Drop In Temperature Follows Rains East Of Mississippi

Two relatively mild storm areas—one in the Great Lakes section and the other in the Rockies—marked the nation's weather map today as clouds overcast most states east of the Mississippi.

Drizzling rains damped the Carolinas, South Georgia, and northeastern Florida. Exactly 1.14 inches rain fell in about an hour at Miami, accompanied by brisk winds, and an electrical display. The northwestern tip of Florida was included in the colder belt, with Pensacola reporting 46 compared to 68 yesterday.

Temperatures above normal enveloped most sections of the south and east last night. Heavy rains soaked the Gulf coast states and extended northward to Pennsylvania and Maryland.

Plan To Hold Celery For \$2 Per Crate F.O.B. Advocated By Shipper

"The celery growers (f.o.b. for Florida celery or not a car lot), is Lee Ransbottom's suggestion for improving the celery market which has declined sharply since last week's upward trend generally believed to be largely the result of heavy recent shipments of celery of questionable quality.

In Mr. Ransbottom's opinion the celery harvesting can be held up several days without injury to the crop, giving it a chance to grow out of the damage done by the freeze, and in the meantime, he says in a letter to The Herald, "the prices will be held up."

The reason—472 cars of celery were dumped on an already loaded market in the eight days, two-thirds of it Florida celery, which was not given the ten days of "normal" movement.

Competitive vegetable crops in Florida and in other areas suffered heavily as a result of the sub-freezing temperatures throughout the south. It also appeared that the usual winter peak movement of celery during this month and March would be reduced, despite the havoc wrought in other sections, those close to the celery industry proclaimed the freeze their salvation.

Florida Construction

For most of Florida 1939 was one of the best building years in its history. You have to go back to the peak year of the boom to find another year in which construction reached so fast a pace, and prior to that you will find no other period in which new buildings sprang up so rapidly.

The grand total for the year was \$65,430,675. More than 65 million dollars worth of new buildings is a lot of construction in anybody's country at any time and it is ten million dollars more than construction during the previous year.

During December the figures for the entire state amounted to \$3,703,949, a sizable sum but somewhat less than the \$5,270,905 total for December of 1938.

The month's statistics from the 30 reporting communities were:

Miami, \$993,222; Jacksonville, \$604,931; Miami Beach, \$472,647; Clearwater, \$123,709; Tampa, \$118,829; New Smyrna, \$95,857; Pensacola, \$81,612; Coral Gables, \$68,489; Sarasota, \$65,752; Daytona Beach, \$52,992; Gainesville, \$30,485; Delray Beach, \$29,755; Sebring, \$25,140; Winter Haven, \$19,095; Lake City, \$15,200.

Lake Wales, \$14,050; Winter Park, \$9,850; St. Augustine, \$8,825; Key West, \$6,775; Vero Beach, \$5,835; Tarpon Springs, \$5,650; Eustis, \$5,000; Fernandina, \$4,500; Jacksonville Beach, \$4,300; Venice, \$3,850; Tavares, \$2,000; Palatka, \$750.

December's construction figure for Sanford was \$4,385. In general Sanford has lagged behind most other Florida cities in new building. This is probably due to the prolonged period of uncertainty over Sanford's tax and financial structure and the failure of many to grasp the fact that this obstacle to future development has been removed.

It must be apparent to everyone that many new houses are needed in Sanford and vicinity. Chamber of Commerce figures show that tourists are passing through daily largely because of the difficulty of finding suitable accommodations.

Fifty or a hundred new homes of the right kind could be rented here during the winter months without a bit of trouble.

What The G-Men Found

In the headlines of northern newspapers Florida is being branded today as a refuge for "vicious hoodlums." This comes not from jealous publishers or disgruntled reformers but an outstanding and impartial authority on the subject, J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the government's G-Men, not in an extemporaneous comment to reporters but in a report to Congress.

Miami, Tampa and Orlando receive particular attention from the FBI's head, who points out that he was acting under orders from the Attorney General of the United States when he made his investigation. An extensive survey was ordered, he says, "to find out way it was that some of the most vicious hoodlums in this country could proceed to a place and operate with such complete immunity and without interference by local authorities."

In Miami G-Man Hoover found that a number of police officers had criminal records, the chief of Miami Beach detectives collaborated with thieves in a \$240,000 jewel robbery, and confidence games flourish un molested. A 77-year old Swede was persuaded to return to his home in Sweden, get his life's savings of \$63,000 and turn it over to a gang of crooks. Kidnapers found Miami a convenient place to exchange their ransom money.

Tampa, said Mr. Hoover, is the headquarters of the bolita racket in Florida. "In the vicinity of Orlando," he said, "the bolita tickets are printed, but the control of the racket comes from Tampa. We are not concerned with the actual operation of the bolita game. We are interested in the operation of the racket and many outside hoodlums engaged in it."

