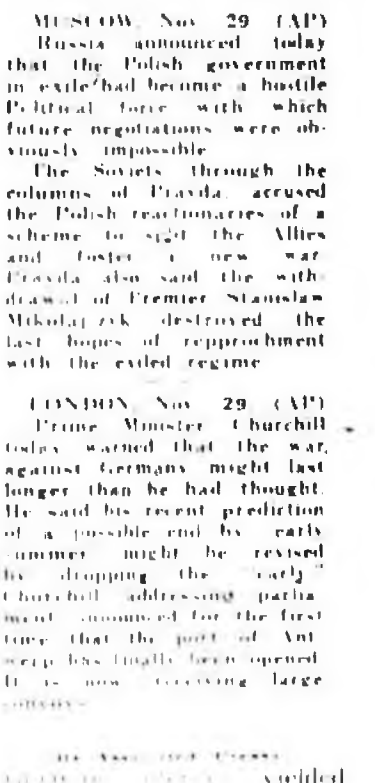
