FIRE DAMAGES MINE

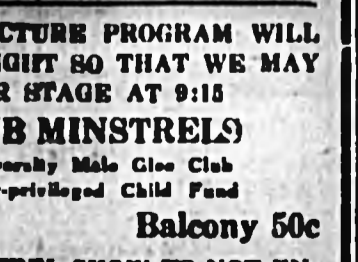

### Miami Officials Expect Reduction In City's Debts

### Big Saving Possible Due To Economic Stability Of City

MIAMI, Mar. 28 — Officials of the City of Miami, Fla., yesterday indicated that the \$28,100,000 refunding operation sched-

uled for this week is expected to effect material reductions in the debt service of the community. The financing was made possible, they said, by the financial and economic stabilization of the city during the last seven years.

"Validation by the Florida Supreme Court of the proposed bond issue opens the way," it was stated, "for a long contemplated refunding operation designed to reduce the interest charges on Miami's long-term indebtedness in the amount of more than \$7,500,000 over the life of the bonds, permits a systematic debt-retirement program to be put promptly into effect and places the entire

financial structure of the city on a stable foundation to serve the future needs of this growing community.

"The proposed refunding reflects striking improvement in Miami's economic position since 1927. In these seven years, the assessed valuation of taxable real property in Miami has risen from \$84,701,378 to \$144,501,550. During the same period new building permits in Miami have amounted to more than \$45,000,000, of which no less than \$16,825,000 were issued in 1933 alone, mainly for small homes.

"The city's recent financial progress has been impressive. During the last three years Miami has operated on a strictly cash basis, with its budget in complete balance. Of the 1935-'36 tax levy over 97.5 percent has already been collected. Since 1934 over 95 percent of all tax levies has been collected. With interest rates under the proposed refunding plan reduced to current prevailing levels and with a continuation of the recent level of tax collections, the average debt service levy in

### Employers Warned To Beware Of Book Agents, By Weaver

ORLANDO, Mar. 23. — "It has been called to my attention that certain book agents are showing employers a receipt book which is supposed to have the approval of the Social Security Board," said Paul K. Weaver, manager of the Social Security Board Office at Orlando, today.

"Employers are warned to be on the lookout for any salesman who tries to sell them a receipt book, stating that it is approved or recommended by the Social Security Board. The Board has neither approved nor recommended any type of receipt," he said. "However, all employers are now required to give receipts to their employees.

Certain specified information must be included on the receipt to the employees but the wording is left to the employer. In addition to the amount of tax deducted, the receipt must show the name of the employer, the period of time covered by the receipt, and the total amount of wages paid to the employee during this period.

Employers are required to furnish such receipts at least once a year and may furnish them often—every quarter, or every month, or every pay day, as they see fit. The receipt must be given to the employee within two months after the end of the pay period which it covers, and in any case, when the employee leaves the job.

effect for the last three years would be more than sufficient to service and retire the entire contemplated issue of \$28,100,000 of refunding bonds through serial payments within twenty-five years.

"From the standpoint of financial safeguards the features of the enabling legislation authorizing the new issue are significant. An annual levy is required for debt service which, based on the average annual collections for the preceding three years, is considered adequate to assure sufficient funds for debt charges. The city is required to refuse to accept payment of taxes for operating expense unless debt service levies are likewise paid.

"Continuance of the present tax rate for debt service is stipulated until such time as the levy equals 120 percent of the annual amount necessary for debt service. Finally, the legislation provides for immediate establishment of a cash reserve fund of \$281,000 or 1 percent of the proposed refunding issue, to be maintained intact through the whole life of the issue for the exclusive protection of debt service.

"Miami operates under the commission-manager form of government, with five elected commissioners, one of whom serves as mayor."

