This act of what might be called defensive sabotage is to deprive Germany of the 6,200,000 metric tons of oil a year that the Rumanian wells

"After the boys from San Antonio and Dallas are through with the wells, Hitler's drillers will have to work from six to eighteen months getting them back into shape again. The Germans may not be able to spare the time. Down in Syria old General Weygand is mobilizing a colonial army of Anzacs, Aussies and British and French regulars that makes the army of Lawrence of Arabia look like a troop of Boy Scouts. The purpose of this army is ostensibly a defensive one but when and if Hitler attacks Rumania it will become an offensive one.

Their argument is that Germany has not sufficient iron and steel, over the past three years of intensive rearmament, to spare for the construction of tanks for more than three or at the most four million tons of oil.

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



He demanded the immediate release of both and reserved the right to claim compensation. pensation. He gave Hallfax of-ficial assurances that the cargoss of both ships were only for So-viet consumption.

British warships on contra-band patrol intercepted the May-akovsky on Mar. 15 about 100 miles from Zugarus straits and

miles from Zugarus straits and took the vessel to Hongkong. The Selenga, also seized near Japan, was detained on Jan, 13 and taken to Hongkong.

The Mayakovaky was loaded with 4,000 tons of United States copper and 200 tons of molybenite taken on board at San Pedro. The Selenga, bound from Manila to Viaulivostok, carried tungsten, tin and antimony.

Lord Halifax replied to Maisky, as the British foreign office did to previous Russian protesta, that British authorities still were investigating the ships and their cargoes.




