Arson suspected in Monday house fire

A two-alarm fire on Sanford Avenue Monday night is a suspected arson case, said fire investigator Tim Robles.

When Sanford Fire Department Battalion Chief Tommy Martin responded to the two-story house fire at 613 S. Sanford Ave. he called for the second alarm. As many as a dozen fire-fighting units from Sanford, Seminole County and Lake Mary responded to the blaze.

There were individuals staying in the home although no rent was being collected, Robles said. One civilian was transported to the Central Florida Regional Hospital for smoke ventilation. The house that had no electricity or gas had been the recent target of the police department for drug activity and prostitution.

"With that right away we suspected it to be a very suspicious fire," Robles said. Sanford Avenue was closed from about 9 to 10 p.m. After the smoke had cleared at about 11 p.m., three separate origins of fire were discovered by investigators. Robles said the home was built in the 1930s, and the three origins of fire included one on the front porch, one in the bedroom and another in a second-story bedroom.

The owner of the home is Allison Galbrith of Port St. Lucie.

Anyone with information about the suspected arson fire can call 407-302-1022. The state fire marshals offer a \$1,000 reward for information leading to an arrest.

Suicidal boater leads police on chase

SANFORD — A potentially armed and suicidal Sanford man took law enforcement officers on a wild boat chase early Monday morning on the foggy waters of Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River.

James Albert Smith, 40, is wanted for aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer as he reportedly tried to ram authorities' boats on nine different occasions, said

Steve Olson, Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman.

The incident began when a relative was leaving from a visit with Smith Sunday night. The relative said Smith made a comment to the effect 'It's been nice knowing you,' Olson said. The relative reported

Smith may be suicidal and armed in a 17-foot boat with a 90 horsepower engine on Lake Monroe. A public records check at the state department of motor vehicles revealed the boat is not registered to Smith.

A wildlife officer responded and tried to strike up a dialogue with Smith, Olson said.

Smith allegedly reacted by attempting to ram the officer's boat. At that point, the Seminole and Volusia sheriff's offices also became involved as both sent two watercrafts searching for Smith.

One Seminole deputy reported Smith came out of the fog at full speed and he had to make a hard right turn to avoid being hit, said Olson. Smith reportedly tried to ram the wildlife officer's boat seven times, and

Community gathers to commemorate civil rights leader

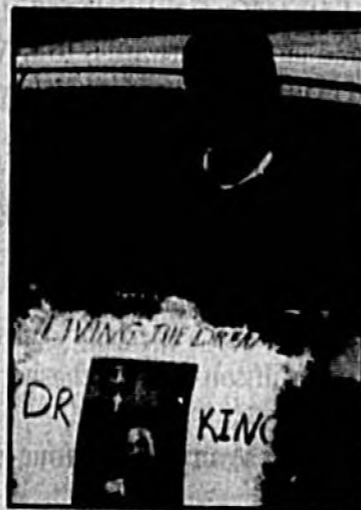

Frith ready to lead Main Street

SANFORD — Marlene Frith knows a thing or two about managing egos. She spent 17 years working as an aide to various congressmen and state legislators.

"There aren't any more diverse personalities or bigger egos than those you find in Washington," Frith said.

She quickly learned that to survive on Capitol Hill you had to communicate your message and prepare for some good old-fashion horse-trading.

"Politics is the art of compromise," Frith said. "You may not agree with another congressman's position, but if you're going to accomplish anything, you have to sit down at the table and hammer out solutions."

Those skills will come in handy in Frith's new job as executive director of Sanford Main Street Inc. The 11-year-old

organization has had its ups and downs and is looking for fresh direction. In addition, there have been turf wars — some actual, some perceived — between Main Street and the Downtown Business Association, founded by Sara Jacobson. Most notably, Jacobson and the DBA officers

Commissioners discuss proposed transit tax bill

SANFORD — Two agenda items discussed by county commissioners Tuesday could assist in improving mass transit services in Seminole.

