Heroes of Bataan

The Bataan peninsula may have fallen to the enemy but the heroes of Bataan are not the slant-eyed Japanese who made the final assault but the American and Filipino forces who held the front lines. Their courage and determination will live in song and story as long as brave men still fight for their rights and wherever freedom exists on this earth.

It has been over four months since the Battle of the Philippines began and this same handful of unseasoned troops has borne the brunt of the fighting all that time, outnumbered ten and later twenty to one by Japanese veterans of the Chinese war. The planes, the tanks and the guns were all on the side of the enemy who also had control of the sea in the neighboring waters and was able to bring up fresh reinforcements and a continuous flow of supplies.

Yet the American and Filipino troops, first under General MacArthur and later under General Wainwright, stubbornly contested every foot of ground, skillfully out-maneuvered the Japanese and strategically withdrew to Bataan, where for over three months they held out against incessant bombing and frontal attacks, maintaining always enough fight to counter-attack even to the bitter end.

While they resisted, the entire Malaya peninsula was overrun. Singapore was besieged and captured. Thailand was lost and most of Burma overrun. Borneo, Sumatra, Java and the Celebes fell to the Japanese. New Guinea was invaded and Australia attacked from the air. The Andaman Islands in the Bay of Bengal were seized and Ceylon and the eastern coast of India raided from the air. And through it all, the men of Bataan held out and fought on.

What a bitter blow this must be to the Japanese! They have captured Bataan, but at what sacrifices, with what loss of face! One of their leading generals committed suicide because of his failure. The great Yamashita, who took Malaya and captured Singapore, was given the job. For weeks he has been making his preparations, bringing up fresh troops and supplies, gathering planes from the whole Far East for the final assault.

The Japanese thought the Americans wouldn't fight. They had listened to Nazi propaganda that Americans had grown soft and couldn't take it. The young Japanese soldiers, who were met with a hail of machine gun bullets, had been led to believe that the Americans would run up the white flag with the first bombing attack. Those who have survived know better now.

They know it took twenty Japanese to defeat one American. They know they had all the planes and tanks on their side and they know it took all they had. Today, instead of gloating over the victory, they are thinking about what will happen to them when the full force of American manpower and industrial genius is brought to bear against their yellow men.

They are thinking, wondering and worrying. And well they might, for Bataan will be avenged.

Sugar Honor System

In some restaurants they give you two pieces of sugar with your coffee without asking. In some places they ask whether one piece or two. At the coffee bars they go so far as to ask with sugar or without. But in at least one restaurant the open sugar bowl is still on the table. The only form of attempted compulsion is the mild one of replacing the standard rectangular lumps of sugar with half-size squares.

Government, which has a great many people counting up a good many useless things, would not be wasting time if it looked into this question of the unrestricted sugar bowl. It would be no surprise if government learned that self-discipline by the restaurant customers has cut down sugar consumption as much as unofficial rationing has done.

Business men who sell on installments have long insisted that 95 per cent of all people are honest. It is far from absurd to suggest that 95 percent of all coffee-cum-sugar customers are good patriots. We are not speaking here of formal government rationing, which is a different matter. Nation-wide rationing is intended to cope not only with greed but with panic; and there also enters the question of justice and public morale.—New York Times.

