Oil men hope not. Gasoline demand by motorists is at an all-time high, and civilian demand for most oil products is on the up-grade, and production creeping back toward its postwar peak.

The shipping and aviation industries already have been called upon by the government to help get men and supplies to Korea. Cargo planes have been taken off the Atlantic routes to ferry war materials across the Pacific.

Food processors are wondering what the government may have in mind for them in the way of price controls. Price jumps in meat, wheat, coffee and sugar, if continued, might lead to talk of reviving controls, some contend.

The White House so far has contended itself with saying the President will make up his mind about both allocations and price controls after he gets the mid-year report from his council of economic advisors.

But steelmen are the most worried at the moment. They are already ready producing a capacity to meet civilian demands, and must find room for the expected military orders.

Washington observers believe the President will soon ask Congress for mandatory power to allocate iron and steel and other materials, but only on a standby basis—just in case. The government planners seem inclined to view any voluntary schemes as unworkable.

The President said the U. N. flag should be displayed "concurrently with flags of various nations participating." But neither this country nor the United Nations permits its flag to be flown in a subordinate position.
In 1942, before the U. N. was set up, Congress ruled that "no other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the flag of the United States of America."
The U. N. issued this order in 1947: "The flag of the United Nations shall not be subordinated to any other flag."
Sharp objections are expected in this country if MacArthur chooses to obey the U. N. mandate and place the American flag in second place.
A decision to fly the international banner below the Stars and Stripes almost certainly would be seized upon by Russia as evidence of U. S. "imperialism."

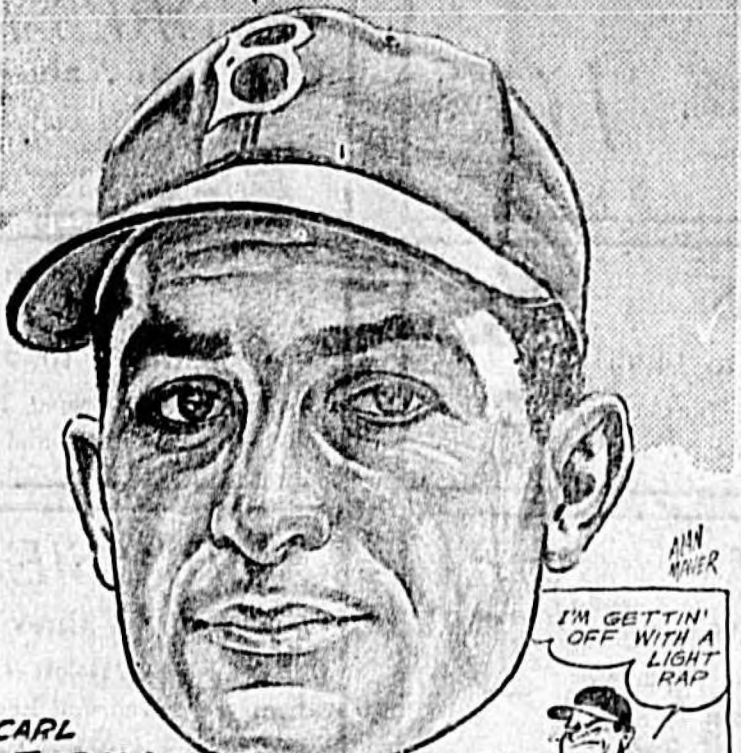

Art Larsen Says U. S. Will Retain Famed Davis Cup

SPRING LAKE, N. J., July 13—(AP)—Art Larsen, who looks like the most colorful player in big time tennis since Frank Kovacs, turned serious today and predicted the United States would retain the Davis Cup this year with a 3-2 victory over Australia.

The San Leandro, Calif., left-hander made the prediction at the 42nd annual Spring Lake Tennis Tournament, where he's second in the seedings and first in the eyes of the gallery.

Would he like to be on the cup squad? "Sure, who wouldn't," he replied with a quick smile. Larsen has some experience with the Australians. He lost to Frank Sedgman of Australia at Wimbledon after winning the first two.

Headed being the best-looking beauty to reach the top ten since the days of Johnny Dool, Larsen has plenty of color. Of Danish descent, he wears his blond hair long and probably is the only big-time tournament player with a moustache.

While warming up for yesterday's match with J. Gilbert Hall of New York, he started the crowd by swinging his racket around behind his back to return a shot by Hall. He surprised the gallery again with a deep loop when the referee announced the match. Then he defeated Hall, 6-0, 7-5.

He'll have to get serious in the quarter-finals today against Jack Geller of New Rochelle, N. Y., who surprised even himself with a 6-3, 6-1 win over the veteran Frank X. Shields of New York. Geller, also a left-hander, played his best tennis of the year in defeating the one-time national finalist.

Gardner Mulloy of Coral Gables topped seed in the tournament, making his low today against Alton Danham of Princeton. Third-seeded Eddie Moylan of Trenton faces durable Vincent of Miami in a quarter final match.

