Teaching Division.



Workers Leave Jobs For Largest Public Demonstration Since Hitler's Rule

DUESSELDORF, Germany Mar. 28 - Approximately 100,000 demonstrators crying for food over-turned two British cars and stoned another in the British occupa-

tion zone today.

The public rally was the largest since the days of Adolf Hitler. Workers abandoned factories, shops and offices to parade to a park in Duesseldorf, They held aloft banners reading "We Are Hungry," "Don't Let Out Chil-dren Starve," and "We Want

Two British jeeps were over turned and left with their wheels churning the air. A military staff car carrying a news correspondent was stoned twice, but no one was injured.

British officials said the demonstration was political but declined 1946 to name the party they believed responsible. German source blamed the demonstrations Communists. The rally had the earmarks of systematic organization. German spokesmen said trade union leaders did the de tailed organizing work.



Negotiations with the Union have been going on since February 17. They are still proceeding and your Telephone Company has hopes that an agreement can be reached that will be fair to everybody

The Southern Bell Telephone Company believes that its employees should be well paid, and that their wages should compare favorably with those paid by other concerns in the community for work requiring similar skill and equivalent training. To make sure that this policy is carried out, we are continuously comparing our wages with other

In the present negotiations with the Union, we have offered a renewal of our present liberal contract, but the Union insists upon unreasonably large wage increases.

Wage rate increases in 1945 and 1946 amount to **Approximately 26 Million Dollars**

Telephone employees wage rates are now the highest in history They have been increased 75 percent since January, 1941 The largest increases have been in recent years, and only but year and in 1945, wage increases granted added approximately 26 million dollars to the annual pay of our employees.

There are increases in wage rates and are in addition to millions of dollars in regularly scheduled raises given our employees.

This is an important point to remember in any discussion of tele phone wages:

These regular wages have been an advantage to telephone em ployees for many years.

Under our present contract, thousands of our employees receive wage increases as often as every three months. Other thousands receive increases every six months or every year.

Here are some typical rates of pay

A five-day, 40-hour week is the basic work period. Non supervise ory employees, such as operators, linemen, austallers and repairmen receive overtime pay for work beyond eight hours a day, 10 hours a week, and also receive premium pay for Sunday, Holiday, and evening and night work.

We believe most people would agree that these are good wages. There are, in addition to good wages, many other advantages in working for the Telephone Company, including pensions (with full cost paid by the Company), sickness and death benefits, attractive working conditions, holidays with pay, and vacations with pay one, two or three weeks, depending on length of service.

Union demands total \$69,000,000 a year. This is equal to an increase of \$3.30 a month in the average telephone bill

The demands of the Union on wages and other matters would-increase the cost of providing telephone service by about \$69 000 000 a year. This comes to 70 per cent of the Company's wage payments in 1946. It is more than 6 times our net income in 1946. It would make our pay coll alone over 2 million dollars more than the total of all the morney we book to last year

In terms of the ager postelephone full, it invound to about \$4 to per routh to every one of a little more than 17 if non-telephone subscribers, and it is the telephone user after all who pays us the money that we pay out in wages. The Telephone Company is asking Union leadership to recognize the obligation of all of us to you - the public. We are pointing out to the Union in our meetings that only by rendeting a constantly improv ed service in the most efficient manner possible can the employees, the Umon, and the management continue to deserve your good will We burst not door and the welfare of the public either in our charge for service or the quality and continuity of the service we remier.

In view of the facts presented here, there does not seem to be jus tification for a complete revision of our working practices as requested by the Union, nor for such large wage demands; Consequently, we have offered the Union a year's renewal of the present liberal contract, but with the right to re-open tim matter of wages at a time when changes in conditions may justify. Vandenberg Suggests Plan To Avert Marshall Denounces Russia Giving Veto Power To **UNOverAidToGreece**

Amendment Requires President To Halt Aid At Request Of United Nations

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan proposed today that the United Nations be given the right to speak the final word on Amercian aid to Greece and Turkey. The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee suggested that the United Nations be given the power to veto the Greek-Turkish aid program. Vandenberg set forth his views

at Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on legislation to authorize \$400,000,000 in aid for the two. Mediterranean nations. The Michigan senator suggested writing in an amendment under which President Truman would be required to halt the aid when and if the United Nations told him to

Vandenberg's amendment also would have the President withdraw all aid if so requested By any government of Greece or Furkey representing a majority of the people of either nation.

Phone Strike Is Proposed For Delivering Ultimatum

House Okays Bill Extending Rationing, On Question Of Reparations Price Control Over Sugar To Oct. 31

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31-Congress today received legislation aimed at heading off the nationwide telephone strike threatened for Apr. 7. The measure was introduced by Fred Hartley of New Jersey, chairman of the House Labor Committee. It would permit the attorney general to obtain an injunction to block a strike.