Staff informed commissioners of a newly proposed house bill that would allow them to ask voters to levy a one-cent transit sales tax — only after the current local option expires.

Rep. Sara Romeo (D) of Hillsborough County is sponsoring House Bill 675, which proposes to amend the state statute that allows counties to levy a transit system surtax. The new bill would strike a requirement in the

statute that prohibits counties with a charter adopted after June 1, 1976 from participating. Seminole voters adopted the current charter in the 1980s.

The LYNX Board will also consider supporting the new bill at their Thursday meeting. LYNX is actively searching for a more predictable revenue source from Seminole, Osceola and Orange counties, said Frankie Callen, LYNX executive manager of governmental affairs.

"What other counties choose to do is totally up to them," Callen said, "but this could give them one more option."

In preparation for each year's

Sanford police nip thief in the bud

Man no longer threat to rose bush garden

SANFORD — For two long years, the Lori Fiorelli waited for the news she received Jan. 18.

Friday wasn't necessarily a special date, but with one single arrest, it marked the end to an assault on the couple's flowerbeds.

Sanford police arrested James Elwood Knight, 47, of Sanford Friday night after Ron Fiorelli witnessed Knight stealing two of his blue potted rose bushes.

Since 1998, Lori Fiorelli estimates 100 rose bushes have been

stolen from her Park Avenue rose garden. Police found Knight hiding in an alley with five rose bushes as a passer-by alerted them to which direction he ran. It's uncertain, as of yet, if he will be implicated in the previous thefts.

"I really think it's the same guy," Lori said. "I'm going to keep on this and make sure he pays for the crime."

Knight is not admitting to any additional thefts at this point, but investigators are talking with him, said police spokeswoman

Cleo Cohen.

Police charged Knight with petty theft and possession of drug paraphernalia, as they also found a suspected crack pipe. He did admit to investigators to jumping the fence and stealing the rose bushes, according to the police report.

The Friday attempted theft was no surprise to Lori. She said a thief routinely would make a big hit and then come back again shortly afterward. The thief had not made an appearance

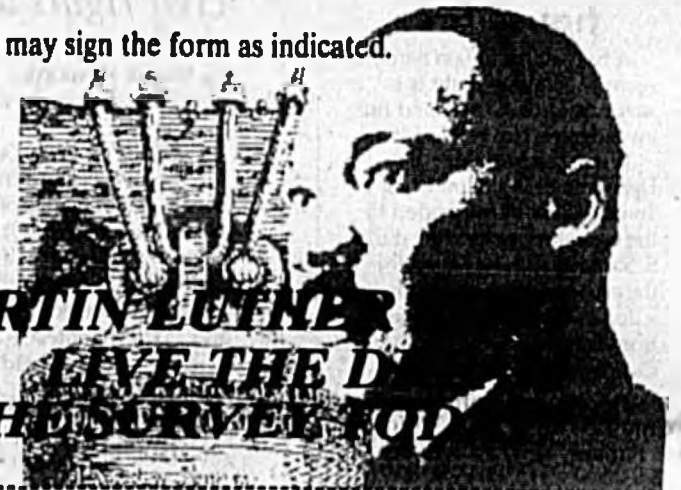

City planners want to make 17/92 area pedestrian friendly

SANFORD — City planners will host a community workshop Friday, Feb. 8, to solicit solutions for improving the "walkability" of U.S. Highway 17/92 between 13th and 20th streets.

The workshop will be facilitated by Dan Burden, director of Walkable Communities Inc., and Charles Gandy, a nationally recognized expert on "anti-gridlock" transportation strategies and former Director of Advocacy Programs for the Bicycle Federation of America from July 1994 to September 1998.

"The city applied for and received a grant from

MetroPlan Orlando to conduct the program," said Antonia Gerli, senior planner for the city of Sanford. "The workshop is open to everyone. We want to find ways to make that area more pedestrian friendly."

