out here. The whole atmosphere is pregnant with odors, because of this condition. Dr. Silsky was called out here to one of our tax payers and he made this statement, that it is deplorable and if there is not something done, an epidemic is inevitable. We pray that you gentlemen will see that sufficient amount of sewage is installed so that the service of these cess pools can be diverted from this community for they are a menace to health.

"(2) If the ditch was cleaned out, beginning at the head of 17th Street, through down to the Atlantic Coast Line crossing 13th Street between Lake's Ave. and William Ave., this would change some of this water that's going through Goldsboro and flooding these cess pools. We ask you gentlemen in the name of Christ for humanity sake, please see that this large ditch is opened up.

"(3) On Olive Ave., beginning at the railroad crossing 14th Street and 13th Street, on out to 9th St., there is a man hole at the filling station on 13th St. and Olive Ave. This man hole is full of bottles. Instead of the water going in the man hole, and going on out to 10th St., the water runs down the streets because of the man hole being stopped up. Therefore, the effects of these cess pools can be felt because of this situation. We pray you gentlemen to see that something is done here.

"(4) If you gentlemen will have some sort of drainage from 17th St. north of Orlando Ave., cross to 10th St., that would catch the over flowing cess pools from covering Goldsboro as it does. We pray you gentlemen will see to this because the majority of our rainy season is in front of us.

"(5) There is a large ditch north of Mulberry Ave., crossing 13th Street just west of Mulberry. It just needs cleaning out so the water can flow. We the tax payers, who constitute the members of the Welfare League, pray you gentlemen will see that something is done in regard to the above. We can hardly live out here, because of these unsanitary conditions.

"There is a pile of cans on Williams Avenue, back of Jones building, facing 13th St. This pile of cans has been there for the last four or five years. It is an incubator for mosquitoes, and you know they are spreading malaria.

"(6) There are a number of vacant lots in Goldsboro which have grown up like wilderness. We think that the city should find some way to have the property owners to clean up these lots, or the city do so and charge same to the property owner taxes.

"If we will clean up some of these conditions that we above spoke of, our community will be

they ought to be changed."

At Crestview, Newman C. Brackin, who will be president of the 1949 Senate, said he hadn't heard of the special session plan at all. "It would be all right if it would solve our problems," he said. He favored some means of direct voting for President.

Richard H. Simpson of Monticello, former House speaker, said

he would be willing to serve without pay in a short session to change the election laws.

"The people ought to know what they're going to vote on and if they don't know, things should be arranged so they can," he said.

Present law does not permit the name of any Presidential candidate to appear on the general election ballot. Voters will have to vote, instead, for the eight Presidential electors on the Republican side, the eight on the Democratic side or write in eight names.

A vote for the eight Republican electors will mean a vote for Thomas E. Dewey because all of them will cast their votes for

him in the electoral college next January.

But it isn't clear what voters for the eight Democratic electors will mean. Three of them have said they will not vote for Truman, one has said he will. The other four haven't said whether they will vote for Truman or Thurmond.

The special session movement apparently was revived by Democrats in Orange County, one of the state's Republican strongholds. Orange County has the only Republican member of the legislature, Alex Akerman, Jr. He is opposed by Charles O. Andrews, Jr., the Democratic nominee.

Andrews is one of the special session movement leaders, although it would be Akerman — not Andrews — who would sit in the Orange County seat.

## Soviet Consul Denies Charge Of Red Teacher

Mrs. Kosenkina's Story Of Activity In Consulate Said Untrue By Russian

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—Alger Hiss, former State Department official, has accepted an invitation to testify to the House Un-American Activities committee in closed session late today. Chairman Thomas (Tom) H. Wright, when announcing this, told reporters it is improbable that Whittaker Chambers will be present.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16. (AP)—A Soviet vice-consul today described as "not true" a police statement that Mrs. Oksana Stepanova Kosenkina pointed to him from her bed at Roosevelt Hospital last week and accused him of holding her a prisoner in the Soviet Consulate.

"The story is not true," the vice-consul, Zolt I. Cherpunykh, told newsmen. "She did not say what the police say she said. She didn't say, you didn't let me go; and she didn't point at me either."

