Anti-Inflation Action Begins Over Country

Measure Will Go To Senate - House Conference Committee For Alterations

(By Associated Press)
Labor, veterans and civic groups across the nation are rallying today for demonstrations protesting the end of O.P.A. as the movement grows for buyers strikes against rising living costs.

The CIO United Auto Workers union today called its 800,000 members off their jobs for demonstrations this afternoon in the first nationwide anti-inflation action since O.P.A. expired July 1.

UAW President Walter Reuther asserts that the movement will " Herald a buyers' strike such as this country has never known. Many communities have scheduled other demonstrations for later this week or next. In addition, citizens committees and consumers councils in several cities have scheduled one-day buyers' strikes as a protest against the death of the O.P.A.

In Detroit, which is the stronghold of the UAW, most industrial plants face a shut down this afternoon. Union officials estimated that some 250,000 workers were to attend the mass meeting in the motor capital.

Chicago UAW officials said 30,000 members were to attend a mass meeting in that city. Similar rallies have been planned for Cleveland and other cities throughout Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan.

In Rochester, N. Y., the Independent Citizens Committee is planning a buyers' strike for July 19th. Representatives of labor, veteran and other local groups have pledged themselves to buy nothing except bare necessities.

BACHAU, Germany, July 15 (AP)—The 43 veteran German S.S. troops responsible for the slaying of 200 American soldiers and British prisoners in 1945 were sentenced today by an American military court to death for their part in the slaying of the prisoners during the Christmas season of 1944.

The other 30 of the 73 defendants found guilty last Monday were given prison sentences ranging up to life. One of those sentenced to death was Carl Schmid, 37, a private who led the 88 troops to take no prisoners during the trial.

Price Reductions On Various Items Revealed By Survey

Good news for housewives; two boatloads of sugar from Cuba recently docked at Jacksonville and several tons of the produce and other goods expected by Sanford grocers. There has been a shortage of sugar for several weeks, according to a Herald survey. Prices vary from 34 to 39 cents for five pounds. One restaurant today reported paying a local grocer 10 cents a pound for sugar.

A shipment of six cases of butter to retail at 74 cents a pound or five cents below the old 79 cent calling price, is expected by a downtown grocer to arrive soon. The following declines in prices were announced at one grocery: pea soup, one cent a can; baby food, one cent a can; ammonia, four cents a bottle; plain flour, two cents on a five pound package; shoe polish two cents a unit; and package matches, two and a half cents a box. Raisins are declining eight cents and pickles 50 cents a jar. Celery salt going down three cents and celery seed six cents a unit.

Milk products are advancing three cents a can for condensed milk, six cents a pound for powdered milk and 10 cents for a large unit of malted milk. Meat specialties are 50 cents and since billings are set yet in from wholesalers, no forecast of price can be made.

Heavy rain fell at Baguio and winds approaching 60 miles an hour were recorded there. Plans for a service to Baguio was cancelled. Manila also was hit by a driving rain and telephone lines north of the capital were blown down.

Labor, Vet and Civic Groups Stage Demonstration Protesting Death of OPA

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—The House today rejected the Senate O.P.A. bill with its drastic decontrol provisions. The measure has been sent to a House and Senate conference committee for revision.

Rejection of the bill by a vote of 211 to 64 in the House marked a victory for President Truman in the long struggle over O.P.A. However, administration leaders admit that no one can predict now what kind of O.P.A. bill the conference committee will finally turn out.

Action on the bill came after Democratic Representative Adolph Sabath of Illinois urged the House to send the measure to a conference committee. Sabath declared that the Senate provisions for exemption of meat, milk and many other items from price control would be rejected.

A key House Republican, Representative Jesse Wolcott, joined administration leaders in demanding a revision of the Senate O.P.A. bill. Wolcott is the ranking member of the House Banking Committee. He declared that the bill was in worse shape than ever and should be sent to a conference committee for revision.

Speaker Rayburn has appointed Chairman Spencer of the Banking Committee, and Representatives Brown of Georgia, Patman of Texas, Barry and Gamble of New York, and Wolcott and Crawford of Michigan to represent the House at the conference committee.

