#### Art Association good deeds

SANFORD — The Sanford Seminole Art Association continues to honor the memory of Sanford artist, the late E.B. Stowe. Two recent activities have been announced.

Ashby Jones, a member of the association's advisory board said a full dozen books, covering many phases of artistic design, creation and painting, have been purchased by the Seminole County Public Library System. Money for the purchases was given as the result of public donations to the E.B. Stowe Memorial Fund, conducted by the Art Association. Each of the books contains a photo of Stowe as well as a special memorial page. The donation for the purchase was listed as \$235.

Jean F. Rhein, director of Library and Leisure Services said the books have been placed in the North Branch Library.

In another move, the Seminole County Museum at Five Points has accepted the Sanford Seminole Art Association's yearbooks from 1959 to 1992. The books will be located at the museum, and may be reviewed during normal hours of operation.

The year books contain various newspaper clippings and photographs regarding the history and various projects of the association since its inception in 1959.

#### Homes pass again

SANFORD — Houses owned by Violetta Williams, the subject of controversy for many months, have again cleared another hurdle. Williams' Attorney Tom Greene reported that certificates of compliance are expected to be issued.

The latest move was clearing additional code violation situations in the interior of the homes. While some had already been cleared, two, at 612 Park Avenue and 718 W. First Street, had been given 14 days in which to be brought up to code.

"The only things we have to do from this point," Greene explained, "is to get approval from the Historic Preservation Board on the exterior work, and we are getting that work taken care of, so we don't expect any further difficulties."

Williams' homes, six in all, contain rental units, they are located in the historic district and were cited by neighbors who launched a letter-writing campaign to have the rental properties closed because of what was described as unsafe and poor physical conditions.

### Sanford Historic Trust hosts first themed garden tour

SANFORD — Following in the footsteps of seven successful home tours, the Sanford Historic Trust is going down the garden path, so to speak.

The first Spring Garden Tour, this Saturday, from 2 to 6 p.m., is a fund raiser, to support the trust's renovation projects, but it is also another opportunity to highlight the historic district of Sanford.

Many of the historic houses that have opened their doors for interior inspection will now open their garden gates to show off outdoor living environments.

The tour begins and ends at Park on Park, where vendors will be set up, displaying native and tropical plants, orchids, antique roses, herbs, annuals and outdoor furniture. Gardening experts will also be on-hand to answer questions and help with problems.

The seven gardens are located within a seven block area, so it should be an easy stroll for most visitors. District residents not on the tour have been encouraged to also spill up their landscapes, so the whole walk should be enjoyable.

Most of the gardens will represent a theme, chosen by the tour committee. The themes will range from Key West to Charleston and French Country. The garden of Hal and Cathryn Welch will be the site of a children's tea party, complete with Peter Rabbit, cookies and carrots!

## There's a price to pay for fresh tomatoes

SANFORD — It's a good thing most Sanford-area grocery stores are equipped with ATM machines because local tomato lovers are going to need them.

Florida farmers are getting a good price for their tomatoes this year, but Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford believes the prices in the supermarket are much too high.

The current pricing of tomatoes is "going crazy," Crawford said, adding that it is legal in Florida, "but may be immoral."

Crawford's remarks were based on a survey of tomato prices in five Florida cities over a five-

House Bed and Breakfast.

"We have a garden tour every day of the week," said Higgins House proprietor Walt Padgett. Padgett, with his wife, Bert, feel the outside of their establishment is as important as the inside in making their guests feel comfortable. Although their yard is small, as are most of the yards in the historic district, the Padgetts have created several private spaces throughout the garden so their guests can further enjoy their visit to the bed and breakfast.

"We have an awful lot of stuff in a very small space," Padgett said. There is a cottage kitchen garden, where the fresh vegetables and herbs are utilized in the meals prepared for guests. Parts of the garden are "formal" with statuary. There are also flowers for cutting, ferns and orchids. The entire garden is bordered by a fence that enhances the intimate feel of the garden.

## Mercer House

The theme for the garden at the home of John and Juanny Mercer is that of a Charleston garden. With the moss-covered brick patio and wrought iron furniture, the garden easily emulates some of the grand gardens in the historic Charleston area.

Plantings of ginger and holly ferns are the major focus of this garden. Fig and guava trees add greenery as well fruit, if Juanny gets to them before the birds do. A mulberry tree also drapes over the patio. Containers of annuals and perennials add color. Juanny has also planted a cutting garden in a sunny spot behind the fence on the alley.

