

Those are some pretty fancy statistics to shove into the record books, but that's what Seminole High's Jim Pigott is doing as he hangs up his coaching hat.

After eight years as head football coach of the Seminoles, Pigott has resigned to take an administrative position with the Paim Beach County school system. It brings to a close a total of 14 years as a football coach in which his teams, including the Seminoles, racked up a total win-loss-tie record of 103-34-13.

During his years in Sanford, Pigott never fielded a losing team, posting a 63-16-7 record, and gathered in aix post-season prep bowl victories out of seven attempts. How does it feel to be putting all that behind him?

"It's with a great deal of reluctance," Pigott says of leaving. "I've thoroughly enjoyed it here. I'll miss the contact with the boys of course, but financially I'll be much better off . . ."

Pigott will be stepping into a newly created position in Palm Beach County, that of supervision of physical education and driver education for the county's 90 schools

"It's the first time I will be putting my college work to its fullest potential," Pigott said. "I'll miss coaching and the contact with the boys.

"I've tried to be the type of coach I'd like to have coach me." That's the philosophy Pigott has followed in guiding his successful teams, and it apparently pays off as a guideline.

. . . . . In 1957, his first year to hold the reins as Seminole High coach, the Seminoles posted an S-1-1 ledger. In 1963, this climbed to a stunning 9-1 record, and last year tallied and 8-1-2 entry, Last year the Seminoles added a a post-sesson victory by dumping Leesburg in the Elks Bowl.

But perhaps Pigott's most famous team was the 1961 edition, which went 10-0-1, yielding only four touchdowns during the regular season, and going on to score one of the frequent post-season victories.

Pigott attributes his success here to the cooperation he has received, not only from his boys but from the fellow coaches as well.

The squads fielded by Pigott have been known for their use of the basic, head-knocking football tactics. "We've never gone in for the fancy or intricate games," Pigott says, "just good basic football," And that's what really wins the games . . . and win it has. And, as the soon-to-be-gone mentor points out, "a team is only as strong as its weakest link."

Although he will be gone in body, Pigott's spirit will forever hover over the Seminoles as they clash on the gridiron. "My interest is here," he says, "I've grown very attached to Sanford. It's one of the finest football towns that I know of in Florida."

And that's a mighty fine tribute.

Coach Pigott will be missed, there's no doubt about it. And he's leaving behind some shoes that will be plenty hard to fill.

And therein lies the big problem. For the search is still going on to locate Pigott's successor. Applications





### **Man Helpless Before Nature**

Probably no form of nature gone wild inspires as much fear as the tornado.

Though tornadic storms are usually limited in extent and duration, they are unlimited in the explosive havoc they can cause. It is this, together with the unpredictability of their courses, that creates the sense of human helplessness we associate with these wild winds.

The storm system that battered six midwestern states was a big one by any measure, however. Spawn-ing some 57 tornadoes and 50 less severe storms, it killed more people than have died annually in tornadoes in the past half century. But while the toll of nearly 250

ranks it as one of the major disasters of its kind, it is still exceeded by the storm that fiailed a 219mile-long path of death through Missouri, Indiana and Illinois in

March 1925, killing 689 persons. When we think of the increase in population that has taken place in these and other states in the past 40 years (and no state is exempt from tornadoes), we wonder that there have not been worse disasters. It is not all a matter of luck. Though man has no way of controlling tornadoes, even in theory, he is

not entirely helpless. Every year

storm forecasting becomes more accurate, more rapid.

How many lives have been saved over the years by the U.S. Weather Bureau's Severe Local Storm Forecasting Center in Kansas City. Mo., it is impossible to say. Certainly the death toll on April 11 would have been higher without warnings issued from this and other weather centers.

This, of course, is scant comfort to those who lost loved ones on that Black Sunday. For some who died, the warnings came too late, or not at all, or went unheeded.

For the survivors, there now begins the long process of rebuilding homes and lives, with whatever help the rest of us can give them.