Gerli said the city is searching for solutions to calm traffic and "improve the 'walkability' between 13th and 20th streets."

"We thought that area had some problems, particularly when you take into account the middle school and the shopping center located there," Gerli said. "That is a heavy pedestrian area, but it's also a fairly unwelcoming pedestrian area."

Approximately 30,000 cars travel that stretch of 17/92

daily, including a high volume of truck traffic, Gerli said.

"The State Farmers' Market at 13th Street and 17/92 draws a lot of trucks and that adds to the pedestrian issues," Gerli said.

The workshop, scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Feb. 8 at Sanford Fire Station #31, will focus on hands-on participation and community input is encouraged.

"The group will provide recommendations to the city," Gerli said. "Hopefully, we can come up with some solutions that can be implemented."

Gerli said the city won't be able to identify funding sources or a preliminary timetable for

improvements until after the workshop.

"We expect both the city and MetroPlan could provide funding," she said. "It really depends on what kind of solutions are recommended and how those solutions would fit in the different transportation classifications."

In addition to Burden and Gandy, planners from MetroPlan Orlando and county officials will attend the meeting.

"We'll be using the workshop to make people aware of our needs," Gerli said.

he also tried to ram the two sheriff's boats once apiece, Olson said.



vigorously lobbied City Commission last summer to void the Christmas parade contract between the city and Main Street and allow DBA to run the event. Main Street members acquiesced but grumbled about DBA's sharp-tongued carping regarding previous Christmas parades.

Frith just shrugs when she asked about the history of the Main Street-DBA relationship. As a proud member of the Daughters of the American Revolution (her ancestor, Capt. Henry Hoover, fought with George Washington) Frith values history, but knows her tenure as director will be judged on future actions.

"There are so many opportunities ahead of Main Street and the city of Sanford that I honestly don't have time to focus on those things," Frith said. "I'm new in town so I begin with a blank slate for everyone. I don't know you and you don't know me, so there's no reason why we can't build a relationship."

Frith notes that Sanford is not unique when it comes to turf wars among civic groups and points out that Main Street and DBA, as

well as the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, have a core mission of making Sanford a better community. The key is taking pride in success, regardless of which group claims credit.

"Who isn't for a more prosperous Sanford?" Frith asked. "That's what we're all trying to accomplish. I see what Sara is doing, and it's wonderful. I don't think Sara's goal is to see Sanford fail. We want the same thing. We don't necessarily all have to agree, but it would be fruitful to at least talk with each other."

Frith said she and Jacobson plan to meet soon for lunch.

"I think we can find a way to work together," Frith said.

Bob Kuhn, Main Street's president, agrees with Frith that Main Street shouldn't "argue over who gets to do which event."

"We need to focus on the positive," Kuhn said. "We have a responsibility to fulfill the requirements of our charter."

Those requirements include historical preservation and economic development. Special events, such as Oktoberfest, and the monthly antique car cruises and the weekly farmers market

will remain a part of Main Street's mission. But expect to see Frith spending more time recruiting businesses to downtown.

"I intend to use the extensive list of contacts I've developed over the years," Frith said. "I've been in Central Florida for 20 years, and there are a lot of people interested in Sanford."

One area Frith plans to focus on is the city's HUBZone status granted by the federal government's Small Business Administration. The HUBZones are designed to promote business and job opportunity in economically-distressed urban and rural areas by increasing federal contracting activity in those areas. Eligible small businesses must locate in HUBZones (Historically Underutilized Business zones), which are areas of generally low income and high unemployment. The SBA expects the pool of available contracts to grow to around \$6 billion annually by 2003.

Frith said one of the attractive features about HUBZones is that 35 percent of a qualified business's employees must live in the HUBZone.

"Not only does it attract jobs,

but residents, as well," Frith said. "A vibrant downtown has a good balance of both."

In the coming months, Frith will work with the Main Street board of directors, community leaders and city officials to lay out the vision for the organization and downtown Sanford.

