AMERICA ASKS RUMANIA FOR DEBT PAYMENT

United States Charges That Country Funded Her Debts To Other Powers, Ignoring Her Obligations To U. S.

Relief Debt Amounts To About 42 Million

Washington Government Has Already Presented Views; Loans Not War Measures

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—Steps to press the Rumanian relief debt question to early settlement have been initiated at Bucharest by the Washington government.

The amount involved aggregates nearly \$42,000,000 principal and interest, and the loan is viewed at the state department as a purely relief transaction, not to be confused with the general war debt problem.

Views of the Washington government have been presented at Bucharest by Minister Jay in a formal communication. It calls attention sharply to the fact that Rumania has negotiated refunding agreements with several other governments covering similar loans negotiated after the American loans had been made and for smaller amounts, but that the obligations to the United States thus far have been ignored.

Loans Not War Measures

The note also emphasizes that the loans were not made as war measures but to relieve urgent necessities of the Rumanian government and people after the war.

On that ground, the Washington government holds that the loans should be given priority in repayment over any strictly war financing operations.

Mr. Jay, who has been appointed ambassador to the Argentine republic, will remain at Bucharest indefinitely to conduct negotiations as to loan refunding and also press for satisfactory settlement of other pending questions, because of his special qualifications to deal with Rumanian problems.

Increasing Dissatisfaction

Both the debt note and the decision to retain Mr. Jay at Bucharest are believed to represent increasing dissatisfaction at the state department with the delay in settling pending questions with that country. These include, besides the debt, the new Rumanian mining law affecting oil explorations, which has clauses regarded here as discriminatory against le-

gitimately acquired American private holdings in the Rumanian field. In some cases, application of that law has been modified by the Rumanian government, but it still has conflicting provisions which make it difficult for the American financed companies to proceed with the development of the ground they hold.

Another point in conflict has to do with American private commercial and industrial advances made to the Rumanian government in connection with relief and reconstruction work after the war.

These include large sums owing still to the Baldwin Locomotive Company, the International Harvester Company and several other big American firms. In two or three cases, the companies have been compelled to go into the Rumanian courts to seek settlements, although through diplomatic pressure partial payments have been obtained by the Baldwin Company and some others.

ROAD BODY FIXES BUDGET FOR THIS YEAR'S PROGRAM

Read Number Three From the St. Johns River to Orange County Line Is Included; Volusia Gets Assistance

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Apr. 16.—The state road department, meeting here Monday adopted the budget for its program of work for 1925, with a few minor changes in the program, which were decided upon following the hearing held at Miami on Mar. 10.

Additions made to program previously worked out included:

Road No. 3 from St. Johns River to Orange county line put in in the budget the department expecting to rebuild the road on a new location to bring the entire road up to its specifications.

On road No. 2, added the section from Silver Lake forks to the section through Polk county.

Added road 27 between Fort Myers and Marco.

Added Road 4 between Flagler county line to Rose Bay through the Daytona section.

Members of the department also granted:

The request of Senator M. O. Overstreet that route A of the state highway running through Fleming Island (the straight route) be designated as the state highway and that the board hard surface that route instead of the river front; also that an application be made to the war department for the privilege of erecting the Doctor's Lake bridge connecting with this highway.

The short route between DeLion Springs and DeLand, provided Volusia county shall deposit with the state treasury the sum of \$35,000 to aid in this project.

The request of a delegation from Alachua county asking that the state department take over maintenance of road 13 in that county, but declined to accept No. 14.

That projects 747 and 629 from Lake Annie east be advertised for bids.

That highway number 3, from DeLand south for 11 miles be advertised for bids for a rock base when the district shall have placed in the hands of the state treasurer the sum of \$90,000 to aid in this project.

The contract for project number 47, from the Duval county line through St. Johns county to St. Augustine, was let to Boone and Wester contractors at Birmingham, Ala., under a bid of approximately \$127,500, the work to be completed in 300 days.

New Memorials Will Grace Potomac River At National Capital

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—The Potomac River's proverbial serenity will be seriously troubled this summer, for work is under way on two memorials on its banks, and a majestic bridge to span its bosom.

One of the monuments, at the foot of New Hampshire Avenue and E Street, will commemorate those who lost their lives in the Titanic disaster, in a figure with catfetched arms. John Ericsson, inventor and constructor of the Monitor of Civil War renown, will be remembered in the other piece of statuary, 900 feet south of the Titanic statue.

The Arlington Memorial Bridge, spanning southwesterly from the Lincoln memorial to Columbia Island, so as to form an avenue toward the Lee mansion at Arlington, is to become one of the most beautiful in the world. For its construction the Sixty-eighth Congress authorized an appropriation of \$1,750,000 over a ten-year period. Preliminary work on laying the foundations, which will link the Lincoln and Lee highways, has just been started, under the direc-

tion of Colonel C. O. Sherrill, officer in charge of public buildings and grounds.
