New Ring Will Greet Fans At Ball Park For Bouts Tonight

A new and improved ring, together with a larger section of ring-side seats is scheduled to greet Sanford and Orlando fight fans who will meet at the ball park tonight when Stanley "Kid" Peckham, the Gator, boxing ace will show the world that he can stop all the mouthing and milling of Eddie Stewart, the Miami Flash.

That bout, a 10 round affair, will follow four preliminaries designed as fast and furious affairs, and a battle-royal which will see six colored boys trade blows. The entire evening's program gets under way promptly at 8:30 o'clock, with a record crowd predicted.

Advance information from Stewart's camp is that he expects to fight from the first ball, and that a knockout will be forthcoming before the fight is minutes old. In his last appearance against Peckham on the inaugural card here, Stewart fought what he called carefully, endeavoring to feel his way along Peckham's style. He acted as though he was over-confident and appeared to throw off all that Peckham had, yet, upon being questioned, he admitted that Peckham "had something," and that he took plenty.

Peckham, in the meantime, answers all of Stewart's press-agency by declaring that the decision he earned here two weeks ago was no accident. Peckham has been working out daily, improving an already dynamic, carrying left arm, and perfecting a change of pace which is expected to baffle the Stewart fight. From all indications, the bout will be the best of the season to date. It has attracted considerable attention in Orlando, as well as Sanford, and followers of both camps in large numbers will be at the ring-side tonight.

The semi-final affair between K. O. Rocky and Leonard Lancaster, colored middle-weights is expected to please every fan. Rocky is the hard-working and clean-boxing Sanford negro who clearly out-pointed Lancaster here some days ago, yet lost the decision. He fights his way carefully, and gives twice as much as he takes. As a defensive boxer, he stands head and shoulders above any negro seen in a ring here so far, and a victory for the Sanford boy would please the crowd.

In the main preliminary, Kid Allen, the curly-haired Kid Line clerk of Sanford expects to flatten Young Thompson, a Miami 118 pounder, with ease. Allen is one of the fighting little men you've ever seen, and has the intrepid fortitude of a tiger. His technical victory over Young Stokes of Orlando, was a pleasure to behold, and his followers will be out in large numbers tonight.

HAGEN DEFEATS PERCY ALLIS IN CANADIAN FINALS

Shoots Brilliant 68 To Beat German Pro In Playoff Tuesday

TORONTO, Ont., July 15.—(A.P.)—Walter Hagen fought an uphill battle to defeat Percy Allis, British pro at the Wannsee club in Berlin, by a single stroke in their 36-hole playoff for the Canadian open golf championship yesterday.

"The Hulg," after trailing Allis by one stroke in the morning round with a 73 to the Biltons 72, shot a brilliant 68, four under par, in the afternoon to win the title with a 36-hole total of 141. Allis followed his par-equalling morning round with a 70, one to see Hagen slip into the championship with a magnificent display in the last nine holes.

In the final analysis, the Cing-dong battle was decided on the 25th hole. Allis had squared the match at the 24th by sinking a 25-foot putt for a birdie three. On next hole, however, Hagen's second failed to go down and he sank a short putt for a birdie three. Allis' second had rolled to within a yard of the cup but in this crisis, the Briton's putting touch failed and the ball rolled to one side of the cup, giving Hagen the one-stroke lead he needed so badly.

As it was, Allis came within an ace of squaring the match at the birdie green, a long putt for a birdie three missing by inches. Hagen with the championship in his grasp, played safely, carefully rolling up his approach putt and sinking the short one he had left to win the final hole in four and thus halve the one big championship he never previously had captured. Allis held the lead most of the day, and then had rallied gamely to deadlock the match after being two strokes to the bad as late as the 31st. He cut "Sir Walter" lead to one stroke at the 32nd when Hagen three-putted and then deadlocked the match again with his long putt at the 35th.