"I operate on a four-point principal: research, plan, implement, and evaluate," Frith said. "I'll take a community-approach."

When not working for Main Street, Frith stays busy restoring her 1929 home in Orlando and spending time with her two children.

"A friend of mine told me I had enough energy to light up Times Square," Frith chuckled. "I have a good work ethic, and I'm really excited about this job."

"This job represents a composite of what I've done best throughout my career," Frith said. "It has the historic preservation that I love — I absolutely love antiques and old buildings. It requires the political and marketing skills that I have acquired. When I saw the ad in the newspaper, I said to myself, 'That is a composite of everything I would want to do.'"

county budgets, LYNX officials approach all three county commissions and request funds similar to the process taken by any county department, said Callen. This makes it difficult to prepare for the yearly transit expenses.

Depending on the revenues of the counties, the yearly funds allocated to LYNX fluctuate. Orange County funds LYNX through property taxes while Seminole and Osceola fund the mass transit service through gas taxes.

Commissioner Grant Maloy, who sits on the Lynx Board, said he was in favor of the bill, but "at this point wouldn't ask the voters to support a transportation tax."

"We may need that option in the future," Commissioner Cotton Henley said.

The mass transit tax is different from other local option taxes as it

allows revenues to go toward capital projects and operating costs. The funds could also help in many operations including bus services, commuter rail, light rail and building more dedicated lanes of traffic for buses.

More bus shelters could also make their way to Seminole County. Commissioners directed county staff to issue a request for proposals from bus shelter vendors.

There are 415 transit stops in the county, but only 25 transit shelters. LYNX builds the shelters for \$20,000 apiece, said Maloy.

A contract with a new vendor will provide for the installation of 60 shelters and possibly 50 more as transit routes are expanded. The costs associated with the shelters will be drastically less, as 46 shelters will display advertising.

"This could potentially save us

over a million dollars," Maloy said. "There's not a lot of people who want to stand in the sun. It's an all around win-win situation."

Maloy said the well-written

proposal should bring several bids from inquiring shelter builders. A preliminary timeline has a new vendor installing shelters as soon as August.