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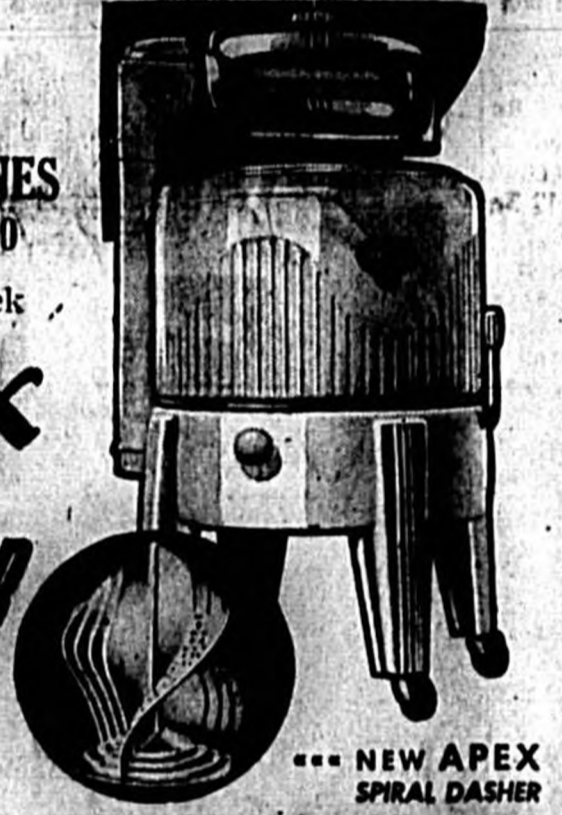

## Germany Gains In Rumanian Trading As Britain Lags

BUCHAREST, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Figures made public yesterday show that Germany is pulling more weight than Britain in their tug of war to control Rumania's foreign trade.

The figures, released at a time when the British are doing their utmost to prevent the success of the big German trade mission here headed by Dr. Karl Clodius, show that during January Rumanian exports included:

To Britain: 718,859,000 lei  
To Germany: 748,614,000 lei  
Imports during the same month were:  
From Britain: 100,085,000 lei  
From Germany: 832,170,000 lei

(The Rumanian lei is quoted at 25 cents.)

The figures, showing a definite swing toward Germany, were believed certain to influence negotiations of the trade delegations which Rumania will send to London in a few days.

Significance of the figure lies in the fact that the Germans, while buying increasing quantities of Rumanian products, are able to keep the balance of trade in their favor.

Britain, on the other hand, is paying for much of what she buys in cash and thus furnishing Rumania with foreign exchange which Rumania may be using to make good her excess purchases in Germany.

The British understand this situation, and that is why they want the Rumanian trade delegation to visit London.

Rumanian purchases of German war materials and machinery are largely responsible for the favorable German trade balance, but it is noteworthy that automobiles, motorcycles, radios and other electrical and photographic supplies are being bought in increasing quantities.

Britain, it is understood, will offer to supply the Rumanians with everything they have been buying from Germany, particularly machinery and war supplies.

The British are calling Rumania's attention to the fact that London granted Bucharest important credits less than a year ago and that expected increases in British sales to this country have not increased as expected. Indeed British sales to this country have shown no increase for three years.

## Will Hays Strikes At Attempts Made To Censor Movies

NEW YORK, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Attempts at movie censorship were scolded yesterday by Will H. Hays as "a scheme destructive of the very basis of free speech, a free press, the freedom of the air and free action."

In his annual report as head of Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Inc., Hays cited facts and figures to support his contention that "the progressive social improvement of the screen is the result of self-regulation."

He said that in only one picture which rank among the best of the industry has producer during current tensions advocated for right markets and compensation to meet the demand for lower costs "to not only a tribute to a free screen which has reached its artistic maturity, but proved that self-regulation has succeeded where censorship has failed."

"It is ironic," he added, "that notwithstanding this record there should be any insistence on a subterfuge potentially more vicious than any form of outright censorship."

"The new censorship movement parades under the name of 'community selection'—except that self-appointed censors, not the community, are to do the selecting."

He contended that what is now urged "through misleading propaganda is really selection without the consent of the community."

Hays declared that "dictation by even well-intentioned groups as to what pictures shall or shall not be shown in any given theater, not to mention dictation from groups with an axe to grind, would stultify the art."

He said that the vitality and promise of industry under freedom to dare and to develop in the American way are proved by a succession of exceptional films now flowing from American studios.

 complete break with Moscow, realizing, as the newspaper Epique declared editorially yesterday, that "it would be a terrible mistake to hand over the Russian army as a plenary to be fashioned by German organizers." . . . Whenever military aspects of the Allies' relations with Russia are examined attention always centers on the great French military pool now established in Syria under Gen. Maxime Weygand, alongside the Turks' modern army of a half million men and the Anglo-Egyptian and Anzac expeditionary forces to the south, a total force of well over 1,000,000 men available for immediate action in the Balkans, the Black Sea basin or the Caucasus. . . . Considerable interest was shown yesterday, therefore, in the general staff talks which continued at Beirut among French, British and Turkish officers. Dispatches from Byrta emphasize the importance of the talks as a like prelude to even greater military cooperation of the three powers.