The Mercer's garden will be accentuated for the tour with a bride's table, covered with old lace.

Juanny said she likes her yard because it is small and contained. "It's not so much to take care of."

## Cassels House

Because of the abundance of tropical plants to be found in this yard, it was chosen to represent the Key West theme.

Bob Cassels said he doesn't like grass in Florida and you won't find a blade of it anywhere in his yard. Like the Padgetts, Cassels has created several seating areas in his landscape, through the use of wood decks and has connected them with ground-level boardwalks. Cassels also converted an old cistern, located adjacent to his back door, into a small heated pool, complete with a dolphin-shaped fountain.

Anchored by old growth oak trees, some of the plantings in the yard feature fishtail, sago and chinese fan palms, banana trees, bamboo and an Australian fern tree. Azaleas, impatiens and roses add extra color to the garden.

## Chase House All Souls Rectory

The home of Father Trout is utilized throughout the year for many parish functions. The design of the landscaping allows for a lot of grass area to set up tables for outdoor entertaining or to hold an annual Easter egg hunt.

Trout said Dutch Mill Nursery, owned by the Lommierse family, on Upsala Road, helped with the design of the landscape plan and with the planting.

The garden is a mix of tropical plants, flowers and flowering trees. An expansive front porch, complete with rocking chairs, flows around the side of the house and ends in a ramp which leads to a fountain.

Central to the garden is a shrine to the Virgin Mary, which was put in place in 1963. There was originally a pond adjacent to the statue, but roots from the oak tree broke it up, so Trout replaced it with the fountain that was relocated to the side of the house, away from the trees.

## Goeb House

Julla Goeb built the white picket fence that now accentuates the side garden of her and her husband Michael's home. Pincapples, the traditional sign of welcome, are cut into fence for added interest.

Soon, honeysuckle will cover one side of the fence. The established plants had to cut back when the original fence was moved to allow for more parking space on the side of the house.

Goeb's garden is colorful against the white background, with lots of flowers. She hopes the gladiolas will be in bloom in time for the tour.

There will also be tables for a tea party set up in the garden, which is shaded by tall trees.

## Welch House

The garden of Hal and Cathryn Welch surrounds a small area of lawn which is often utilized for playing croquet. The lawn in the backyard is actually two levels, with one side raised and bordered with old bricks.

The Welches built a playhouse/storage shed using salvaged material and cedar shakes.

The garden is overlooked by a pergola and enclosed sunroom, which makes entertaining easy in the small yard.

Most of the garden is planted with herbs, native plants and old-fashioned roses. The lush plantings make good use of a minimum of space.

Cathryn said the whole yard was a "dirt pit" when they bought the house. They worked hard to establish the garden, and the small lawn, which may, in the future, be converted to a swimming pool.

Tickets for the garden tour can be purchased the day of the tour at Park on Park, for \$5. Proceeds will benefit the trust's many projects. A rain date of Sunday, April 28, has been established in case of inclement weather.

## House, Senate kick start budget talks

TALLAHASSEE — Leaders in the Florida House and Senate are scrambling to work out remaining conflicts over spending on schools, prisons and social services so their regular session won't have to go into overtime.

One of the biggest obstacles remains the funding of public schools, an annual debate that regularly keeps lawmakers at odds.

The House has proposed about \$74 million more than the Senate in total education money of about \$11 billion. But the two chambers still have to resolve differences about how the state would be permitted to spend it.

For public schools, the debate pits urban versus rural districts

in competition for a share of \$6 billion for 2.2 million school students, including more than 60,000 new students expected in the system next year.

The House wants to provide more uniform financing for all of the state's 67 school districts. But the Senate wants more money to go to districts with most of the students.

Legislative leaders said Wednesday they'll find an agreement — it's just a matter of time.

"I think there's more confusion here than needs to be," said House Appropriations Chairman Buzz Ritchie, D-Pensacola. "We've had these differences before."

Ritchie was among the lawmakers and staffers who met early Wednesday to try to avoid the same disputes that last year

forced lawmakers to go into overtime to conclude agreement on the state's budget.

"I think everybody shares the same feeling about trying to get this resolved in a timely fashion," agreed Senate President Jim Scott, R-Fort Lauderdale.

