MARTIAL LAW IN AZORES PREVAILS TO STOP LOOTING

Twenty-Five Are Dead, Reports Say, And Fully Four Hundred Injured; Buildings On Fayal Island Wrecked

HORTA, Fayal Island, Azores, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Martial law restrictions, instituted following Tuesday's disastrous earthquake, were tightened throughout the island today to cope with looting, a number of cases of which have been reported.

(Horta dispatch last night said 25 persons had been killed and not less than 400 injured in that city, the chief town of Fayal Island, while many buildings were wrecked.)

The Portuguese government has dispatched a ship laden with Red Cross supplies and bearing army supplies which will aid in clearing away the ruins and repairing the roads. The cruiser Cardulo Arronjo arrived.

Electric Chair To Claim Trio Tonight For \$30 Murder

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 2.—(AP)—"Sometime tonight" the electric chair at the Ohio penitentiary will take three lives in expiation of the "30 murder" of Pomeroy's "Hill of Horrors," unless Governor V. Donahue intervenes.

The trio face execution for the murder of James McCumber, 65, who "knew too much" about the bootlegging activities of John Bryant, 40, negro, one of the condemned men. Richard Rhoads, 29, and John Hedrick, 30, both white, the other condemned men, testified they "got rid" of McCumber at the behest of Bryant, who they said, offered to them \$50 to get him out of the way.

They actually received \$30 between them it was brought out. Both Hedrick and Rhoads claim the other fired the fatal shot, which was fired after they had "slugged" McCumber. Hedrick pleaded guilty, while the other two were convicted at Pomeroy, May 1.

GIANT AIRSHIP IS OFF ON LONG INLAND FLIGHT

Army Dirigible Flying Over Practically Same Route As One Followed By Ill-Fated Shenandoah Last September

Airship Passes Over Ohio This Morning

Sunshine And Gloomy Skies Alternate As Ship Makes Way Toward Illinois Field

(By Associated Press)
Floating over the same territory traversed by the ill-fated Shenandoah a year ago tomorrow, the army airship TC-5, a semi-rigid airship, journeyed over Ohio today on a flight from Langley Field, Va., to Scott Field, Ill.

It was the first inland flight by a government dirigible since the Shenandoah disaster.

Sunshine and gloomy skies alternated as the trip progressed. Entering the state near Belpre, after passing over Parkersburg, W. V., at 8:55 a. m., the ship journeyed over the southern half of Ohio at a good speed.

The TC-5 passed over Athens at 10 a. m. Eastern time, and was flying so low that members of its crew waved gaily to people gathered on the hilltops waiting for a glimpse of it.

The southern Ohio hills which beheld the silver glory of the Shenandoah and then cradled its shattered bulk formed a vantage point for many persons to see the ship.

But the sight of the lesser ship was denied citizens of Noble county, where the Shenandoah crashed, for the army dirigible skirted that immediate vicinity, entering Ohio farther south.

WASHINGTON, Ohio, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The army and semi-rigid airship TC-5, bound from Langley Field, Va., to Scott Field, Ill., landed near here at 11:15 Eastern Time today to re-fuel.

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 2.—(AP)—The army dirigible TC-5 was en route today from Langley Field to be the first inland flight by a Scott Field, Ill., on what was said government dirigible since the disaster of the navy's Shenandoah. It is expected to arrive about noon today.

Smiths Leading Brown By 7,500 Votes For Senate But Second Primary Necessary

COLUMBIA, S. C., Sept. 2.—(AP)—Executive committeemen will meet in every county seat of the state today to make an official canvass of the results of Tuesday's primary election.

With 160,000 votes counted early today and less than 100 precincts in the state's 1,383 uncounted for, it was estimated that the total number of ballots cast would not exceed 175,000 at the maximum. This is lower by several thousand than the vote of the state of the 1924 primary.

As belated returns trickled in, Senator E. D. Smith held a 7,500 lead over Edgar A. Brown, with former Senator Dial trailing nearly 30,000 in the rear. With all but 98 precincts counted, the standing was: Smith, 67,003; Brown, 59,499; Dial, 32,418.

