Police search for bank robber

Seminole County Sheriff's Investigators are searching for a bank robber who struck Friday morning in the Wekiva

Shortly before 11 a.m. a man entered the Sun Trust Bank branch located at the intersection of Wekiva Springs Road and Miami Springs

"The County's Economic Incentive program has spent about \$377,000 to attract businesses that have in turn spent

Local man dies in shooting

Neighbors reporting shots fired, police find Milton Roundtree of Winter Park dead

SANFORD — Sanford police are investigating the death of a 29-year-old Winter Springs man, found face down on the ground early Thursday, at 1012 1/2 West 3rd Street.

The man is identified as Milton Roundtree.

Police responded to a 911 call, and reported having heard other voices in the background when the call was made.

Two persons were in the house when officers arrived. One was located in the corner bedroom, and the other in the front bedroom closet. Both were taken to the Sanford Police station for questioning. Their names have not been revealed.

A third person was in the house when officers arrived. They said he initially fled from the area but was later located. A search of the residence uncovered an amount of marl-

Sanford Fire and Rescue responded to the scene and determined the victim was deceased. It was initially



reported that Roundtree had been shot tiffee time.
Investigators said Roundtree
was well known locally, and had been previously arrested on various charges. His latest arrest report gave his mother's address on Winter Park Drive in Winter Springs, but it is believe he may have lived in

the Sanford area. Officers said they are presently looking into an anonymous tip, and are cur-rently seeking a suspect in connection with the shooting.

Wildfire season already?

What a year this is turning out to be. February is normally considered as the coldest month of the year in Central Florida, but we've had temperatures in the 80s. November and December of last year were much colder than normal, with temperatures often in the high 20s to low

Now we have wildfire season. Normally, (and I don't know who makes these predictions), the period from May to October is considered wildfire season. But all one has to do in Sanford is to go outside in the morning, or other times of the day, and you can smell the smoke from the fire that is devastating

woodlands in Polk County. Earlier this week, the report said possibly 12,000 acres were burning. That land area is equal to 16.4 percent of the total size of Seminole County. Interstate-4 has been closed in that area for a week, and predictions are that, if we don't have rain to quench the fires, I-4 may have to be closed for possibly another week, or even longer.

Reports are inconsistent. One time we hear the fire has been 80 percent contained — then it's 40 percent, and 30 percent. Winds of course are playing a big part in the fire, and when they are blowing northeasterly, have an effect on Seminole County, bringing smoke, and a visible dark sky from Polk County.

Regardless of where we live, everyone is being asked to exercise extreme caution. One report even suggests that a spark from a lawn mower could ignite a dry lawn. Of course, without rain, what is there to mow? And we can't water our lawns much because the drought has produced an extreme water shortage. The lack of water is making us a tinderbox. Naturally, outdoor fires, or any kind, are banned.

With warm weather, people have a tendency to leave their windows open at home. With the smoke however, it is suggested that they be kept closed. Even if you don't smell smoke, there is plenty of it in the air, and it can cause a number of ailments.

In wildfire season it is also suggested that you keep roofs and gutters cleared of pine needles, leaves or other debris, and remove dry grass, brush and dead leaves at least 30 feet from your home.

We all know the devastation a wildfire can bring. There have been a number of them in Central Florida during the past few years. Some of us can even say that fires have been

very close to their homes. It should be our responsibility to report such burning. Yes, it will probably get your neighbor mad at you, but would you rather have an angry neighbor or property going up in flames?

We exercise caution in Hurricane Season, most of us adhere to water restrictions in a drought, we don't stand under a tree in a lightening storm. So in this dire time of wildfire danger, let us all take as many precautions as necessary.

This newspaper prints news. Even so, we don't want to report on any disaster caused by a wildfire — especially one that may have been started by carelessness.