Both House and Senate spending plans for 1996-97 would total about \$39.6 billion, about \$500 million more than the current \$39.1 billion budget. It will be one of the smallest increases in 20 years and includes no new statewide taxes.

Under Florida's constitution, the Legislature must wait 72 hours after concluding negotiations before taking a final vote on the budget.

Lawmakers will work through the weekend on the budget in an effort to reach an agreement by Monday, so they can print the

proposal by Tuesday and vote on Friday, the last day of the regular session.

Each year, Florida's state budget takes effect July 1.

On Wednesday, legislative leaders floated ideas to resolve their major differences.

The Senate has about \$110 million more in cuts to social services — such as transportation — for the medically needy, and to cash assistance to welfare mothers.

Scott proposed splitting the difference with the House. Ritchie said he wasn't sure the House would be willing to reduce the social services spending any further.

But Scott also said the Senate would not grant more decision-making powers to the presidents to raise fees and run their campuses.

## House approves auto impact fee rebate

TALLAHASSEE — A lawmaker has offered an apology to 98,000 motorists left out when the state refunded an illegal auto impact fee, and their checks for \$295 each may soon be in the mail.

The House voted 117-0 for a bill (CSHB 5) that would authorize refunds totaling \$24.8 million Wednesday. It went to the Senate, where a similar measure was pending in the Ways and Means Committee.

"We made a mistake," said the bill's sponsor, Rep. Bob Starks, R-Casselberry. "I only apologize that it wasn't done sooner."

The Florida Supreme Court in 1994 ruled the fee charged to newcomers violated the U.S. Constitution's ban on interstate trade barriers.

But the ruling affected only fees paid under a 1991 law that slightly revised a statute passed the year before.

As a result, motorists who paid the fee between July 1, 1990, when the first law took effect, and June 30, 1991, when the new version went on the books, were not covered by the high court decision.

The state already has paid \$169 million to 600,000 auto owners who paid the fee under the revised law. The first batch of 490,000 checks were mailed in late November, and the

## Woman appealing order to return, with mom, to Florida

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — First the Florida courts barred Katherine Doucette from taking her 90-year-old mother north. She defied them. Then a Massachusetts judge ordered her to surrender. She appealed.

Now, her attorney says, the case could end up in the state appeals court.

Middlesex Superior Court Judge Malcolm Graham on Wednesday denied Doucette's challenge to efforts to turn her over to authorities in Florida, where she faces charges for spiriting away her mother.

But Doucette's attorney, David Berman, said he has

filed notice to take the case to the Massachusetts appeals court. Berman says Doucette was excluded from guardianship hearings for her mother, Margaret Enos, in Florida.

Doucette, 70, says she rescued her mother from a life marked by neglect. Other relatives of Enos' say Doucette kidnapped Enos, who was living in the home she and her husband had built in St. Petersburg. Mother and daughter, it is admitted, had been estranged for decades. Enos has major physical problems and is senile part of the time.

### Secret satellite launched

CAPE CANAVERAL — An Air Force Titan 4, America's most powerful rocket, has launched a secret satellite into space.

The 20-story-tall Titan roared off the launch pad from the Cape Canaveral Air Station at 7:37 p.m. Wednesday, two and a half hours late.

Stiff upper winds kept postponing the final countdown, and at one point aroused concern they might send the solid booster's toxic emissions wafting toward nearby populated areas.

## Real-life Lois Lane follows unhappy path of Superman

The Superman Curse appears to have struck Margot Kidder, the actress who played Lois Lane in the "Superman" movies.

Kidder was taken to a psychiatric ward Tuesday after she was found wandering disheveled and disoriented through a back yard in suburban Los Angeles. Authorities found no evidence of foul play.

Her "Superman" co-star, Christopher Reeve, was left paralyzed and unable to breathe on his own after a riding accident last May. The first "Superman" movie with Reeve and Kidder came out in 1978 and was followed by three sequels.

George Reeves, who starred in the 1951 movie "Superman and the Mole Men" and did 104 episodes of TV's "The Adventures of Superman" from 1951 to 1957, died of a gunshot wound to the head in 1959.

Police ruled Reeves' death a suicide, but his mother believed he was murdered. There were reports at the time that the actor

was despondent about the end of his "Superman" run.

Kirk Alyn, the first live-action Superman, bitterly complained that he had been typecast and couldn't get another movie role after the movie serials that ran from 1948 to 1950. Now 85, he has Alzheimer's disease and was last reported living in Texas.