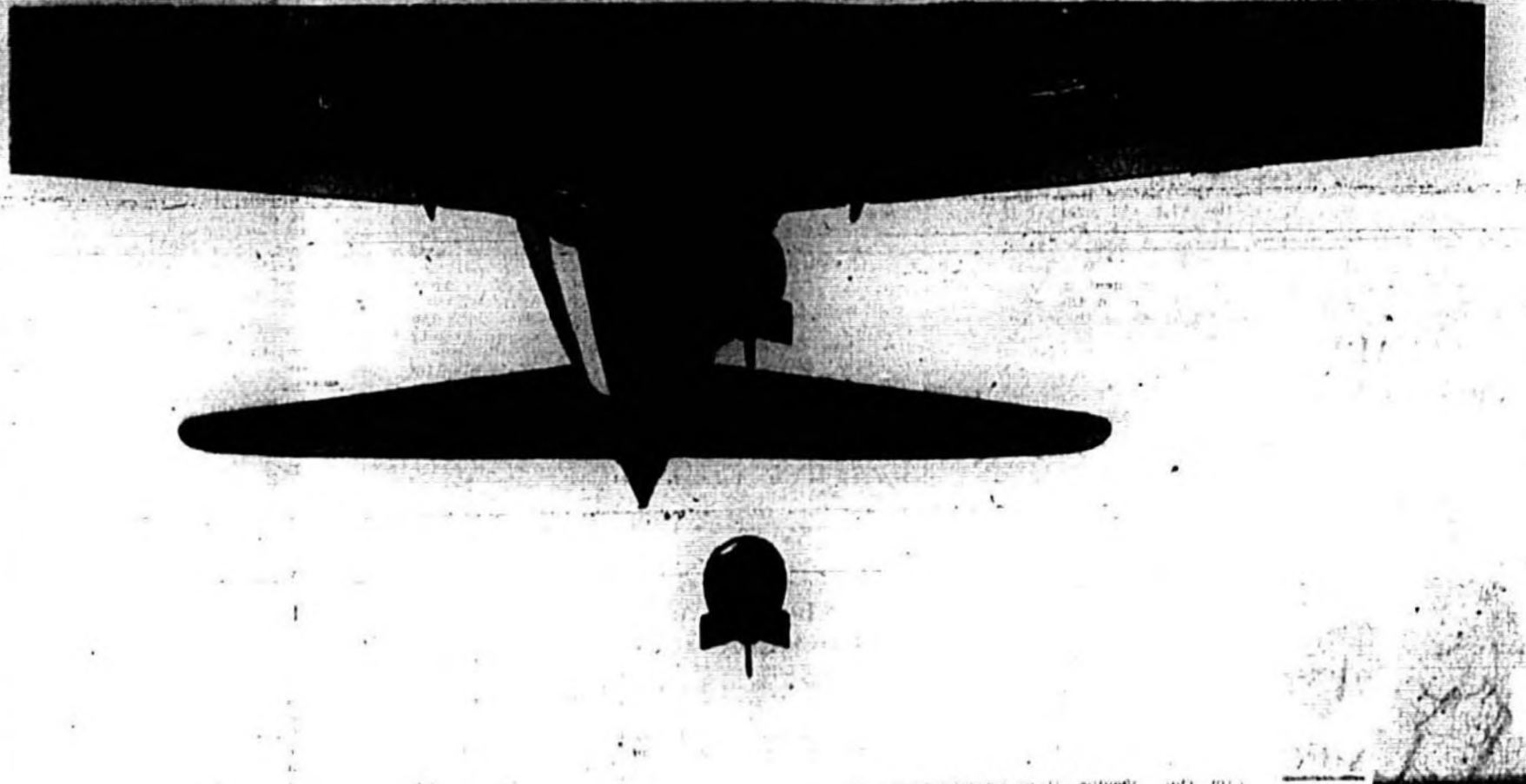

### Stinnett Calls 4th Registration "Nose Counting"

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(WV)—Apparently the President's announcement that men of 45 to 65 will be registered Apr. 27 has given rise to a lot of unanswered questions and some misunderstanding, with some older men thinking that registration will mean immediate draft into the Army or war industries.

I have talked to national Selective Service officials and to Congressmen. The Fourth Registration is a nose-counting registration and nothing more. It could be done, but not as effectively, by the Census Bureau. The Census Bureau admittedly misses a certain percentage of the population. If the Selective Service boards miss a few, the FBI doesn't not for long anyway.

Besides, the Fourth Registration will make available detailed facts and information that could not be obtained any other way. Congress, the military forces, and the War Production Board will then know exactly where we stand in man-power, what that man-power is fitted for.