A Russian-speaking detective said Friday that the 52-year-old Soviet school teacher rejected Cherpunykh's suggestion that she be moved to another hospital, declaring, "you kept me a prisoner, you would not let me go."

Cherpunykh, after repeated demands to see Mrs. Kosenkina, had been escorted to the hospital room where the teacher is recovering from serious injuries received in a three-story leap from the consulate building. Police quoted her as

## 4 Negroes Held Jewish Traffic For Murder At Is Fired On By Ormond Saturday Snipers In Judea

Officer Says Men Shooting In Hills Were Caught In Car Seen Near Killing

ORMOND, Aug. 16. (AP)—Sheriff deputies announced today the apprehension of four negroes in the apprehension in the slaying of a pretty Georgia stenographer and her escort on a desolate moonlit beach here.

Sheriff Alex Littlefield said the young "vacationing" couple—24-year-old Mary Hucks of Easy Point, Ga., and Gregory Blount, 23, of Lexington, Ky.—were shot and killed Saturday night on a lonely beach about a half-mile from habitation.

The girl had been raped. Deputy Sheriff T. J. Wright said the negroes were being questioned closely at an undisclosed location. They were apprehended in an auto which fitted the description of one observed near the murder scene, he said.

Meanwhile in Sarasota, Police Chief Ed A. Garner said four young men were being held for questioning in connection with the murder of the couple at Ormond Saturday night.

Garnier said the men had in their possession an automatic .22-caliber pistol which he said he understood was the type weapon used in killing the young couple. He said he had contacted Daytona Beach officers who asked that they be held. Garner said he knows no other details about the case.

In the glove compartment of the car, Garner related, was found a hood of the type women wear about their head with two fingers apiece in it which could possible be blood.

"They didn't have a nickel between them and they were nervous," he added. They denied being in the Ormond area.

The automobile had an Indiana license. He said the four were "picked up for investigation" last night when someone called police to report a car parked across from a filling station.

## Army Expects To Start Draft In November

Manpower Requisition Needed From Army To Determine Induction Number

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—The Army expects to start taking its first batch of about 15,000 inductees under the new draft law early in November.

Major General John L. Dallquist estimated the draftees will start coming into training camps between Nov. 1 and 15.

This estimate is based on a calculation that Selective Service will need about 60 days to make the inductions after it gets a manpower requisition order from the Army.

"We might put in the requisition in the next week or 10 days," Dallquist told a reporter. "Our people are working directly and informally with Selective Service and we are trying to coordinate things so that we ask them."

Dallquist explained that the Army has to complete plans for accommodation and training of the draftees, and that the number of men enlisted in the Army has a bearing on how many men will be sought through the draft.

The requirements for drafted men will gradually increase to about 50,000 monthly, Dallquist said, but added it would be a gradual increase rather than an immediate doubling of the draft call.

The upsurge in enlistments has made some difference in Army draft plans, Dallquist said. Last month the Army and Air Force signed up 51,401 men. Dallquist said this was more than 10,000 above what he had expected.

The registration of the nation's young men begins August 30. All aged 18 through 25 must register, although only those 18 and older are subject to draft.

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OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 16. (AP)—The British Army said Arab snipers fired on Jewish traffic today on the Judean mountain road two miles west of Jerusalem.

The report followed a day in which Jerusalem resounded to the heaviest fighting since the second United Nations truce started four weeks ago. Both Arabs and Jews accused the other side of starting the battle.

The Army announcement said there was skirmishing in four areas of Jerusalem and asserted that "Arab military activity continued steadily in the last 24 hours."

The rifle fire in the Judean hills was the first reported against traffic there in nearly three months. The Jews said the Arabs apparently fired high positions which they had infiltrated on a hillside commanding the road near the Jewish-held village of Beit Issa.

Meanwhile in Britain, the Ministry of Defense already facing espionage charges, of helping plan the Ben Yehuda Street bombing here last Feb. 22. More than 50 persons died in that blast, in the heart of the Jewish business district.

Buncombe County (Asheville) in the western mountain resort area, which lifted its quarantine over the weekend, reported no new cases.

BABY DROWNS NESCOPECK, Pa., Aug. 16. (AP)—"Come on home," Lawrence Dawson called yesterday to his two-year-old daughter, Ila, who had taken her doll to a small creek 50 yards from their home.