Richard Pryor, who has multiple sclerosis, says he's been in touch with Kidder, who has helped him financially. In "Superman III," Pryor played Gus Gorman, a dishwasher-turned-computer mastermind who tries to thwart the Man of Steel.

## EDITORIAL

### Do we need all these codes?

There is no question: building and safety codes are necessary in today's society. We have long passed the era when a person could build or remodel his own home without having to meet certain criteria.

Now, depending on where a person is located, such as the Sanford Historic District, or within close proximity of other types of structural use, the number of permits and approvals necessary to build a new structure, or rebuild or recreate an existing one, can most often be costly, time consuming, and at times, extremely frustrating.

There are people in Sanford's historic district who purchased an old structure with the intent of remodeling it. Faced with the difficulty in obtaining necessary permits however, plus requirements which have been placed on remodeling, they are seeking to sell.

Yet sales are becoming difficult. A prospective buyer would be faced with the same difficulties as the present owner. Learning what will have to be accomplished even before the first dab of paint can be applied or work done has a tendency to frighten them off.

We hear these complaints often. "I'd like to sell my house. It's a beautiful old home with historic significance, but no one wants to buy it because fixing it up would be too costly for them."

As was said at the onset, building and safety codes are necessary. Perhaps historic renovation restrictions are also appropriate. But we believe there have been, and still are, many times when they are becoming so intense, so restrictive, that they prevent improvements.

People seeking permission for much of the remodeling of historic homes are necessary are faced with having to obtain approval after approval. A person buying one of the historic old homes may find himself held back by months before anything can be accomplished.

Ask anyone who has attempted restoration of an old home in Sanford. They will tell you stories which may make you wonder how they managed to go through the multi-faceted bureaucracy.

There must be a better way, one which is more people-oriented. When it comes to keeping the historic value of our old homes, we must either give individuals more rights, or be willing to see a continuation of the deterioration of the historic areas in the city.

### Sending care to Bosnia

In conjunction with volunteer work that I enjoy doing at Geneva Elementary School, I thought it would be a timely and memorable project if the children could be involved in sending "care packages" to Bosnian students. These were to be composed of shoe boxes containing school supplies for use by the Bosnian students, and I had on a preliminary basis, arranged the shipping of these school supply boxes through the Feed the Children organization based in Oklahoma City. Because the cost of the supplies and the cost of shipping might have been prohibitive to some families, I had intended to pay all shipping costs first from Florida to Oklahoma City and then as necessary from the Feed the Children facility to Bosnia.

I approached Mrs. Phillips, the principal at Geneva Elementary, and proposed the project to her for her approval. Her response was that the general consensus was that we need to worry about our own community and not worry about "them, over there." It was unable to get her to agree to this project, even if it was done at no cost to the students and their families, and I had other words, if I offered to pay the shipping and buy the school supplies to fill the boxes, it still wasn't a viable proposal in Mrs. Phillips' opinion.

I realize it's important to take care of ourselves, and our own communities. But how do young people learn to be caring, and the effects of their actions without some type of involvement with it? I consider it important to teach our children that caring about all the people of the world is a moral responsibility that we share, and that by participating in charitable activities, the children are helping far more than they even know.

Am I wrong in feeling that the principal's response was mislaid and that my request did not receive fair consideration (in light of my having offered to pay expenses)? I found it disheartening that a principal of a public school could arbitrarily deny such a project, without giving it any real consideration; and apparently, without any interest in hearing my justifications for suggesting the project in the first place.

It's been satisfying to my family to personally prepare a number of these shoe boxes and ship them to Bosnia. I still firmly believe that this is the type project from which much could be gained by the children if it could somehow become a project endorsed by our school, as well as other area schools.

### On reporting on Ron Brown's life

Washington—I don't know Barry R. Harris of Montgomery, Alabama. But his question, raised in a two-paragraph letter to the editor of USA Today, is my question.

"It's nice to see the tributes to the work of the late Commerce Secretary Ron Brown and of a few days ago," he wrote. "But I'm wondering why we didn't see such reporting before their untimely deaths."

It seems that the media spend so much time on criticism of public servants that there's little time or space to comment on their accomplishments on behalf of our country. That is a disservice which only contributes to the climate of governmental cynicism perpetuated by primarily selfish forces.