Senator Smith, three times a member of the upper house of Congress, yesterday issued a statement predicting a victory for himself in the run-off primary Sept. 11 with Brown. Neither obtained a majority vote in Tuesday's voting.

A run-off primary will also be necessary in the race for governor, as John G. Richards, member of the state railroad commission, led the field of nine candidates without a majority. With 1,285 precincts counted, I. A. Blackwood of Spartanburg appeared to be his opponent in the second race, with a lead of 2,500 over Lieutenant Governor E. H. Jackson. Early today the vote stood: Richards, 40,213; Blackwood, 34,031; Jackson, 31,478; John T. Dunnean, 5,711; George K. Laney, 11,878; John J. McManis, 2,150; Carroll D. Nance, 15,431; D. A. C. Oulize, 10,110; Thomas H. Peoples, 9,700.

Latest returns indicate a run-off primary in the seventh congressional district, as Hampton P. Fulmer, incumbent, with 11,696 votes, failed to get a majority over Ernest M. Dupre, Columbia business man, with 10,264, and Dr. Starke, Calhoun county, with 1,415.

Thomas McMillan, congressman from the first district, and W. P. Steffenson, of the fifth, held commanding leads over their respective opponents, I. S. Hutto and Zeb Vance Davidson.

MIAMI, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Auxiliary schooner Evelyn D., of Spanish registry, with 1,000 cases of assorted liquors aboard, was brought into Miami Harbor this morning under escort of a coast guard patrol boat.

The seizure was held illegal, and the ship was released and escorted from port by a coast guard convoy.

TRACY ESCAPE CAUSES ROW IN STATE OFFICES

Commissioner Mayo Puts The Blame On Governor Martin And Latter Blames Former For Permitting Expedition

Executive Admits Error About Date

Officials Hold Conferences But Disagree On Responsibility For Bandit's Release

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Governor Martin and Prison Commissioner Mayo both blamed each other for J. P. Tracey's escape in statements to the press here last night.

Both described the circumstances leading up to the issuance of the order for Tracey's temporary release from the Florida penitentiary to permit the convict to go to the Everglades to "renew" \$100,000 in bonds, which, he claimed, had been buried there. Tracey, escaped from his guard while being returned to Raiford after the search had proved futile.

The statements were made today after a conference between the two officials, as a result of newspaper reports and editorials on the responsibility for Tracey's escape.

Telegram in Error
Governor Martin declared a telegram he had sent to The Tampa Morning Tribune to the effect that he was attending the governors' conference in Wyoming at the time the order for Tracey's release was issued was in error because of information furnished by the prison authorities that the order had not been issued until July 30, when it had gone forward on July 15. He added that he was in Florida on July 15 and desired to correct his previous statement.

"I gave Mr. Mayo the correspondence with Mr. Hack and Mr. Blitch, as the prisoners are under his department," the governor said. "Mr. Mayo says that I agreed with him that Tracey should go on this errand. The records of my office show no correspondence to this effect."

The executive concluded his statement by declaring that he did not desire to shift the responsibility to anyone "unjustly or unfairly."

"This is my administration and there is no disposition on my part to shoulder anything on any one unjustly or unfairly. What good the administration does, I shall be glad to have credit for. If anything happens during the administration that is not pleasing to the people, of course, if it is my administration and I shall take the blame along with the good."

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 2.—(AP)—One of the freak wagers on the recent gubernatorial race in Texas came to light today.

State Representative Ruben Loftin, the loser, "hunched like a mule," must pull the winner, Frank Holliday, former legislator, in a little red wagon around the court house in Henrietta Square. All Clay county, in which Henrietta is located, is expected to turn out next Saturday to witness the event.

Loftin, floor manager for Governor Miran Ferguson in the house of the Thirty-ninth legislature, bet Holliday, "I'll harness Loftin to that wagon. I'll put on him all the collars and traces chains he can carry, and he also will be hobbled so there can't be any runaway."

J. M. Skinner, beaten into submission Monday night by five unmasked men, fails to file charges with Judge Sharon

J. M. Skinner, said to have been beaten into submission by five unmasked men Monday night, has left Seminole county, according to information received by the sheriff's department. He and his wife were seen Wednesday in a touring car, loaded with personal effects, driving north on the DeLand highway.

