



Bakke Case: School Lawyer Denies 'Quota'

lawyer for the University of California, opening arguments in the Allan Bakke "reverse discrimination case," told the Supreme Court today there is no "racially blind method" for enrolling appreciable numbers of minorities in professional schools.

Professor Archibald Cox of Harvard defended the university's action in twice rejecting Bakke, the 37-year-old white applicant whose appeal to the high court has drawn nationwide attention

desegregation case. Cox rejected the idea that the 16 places reserved by the school for the disadvantaged is a quota

The former U.S. solicitor and Watergate special prosecutor told the court the 16 places were certainly not a quota in the older sense - put on members of an unpopular group" to keep them out

A group of Silver Lake area esidents vowed today a legal fight to stop the location of an aluminum smelting-recycling plant in their neighborhood.

Richard Fowler, a retired U.S. Navy Rear Admiral, who said he was speaking for 15 property owners in the Silver Lake area where Keller Industries Inc. of Miami has announced plans to construct a new plant under a citysponsored industrial bond issue, said the group has held preliminary discussions with a legal firm about representa-

Fowler said the group sees as its only recourse legal means of preventing the construction. Fowler also challenged the propriety of the city's agreeing to sponsor the bond issue, stating that the people in his area were unaware of plans for the plant until after the approval was given.

Lansky's Stepson Slain

BAL HARBOUR (UPI)- Richard B. Schwartz, stepson of reputed gangland financier Meyer Lansky, facing trial in a well publicized slaying last summer, was shot and killed today, police said.

Police said neighbors of Schwartz' Inside Restaurant in this Miami area resort community heard a shot shortly before 9 a.m. at the restaurant and when they investigated they found his body in his car, which was parked in front. Investigators said he had been shot once in the upper

"We are investigating to determine who, what, when and where," said police spokesman Ralph Page.

Schwartz, 48-year-old son of Lansky's wife, Thelma, was charged with first degree murder in the June 30 shooting death of Craig Teriaca, 29, a neighbor of Schwartz' and the son of Vincent Teriaca, the target of several recent gambling probes.

Justice Potter Stewart then suggested the issue is not whether 16 is a quota but whether 84 is, since the school accommodates only 100.

"Neither is properly definable as a quota," Cox replied. "The decisive thing is the facts...It is not a limit on the number of minority students...It is not a guarantee...It did say that if there are 16 qualified minority students who are also disadvantaged then 16 places shall be filled by them and only 84 by others."

"Does it really matter what

you call it?" Justice Lewis Powell asked.

"I quite agree," Cox said. He explained he was merely trying to emphasize that none of the facts lead to the idea of "quota" as a "bad word."

The program was not forced. he said, but it was a decision by the school as to what part of its assets would be allocated to the purpose of having minorities in the student body preparing for the medical profession. More than 400 persons waited



New U.S.-Russian Treaty

Would Cut Weapons Loads WASHINGTON (AP) - A new treaty being worked out with the Russians would reduce nuclear weapons stockpiles, slow the development of new arms and set separate

ceilings on major missile systems, according to Carter administration officials. They told The Associated Press that while the negotiations now centered in Geneva are

far from over, the emerging pact represents major achievements toward the goal of arms reduction.

Spenkelink Gets Another Stay

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has granted an indefinite stay of execution for John A. Spenkelink, the convicted murderer who was scheduled to be the first person executed in Florida since 1964.

It was the fourth time that federal judges have granted a stay of execution for Spenkelink, a 28-year-old California prison escapee who was convicted of murdering a traveling companion.

What Monies Are Used For

WASHINGTON (AP) - The first public accounting of a \$2, 000-a-year expense account given members of the House shows that tax money paid for concert tickets, bar association dues, car insurance and even a rented tuxedo.

The expenditures were in the first semiannual report of the House clerk since the chamber passed a series of reforms in January. The report covers the first six months of 1977.

Bill To Help Handicapped

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is siging a bill providing \$14.7 billion for housing the needy and revitalizing the cities, including \$1.2 billion to help low-income, elderly and handicapped families pay their rent.

The housing and community development bill, product of a two-month conference between the House and Senate, extends the block 'grant program for revitalizing cities for three years and funds it with \$10.9 billion, a \$2.4 billion increase.



Zamora Conviction Appealed

MIAMI (AP) - The first-degree murder conviction of 15-year-old Ronny Zamora has been appealed by his attorney on grounds that expert testimony on the effects of television violence was not admitted during his trial. 

Every time you pick up your newspaper at your doorstep or take it out of your mailbox, freedom is in your hands.

The Founding Fathers of this nation, who wrote the blueprint for the greatest experiment in government the world had ever seen, felt so strongly about freedom that they themselves annexed the Bill of Rights amendments before the Constitution could be submitted to the several sovereign states for formal ratification.

Through its free choice to present the news, to interpret the news, and to make comment on the news, your newspaper in every edition relies upon those basic rights and freedoms. In the process of pursuing its every day duties and obligations to you, your newspaper stands as the first line of defense against any action or any effort that may tend to infringe upon those rights and freedoms.