Harris' question, which has bothered a number of thoughtful journalists for some time, is especially valid in the aftermath of the outpouring of praise and affection for Ron Brown, the millions of Americans just have been surprised to learn what sort of person—and what sort of official—Brown was: tough, personable, highly skilled negotiator, consummate deal maker, motivator, builder of bridges across all sorts of racial and political chasms. Why didn't they know these things before?

Two things before we wrestle with that ques-

tion. First, stories on the recently dead almost always err in the direction of kindness and, particularly if the decedent is well-known, they usually will include some poignant anecdote, calculated to help give the public a better sense of the person. Second, in the very work of pulling together these final stories, reporters will talk to sources—school or childhood friends, family members, social and professional colleagues—not normally contacted during ordinary reporting. The reporters themselves, that is to say, are frequently surprised.

But not this time. So much of what Brown's intimates knew about his professional skills was reported by journalists out of their own knowl-


edge—after his death. They knew the good stuff before, but seldom bothered to report it.

Barry Harris' perfectly reasonable question is: Why? The first answer you'll get from journalists is that we do report the good stuff, and if you've got the time we'll show you a paragraph here about Brown's charm, a story there about his tireless negotiating, an account somewhere of every single business deal he helped engineer for American businesses. But only at the end were there attempts to paint the picture whole. It's like nothing, as separate items, each sit-in, each freedom ride and each non-violent march and neglecting to tell readers there's a civil rights movement in progress. And I'm not sure how well we covered even the bits and pieces. I've just looked at the last 100 stories The Washington Post carried on Ron Brown. The 50 most recent came after his death and if they were not merely factual, were uniformly praised. Of the 50 before his death, perhaps three or four could be called positive—including stories that merely had him vowing to defend his department against attempts to eliminate it. I'm doing what I didn't intend to do: I didn't want to make this a column about how the media did Ron Brown wrong. It's not Ron. It's political and government officials. It's not personal. It's today's journalism.

### Is the minimum wage fair?

BOSTON — Let's hear a round of applause for the folks who always told us to put our faith in the free market. How right they were.

Last Monday (April 15), Democrat in the Senate made another bid to raise the minimum wage from \$4.25 an hour to \$5.15 an hour. Two days later a group of 20 moderate Republicans in the House trumpeted them with a proposal to make it \$5.25.

Do I hear \$5.35? Do I hear \$5.50? Going once, going twice...

Of course, the invisible hand of this particular market looks an awful lot like the glad hand of politics. Even The Wright-Scott Corp. has apparently decided to stop selling an argument the people refuse to buy. This issue may finally get to a congressional vote.

A newly unanimous American public—some 84 percent—believes that the minimum wage needs a lift. Working a 40-hour, 52-week year for \$6,800 just doesn't seem fair. And fair is the F-word now being used regularly whether we're talking about shameless pay scales at upper CEO echelons or shameful ones at the lowest worker levels.

Last week, for example, a few stockholders at the annual AT&T meeting had the nerve to query their own maximum-wage earner, Chairman Robert Allen, who was awarded \$5.2 million in compensation and a large grant of stock options while firing 40,000 workers, was asked to justify his personal upscaling during corporate downsizing. He had the audacity to explain—complaining—that he hadn't even gotten a raise: "I made essentially what I was paid before."

On the whole, the CEO pay scale is rising 20 percent and 30 percent, while median wages are stagnant, and the minimum wage has fallen through inflation to a near record low. As Labor Secretary Reich has said to anyone who'll listen, "It's hard to accept that kind of mathematics." Especially at the bottom.

Until now the arguments against raising the lowest wages of workers have been twofold. First, that the minimum-wage workers are just teens or "secondary workers" (aka women). Second, that raising wages will result in job loss.

Well, only 12 percent of the Americans who work for the minimum are teenagers from families with above average incomes. Nearly two-thirds are adults over 20.

As for the pin money myth, some 58 percent of the minimum wage workers are women whose \$4.25 an hour job brings in an average of half the family earnings. About 40 percent of the minimum-wage workers are sole breadwinners and the overwhelming majority of those are single moms.

It's true that if you raise the minimum too high, some employers will make do with fewer

workers. But even in the world of dueling economists, there's a general agreement that a 90-cent raise over two years will have minimal impact on jobs.

And even if it does result in some job loss, what is the point at which we have to make work worth it?