"I'm bathing my baby," Ila called back.

Five minutes later, Dawson walked to the creek. Ila had drowned in October.

1948-'49 Budget Is Adopted By County Board

5 To 8 Percent Drop In Expenditures Is Estimated By Pope

The County Commission adopted its 1948-49 budget on Friday, and appropriated \$406,713 for all County purposes. This is about 5 to 8 percent less than last year, it was estimated by H. B. Pope, chairman of the Commission. Two-thirds of the taxpayer's dollar will go to schools. County millage remains at 10 mills.

The Detroit address, under labor organization sponsorship, will be made in the afternoon, the exact time to be announced later.

Mr. Truman's charge that Rep. Frank J. McHugh has built up inflation into a major issue, it is likely to prompt a campaign demand by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for a drastic cut in government spending.

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Mr. Pope pointed out that all of this money will not be expended during the calendar year, as there must be a sizeable carry-over of funds for outlay during the interval between Fall and winter, or between the fiscal and calendar years.

Of the total appropriated for county purposes, 47 percent goes for repair and construction of roads and bridges, 17 percent for county operation, 9 percent for county enforcement, 15 percent for health and welfare, 2 percent for educational and home demonstration purposes, 2 percent for public welfare, and 8 percent for other non-exempt purposes such as library, pensioners, books and records, hospital equipment, etc., it was announced by C. P. Hendon, County clerk.

The tax levy produces 48 percent of the revenue or \$196,139, while 52 percent, or \$210,282, is realized from race track money, excess fees and balances carried over from the previous year.

Homesesteads in the county are exempt up to \$5000, but in the Sanford area are subject to a 2 mill school bond tax and in other districts, one mill for school bonds.

On non-exempt property in the Sanford area, the school millage will be 20 and the County, 10, with 66 2/3 cents of each dollar going to schools and the remainder to the County. In other districts the school millage will be 19 and the County, 10, or 45 1/2 cents to schools and 34 1/2 cents to the County.

On each \$1000 non-exempt valuation, the total tax will be \$30 in Sanford (District No. 1) and slightly less in the other districts.

ROTCA Students Will Get Draft Deferment

## Western Allies To Stand Firm In Berlin Row

General Clay Says Four Power Meet Will Not Change Occupation Plans

MOSCOW, Aug. 16. (AP)—Western diplomats held their longest conference of the current negotiations today with Foreign Minister Molotov, talking in the Kremlin for nearly four hours. The ambassadors of the United States, Britain and France and a special envoy from the British Foreign office ended their sixth conference with Molotov since July 31 at 9:45 P.M. (1:45 P.M. Eastern Standard Time).

FRANKFORT, GERMANY, Aug. 16. (AP)—General Lucius D. Clay said tonight he expected the Western Allies to stand firm on their present German policy in the four-power divisions underway in Moscow.

"I know of no intention by anybody to deviate from the present program," the U.S. occupation chief said.

He made the statement in reply to a news conference question whether Moscow decisions might alter the plans of the United States, Britain and France for the formation of a Western German government.

He indicated the West would continue with that objective until such time as there could be a unified Germany, reflecting the political and economic views of the whole German people.

"Tokyo Rose" Is Ordered To Face Treason Charges

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—Attorney General Clark today directed the arrest in Tokyo of American born Mrs. Toguri D'Aquino in connection with wartime broadcasts over radio Tokyo.

The attorney general said Mrs. D'Aquino, native of Los Angeles and the wife of a Portuguese citizen, will be brought back to the United States to answer a treason charge.

The Justice Department said Mrs. D'Aquino was one of at least six English speaking Japanese women to whom American fighting men applied the name "Tokyo Rose" as a result of broadcasts claimed to U.S. forces in the Pacific between 1943 and 1945.

The broadcasts played heavily on the homesickness theme and were best described by authorities as intended to promote war-weariness among the Americans.

However, the department said that Mrs. D'Aquino was never known to have used the name "Tokyo Rose" in any of her alleged broadcasts. It said she broadcast under the name "Ann" or "Orphan Ann."

Mrs. D'Aquino was described by Justice officials as the only American-born woman among the wartime Tokyo broadcasters.