Mothers need permission to be more like fathers

Time magazine reports that millions of adult women are being treated for attention-deficit disorder, a condition we have long associated with disruptive, can't-sit-in-theirseats boys. But doctors say they face an interesting chal-lenge in diagnosing women with ADD because the dys-

functions of the disorder — feeling over-whelmed, disorganized, distracted, scattered pretty much capture the daily experience of your basic American mother

The increasing number of ADD diagnoses among women is, in great part, the result of more sophisticated knowledge about the brain. We can pinpoint and treat more neurological and chemical disorders than ever

But I can't help wondering if we're also Ryan 'pathologizing" a way of life that needs simplification, not medication. In short, mothers

feel overwhelmed and scattered because we try to do too much. The expectations — whether our own or society's keep rising. We're supposed to make cupcakes for the class party, arrange carpools, exercise, keep a clean and pretty house, read stimulating books, produce well-balanced meals, raise moral and competent children, maintain our youthful good looks and pursue a satisfying career. And, by the way, we're supposed to do all this without having an extended family around to help out.

No wonder we're turning to pharmaceuticals. What we need is a cultural revolution like the one fathers underwent some years ago. Fathers were encouraged — and given permission — to be more nurturing and involved in their children's lives. In other words, they became more like mothers.

Now we need to give mothers permission to be more

A basic difference between men and women is that men allow themselves to rest and women don't. Men instinctively build recuperation time into their days. As comic Mark Lundholm points out, it's no mystery why there's a La-Z-Boy chair but no La-Z-Girl version.

Last Saturday, a girlfriend treated me to a spa day. We had massages, sat in the hot tub, then had a long lunch. Spas make their living off women like us, who once or twice a year might indulge themselves in a day of com-plete relaxation. "Pamper yourself" and for bubble bath and specialty coffees say, recognizing that women countany personal rejuvenation time as "pampering" and a "special occasion."

You don't see the networks telling men to pamper themselves by spending Super Bowl Sunday in front of the television. You don't see golf courses running ads that tell guys to pamper themselves by playing 18 holes. They know men don't need to justify the choice to watch television or play golf. Men seem to recognize the importance of relaxation, an instruct that perhaps dates to prehistoric days when, if a hunter were weak and depleted, he'd


become prey. Of course, if women relaxed more often, the house wouldn't look like Home Beautiful, the kids might not get their daily requirement of vegetables, and maybe there wouldn't be milk in the fridge.

Yes. And we would all manage to get by, perhaps even

without a little pill every morning.

I think this movement to get mothers to become more like fathers ought to adopt as its motto those wise words of our nation's flight attendants: Put your own oxygen mask on first before helping others with theirs. Then everyone would have a better chance at survival.

Stanley Kramer spent a lifetime standing up for such causes. His death at 87 this week reminds us that, fortunately for this country, leadership is not a quality restricted to politicians.

I recall sitting decades ago in a South African movie theater for a showing of "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner." The subject matter was interracial marriage. Would a white father

For the audience, the question cut to the core of their daily existence. While the action was set in San Francisco, the issue of racial separation was at the heart of South African politics and to the soul of everyone in that theater. In two years in the Peace Corps, I never heard an audience so quiet, so rapt

in attention to the mes-sage coming from the Matthews screen. It was as though the people around me - black and white, but especially those of mixed race — had their hearts

riding on the outcome. At the movie's climax, the white father, played by Spencer Tracy, finally gives his somber but loving blessing. Suddenly, in a theater where you could hear a pin drop, I heard someone in the row ahead of me whisper words I will never forget: "He sounds like

a judge."
This was the power of Stanley Kramer. Across boundaries of race, class, age and country, his films grabbed our attention; their messages pounded into our con-sciences. What would we do in such circumstances? Could we summon the stuff that heroes are made of?

As an American who grew up with Kramer's films, I know their

With "Judgment at Nuremberg," the movie maker

took on the Cold War mindset that we should "move on" from the Nazi evil of the '40s, husbanding all our outrage for the Communist menace of the 1960s. His hero, the American jurist played here again by Spencer Tracy, condemns the anstocratic German judge who collaborated in Nazi injustice rather than jeopardize his position. The worst people, he rules, are not the fickle masses, but the men of conviction who could have challenged Hitler but didn't.

"He sounds like a judge." That's not a bad epitaph for a filmmaker who knew and never stopped showing us the difference between right and wrong.

Bushs earn "B" grades on fiscal policy report card

SANFORD — Maybe George "Dubya" will have the last laugh

after all.

Chided all presidential campaign long by late night comedians over his alleged lack of intellectual acumen, then Texas Gov. and now U.S. President George W. Bush was among the nation's top governors graded by the Cato Intellitate in the organization's fifth biennial fiscal policy report card released this week.