Here we get back to the F-word. The minimum wage is inextricably tied to welfare. You reformer? As it was originally cast by Clinton in the 1992 election, "ending welfare as we know it" was connected to the idea that "no one who works full time and has children at home should be poor anymore."

There was a legitimate concern that the difference between work and welfare had been erased or even reversed. Women who worked at entry-level wages were doing so for "chump change."

Clinton's original plan included ways to raise the value of work—boosting the Earned Income Tax Credit, making sure that workers had health care, and raising the minimum wage.

But the Contract with America crowd tends to believe that only the rich need incentives to work; the poor need penalties. This second round of welfare reformers wants to make work worth more by making welfare worth less—or by cutting it off.

More states are talking about throwing mothers off welfare at the end of two years. If they have no choice but to work, and if work doesn't pay enough to support their families—what exactly are they supposed to do? Give the kids to Robert Allen?

A 90-cent raise isn't going to make anyone rich. It's still lower in real terms than in the 1960s. But 90 cents will make a real, \$1,800-a-year, difference.

If there's anything Americans agree on it's the rock solid belief that people who work hard should be able to feed and house their children. It's what makes the work ethic ethical.

Anyone who doesn't see this meager raise as a huge minimum standard of fairness, may once again experience the wonders of the free marketplace. Going, going, gone.

## Bidding for Camelot's castoffs

NEW YORK — Caught up in a Camelot frenzy, a bidder said \$2.59 million for Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis' engagement ring, and soaring prices for even a lighter and a doodled textbook have some people asking — Where will it end?

"It's incredible!" said gossip columnist Cindy Adams, who

looked out of the bidding for cuff bracelets. The winner of the \$1,500, "It's Inane! At auction you're supposed to get good prices!"

The price a mystery bidder paid Wednesday for the 40-carat diamond engagement ring from Aristotle Onassis was highest so far in the four-day auction of the former first lady's belongings. The marquise-shaped, near-flawless diamond had been

valued at \$500,000 to \$600,000. Earlier, desk President John F. Kennedy used to sign the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty of 1963 sold for \$1.43 million. Another ring purchased by Kennedy for his wife but never given to her sold for \$415,000.

The running total after two days of the four-day sale was \$20.8 million, far exceeding Sotheby's extremely conservative estimate.

Four of the major Sanford-area grocery stores — Winn Dixie, Gooding's, Publix and Albertson's — averaged \$2.60 per pound, slightly higher than the average Orlando price.

Public spokesman Jennifer Bush said the increases were inevitable after the state's extremely harsh winter.

"We know the weather has affected us," Bush said. "But our prices for any produce is based on what it costs us. The prices for tomatoes has skyrocketed but it is based on Economics 101. Supply versus demand."

She denied Crawford's implications.

Price gouging is absolutely not true," Bush said. She added, however, that there doesn't appear to be any signs of a price decrease in the near future.

John Van Sickle, a professor with the University of Florida's Institute for Food and Agricultural Resources, said grocers and packing houses overreacted when Florida growers lost a third of the crop due to cold weather and Mexican shipments tumbled by half.

In a 10-day period in March, packing house prices for tomatoes almost doubled.

"I don't think markup justified at that higher level? I don't think it's fair," Van Sickle said.

Florida's crop woes and the drop off in Mexican shipments are clear reasons for the increases, according to Humberto Monteverde, president of the Nogales-based Fresh Produce Association of the Americans.

Chamber President-Elect Sandra Glenn gave opening remarks, pointing out that both candidates were attorneys, and specifying time limits for response to questions.

In his introduction, Feeney told of serving in the Florida House from 1990 to 1992, and how he was tapped to be Jeb Bush's running mate in his unsuccessful gubernatorial election campaign.

Hattaway stressed how he was a local native and considered Seminole County his home. "I know the values of the community and the aspirations of the people," he said, "and this is what I want to take to Tallahassee."

Feeney said he is concerned about so-called tax reforms, which actually end up being tax increases. "What we need is some other taxation, such as a consumption tax," he said, "rather than income tax. We are taxing things that we should be encouraging."

He suggested that the exemption on intangible tax should be raised from \$20,000 to \$250,000.

Other points Feeney brought out regarding values in the community, included problems with welfare and insurance, and health care.

Hattaway began his comments by stating, "Education is a number one issue in this race. He called for smaller class sizes, and removing disruptive students from classrooms to allow improved school environments. He also said he supported more technology, such as computers, for classrooms, and a greater spirit of cooperation between the public, education, and business sectors.