Clark asked the Army, the governing body of Japan, to take Mrs. D'Aquino into custody "and return her to the United States as early a date as possible for prosecution."

Improving Health

The best way we can think of  
to get rid of the "red herring"  
in government is to can them.

In Central City, Colo., a man  
and his wife are arrested for  
chaining their four children by  
the neck in a dark room for days,  
at a time. Speaking of civil rights,  
how about a federal statute pro-  
hibiting such people from having  
children?

Do you know why prices are  
high? On reason might well be  
because the federal government has  
spent \$130,000,000 in the last  
year on the production of pure  
potatoes, and is planning to  
spend \$70,000,000 more this year.  
For the same purpose in spite  
of President Truman's professed  
desire to avoid further inflation,  
we do not mind paying taxes for  
public improvements, but the pur-  
pose of increasing our money bill.

Governor Caldwell wields moves  
to call a special session of the  
Legislature in order to amend  
Florida's election laws so that  
the people will know where they  
are voting and can vote in where  
they choose among the various  
presidential candidates in next  
November's election. Why not  
put the names of Truman, Wallace,  
Thurmond, and Dewey on the  
ballot and let the people know  
where they're voting for? Why  
make it as difficult as possible  
that half the people will get it  
all balled up?

The dramatic picture of Mrs.  
Koskenkina from the Red consulate  
in New York personifies the  
victims of the Soviet system  
as agents of articles by qualified  
writers have failed to do. To  
the man on the street it means  
nothing that competent observers  
have repeatedly told us during  
the past 25 years of the evils of  
Communism as practiced in Russia;  
but when a middle aged  
school teacher jumps out of a  
third floor window it fails to set  
down from it, even the  
guileless on the street gets a  
fleeting glimpse of what it is all  
about.

Goldstein negroes have a good  
case in their political fight. The City

used at a check for dictatorship.  
Federal abolition of poll taxes is  
merely an entering wedge which  
will ultimately give the federal  
government complete control of  
our economic activities. A fed-  
eral civil rights law would be  
the beginning of a host of similar  
legislation regulating all relations  
between men. A federal  
FEPC would open up the flood  
gates to federal control of all  
our economic activities. It would  
take a lot of federal agents to  
run our country. The South would  
not benefit much from such legislation  
but the Federation of the Na-  
tional Guard would take care of that.  
And if more men were used  
as an American branch of the  
OGPU could be created.

**The National Guard**

It is readily understandable that the Defense Department committee report calling for transfer of the National Guard to the Army was released in expectation of a barrage of protests.

It is recommended that the Guard be removed from state control and given to the Army, lock, stock and barrel, and that the state then organize new militia for their own military uses. The committee proposes, in other words, that the states be given the arduous and costly task of organizing a new military service because it is concluded that the Army needs one.

The establishment of the Army reserves does not inspire confidence that the National Guard would be improved by Army control.

If the Army needs a new reserve branch, the sensible thing would be to let the Army to work to organize one, in a pattern to fit the need exactly. The National Guard already has some assets; it would not make sense, nor would it be just, to take it away from the states and rework it to fit Army needs.

Perhaps the establishment of a new Army branch on the scope of the National Guard, and duplicating the pre-state militia could not be adequately justified. Study might be given to some plan to integrate the National Guard into the Army, to control in more precisely into the Army defense scheme, and to facilitate the utilization of the Guard for federal service in the event of a national emergency.

**Improving Health**

More than 160,000 of the men at 10 to 25 years of age who are eligible to be drafted will be considered a major power which has accrued from the improvement of health conditions in the United States, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. These men are alive today because of declining death rates since the year they were born.

Another sizable addition to the reservoir of potential draft-age men will be made by military service because the improvement in health has brought a reduction in the amount of chronic disease and serious disability among young people.

At the ages included in the peacetime draft, death rates have been reduced in the last 25 years.

There has been a decline of pneumonia and influenza, 20 to 24 percent; male industrial

Further progress in the control of disease is expected as a result of the draft. dicted, grossly exaggerated.

It is now in order for a Southern newspaper to send a white reporter, also disguised as a Negro, into the North East, to "study racial relations." We live with Negroes in the Negro sectors of cities in those regions—particularly in Pittsburgh, in New York's Harlem, in Chicago—to see how Negroes fare in their relations with the whites.