Every newspaper reader has the freedom of his or her choice in selecting the newspaper, the stories, the features, or the editorials he or she may want to read. When you have no choice or you cannot take issue, the freedom of the press is imperiled and your freedoms are consequently restricted.

As surely as there are different types readers, there are different types of newspapers This in itself is the guarantee that freedom belongs to both the press and the public. That fact is important and essential to our system.

They could not allow the people the freedom of hought, choice and expression. Freedom is basic and essential to all of us.

When you have your newspaper in your hand, you have freedom in your hand.

Energy Package

Senate success in dismantling President Carter's energy program has not produced workable legislation in its stead. And despite Senate sentiment for a phaseout of natural gas price controls, there is no indication that the fragmented Senate can agree on its own program.

In the meantime, oil imports have spiraled since the Arab embargo of 1973. The nearly two billion barrels imported in 1976 represents an increase of almost two-thirds over the 1973 total. contributing to the record trade deficits that distort the economy.

The Senate disarray, nevertheless, increases the probability that the ultimate legislation will be hammered out in a House-Senate conference committee.

The energy effort cannot be allowed to founder. Continued fuel shortages are a threat to the collective and individual welfare of all Americans.




A fire safety awareness program, involving twice-yearly presentations in Seminole County schools, has been instituted by the Seminole County Commissioners Tuesday.







About 1,200 of the 1,728 convention delegates will be selected, making the caucuses an important test of the strength of the candidates some 11 months before the 1978 primary.

The main purpose of the conention is to draft a platform for Democratic candidates in the 1978 election, but the issue of a straw poll has not been resolved and could trigger bitter fighting when the Democrats meet on Nov. 18-20.

Attorney General Robert Shevin, widely acknowledged as the front runner, has ad-Wocated a straw poll but is not doing so at this time, according to Steve Wilkerson, Shevin's campaign manager.

When Democrats held a convention in 1975, they gave overwhelming support to Jimmy Carter, then a relatively little known candidate for president, in a straw poll. Carter's showing helped in his Florida pri-Mary victory a few months later and that, in turn, helped him capture the Democratic presidential nomination.

Shevin foresees that sort of potential gain for his campaign. but he is playing it cautious to avoid alienating uncommitted party stalwarts who oppose a straw poll as divisive.

If his supporters elect a commanding number of delegates in the caucuses Saturday, it may be worthwhile for Shevin to press for a straw vote at Or-

lando

But the other candidates are unanimously opposed to a straw poll and would fight any move by Shevin for one. They are LL. Gov. Jim Williams, Sen. Robert Fraham of Miami and financier Raleigh W. Greene Jr. of St. Petersburg.





They buried a good woman Tuesday. Nina Arrieta was laid to rest in Forest City, just a stone's throw from the rock slab cancha on which she carved a name known

throughout the jai-alai world. By Monday, there wasn't a fronton in the world that hadn't received the news of her passing.

Nina was the wife of players-manager Juan Arrieta. Just as Juan lost more than a wife, the rest of us who knew her lost more than a friend

Veracity and probity were hers profoundly. Her contributions to jai-alai are legend. She has served as interim executive, substitute mother as well as setting up the elaborate telebet system at the Orlando fronton when it opened 17 years ago.

In the fronton's infant years, she provided a great deal of stability; even carried a major portion of the load when general manager Norman Stabel died.

In recent years, as the fronton gained sound footing under general manager Gordon Hulbert, Nina's health took a turn and her three year-battle was a valiant one.

She lost this one, but even in death her influence is widespread. Certainly she was the most influencial

woman in American jai-alai. She met Arrieta in Havana, was courted by him in Miami, and had a hand in fronton operations in West Palm Beach, Orlando and Daytona Beach. I will never forget the afternoon I visited her

shortly after learning of her terminal illness. "Don't be afraid to say it," she said in

almost a command tone of voice, which was natural for her. "It's cancer. Since I found out I have it; three people I knew who were in apparent perfect health have died. It can happen to any of us anytime. My time will come, but I'm not ready yet."

And she wasn't. While doctors were not encouraging her prognosis, Nina had personal matters to set straight. Her three-year struggle was not without pain.

"Looking back over my life," she said recently, "the best thing that ever happened to me is sitting right there." She was pointing to her husband, sitting at a desk preparing the next day's entries. "What a husband! He is something else.

"Are you remembering this? When I die, I want you to write this. You are in charge of my epitaph. Juan is the best players-manager anywhere. How he goes to Spain year after year and gets good players is beyond me. Spain has been picked over time and again, and the other frontons say there are no players left. But he gets them. And the matchmaking. . . well, try and pick a game that looks easy. He is hard and strict, but that's jaialai. There isn't any room for bending the rules."

Among those closest to Nina's heart have been the jai-alai players. They went to her with everything from a hangnail to advice concerning their love life. She expressed an interest in their personal lives, their futures and their happiness.

"They are my sons," she said. A mother was never mourned more.

Arieta's respect for his wife was mutual. "She was my life. . . what will I do now?" he