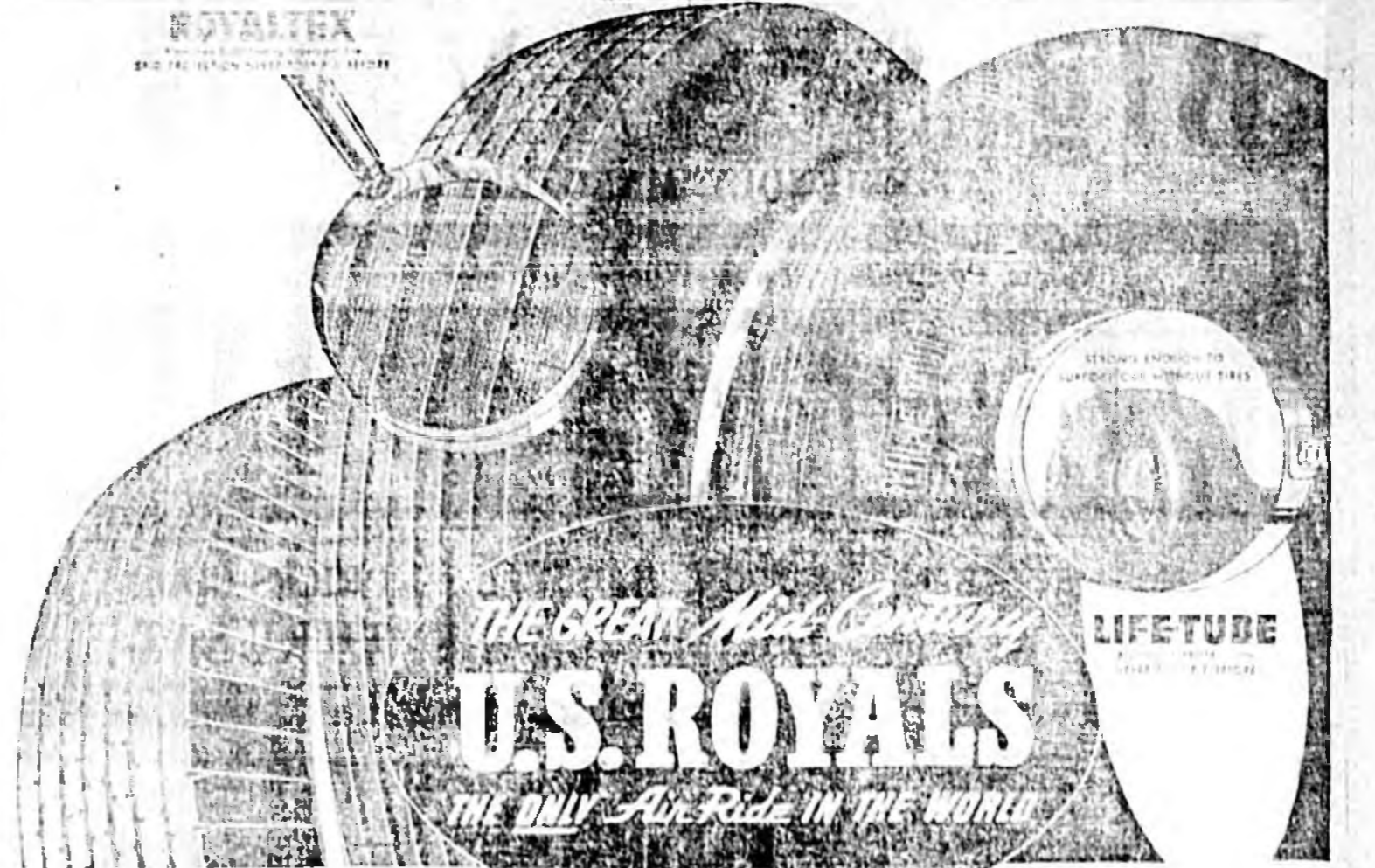

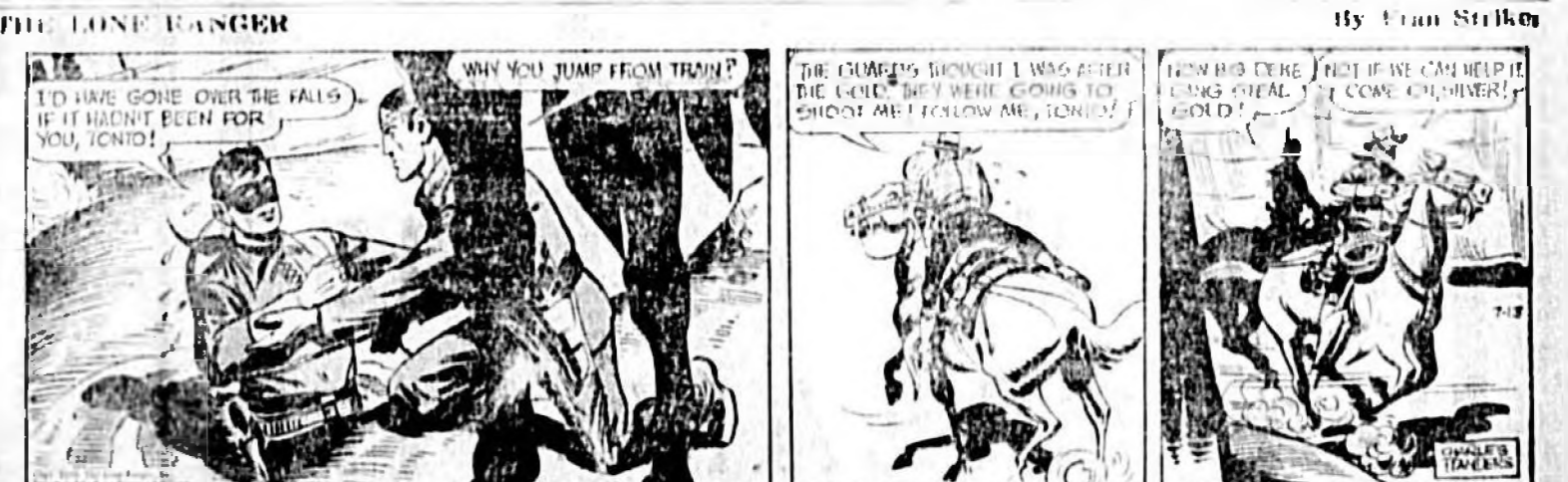