The reporter would find that undoubtedly, the Negroes of the South are better treated than they have ever been. They are not many, but those who are, much happier in the South than in the "black belt" of the North and East. —Tampa Tribune.

## FARMERS ATTEND FIELD DAYS AND OTHER MEETS TO GET CROP POINTERS

That thousands of Florida farmers are eager to improve their crops is shown by the way in which they attend demonstrations, tours, and meetings which emphasize new methods and management practices and new varieties that may be employed and produced on their farms.

Field days at the University of Florida Agricultural Experiment Station, for example, have attracted hundreds of farmers seeking information about pastures, beef cattle, dairy cattle, and other crops this year. Many others have attended meetings and demonstrations in their respective counties or sections for the same purpose. Tours, particularly those in which pastures have been featured, have attracted many during the past few weeks.

Such events as the Mango Forum

in West Palm Beach, the field day at the Range Cattle Experiment Station at Ona, the Dairy Field Day at the Main Experiment Station in Gainesville, the West Florida Bovine Egg Institute at DeFuniak Springs, the meeting of the State Horticultural Society, the Florida poultry and citrus institutes, and the farm and home institutes are very popular with Florida farmers seeking information on ways in which they can improve their production of crops, fruit, and livestock and products.

When they attend events of this kind, farmers have the opportunity to hear agricultural research workers and specialists discuss improved crops and practices and materials which will help them to produce high quality produce, ways in which they can increase production and reduce production costs, marketing their products, and many other subjects of primary importance to them. They also have the opportunity to obtain information and suggestions from other farmers.

There is no doubt about the great value of such events to Florida's agriculture. Farmers attend them and return to their farms to copy the practices they have heard about into operation on their own farms. They also point the improved crop varieties they have heard about or have seen growing on other farms. And those things mean progress in Florida agriculture.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture is developing a new type of nitrogen fertilizer known as urea-form. It remains a free-flow

ing powder even after it absorbs moisture from the atmosphere.



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## 3 Persons From Toledo Drowned As Barge Sinks

Several Hundred Picnickers Had Been Moved By Ferry

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 16 (UPI)—Three persons drowned last night when a steel cable barge carrying some 30 passengers sank in the Maumee River south of here, the state highway patrol reported.

The victims were identified as Mrs. Peter Van Klinger, 47; James Putinta, 5, and Cornelius Van Klinger, 9, the drowned woman's nephew. All were from Toledo.

Two other victims, Florence Heitz and Peter Van Klinger, the dead woman's husband were hospitalized, suffering shock and injuries, the state patrol said.

The barge, which was being used as a ferry from American Legion Island in the Maumee to the mainland, already had transported several hundred persons from a picnic sponsored on the island by the Textileworker Corp. of Toledo.

Many passengers were rescued and administered artificial respiration by persons who swam to their aid from the island.

The Putinta boy and Mrs. Van Klinger were trapped on deck and Cornelius Van Klinger's body was found near the barge, the patrol reported. The accident occurred just south of Waterville, O., which is on U. S. route 24.

## Inside WASHINGTON

Truman, Dewey May Make Trips to the Pacific Coast

Warren May Make a Tour Of East During Campaign

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—The adjournment of the special session of Congress has set the stage for the presidential campaign ahead, with President Truman likely to journey to the Pacific coast within the next eight weeks.

GOP presidential candidate Thomas E. Dewey is regarded as almost certain to go west before Mr. Truman in the presidential sweepstakes, with GOP vice presidential candidate Earl Warren probably coming east.

On the Democratic side of the picture, Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky, Mr. Truman's running mate, is slated to concentrate on border states where Senate seats hang in the balance.

In fact, one of the considerations behind Barkley's vice presidential nomination was the help he can be counted on to give the Democratic party in its fight to re-win control of the Senate.

Mr. Truman is virtually certain to pitch his main campaign battle on the record of the 80th Congress, particularly its failure to carry out his anti-inflation program. However, both Dewey and Warren are expected to counter by blaming Mr. Truman for the still soaring cost of living.

Henry A. Wallace, the Progressive party presidential candidate, will head westward with his own "peace and abundance" program.