Quillman Says Polio Has Not Reached Epidemic Stage

The incidence of poliomyelitis, according to leading authorities, has not reached epidemic proportions at any time in the past year. Dr. Frank L. Quillman, director of the Seminole County Health Unit, says in his latest issue of the Seminole Chief, the County's monthly publication.

No cases at all have been reported in Seminole County. The majority of cases have been in the southeastern portion of the state, he wrote. For all the state, to July 1, 290 cases have been reported. The number of deaths has not been reported. Two-thirds of the cases have occurred in these counties.

Restrictions on travel are not necessary so long as there are no cases, he stated. "As a matter of fact, polio is a person infection, such as measles, for that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis suggest that cases be treated in general wards. Very rarely does more than one case develop in a family."

"We have had opinions from many persons of authority throughout the United States as to benefits of area quarantine," he added. "All say that it is ineffective, unwarranted and places unnecessary hardships on many."

Although no cases have been reported this year in the county, Dr. Quillman urged every individual to co-operate to prevent any cases developing by keeping premises clean, not allowing trash to accumulate in yards, alleys or vacant lots. Spray for flies and mosquitoes. Avoid crowds, avoid undue fatigue, eat correctly and keep clean, is his advice. He reported that last year 17 states had more polio than Florida.

TO RELEASE RUSSIANS

BERLIN, July 16 (AP)—United States Army authorities announced today that three Russian soldiers suspected of espionage in the American occupation in Germany. Their release came shortly after the Russians freed a missing American officer and his wife today. The American Warrent Officer and Mrs. Samuel L. Harrison of San Antonio, Tex., disappeared 15 days ago after they entered the Russian zone to see a pet shop dog kennel. Two other Americans are still missing somewhere in the Russian zone.

HEIRENS IDENTIFIED

CHICAGO, July 16 (AP)—State's Attorney William Duhy said today that a soldier, George Rubrowski, has identified William Heirens as a man he saw carrying a paper bag one block from the Degnan home. Rubrowski said he saw Heirens with the bag shortly after Suzanne Degnan was kidnapped and killed.

Education In Danger

Three thousand teachers and school administrators in a national meeting at Buffalo reveal that public education in the United States is in grave condition. The conference, sponsored by the National Education Association, brings to light a serious teacher shortage due to inadequate and irregular wage standards.

The average teacher salary for the country is \$35 a week, and many teachers receive less than \$20. A half million instructors have left the classrooms for better pay elsewhere. Passage of the \$250,000,000 Federal Aid Bill may be necessary to raise state pay levels to figures which will bring back well-trained persons.

In the meantime 140,000, or one in ten of the teachers now employed, work under emergency licenses, which indicates that their qualifications are below the lowest of their state. Men teachers are so few that millions of children pass from kindergarten through high school entirely under female instructors.

Conference delegates said that they were not concerned about possible government interference through federal aid. They pointed to the successful administration of the nation's land grant colleges as a satisfactory pattern for subsidized public school education.

The public school problem touches every community and nearly every family. The teachers, by publicizing the critical situation, perform a duty not only for themselves but for the country.

Teen-Age Marriages

America's best-loved teen-ager, known in private life as Mrs. John Agar, and on the screen as Shirley Temple, is said to have received thousands of letters since her marriage on the teen-age marriage problem. She answers these publicly in the August issue of Motion Picture Magazine.

Says Shirley, "It is never too soon for happiness, providing two people have a foundation on which to build permanent happiness."

- Her ten rules follow:
1. The couple should have the consent of both their parents.
2. They should have an income sufficient to give them financial security.
3. They should know themselves well enough to know what type of person they need to make themselves happy — not just now, but always.
4. They should wait long enough to give the romance a chance to wear itself out if it is mere infatuation.
5. They should be settled enough in their ideas that they are not apt to grow apart as they grow older.
6. They should have known each other long enough to be familiar with each other's bad moods as well as their good, their faults as well as their virtues, their weaknesses as well as their strong points.
7. They should be mature enough to recognize and be willing to accept the responsibilities and sacrifices marriage involves.
8. Their temperaments should be compatible and they should have enough interests in common to assure them an enjoyable life together.

NEW YORK—He may not be a Whirlaway or a Count Fleet in his winning habits, but veteran horsemen see in Assault the greatest money-winning colt of all time.