"We are finally making progress in the criminal justice system," he said. "The perks are being taken out of our prisons and the length of time a person has to serve in jail has been

lengthened, but we still need to be proactive in our fight against crime."

In other matters, Hattaway stressed his support for ecology, being over-taxed and over-regulated. "The administration bureaucracy is stifling," he observed.

He also commented that he believed too many small businesses were being forced to close because of the amount of money they are spending in defending themselves from frivolous lawsuits which government is allowing to be filed.

Other questions handled by the two candidates came from members of the audience, and dealt, again, with insurance and taxation.

On one question, "How do you hope to do anything with only five days left in the session after you are elected," the candidates came out with differing points of view.



**Is emphysema control possible?**

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 64-year-old male diagnosed about 10 years ago with emphysema that seems to be progressing as the years pass. Inhalers and pulmonary specialists don't seem to help much. What then is left for better control of my condition?

DEAR READER: Emphysema is a chronic lung disease, often the consequence of smoking, that is marked by destruction of the feathery air sacs in the lungs, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged. As the disease progresses, less and less oxygen is absorbed into the body. This results in progressive respiratory disability: first, breathlessness during exercise; later, breathlessness at rest.

In attempting to slow the development of serious emphysema, physicians usually try to treat any underlying disorders that may contribute to respiratory disability. For example, smokers must cease and desist. Asthma, if it is present, is treated with bronchodilating sprays and pills. Low-grade infection, such as chronic bronchitis, is treated with antibiotics. Unfortunately, one of the characteristics of emphysema is its relentless progression with age. If, at this point, you are following your physician's instructions, you may simply have to do the best you can to compensate for your respiratory disability: Reduce your strenuous activity, avoid air pollution (especially smog and "second-hand" smoke), undergo pulmonary therapy (to help you learn how to breathe more effectively), and use supplemental oxygen under your doctor's supervision.


DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 25 and seven months pregnant. About eight weeks ago I had chicken pox for the first time. The spots seem to be healing but even after two months, some still remain. Is this normal or will I be stuck with scars for the rest of my life?

DEAR READER: Patients with chicken pox develop itchy blisters on the skin. Over time, the blisters break and crust over, leaving minor scarring. However, if during the active phase, patients scratch the blisters, scarring is avoidably aggravated.

If you successfully resisted the urge to scratch, you should have few, if any, scars left, once the chicken pox lesions have healed.

Remember that chicken pox — in fact, any viral illness — can be dangerous during pregnancy, because of the possibility of birth defects. So, please check with your obstetrician to make sure that he is aware of your recent infection.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes a cystocele and what should be done about it? Would this cause a vaginal odor?

DEAR READER: Cystocele is a medical term that refers to a specific anatomical abnormality in women: Instead of being suspended in its usual location, the bladder drops too low and may actually protrude into the vagina, causing urinary incontinence.

painful intercourse and, possibly, a chronic vaginal discharge and odor.

The condition is common in older women, especially those who have experienced multiple pregnancies. Most mild to moderate cystoceles require no therapy. However, severe degrees of prolapse usually respond to either of two treatments.

A pessary is a plastic device that is inserted into the vagina and helps re-suspend the bladder in a more normal position. If this doesn't work, surgeons customarily consider surgery to correct the abnormality.

Women with suspected cystocele should be examined by gynecologists, who can fit them with pessaries or perform the required operations.

In contrast, the brain of Ken Meyer, from Little, Pa., was working perfectly when he played this deal back in 1977. How would you have declared three no-trump after West has led the spade 10?

North raised to three no-trump in the hope that his club suit would run. Unless you use four-suit transfer bids to find out whether partner has a fit in

clubs, jumping to game is the percentage action.

Given the spade lead, South had six top tricks: three spades, one heart and two diamonds. And it looked obvious to lead a club to dummy's 10. After losing that trick, declarer would get back on play, perhaps with the spade king, and lead another club to establish the suit. The spade ace would then provide access to the dummy.

However, Meyer was playing against experts. He knew that if they could, they would duck the first club trick. That would kill both the club suit and the contract. Instead, at trick two, Meyer led the club two from his hand and, after West played the six, called for the three from the dummy. When the ace appeared on thin air, the contract was resurrected from the grave.

Did you spot "flower" from those letters? Good, but there's a seven-letter word: trolled. Or did you find an eight-letter word?

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
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
