





SBA Did Not Give Enough, Says Federal Appeal Court

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - A federal appeals court has grant enough relief to the victims of Hurricane Betsy, which ravaged the Gulf Coast in 1965.

"The controversy, still raging in the 10th year after the turbulent winds subsided, centers around the forgiveness provisions," the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ex-

Congress passed the Southeast Hurricane Disaster Relief Act, which provided loans through the SBA but also provided forgiveness of as much as \$1,800 after payment

However, the SBA only cancelled \$1,000 after payment of the first \$500, then cancelled half the amount between \$1,500 and \$1,800, the court said.

Carolina Supreme Court Justice Susie M. Sharp. He declined to discuss the qualifications he seeks in a nominee to succeed retired Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, but he said he hopes to announce his choice "within three weeks."



Judge Bans Prayer, Bible Reading In Okaloosa Schools

PENSACOLA (AP) - A federal judge, basing his decision on the Constitutionally required separation of church and state, has ordered the end of daily prayer and Bible-reading in Okaloosa County public schools. U.S. District Judge Winston Arnow, after hearing witnesses from the county school board and the Okaloosa Teachers Association, issued a temporary injunction Friday saying the services should no longer be required in

"(James) Madison and (Thomas) Jefferson knew the government must stay neutral, and that is not to say they were not religious," Arnow said. "They knew the dangers of government supporting religion."

Request May Be Cut

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - The Public Service Commission should cut United Telephone's request for a \$7.6 million increase by at least \$4.1 million, Public Counsel Woodie Liles says.

He said Friday that the company had not shown the need for a \$1.3 million "attrition allowance" to take care of future inflation and it could still earn a fair return if the requested increase in profits was reduced by another \$2.8 Liles, who represents consumers before the PSC, has

Money Sought For Purification

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - State officials are seeking federal money to combat high radiation levels in Sarasota County drinking water, but they say more information is needed on the extent of the danger. Health Division and Department of Environmental Regulation officials met Friday to coordinate efforts in monitoring the Sarasota situation, where 12 water plants have been found to exceed proposed federal standards for radium levels in water.

Dr. E.C. Prather, Health Division director, said monitoring facilities needed to be set up quickly and that more answers should be sought to determine which exposure levels represent a problem.

Ford Takes Charge Of Administration

It will take a while to assess the impact of the changes President Ford has announced in the personnel of his administration.

But one thing is clear. The President has taken full charge. He has put "his guys" in positions of power. It is now clearly a Ford administration.

Secretary of State Henry Kissinger has lost one of his hats. That's good. Even though it is Kissinger's loyal deputy, Brent Scowcroft, who takes over as the President's No. 1 White House aide in the area of national security, Kissinger must give up his desk in the White House and operate from his State Department office, where the secretary of state belongs.

Kissinger will continue to dominate policy-making in foreign affairs — the President made that clear. And that too is probably good for the nation. No matter how Kissinger's personality grates on some people, especially in Congress, he has the knowledge and the will to adjust American foreign policy to the realities of an ever-changing

Secretary of Defense James Schlesinger has been an able civil servant of the government in several top capacities. But Ford, before he became president, disclosed in an unguarded moment that one of the first things he would like to do if he became president would be to replace Schlesinger. Obviously there was something about the defense secretary that the President didn't like — perhaps the same kind of intellectual arrogance some people see in Kissinger.

Schlesinger's relations with Congress and with the President apparently deteriorated recently as a result of the secretary's harshly worded insistence that Pentagon spending not be curtailed in the budget crisis.

In William Colby as CIA director, Ford had another career civil servant who owed his primary loyalty to a government agency that has come under severe criticism.

Replacing Schlesinger and Colby will be two former congressmen who have been close to the President for many years, dating back to Ford's long service in Congress.

As defense secretary, Donald Rumsfeld, Ford's White House chief of staff, may well be more effective in defending Pentagon appropriations than Schlesinger would have been. As CIA director, George Bush, U.S. liaison officer in Peking, should be able to work effectively