Although the law provides for registration of men from 45 to 65, there isn't now any law for drafting these men into the armed forces or into the industrial and agricultural pursuits that provide the war machine with its sinews.

And there isn't any pressure either public or official on Congress to pass such a law at this time.

This catalogue of skills will, however, show exactly just how many an Army this country could support if its total man-power were mobilized. The final answer to the ultimate and complete war effort could not, of course, be given until women and men aged 18 also are registered.

One question that is constantly asked by these registrants is the third draft, 35 to 44 years old, in that are the chances that I will be called into military service? It doesn't do any good to take the question to Selective Service. They'll give you the fishy eye and the stock answer to a question they don't want to quibble about. "That's a matter for the Army and the War Department. I did find one government official through who pulled some interesting figures out of the last year's record, unofficial estimate is worth.

There are, he explained, about 1,250,000 men in the 35-44 registration. If we want an Army of 4,000,000 men and we do about 400,000 will come from this age group, and they will be called within the next 12 to 18 months. That means that one out of an approximately every 18 men in that group will be in uniform by the end of 1943, unless war ends before then.

If we go on to build the projected Army of 8,000,000 the number required from this age group will more than double (because of previous demands on the younger age groups). A guess is that this group would then provide at least a million men and the chances of course would then rise to one out of approximately every seven.

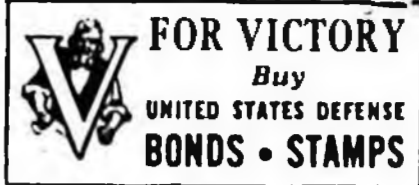

MELBOURNE, Apr. 10.—(AP)—"We've taken the offensive against the Japanese in the air, and we'll continue to increase it," said Lieut. Gen. George H. Brett, air chief and deputy commander in the Pacific. He added planes are "flowing here at an ever-increasing rate."

The Japanese raid on the New Guinea harbor of Port Moresby for the 14th time, Lieut. Gen. George H. Brett, deputy air commander in the southwest Pacific under General MacArthur, declared today that the Japanese are taking the offensive against the Japanese in the air and we'll continue to increase it.

A Japanese air raid on the Florida island capital of Tutuila, administrative center of the Solomon chain across the Coral Sea from northeastern Australia, still held fears anew last night that the Japanese might be clearing the way for a stab closer to the vital supply lane from the United States to Australia.

The imperative need for safeguarding the sea lane to the United States was underscored by Ronald H. Cross, British high commissioner for Australia, who said "I am unable to envisage the United States being able to come from Britain to Australia."

#### Australians Prepare for Japs

The exchange of air blows came on a day when the defenders of Australia learned of a further spread of the Japanese grip on the scattered islands to the north.

A communique said aerial reconnaissance revealed that the Japanese, probably landing some time ago, had occupied Lungu on mountainous Manus island, largest of the Admiralty group 200 miles north of New Guinea.

Prime Minister Curtin announced that five Japanese planes took part in the raid on Tutuila, sweeping over at 5,000 feet and dropping 30 to 40 bombs.

Some damage was done, but no casualties were reported.

#### Sanford Market Sales For March Total \$154,273

\$38,000 Is Received From Citrus While Celery Prices Drop

March sales of produce at the Sanford State Farmers Market showed an increase in sales for the month—an increase of over \$34,000 over March, 1941, and a decrease of about \$38,000 under the sales in the preceding month of February this year.

Total sales for the month just ended were \$154,273.10 as compared with \$119,900 a year ago. February sales were \$192,295.22.

Mr. Lehman gave as the principal reasons for the decrease the lower prices being offered for celery and celery. More quantities of produce were sold in March than in February.

Citrus sales topped the month's earnings with \$38,000, followed by celery with \$22,000 and lettuce with \$25,000. Other leaders in sales were beans, cabbage, tomatoes and potatoes.

Local new potatoes are expected to be marketed by the first of next week, and local beans probably will be ready in two weeks. It was predicted that more vegetables will be received soon from South Florida.