The match was all square no fewer than six times. Hagen started shakily and found himself four strokes to the bad after four holes. He clipped single strokes off this advantage at the sixth, eighth and ninth holes to turn in 36 strokes to 34 for Allis. Allis went two strokes ahead again at the 13th where Hagen put his second in the credit river, but the Detroit veteran holed out with a deuce at the 14th to square the match. Allis blowing a 14-inch putt and taking four, Hagen went into the lead for the first time at the 15th and after that first one and then the other would take the advantage.

Not more than one stroke separated the two stars then until Hagen gained a lead of two at the 23rd hole. Allis squared it again at the 25th and then went one up again at the 27th where Hagen mixed a putt of a foot.

It was at this point that Hagen made his stand. Walter almost holed his tee shot at the short 28th and scored a deuce to square the match, then followed with a birdie three at the 29th that put him two strokes ahead.

Future Of Spain In Public Hands After 8 Years

(Continued From Page One) banged in the assembly hall officially opening the cortes. Don Nicolo Alcala Zamora, the white-haired provisional president of the republic, delivered the presidential address.

The head of the cabinet which has carried on since the monarchy fell last April pointed out that the republic had finally come, "after a quarter of a century of struggle for liberty, as the perfect example of a peaceful revolution."

The cabinet now wished, he said, to resign its powers to "Spain's only majesty—the constituent assembly." He urged the deputies to attack their many problems and to throw their entire energies into outlining a new constitution as quickly as possible.

As the assembly opened there were only two splashes of the color of the past visible in the scene. These were the uniforms of two "mace bearers" who stood, dressed like the jack of spades, on either side of the speaker's rostrum carrying ancient pikes and lanterns. Above them towered the two heroic statues of Ferdinand and Isabella.

Otherwise the chamber was stripped of everything which savored of the days of the monarchy. Spain's first women deputies were cheered loudly as they entered the assembly hall.

Six Catholic priests, who are members of the assembly, were present, dressed in their robes. The only untoward incidents reported up to last night were the hissing of Papal Nuncio Tedeschi by the crowds as he entered the congressional building, and the jeering at the civil guards during the military parade. Both these outbreaks were drowned quickly in the clamorous wave of public enthusiasm.

President Alcala Zamora was visibly affected by the cheering. "This will be the last of Spanish revolutions," he said, "and the first which opens the pathway to social justice. We must avoid further bloodshed."

"There is no possibility of a return of the monarchy. Free from all foreign tutelage, we are masters of our fate."

GIANT AIRPLANE WILL BE REPLACED ON MIAMI FIELD

40-Passenger Flying Boat Will Get Test For Over-sea Jumps

NEW YORK, July 15.—(A.P.)—In about three weeks a new 40-passenger flying boat will take the air in Connecticut as another great stride will be taken toward the nearing day of regular trans-Atlantic air travel.

For this plane is to go into the Caribbean service of Pan-American Airways, which is the testing ground for commercial trans-Atlantic flights. The new plane, the largest commercial plane ever built, will fly between Miami and Baranquilla, Colombia, a distance of 1350 miles and only 50 of which is over land. The hop from Jamaica to Baranquilla is approximately the same distance as from the Atlantic seaboard to Bermuda, the conditions are about the same, and almost all the way the pilot is out of sight of land.

Pan-American Airways is definitely interested in participating in an Atlantic line and it looks on its Caribbean department as a practice ground on which to learn the lessons necessary to successful operation of a cross-ocean service, which some experts believe will come within two years.

The new giant flying boat, and a sister ship already begun, are constructed with an eye directly on Atlantic flying. They are built with a range of 1000 miles, which can easily be extended by sacrificing a small portion of the passenger space. The planes are equipped as luxuriously as any ocean liners.

When an Atlantic line is inaugurated it probably will be operated jointly by American, English and French companies. Pan-American Airways will certainly operate the leg from the Eastern seaboard to Bermuda. Imperial Airways to Great Britain has flying monoplanes at Bermuda and Aero Postal de France at the Azores, but because of its experience in the Caribbean school and its large over-water equipment, Pan-American probably will also operate from Bermuda to the Azores. From the latter point Imperial Airways probably will run a line to London and Aero Postal another to France.