Bush ranked third with a come of 70 and a grade of "B,"

Bush ranked third with a score of 70 and a grade of "B," trailing only Massachusetts Gov. Paul Cellucci and Nevada Gov. Kerny C. Guinn, who earned "A's" with respective scores of 76 and 74.

The Cato Institute is a nonpartisan public policy research foundation dedicated to broadening policy debate consistent with the traditional American principles of individual liberty, limited government, free markets, and peace.

The fiscal report card is based

on objective measures of fiscal performance. Those who cut taxes and spending the most received the highest grades. Those who raised taxes and spending received the lowest grades.

The average grade for Republicans was only slightly higher than for Democrats. Wrote Stephen Moore, senior fellow, and Stephen Slivinski, fiscal policy analyst in the Cato report: "Ironically, Republican gover-

nors were more aggressive in cutting taxes in the early 1990's when states were in fiscal shortfalls, than they are today with the largest budget reserves in nearly two decades."

Florida Gov. Jeb Bush also received a grade of "B" with a score of 66, ranking him minth in the nation and surely providing cannon fodder for Bush family gatherings.

Three governors received "F" grades for their fiscal policies. Among the lowest scores tailied on the report card were lowa Gov. Tom Vilsack with a score of 45, and California Gov. Gray. Davis with a score of 41. Oregon Gov. John A. Kitzhaber ranked dead last in the report with an "F" grade and score of 30.

Tuberculosis is spread through the air by coughing or sneezing. The disease can cause an infected person to cough up blood, loose weight and suffer fever, in chills, and fatigue. Treatment to cure the disease normally takes about six months.





"That has led to the direct creation of 400 new jobs with a median wage of \$35,000 per year and the indirect creation of 1,000 additional jobs. We are on the right track but we can't feel satisfied yet, we can't afford to be complacent. We are striving to make County government better each year because there are both challenges and opportunities in the future."

Van Der Weide talked about Seminole County's moderate tax rate and quality of its schools before continuing his public pitch for support of two transportation initiatives and a fall public referendum on a Second Generation one-cent sales tax

Generation one-cent sales tax.

"The Second Generation initiative will come before voters on Sept. 4," he said. "Since 1991 the initial one-penny tax has raised \$450 million dollars.

There's more to do and the need is still there."

He encouraged Chamber members to mount support and contact State Legislators to get behind a Metro Plan Orlando move that calls for the Central Florida area, the largest car rental region in the State, to get back more of a fair share of the surcharge it generates for Statewide transportation. 



County seeks input for state housing program

By Joe DeSentis Staff Writer

SANFORD - Seminole County's Community Development Office is seeking public input on designing strategles to use State Housing Initiative Partnership (SHIP) monies over the next three

Each year Seminole County receives about \$3.5 million in funding under the SHIP program. All SHIP funding must be used by the county for the creation or preservation of affordable housing for lower income persons and households in Seminole County. The program allows the county to assist very low, low and moderate income households. The Board of Seminole County Commissioners has determined that assistance will be directed only to very low and low income households.

Under those parameters assistance is limited to households with incomes that do not exceed 80 percent of the median income for Seminole County.

According to Principal Planner Buddy Balagia, the county is required to submit its Affordable Housing Assistance Plan (AHAP) to the State by May 2 in order to receive SHIP funding for the next three year period. The AHAP will be used to describe the activities and strategies the county will use to address the need for affordable housing for lower income households in Seminole County.

Presently, SHIP funds are allo-cated for the following activities:

Down payment assistance.Single Family Homeowner Occupied Emergency Housing Repairs

 Single Family Homeowner Occupied Housing Reconstruction

Housing Counseling for Home Purchase/Maintenance

 Assistance to Construct, Rehabilitate or Finance Rental Housing for Senior Citizens and Disabled (Special Needs)

• Disaster Recovery Assistance (Declaration of Disaster required by the Governor or President)

The county is not limited to these activities and is seeking public input on activities that may be funded between 2001 and 2004. Balagia said Seminole County has provided assistance since 1992. Last year he said the program assisted about 150 Seminole County residents. "We receive the funding in

July and it becomes available to individuals and subrecipients in October to coincide with the county's fiscal year budget," Balagia said.