• "FLYING RUNWAY" MAKES HOW—The Air Force is now receiving a "flying runway" cargo plane which could have shortened the Pacific war had it been available.

The "flying runway" is the famed Fairchild Packet equipped with tractor-type landing gear. It can land and take off in any reasonably level area.

Perfection of the tractor or track-type gear will eliminate in any future war much of the laborious airfield construction heretofore necessary before volume "air-lift" of supplies could begin to supply beachhead forces.

The idea of the track-type landing gear for airplanes was first tinkered with in 1920, but World War II had to be fought and won before its worth was appreciated and concrete action taken.

Now 18 of the "flying runway" planes have been put in operation and 23 more will be built.

One of the moving spirits in pushing the experiment was Gen. George C. Kenney, head of the Strategic Air Command. Kenney, as Gen. Douglas MacArthur's air chief in the Pacific, remembers countless crises when he could have moved up on Japanese islands much sooner had he had the "flying runway."

• JUDGES' BOX SCORE—The score sheet for the recently ended term of the Supreme Court shows that fiery Justice Felix Frankfurter most often rebelled against the majority's decisions. He wrote 18 of the 72 dissenting opinions issued during the term.

Justice Robert H. Jackson trailed Frankfurter with 13 dissent, and Justice Wiley Rutledge was third with 10.

Justice William O. Douglas did the most work on majority opinions, which are the weighty documents announcing the court's decisions. He wrote 22 of the 110 handed down.

Next in line were Justice Hugo L. Black with 18 and Justice Jackson with 17. Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson, boss of the high court, was a poor fourth with 12 opinions.

All told, the court handed down a grand total of 223 majority, concurring, dissenting, separate and "per curiam" opinions during the term.

saying immediately after her jump that she had been imprisoned in the consulate.

Chernopnykh said today he thought police had made a transcript after which the conversation was interrupted by Police Inspector Leiden.

"Sooner or later, the record should be released," he said. "If they didn't make a transcript, they were stupid."

The vice consul added that only a few words were spoken during the brief visit which he said was terminated when Inspector Michael E. J. Leiden announced, "that'll do" and pushed him from the room.

Meanwhile in Moscow Tass said that statements by Mrs. Okana Kosenkina have no value since they are made through American police and intelligence agents.

A Tass dispatch from New York printed in Pravda said:

"The American press continues with the effort to silence the fact that Kosenkina in the hospital continues in fact to remain in the hands of American police and all possible declarations made in her name in the papers have no value since they are made through American police and intelligence agents from whose arbitrary plans at present depends the life or death of Kosenkina."

Tass said that in Kosenkina's hospital room "there are constantly on duty two policemen" and added:

"The room is guarded by six police agents in civilian clothes

and the hospital entrance is guarded by a police guard. When on Friday the vice consul from the Soviet consulate Chernopnykh, visited Kosenkina at Kosenkina's head stood Chief Police Inspector (Michael A. J.) Leiden and Police Agent Dushko (Detective William Duzko, interpreted).

"Two policewomen also stood at the exit, one conversation continued little more than one minute and Chernopnykh succeeded in getting away before when the conversation was interrupted by Police Inspector Leiden."

A bulletin said she was "resting comfortably but still on the critical list," and her condition was unchanged.

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## Air Force Shows It Can Increase Berlin Supply Operations

American Globemaster Delivers Load Of 25 Tons To City; Reds Block British

BERLIN, Aug. 17—(AP)—An American C 74 Globemaster, largest plane ever to land in Berlin, delivered 25 tons of flour today to the blockaded city.

The Globemaster can carry a load four times as heavy as the 175 foot wingspread planes used to put in regular service.

The globemaster is attached to the Atlantic division of the U.S. Military Air Transport Service. It landed at Frankfurt and flew to Berlin in 67 minutes.

Capt. Brady Cole, of Cleveland, Miss., who flew the Himalayan hump from India to China during the war, commanded the transport. He said he believed the 11 Globemaster sister ships might be put into the service "if the situation becomes critical enough."

The run was a test. Officials said they did not know if or when the 175 foot wingspread planes would be put in regular service.

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"It needs," said Montgomery, "150,000 active, energetic, enthusiastic, and intelligent men and women by next spring."