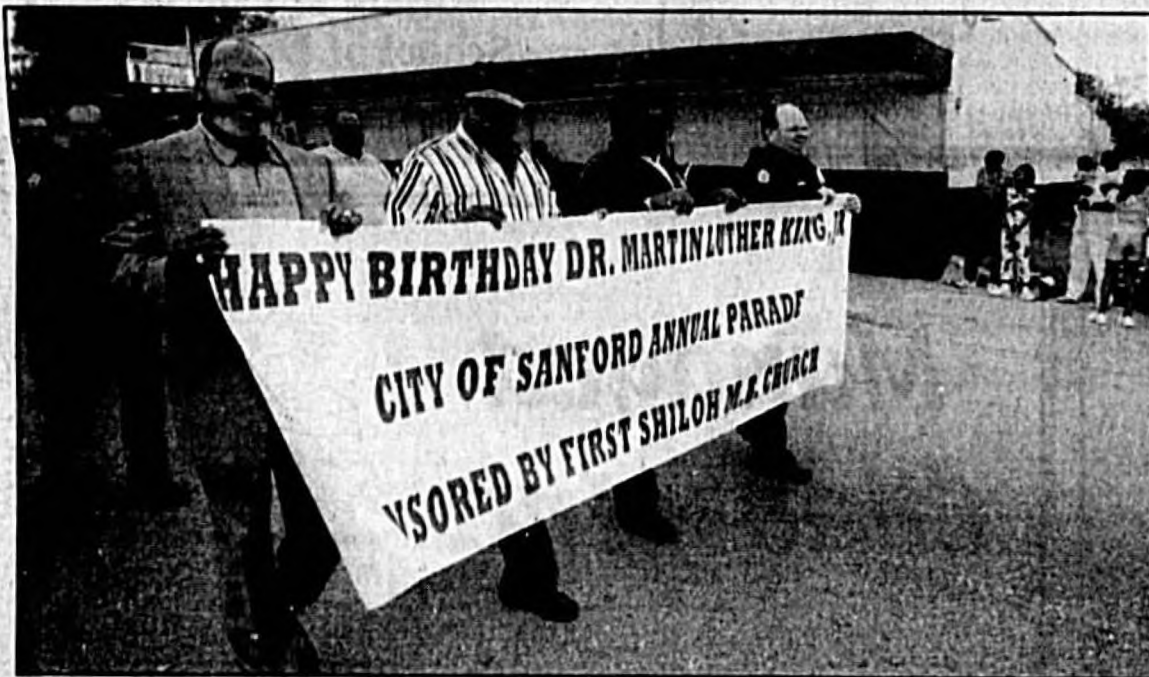

The win was the seventh in a row for SCC overall, giving it a mark of 12-8. The victory also left the Raiders alone atop the M-FC standings with a 2-0 record.

DBCC came into the game ranked No. 18 in the nation with a 20-2 record overall and the Falcons were also 1-0 in the conference after upsetting No. 8 nationally-ranked Central Florida Community College in Ocala on Wednesday.

SCC will be idle tonight (Wednesday), but will return to the SCC Health and Physical Education Center to host

Florida Community College at Jacksonville this Saturday night.

The game will be the first of a women/men doubleheader with the tipoff set for 6 p.m. The SCC men will take on the FCC-J Stars at 8 p.m.

The turnaround by the Raiders has been nothing short of phenomenal. Before Christmas, the women of coach Ken Patrick were struggling to stay at .500. Most of that was attributed to a very tough schedule and injuries.