Skinner said he intended to file warrants against three of the men alleged to have been in the abduction party, which was carrying him in an auto on the highway when motorcycle officers intercepted him. He failed to file charges before Judge James C. Sharon of the County Court to swear out warrants, it was learned today.

County Prosecutor E. F. Housholder said today that if Skinner had given him information on the assault he would have acted in his capacity as prosecutor, and would have given the information to the grand jury, provided there was a case.

The two men placed under arrest Monday night in connection with the kidnaping, appeared in Sheriff C. M. Hand's office the following morning at 10 o'clock as requested by the sheriff, it was said today, but no action was taken pending the swearing out of a warrant by Skinner.

Skinner declared that it was a neighbor who led the men in the assault, but from another source it was said that the members of the abduction party belonged to a secret society.

SUMMER IS NOT DULL HERE, SAYS SANFORD BROKER

Edward Higgins, President Of Brokerage Firm, Cites Months of July, August

The opinion that there is "little or no business" moving at this time of the year is wrong, according to Edward Higgins, president of Higgins & Smith, Wight, Inc., Sanford real estate brokers and developers of Loch Arbor.

Mr. Higgins cited the office records of his company in denying the oft repeated assertion that this is the "dull season." Higgins & Smith, Wight, Inc., did \$251,450 in brokerage business in July and August. This brokerage business included sale of lots, business property, acreage and real estate. Insurance coverage of \$599,855 was written, and investment securities amounting to \$45,000 were placed.

"The business we have turned during the last 60 days," Mr. Higgins said, "has come to us, we believe, largely because we have through our advertising converted the public to the belief that Sanford has real values."

"We have never been skeptical about the buying power of Sanford for the reason that it is illogical to believe a city enjoying the prosperity that Sanford is enjoying would have a dull period. You cannot pour into a community the crop millions that have been poured into Sanford, plus its construction, railroad and business house payrolls, and not be highly prosperous. Our banks are full of money and the business conditions are sound all the way through, and with every wheel in the industrial, commercial and financial machine of the city speeding up to high pressure, we cannot see any reason for any foundation for the belief that things must be slow."

"So far as the future is concerned we ourselves are very optimistic. In spite of all the propaganda that may have been spread throughout the North, Florida will receive its usual number of winter guests, and so long as the North is enjoying the prosperity that it is now enjoying, there will be an ever increasing number of persons who will find the time and money to recreate in Florida during a part of the winter."

"While we look for an absence of pressure buying and speculation foolishness, we are, however, confident that a great many of our winter guests will be in the market for good homes, homesites and farm tracts, but the buying this year will be done on an intrinsic rather than speculative values."

Confessed 'Attacker' Of Girls And Of Miami Yeggs Make Break To Night Jailer Brown Is Beaten By Men Wait For Officer In Corridor After Sawing Bars Of Cell

Black Saw Found By Jailer
The only implement used by prisoners in sawing through bars of their cells which Jailer Al Tucker could find this morning was a sort of black saw fashioned from a knife blade. The blade was placed in a handle of wood.

Jailer Tucker said he believed the Miami yeggs planned the flight and took Lowe with them. After sawing one bar each of their cells, the four men cut themselves in the jail sub-corridor and looked out through still bars to the ground, three feet below.

Held by these bars and heavy locked doors leading to the main corridor, they sawed through the ceiling of the sub-corridor and climbing between roof and the top of the third floor.

 Jailer Tucker said his investigation disclosed.
 Found Exit In Main Corridor
 Falling in this, the men found an exit to the main corridor through a closet door. Mr. Tucker said, used to open the way to water-pipes of the jail. Once in the main corridor they awaited an opportunity to attack Jailer Brown.
 At 5 o'clock Brown started to the second floor to unlock seven negro "trusties" and start preparations for breakfast. As he reached that floor and had started to place the key in the door freeing the trusties, the four men jumped on him, he said.
 They struck him in the sides and on the head and hustled him down stairs and forced him, under threat of using the heavy iron bar to unlock the jail door, to New Brown Learning Against Wall.
 Meanwhile, Jailer Tucker, who resides in an adjoining house, was attracted by the yelling of the negro trusties. He peered out his bedroom window to see Brown, half-conscious, leaning against the wall of his house. The four prisoners had escaped barefooted. An investigation of the jail break will be held, Deputy Vinzant said.
 The three negroes who escaped from the city jail were minor offenders, police said. They escaped from the building, the old county armory, used as the jail during the construction of a new city prison, by the simple formula of pulling off a heavy board nailed over a transom in the rear of their quarters—the same method a half-dozen prisoners have employed to flee the building since the transfer there.