"We have no interest in gambling or prostitution as such," he continued. "We are concerned with the conditions growing out of gambling and prostitution which result in corruption of local police officials, which, in turn, in many instances makes it very difficult for us to bring to justice violators of the federal law in which we are interested."

As everyone knows wherever gambling, prostitution and similar vices flourish in open violation of the law, corruption of local officials exists also, and such conditions naturally attract gangsters, racketeers, and hoodlums from all parts of the country. This results in robberies, murders, gangster warfare and lawlessness of all kinds.

Dear Editor:
 In Thursday's issue you carried a front page report on \$4.00 celery. In Friday's issue you told how all vegetables were skyrocketing, all of course account the freeze. But have you noticed what celery sold for Friday and Saturday in New York? A great deal of it sold at \$1.50 to \$2.00 and even some cars were abandoned to the R. R. Co. After packing, processing, freight and selling charges, there is nothing left for the grower. And yet we think under the conditions this is the farmer's year for profits.

Now Mr. Editor, I believe that this present deplorable condition is largely the fault of us shippers. It is generally agreed that the situation is out of the farmer's hands and any control measures must be carried out by the shippers.

I maintain that if a dozen shippers met, all around a conference table and map out a plan and carry it out, we (the said shippers) are just a bunch of nincompoops.

We shippers under the present situation should say to the trade, we not ship any celery except it is sold 2 c. a. lb. for not less than \$2.00 per crate job. We will not consider nor roll any unloads. That's all we would need to do. And it is my firm belief that in one week's time we would have the situation in hand. But if we shippers keep on with this dog-out-dog method we will make the best chance in years to get these farmers back on their feet.

AFL To Campaign For 500,000 New Members In Drive

MIAMI, Feb. 7.—Cognizant of widespread organization campaigns by the rival CIO, the American Federation of Labor yesterday announced a nationwide drive designed to bring 500,000 new members into its ranks by October.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the far west and south, but a statement by the federation's executive council said the campaign in general would be extended to all fields which have "heretofore resisted unionization."

In announcing the federation's organization program, William Green, president, denied it was in any way spurred by rival unionization efforts by the Congress of Industrial Organizations, and said he did not believe it would result in any intensification of CIO membership work.

Among fields upon which the federation plans to concentrate are textiles, retail trade, marine workers, office and white collar workers, government employees, teachers and "miscellaneous industries."

Included in the latter is the newspaper field, where Green said the federation already has a number of local chapters. He said particular emphasis would be placed on organization work among newspaper workers, however, but that "wherever the newspaper unions want to come into our federation, we will take them in."

Green said results of a recent meeting in Salt Lake City, when a "loyalty membership drive" was launched to organize unorganized workers in a number of west coast industries, had been "prompt and encouraging" and that the next major regional conference would be held in Atlanta, March 8.

Declaring that the Atlantic meeting would witness launching of "the wildest organizational campaign ever conducted in the south," Green said, "more than 1000 representatives of our unions in the south will attend."

Both Green and Francis P. Sullivan, national director of the federation's organization work, will address the Atlantic meeting and help launch the southern drive.

"The south has made great industrial progress in recent years, but cheap labor still is stifling its economy," said a statement issued by the federation's executive council. "We believe the time is ripe for teaching the workers of the south the benefits of self-organization."

Discussing the nationwide membership drive in general, Green said the "full strength of our far-flung organization" would be enlisted.

"But," he added, "we realize that each section of the country has its own special problem. Therefore, local union leaders best familiar with these problems will be called upon to direct the drive in each locality with the full assistance of our national organization."

cost for construction purposes in Florida, but the experimental work done by the Art Project shows that this may prove a profitable field for local industries. The Planning Board exhibit is in the rotunda of the State Building.

Jap Army Hunts Chinese General Reported Killed

SHANGHAI, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Japan's northern army, pressing deep into Sulyuan province in Inner Mongolia, is engaged in one of the greatest "ghost" hunts in history.

In sub-zero weather, the Japanese were reported pursuing across the desolate snow-covered Ordos plains a Chinese warrior they officially announced they had killed eight years ago.

He is Gen. Ma Chan-Shan, hero of the Momi river battle during the Japanese invasion of Manchuria in 1922.

A thorn in the side of the invaders for more than a year, Ma

officially was reported by the Japanese to have been killed in action in northern Manchuria. So sure were the Japanese of his death that they sent to Emperor Hirohito what they believed to be his medals and uniforms.

According to Japanese belief, anything reported to the emperor becomes "irrevocable." Hence the Japanese army leaders were unable to admit that the general was alive. Recently he has become a very annoying corpse, Chinese say.

Ma's troops, organized as a "date-to-die corps" to oppose the Japanese conquest of Sulyuan province, boldly attempted late in December to recapture Pao-touchen, Sulyuan capital.

Chinese soldiers actually entered the walled city before the Japanese rallied and drove them back.
