

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Chalk it up: School race gets nasty

Goff, Schaffner sling mud at first debate for school board seat

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — This could get ugly.

Seminole County School Board member Bob Goff and his challenger, school-district spokeswoman Dele Schaffner, turned the first debate of the political season into a stage for slinging mud.

The battle for the District 3 School Board seat will be full of venom if a debate held Thursday at the Eastmonte Civic Center in Altamonte Springs is any

indication.

The debate was sponsored by the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee at its regular monthly meeting, and moderated by committee chairman Jim Stelling.

Schaffner, director of community involvement and public information for the school district, got in the first true zinger of the night. She accused Goff, an outspoken and sometimes controversial incumbent who has held office since

1996, of being an "embarrassment" to the School Board.

"Your 3 1/2 years on the board have been controversial," Schaffner said to Goff. "Many see you as an embarrassment, to say the least."

She also read from a past newspaper editorial in which Goff was accused of being "rude and profane."

Goff did not back down, saying Schaffner is basing her campaign upon mudslinging.

Lake Mary closer to developing downtown area

Commission approves first reading of comprehensive plan

LAKE MARY — City officials and staff are one step closer to developing the old downtown district.

City Commission approved on first reading the adoption of the city's revised, updated and amended Comprehensive Plan, which includes a change in land-use for the area surrounding the downtown area.

The Downtown Development Core District is approximately 38 acres, and the property is owned by various private owners. The area includes property situated within the confines of Lake Mary.

Boulevard, Fourth Street, Wilbur Avenue and First Street.

Currently, the core district is zoned for numerous uses, including residential. Once the zoning district is established, zoning will include TD, professional office, CD, general commercial and PUD, planned unit development.

According to Lake Mary Senior Planner Susan Daines, the zoning will allow for the establishment of small businesses and offices. However, no fast food restaurants or gas stations will be permitted.

Construction of buildings will follow city building codes, which means the maximum height will be between 35 feet and 40 feet, Daines said.

New residential development shall not be permitted but individuals will be allowed to maintain their residences in the core district. However, if a building is

Sounding the alarm: Firefighters give away smoke detectors

SANFORD — Residents of the city of Sanford may be able to obtain a smoke detector for their home, free of charge, from the Sanford Fire Department. The project is part of a statewide effort to promote home safety.

In late 1997, State Fire Marshal Bill Nelson received 50,000 smoke detectors with batteries from Radio Shack, to be distributed throughout the state. The purpose was to ensure that they are utilized in residences which pose the greatest risk of fire injuries and

deaths. For the second year, the State Fire Marshal's office has supplied quantities to local fire departments, which have agreed to not only provide delivery, but handle the installation for those who need assistance.

The Sanford Fire Department has recently received its second batch, with two cases arriving earlier this week. They require nine volt batteries for operation.

To apply, residents are required to contact the Sanford Fire Department at 407-302-1027, or stop at the main station, 1303 S. French Avenue, and obtain a detector application. After the application has been

received and accepted, Sanford firemen will go to the home and install the device in the appropriate area.

Over the years, Radio Shack reportedly has donated a total of 250,000 of the smoke detector alarms in other states. The alarms can no longer be sold in stores because of federal regulations which changed, regarding the requirement of a continuous tone versus a beep. While these will have a continuous tone whenever they sound a fire alarm, they are, none-the-less, still valuable in alerting residents of fire.

School attendance drops on anniversary of Columbine tragedy

Attendance took a significant drop Thursday at schools in Seminole County, but no serious incidents occurred on the ominous one-year anniversary of the massacre at Columbine High School.

One year ago Thursday, two students killed 13, wounded 23, then killed themselves at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colo.

No students were arrested in Seminole County schools on Thursday, authorities said. Classes were not disrupted.

However, in middle schools

and high schools, an average of 20 percent of enrolled students did not show up for class on Thursday in Seminole County.

This represents about a 15 percent drop from normal student attendance rates. On an average school day, about 95 percent of enrolled students attend class.