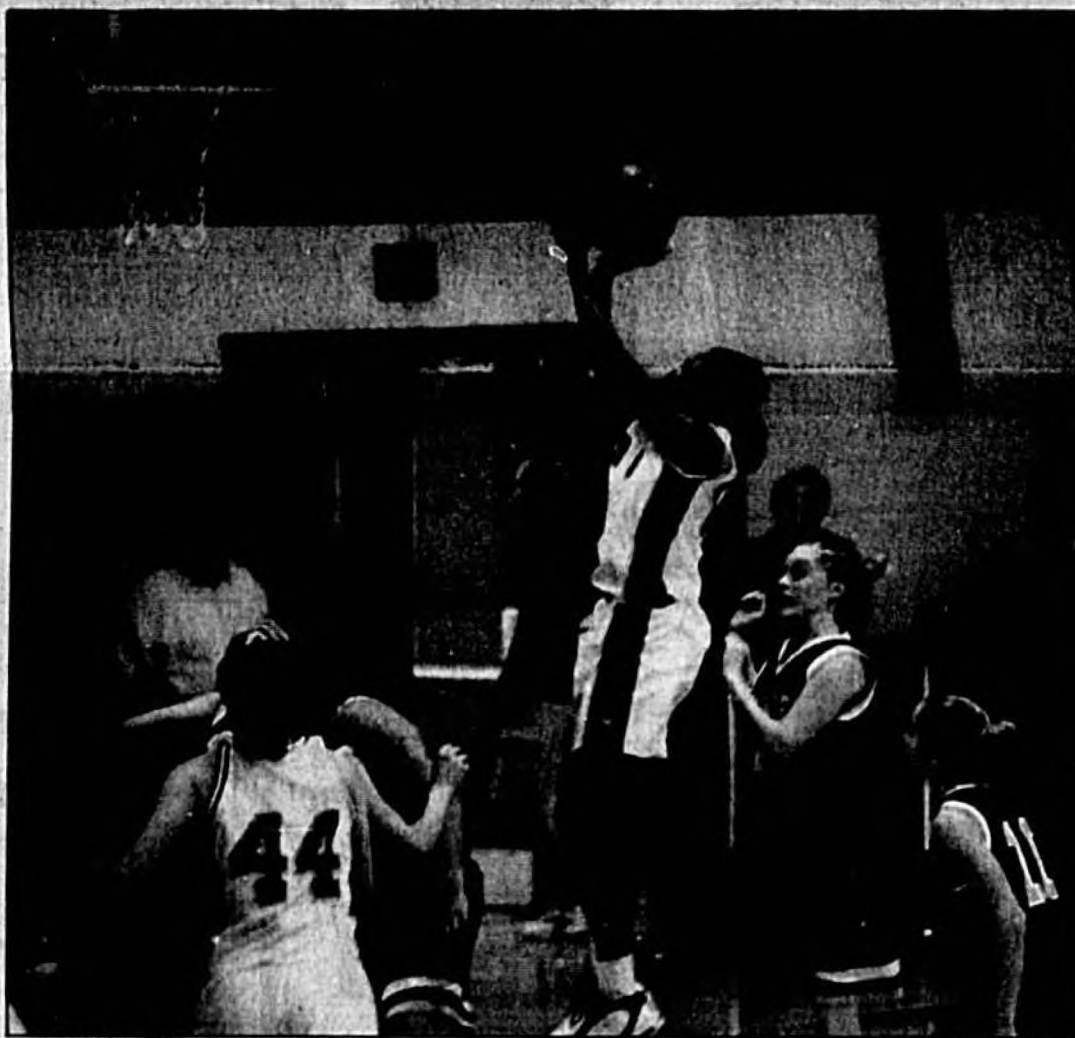

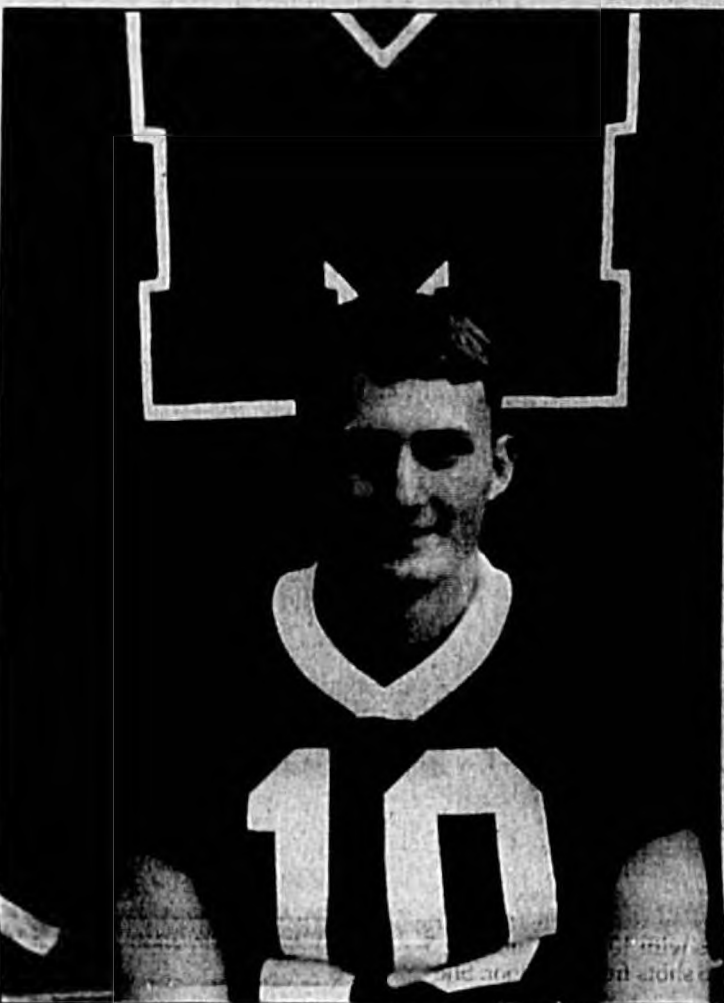