Current eligibility standards for low income households for the program at 80 percent of Seminole County median household income would be incomes not exceeding \$36,480 for a family of four. Eligibility for very low households would be incomes not exceeding \$22,800 for a family of four.

Balagia said anticipated funding from the State next year is expected to be lower than this year's allocation, but added that could change depending on market conditions.

"We actually received more money this year than originally anticipated because of the return on stock stamp market instru-ments," said Balagia.

"The money is awarded on a project-by-project basis and on a year-by-year basis."

Residents in the area said they have expected development but consider the project outside the parameters of land designated for transitional development. Residents in the area will contend the project resembles a office/warehouse/distribution combination that is not compatible for transitional use because of its proximity to neighborhoods.

The Tall Trees Homeowners Association is a member of a loosely organized group of neighborhoods along SR 46 that comprise the SR-46 Coalition, organized to monitor what it calls responsible growth of office, retail, commercial, and residential developments. Other neighborhoods that belong to ' the coalition include Lake Forest,

Sylvan Reserve, Wilson Place, Wayside Woods, and Friends of 46. A year ago homeowners in the Lake Forest area were successful in persuading the County Commission to deny approval of a Super Wal-Mart from being constructed within 500 feet of their upscale homes.







The Way We Were: Early history of Lake Jesup

In a paper entitled "Early History of Lake Jessup Settlement," are pioneer Steen Nelson tells of his memories of the Lake Jessup/Oviedo area. I will give

Solaria's Wharf on Lake Jesup had two mercantile businesses; one was operated by Dr. J.F. Mitchell and the other by A. Solaria who also had the post office. It was the Lake Jesup Post Office, Orange County. Brantley and Co. also had a store there.

Tuscawilla, one mile from there on the lake, consisted of about ten homes, some of which were quite large.

Mail came from Jacksonville once a week on the "St. Volusia" whose captain was Captain Land. Later it was brought twice a week across the lake by Mr.

All of this area was known as the Lake Jesup Settlement.

An old trail came from Fort Mellon and forked at the head of Lake Jesup. One branch ran through the settlement at Fort Christmas and the other up to Fort Gatlin (Orlando). This road dated back to 1836, the time of the Seminole Indian War.

Dr. Taylor operated a small sawmill with a straight up-anddown saw near Litowoodnot Creek. This creek was dammed so it would flood the low flat woods. According to Nelson, the swamps of this creek became Slavia and Mitchell Hammock.

The logs were floated down to the mill dam. When the water got too low to operate, the mill would close down until the water rose.

During the 1870's a couple of railroad projects were envisioned, but both died. Mr. Brantley went to New York to complete the purchase of rails, engine and cars for his project from lake Jesup to Orlando, but while there, he died. Another rail project from Longwood to Lake Jesup also did not come to

About this time, W.G. White opened a large business at White Wharf on Lake Jesup with a large stock of merchandise. It employed as many as six clerks. This store attracted people from miles around, sometimes two or three big caravans of traders would camp there for two or three days, having come from as far away as 200 miles. When the railroad finally came, Mr. White moved to Orlando. Some of the area residents prior to 1875 remembered by Steen Nelson were J.O. Jelks, Miss Julia Golde (a school teacher), Dr. Jolks, William Slevor, C.A. Love, A.C. Hart, J.C. Hatlzelow, A.P. Parnell, John S. Womble, J.O. Fries, Captain M.E. Brock,

The Oviedo Chronicle was edited by Philip Isaces (approximately 1885-95). After the big freeze, he moved to New Smyrna Beach. The Oviedo Advance, edited by E.A Douglas also had a short run in the early 1900's.

In 1886, the Sanford-Oviedo-Indian River Railroad came to Oviedo and the SAC Railroad came a year or so later.

All of the large orange groves in the state had their own packing houses in their groves, and until the railroad came, shipments all went by boat from Sanford to Jacksonville.

For two years, Oviedo held the record for being the largest shipping point of oranges in the state. After that, Citra took the lead for a few seasons and then

the honor changed quite often. In 1877, the Nelson family set out their first grove. Dr. Bats Mitchell was their newest neighbor and he told Nelson about

the delicious African oranges that he had bought in Palatka. Mitchell had planted the seeds and had some young trees not yet able to bear fruit. Nelson got so interested that he budded ten of his trees without ever seeing the fruit. Three years later, they started bearing tangerine oranges which sold in the New

rows across his grove with the same variety and this grove became a showplace in the early days. People would come from miles around just to see it and to get budwood. Prices stayed good until 1895.