Thursday was not only the anniversary of Columbine, but also the day before a long holiday break. School is out in Seminole County today and Monday. School officials said that both Columbine and the long weekend contributed to the drop in attendance.

"A lot of people have been concerned with what this week stands for," said Jim Dawson, director of school safety for Seminole County. "Plus, traditionally before an extra holiday weekend less students attend school."

Many students and parents have been on edge this week as Thursday approached. School officials have had a busy week of tracking down rumors and disciplining some students for writing graffiti on bathroom walls.

"It's been an interesting week to say the least," Dawson said. See Attendance, Page 2A

Simon of Cyrene was chosen on this day 2000 years ago to carry Christ's cross to Calvary.

Matthew, Mark and

Luke all mention

Simon by name — a

name known for cen-

turies and for centuries

to come.

Simon was a Jew who was probably in Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. St. Mark wrote that he was the father of Alexander and Rufus. Cyrene was a city of Libya in North Africa.

According to Mark,

Simon was passing his

way in from the coun-

try when the soldiers "forced"

him to carry the cross Jesus had

been flogged severely and need-

ed help as he climbed toward

Calvary.

Through the years, Biblical scholars have attempted to learn more about Simon and why — of all those present — he would carry the cross. They've also attempted to learn what became of him later.

There's a story — and a lovely one — about what happened at the crucifixion and about the Resurrection (eventually known

as Easter).

In the story, Simon is an egg merchant. When he returns to his produce farm in Cyrene, Simon discovers all his hen's eggs miraculously had turned a rainbow of colors.

The egg, in most cultures, signifies birth and resurrection — in this case the birth, death and Resurrection of Christ.

Whatever the modern celebration of bunnies and Easter eggs, the story of Simon's carrying the cross represents the struggles









that all people experience in life and the responsibilities of those who believe in God to carry the cross of his Son.

"Just sling the mud, don't have any answers, don't have any issues," Goff said of Schaffner's candidacy. "Be a rubber stamp. Continue what has been done."

However, Goff admitted that when he first became a member of the School Board, he learned from mistakes. He also said that his uncompromising style will not change.

"I say what I mean," Goff said. "I stand up, and I speak my mind. Am I going to change? No."

In between the insults, there were a few issues discussed. Schaffner said the School Board should not have agreed to give the Central Florida Zoo \$1 million toward an expansion project.

"Could you tell me what educational needs are outranked by

the zoo?" Schaffner asked.

Goff responded that the zoo has an established educational program, and that 14,000 students participated in programs at the zoo last year.

Goff said that Schaffner's status as Chair of the Board of Directors at Seminole Community College may conflict with her role on the School Board. He asked if, given a choice, she would support edu-

cational programs for public schools or SCC.

"The control of vocational programs will go between public schools and community colleges," Goff said. "We need to maintain the programs we've got at public schools."

Schaffner countered that because vocational programs are already well established in Seminole County, proposed state reforms relating to vocational programs will not impact the school-district's relationship with SCC. She said her support of SCC would not impact her support of public schools.

"This is not an issue," she said.

Both candidates say they should be elected based on their experience and accomplishments.

Schaffner said she has been active in the school-district for 27 years, starting out as a parent volunteer. She points to her founding of the Dividends volunteer program, which sponsors 16,000 volunteers in every school in the district.

"Elect me to the School Board, and watch what a difference I can make," Schaffner said.

Meanwhile, Goff said that he created Arts Alive, a program that has raised more than \$100,000 for the school-district.

"The Board has changed in the last couple years," Goff said. "I'm a part of that. We have a different Board. It's not a rubber stamp."

Schaffner criticized Goff for his sometimes contentious rela-

tionship with school-district staff. One issue raised by Goff during the debate illustrates the friction.

During a recent closed executive session to discuss the school-district's attempts to satisfy requirements of the U.S. Justice Department relating to school desegregation efforts, Goff asked for a document containing a Justice Department proposal.

