NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—A young free-lance writer, J. C. Furtak, 29, has a new plan to stop the slaughter of 36,000 Americans annually in automobile accidents and the manner of 1,000 million dollars it costs. It was tried in Manhattan traffic court yesterday with telling effect.

It consists of impressing upon motorists the ghastly reality of ghastly white bodies streaking through torn flesh, or a dead baby's crushed body, of the queer building made a woman moves when she tries to get out through a broken down rear fender.

Traffic court was packed with some 200 men and women. Scores of them had risked death in coming to the court, with which they were charged.

U. S. Attitude On

Soviet in Making

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—President Roosevelt indicated last night he had reached a decision on the government's future attitude toward Soviet Russia and intimated an announcement probably would be made today.

A few weeks ago Florida citizens read in the paper that a hurricane was brewing in the West Indies. The next day it was reported blowing toward the Florida coast. A later announcement said that it had recurred, and, heading in a northeasterly direction, had blown out into the Atlantic. That was the last that most of us heard of it. We breathed a sigh of relief that Florida had again been spared another damaging storm.

Out in the middle of the Atlantic, Alfred Welsh sailed his 66 foot two-masted schooner, La Dahama, bound from Bermuda to Cannes, France, over a southerly track. With him on this pleasure lark were Captain Lara Larsen and three young seamen. About 700 miles off of Bermuda, a falling barometer warned them of "a little 'tide' weather," and soon the sea was raging and the winds bore down on them with terrific force.

Closely racing did little good against a wind which at times blew at speeds of hundred miles an hour. Sails had to be lowered to prevent the mast from being blown away.