In 1886 the Nelson Brothers went into the orange packing and brokerage business using their trademark "Pride of Oviedo", featuring an eagle in the center. Their business expanded throughout the United States as well as over-

The Oviedo post office became a distributor office to Geneva, Chuluota, Christmas

York market for \$10 per box. Nelson then budded four

and Lake Emma. The town of Ovjedo had a bank, two small hotels, a brass band and a baseball team.

In 1887, Dr. Henry Foster of Lake Charm, T.L. Mead and others, organized the Oviedo-Lake Charm-Lake Jesup Railroad Company. They signed a con-tract with the Atlantic Coast Line which promised to never charge more than five cents per box between Oviedo and Sanford. Their old rate was between 12 and 15 cents per box. This was a very good deal and they were able to recoup their expenses in four seasons. From Sanford, the shipment went by steamer to Jacksonville. Then came the big freeze of 1894-95. There were 34 days of

perfect spring weather between the two freezes so the groves were in full bloom when the February 4, 1895 freeze came. Grove owners lost everything in one night, and many left the state, never to return. The Nelson family however, stayed the course, and today they continue a large and prosperous business, with other interests in addition to citrus, as Nelson and Company, Inc.

Editor's note: Both spellings "Jessup" and "Jesup" are contained in this article. "Jessup" was the original spelling, with one "S" removed in later years. Property deeds often contain both spellings. "Jesup" is accepted as the present proper spelling.



n March 8, beginning at noon, the Longwood Tourist Club will hold a special observance - its 70th anniversary. Few clubs can boast of existing that long, and what's more, meeting in the same location.

Dottie Berg, secretary of the club, has recorded the history of the organization, which includes a summary of the club's activities.

According to Berg, the Longwood Tourist Club was formed many years ago by a group of winter residents, mostly from Maine, along with some local residents. In 1955, the Sanford Herald published a special section, "Longwood, Our Town," which indicated Mrs. F.J. Neimeyer donated property in 1931 that made Sunnyshade Park possible. This was the beginning and now the home of

the Longwood Tourist Club.

Records available indicate the present by-laws and constitution for the club were drafted in 1957 as "An Association for the cub were dranted in 1957 as. An Association for the purpose of promoting social and recreational activities; for providing a means of becoming better acquainted; and for cooperating with other groups interested in the welfare of tourists and community."

In the early days, there was no building, just picnic tables. In 1938 the Town Council built a covered pavilion, but that was little protection on cold days. Then capture or

but that was little protection on cold days. Then, canvas or tarps were, at times, placed on the sides and portable heaters were brought in.

fall to realize that what they are doing is isolating you. If you are afraid to talk to your parents for fear of being criti-

cized or ridiculed, how can you learn their values and share in their knowledge? How unfortu-

While it may seem "safe" to talk to your friends, the problem is they usually don't have any more life experience than you.

It is important that you find an adult in whom you can con-fide and from whom

you can get straight answers when you need them. Perhaps a trusted teacher, a school counselor or the mother of one of your friends could fill that role. No child should have to go through his or her teen-age years without an adult to guide the way when the going gets rough.

DEAR ABBY: I appreclated your tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Because of his courage, and that of Mahatma Gandhi before him, we see more clearly how it is possible to elevate the consciousness of humankind by how we choose to live. The principles of nonvi-olence by which these men lived were based on the teachings of all great religions — not just Christianity. The message that both Gandhi and King gave their lives for was one of unity, not separation or exclusion.



Before I could give them an answer, I told them I would have

to ask them a few questions.
Had Schatzie been a loyal
friend? Was she forgiving after
they had done something wrong
to her? Was she glad to see them

school?

Oh yes, they answered excitedly to all those questions.

Then, I said (happily laying aside for the moment everything I had learned in catechism class and in the halls of divinity school), Schatzie would be waiting for them in heaven when they got there.

Men and women far wiser than I am in matters of theology have said the same thing. Father George Tyrrell, a Roman Catholic priest whose constant companion was a red Irish setter, went so far as to say he would not be sur-

prised to find that there were more dogs in heaven

than people.


