Soviet Reserves, Tanks Are Massed Behind War Front

Russians' New Army Is Estimated At 10 Million Men

The Red army was reported massing its tanks which have been turned out at a frenzied pace all winter in factories strong out all the way back to the Ural Mountains, supplemented by shipments from the United States and Great Britain, and there also indications that both of Russia's most important pieces of strategy was about to be put to the test.

Stockholm dispatch said that a vast army of Russian reserves, under personal command of Marshal Klement E. Voroshilov, had taken up positions behind the Ukraine front to join the crucial battle for the Caucasus.

A Allied India forces straddled a Japanese aircraft carrier with big explosives yesterday and shot down at least ten Japanese planes and perhaps 10. It was officially unannounced yesterday.

Japanese bombers, apparently based on the aircraft carrier sought out by the Allies force, straddled the British carrier.

The invaders damaged harbors and airbase facilities at Trincomalee, and "there were a few casualties amongst the deckhand civil and naval personnel," the communiqué said.

The British said that "near misses" were scored in the attack on the Japanese aircraft carrier which apparently was the mother ship for the planes attacking Trincomalee.

The communiqué referred to "our bombers" in telling of the naval-air engagement. It was not disclosed whether U. S. aircraft, based in adjacent India, participated in the raid.

In the Japanese raid on Trincomalee the British said six of the invading craft were destroyed definitely, six others probably destroyed, and two damaged.

The other four planes, fighters, were shot down in the ensuing attack on the aircraft carrier.

Its manufacturers spiked the rumors that the Germans had gotten possession, President T. H. Barth of Collin Kelly Co. reversed the late Col. Kelly's statement that Norden bombsights were being used in sinking the Bismarck.

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 10, (AP)—Governor Holland told Florida road builders Thursday that there are enough defense highway projects to keep them busy despite Roosevelt's Federal ban on non-essential construction.

"I think the restrictions will not affect the roads in Florida," he said. "For the duration," he said of the Florida Road Builders' association annual meeting here.

He called the bar a "wholesome indication that all equipment and facilities are being channeled to serve the general war picture."

\$38,000 Is Received From Citrus While Celery Prices Drop

March sales of produce at the Sanford State Farmers Market showed an increase and a decrease for the month—an increase of over \$34,000 over March, 1941, and a decrease of about \$38,000 under the sales in the preceding month of February this year, according to H. C. Lehman, manager of the market.

Total sales for the month just ended were \$154,273.19 as compared with \$119,890 a year ago. February sales were \$192,295.22. Mr. Lehman gave as the principal reason for the decrease the lower prices being offered for cabbage and celery. More units or packages of produce were sold than last month.