It is expected that the three companies will pool incomes. Pan-American's government mail guarantee and the other subsidies of equal amount in one operating company and then pay each individual company according to the mileage over which it operates.

The two new giants of the air are built with an eye to all possible emergencies during ocean flight. Cabins constructed in withstand buffeting of high seas in case of forced landings in the ocean and each of the four great

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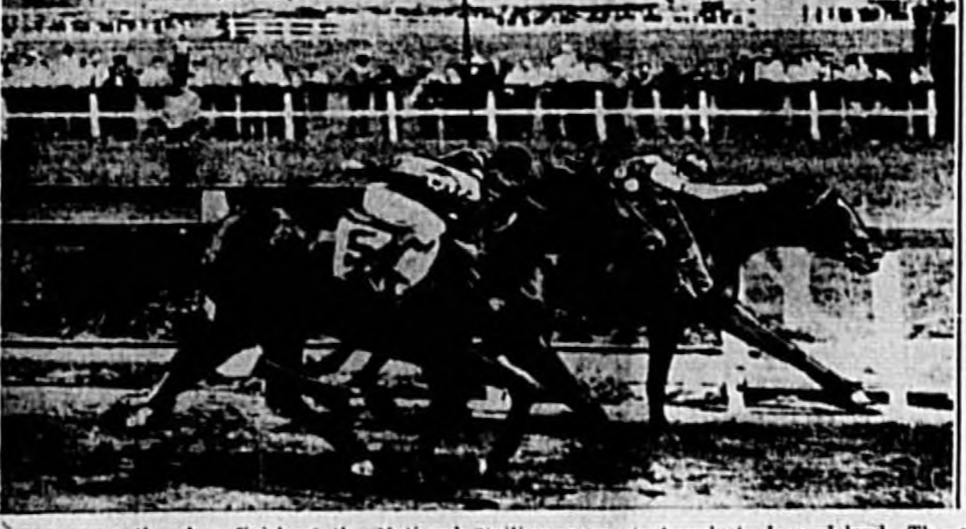

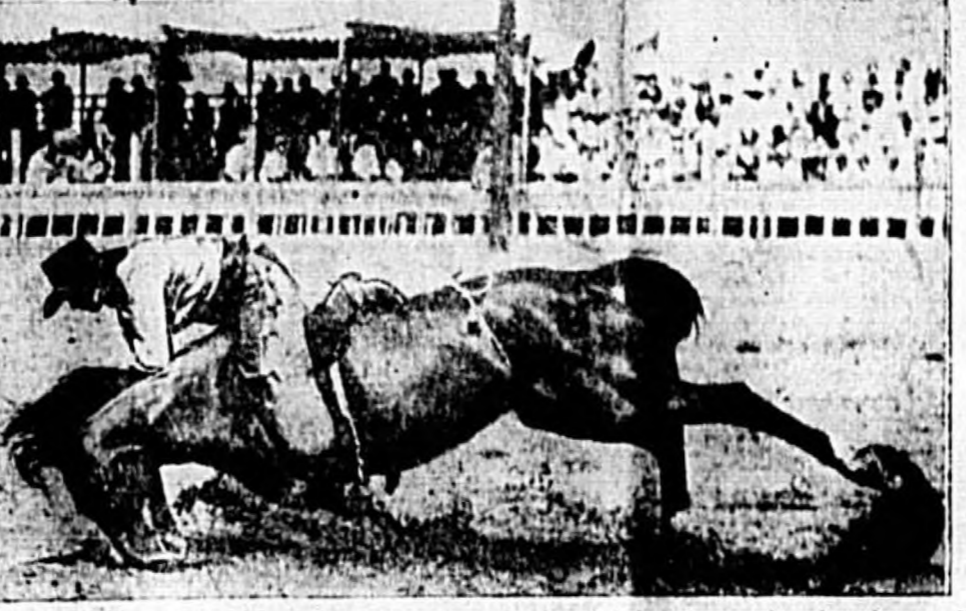