In these days of rich purses Assault should have little difficulty in eclipsing Whirlaway's mark of \$561,161. Mr. Longtail compiled his record earnings by winning 32 races in 60 starts over a period of five years.

Assault, the King Ranch color-bearer with the malformed right forefoot, is fifth among the nation's money winners with \$200,000 less than Whirlaway's earnings. Assault's account, however, was compiled in less than two seasons.

The three-year-old chestnut, the seventh Triple Crown winner in turf history, has enriched his Texas owner, Robert J. Kleberg, \$356,970 by scoring in eight of 16 starts.

Assault won only \$17,150 last year. He earned the bulk of his booty this spring, winning six of seven races. He began with the Experimental No. 1 at Jamaica and less than two weeks later won the Wood Memorial.

The only test he lost was the mile Derby Trial at Churchill Downs. It rained for a week and Assault didn't like the mud. Four days later he came back a galloping eight-length victor in the Derby and followed this with triumphs in the Preakness, Belmont and Dwyer.

Trainer Max Hirsch, a shrewd man with a horse, feels that Assault can pass Whirlaway's mark.

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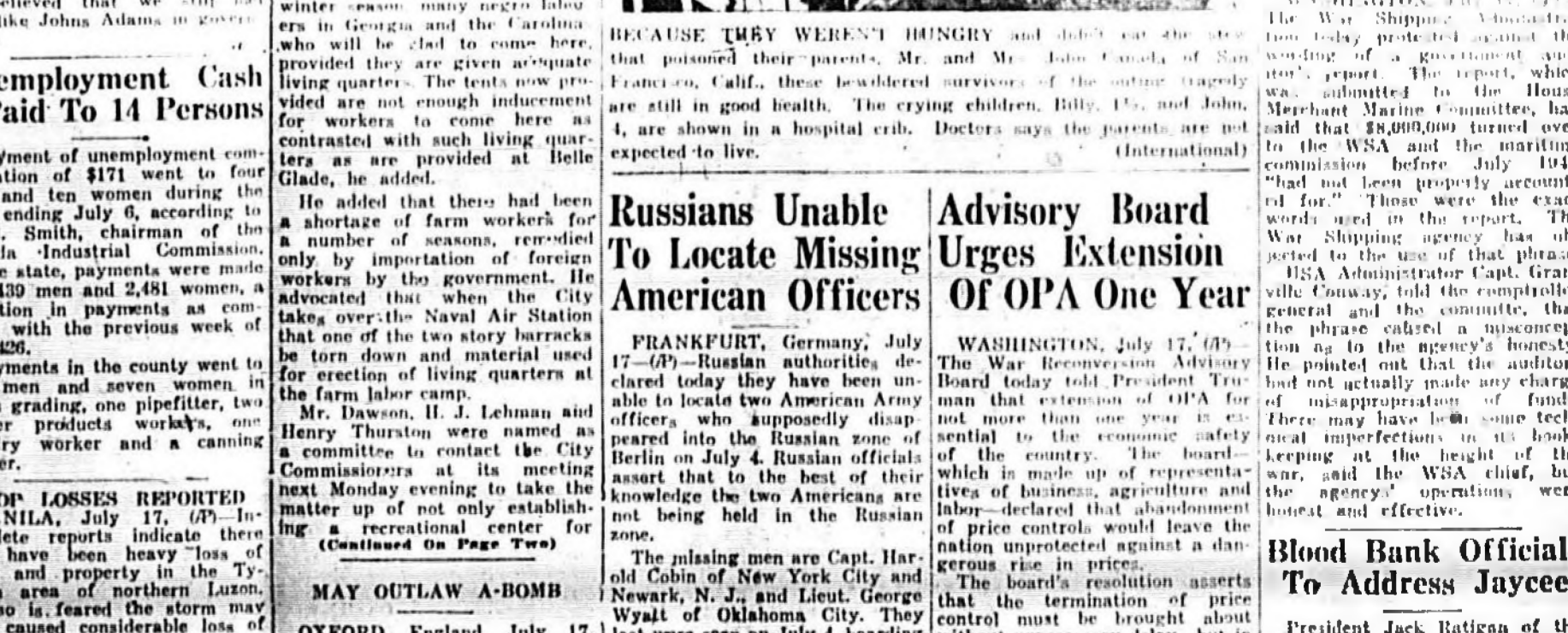