School Board Attorney Ned Julian declined to release the document because it is not public record. Goff asked Schaffner how she would handle such a situation. Schaffner said she could not say. She was not part of the executive session and unfamiliar with the details.

"I represent the taxpayers who expect fiscal responsibility," Goff said. "I don't like it when bureaucrats refuse to answer questions."

During an April 11 School Board meeting when Goff chastised him, attorney Julian said that public discussion of the Justice Department document could jeopardize negotiations that were mandated by a 1970 federal lawsuit.

Superintendent Paul Haggerty supported Julian, saying that the Board could see the document if a majority vote is taken to make it available.

The School Board did not take any action regarding the document during the April 11 meeting. Board member Larry Furkong criticized Goff for discussing the matter in a public forum.

Pantelias hangs up the cleats

Coach calls it quits after 28 years at SCC helm

SANFORD - Veteran Seminole Community College baseball coach Jack Pantelias did not get the going-away victory he would have liked, but he did see his Raiders fight to then end as Pantelias' 28-year reign came to an end, 15-10, at the hands of Central Florida Community College in an Mid-Florida Conference game at Raider Field on Thursday.

Pantelias is just the second baseball coach ever at SCC, moving over from Florida Technical University (now the University of Central Florida) to replace Jay Bergman when the current UCF coach left to become an assistant coach at the University of Florida in 1972.

Pantelias, who has won over 600 games as coach of the Raiders, announced back in August that he would be leaving the program after this year and it appears assistant coach Rick Eckstein, who played for Pantelias after graduating from Seminole High School in the early 1970's, is in line to take over the program.

The CFCC-Patriots from Ocala (29-25 overall, 12-16 in the MFC) looked like they might make Pantelias' final game a painful one as they took a 7-2 lead after two innings.

But SCC fought back to trail 7-5 after four innings and 10-8 after six innings before the Patriots scored three runs in the top of the seventh inning to put a cap on any Raiders thoughts of a comeback.

Garrett Robinson had three hits, including a home run, and drove in two runs and Brian Busher was 3-for-5 with a pair of doubles and three RBI to lead a 15-hit Patriots attack.

Manases Pabon also homered for CFCC, while Sias Swentzowski drove in four runs.

SCC did outhit the Patriots, 16-to-15, with Juan Chacon (3-for-6, home run, two runs, three RBI), Christian Corvoe (2-for-4, home run, run, RBI), Adam Shorts (2-for-6, triple, run, RBI), Todd Babij (2-for-5, two runs, RBI), Oviedo's Rich Rodriguez (2-for-5, two RBI), Eugene Ribley

ORLANDO - Not all wins are the same.

Some wins fall into the exquisite category, executed with style and flair. Some are ugly, garnered in spite of miscues and mishaps.

The Oviedo High School baseball team, ranked No. 4 in the most recent Florida Sports Writers Association's Class 6A state poll, slogged its way to its 14th consecutive win Thursday afternoon, overcoming a variety of factors to defeat the University Cougars, 6-3, at Larry C. Payne Field.

"I had a bad feeling before the game," said Oviedo head coach Harold Hitt. "I thought we might be in trouble. We didn't look sharp during our pregame drills and we just seemed sluggish. I really thought we might get beat today."

"But I have to give the guys credit. They did what they had to do to get the win. There are some

things I would have liked to see us do better, like running all the way through first base on ground balls and take advantage of more scoring opportunities, but we did what we had to do to win."

One factor that may have been working against the Lions (who are now 23-3) was the 4 p.m. start (even though Oviedo is 3-0 in games with afternoon starts over the last month). Or perhaps it was the 80+ degree heat, bright sun, and the fact that the Lions were in their black uniform tops.

Perhaps it was the fact that University (now 13-14) was sandwiched between Tuesday's game against state-ranked Venice (No. 5 in the FSWA 6A poll this week) and tonight's Seniors Night clash with Miami-Columbus at Oviedo's Paul Mikler Memorial Field.