MIAMI, Sept. 2.—(AP)—F. G. Ward, E. L. Smith and J. R. Williams, who escaped from the Duval county jail at Jacksonville this morning, are regarded by police here as three of the most dangerous prisoners that ever were captured here.
 They were arrested April 19, after a running gun-fight with police, the trio attempting to cut off a small safe containing \$25,000 in cash, the property of a chain-store. One officer was slightly wounded in the battle.

"On the same afternoon, July 15, the same day the order was issued, a statement was broadcast by Governor Martin's press reporter to the effect that the governor had this day given permission through my office to permit Tracey to go out under guard."

Right Of America In World Tribunal Debated By Nations

GENEVA, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The opinion that the United States should have the same rights in the World Court as members of the League of Nations council, but no more was voted by many delegates at today's session of the international conference convened to discuss the American reservation to membership in the court.
 If this opinion weighs in the conference it may be impossible to accept the fifth American reservation, requiring the consent of the United States to requests for advisory opinions from the council on questions in which she claims interest.
 The reason for this is that the law of the League of Nations is so obscure that it is so uncertain whether unanimous or only majority vote is necessary when the court is asked for such opinions.
 Some of the delegates held that if unanimity were made essential the United States could not vote anyway as a party to a question at issue, while if a simple majority only were needed, it would be impossible to record the United States the right to block the decision of the majority.

Most Of Cardinal's Jewelry And Bonds Have Been Found

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 2.—(AP)—With the exception of two small diamond rings, all the jewelry and bonds, valued at approximately \$60,000, which were stolen from the residence of Cardinal Dougherty, archbishop of Philadelphia Tuesday night had been recovered today.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—How much has been heard lately from Col. "Billy" Mitchell, aviator, but there's liable to be, shortly. When the National Aeronautic Association meets in Philadelphia Sept. 4, a drive is to be launched to make Col. "Billy" the organization's president. The colonel's supporters say a majority in his favor has already been won, and the colonel himself, now on a vacation in Maine, is quoted as having promised to accept, if elected. NOW, as we all know, Colonel Mitchell holds that navies are obsolete and armies nearly so, that military aviation is everything these times. We also know that orthodox army and navy men dissent from this judgment and that the colonel was driven out of the service, not perhaps for his opinions, but for the way in which he expressed them. After his enforced retirement, Mitchell tried to keep on his right but wasn't very successful. He was a good leader but he lacked an organized following. Maybe here's where he gets it.

THE National Aeronautic Association's motto is "America First to the Air," which speaks for itself. It was formed in Detroit in 1922. Its 1923 president was Howard E. Coffin, who served on President Coolidge's aircraft board. Its second was Fred B. Patterson of the National Cash Register Company. Godfrey L. Cabot, Boston manufacturer and aviation expert, the third, is just finishing his second term. The association opened up with a flourish of trumpets, but its enthusiasm waned presently. Of late it's hardly been heard from.

Next November's election is only a congressional election, but some presidential candidates are at stake in it for all that. President Coolidge's is one. If the Democrats and insurgents, Republicans get Congress, or even the Senate, away from him, his chances of a re-nomination will be mighty slim. His party primaries left him politically prostrate. A defeat in the fall would be almost sure to knock him out—in 1928.

On the other hand, let the voters rebuke the Republican insurgents and re-elect all the regulars, and he'll come up strong for the ensuing round.

Just a moderate amount of in- urgency, particularly in the cor- belt, will play into the hands of farm candidates like Vice Presi- dent Dawes and Frank O. Lowden. A great wave of it might give Senator Borah a look in. This coming election means ev- erything to Coolidge. London's Socialist Book Store Soon To Have A Competitor