LONDON, Mar. 28.—(AP)—British-Russian relations, already bad, were subjected to new strain yesterday when Soviet Ambassador Malisky attempted in vain to obtain the release of two Russian freighters seized by British warships in the Far East. . . . Coolness between London and Moscow was not helped by the French request that Soviet Ambassador Souritz be relieved of his duties in Paris, although this incident was not believed likely to cause Malisky to leave London. . . . In an interview with Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax, arranged at Malisky's request on orders from Moscow, the Soviet ambassador renewed an earlier protest regarding detention of the British at Hongkong of the Russian freighters Selenga and Mayakovsky. He demanded the immediate release of both and reserved the right to claim compensation. He gave Halifax official assurances that the cargoes of both ships were only for Soviet consumption. . . . British warships on contra-band patrol intercepted the Mayakovsky on Mar. 15 about 100 miles from Zugarus straits and took this vessel to Hongkong. The Selenga, also seized near Japan, was detained on Jan. 13 and taken to Hongkong. . . . The Mayakovsky was loaded with 4,000 tons of United States copper and 200 tons of molybdenite taken on board at San Pedro. The Selenga, bound from Manila to Vladivostok, carried tungsten, tin and antimony. . . . Lord Halifax replied to Malisky, as the British foreign office did to previous Russian protests, that British authorities still were investigating the ships and their cargoes. . . . It was understood that despite the continued strain on Anglo-Russian relations, Moscow is ready to let bygones be bygones and co-operate in an effort to improve them. . . . The impression prevails among foreign diplomats here that the

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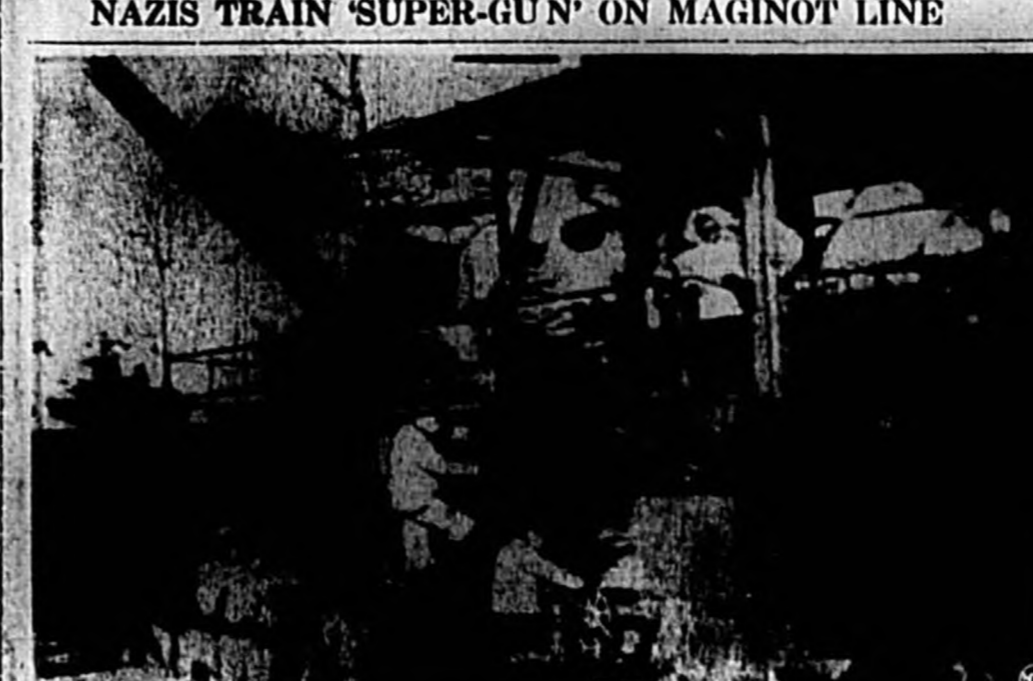
