BIG SAVING MADE BY MEMBERS OF CITRUS EXCHANGE

Figures Based On Survey Among Growers Of Organization

TAMPA, June 2.—Savings of more than \$1,000,000.00 in packing, operating and marketing expenses were effected by the growers who compose the Florida Citrus Exchange on their ten million box output for 1930-31, in comparison with the costs for the same items in 1924-25, the last season before the present management was placed in charge, it is disclosed in a survey made by the Florida Citrus Grower, reviewed in the June number.

"Continuing reductions, extended over the six year period, have given an average lowering of 17.3 percent in the local association expense, an average cut of 15.8 percent in the sub-exchange outlay and a saving of 24 percent in the sales expenditures at Tampa headquarters and in the northern offices. More money was spent for advertising in 1930-31 than in 1924-25, the story says.

"Of 40 local associations for which figures are available on costs in 1930-31 as compared with 1924-25, all but five showed marked decreases. In the '30-31 season, the average per box expense of the 40 associations was 62.4 cents, while in '24-25 it had been 75.5 cents. The greatest of the reductions was from \$1.16 to 62 cents, and the smallest from 62.9 cents to 61 cents.

"Six out of ten sub-exchanges in continuous existence were operated at a smaller cost for the last season of the period than in the first. Disbursements of all ten averaged 2.1 cents a box in 1930-31, as against 2.5 cents for 1924-25. The biggest drop was from 5.2 cents to 2.4 cents and the smallest from 1.4 cents to 1.1 cents.

"Weighted averages applied to the statistics would make them even more impressive in respect to the amounts of money saved to the growers by the increasing efficiency reflected in lessened association and sub-exchange costs. In most of the cases, the reductions have been the greatest in the units with the heaviest volume.

"Costs of selling function exercised by the Tampa headquarters and in the offices at the north directly under its control were lowered to .0825 cents per box in 1930-31 from .1084 cents which had been expended upon them in 1924-25. Advertising outlay increased to .0487 cents in '30-31 from .0307 cents, which it had been in '24-25.

"Estimate of a minimum saving of \$1,000,000 was arrived at by applying the combined reductions in cost of a little over 16 cents a box to a turnover of approximately 10,000,000 boxes. Obviously, the sum would be materially larger if the weighted average basis had been employed in the calculations. "In some degree," it is pointed out in conclusion, "the lower costs were made possible by the larger volume of fruit handled and by reduced price levels on supplies, but by no means would these factors account for the major portion of them. The total tonnage of the Florida Citrus Exchange in 1924-25 was in excess of 6,000,000 boxes."

Alsop Pledges To Work In Behalf Of Public's Interest

KEY WEST, June 2.—Efforts of the Coastal Cities Co-Ordination Organization, in behalf of projects of public interest in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina, including the drive to retain the Naval station for Key West, were discussed here last night by Mayor John T. Alsop, Jr., of Jacksonville, president of the Coastal group.

Mr. Alsop was here in connection with his candidacy for the Democratic nomination as the congressman-at-large from Florida. He conferred with his many friends here during the day and last night was one of the principal speakers at a largely attended political rally in downtown Key West.

The Coastal group, which Mr. Alsop said was formed because of the vision of Clark Howell, Atlanta editor; Stuart Graemer and Howard Coffin, is a non-partisan organization aimed to coordinate the activities of the coastal cities in the four states. Mr. Alsop said. He told his audience of the efforts being made in behalf of the local station, and the naval and marine activities in South Carolina, bringing into his discussion at that point his stand as being opposed to a reduction in the Army and Navy or any appropriations cuts which would affect the national defense.

Mr. Alsop congratulated Key West on the interest shown by the Monroe county citizens in the creation of the Atlantic Coastal Highway, reminding the crowd that he headed the motorcade to Washington in celebrating the opening of the highway several years ago, many Key West citizens being members of the motorcade.

Forestry Work To Help Employment Is Given Approval

BALTIMORE, Md., June 2.—Inclusion of plans for the improvement of public forest lands in any national program intended to ameliorate unemployment was urged in a resolution adopted at the concluding session of the American Forestry Association, holding its fifty-seventh annual meeting here recently. A second resolution endorsed the action of the board of directors of the association in recommending that in any reorganization of government departments the activities con-

cerned with agriculture, grazing, forestry and wild life preservation be continued in the Department of Agriculture.

How the fish and other aquatic fauna are dependent on the forest as well as the water was shown by Mr. Henry O'Malley, chief of the United States Bureau of Fisheries. The activities of the Bureau of Fisheries, he said, as well as those of more than 45 state fisheries and 200 private commercial hatcheries, are dependent upon the maintenance of conditions which will assure the perpetuation of running streams, brimming rivers and perennial lake levels.

"An abundant water supply," Mr. O'Malley said, "inevitably falls back on the basic essential of watershed clothed with trees. The shed run of the Potomac River is correlated with rainfall in the upper waters of the Potomac system hundreds of miles back in the Appalachian Moun-

tains. Other speakers were: Mr. W. S. Conant of the water resources committee, American Engineering Council; Mrs. John F. Sippel, president of the Federation of Women's Clubs, and Mr. Paul G. Redington, chief of the United States Biological Survey. Mr. George D. Pratt was elected president of the association.

Mayors Gathering In Detroit To Seek Method Of Relief

DETROIT, June 2.—(A.P.)—Seeking relief from municipal financial distress, mayors and chief executives from 32 cities attending a national conference here yesterday drafted a three-fold program in which the federal government is asked to lend immediate assistance.

Resolutions adopted by the executives, who met on invitation of Mayor Frank Murphy, of Detroit, demand an amendment to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation act authorizing the advancing of credits to cities; legislation providing appropriations by the federal government for direct unemployment relief, and a five billion dollar loan for a national public works program. A committee will be chosen later to present the demands to Congress and President Hoover.

NOTICE OF AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE SANFORD GARDEN CLUB
To amend article 1, by striking out the entire article, and substituting the following—
ARTICLE I. MEMBERSHIP
Sec. 1.—Membership shall be of three classes, Active, Associate and Honorary.
(a). An active member is one who takes part in all the activities of the club.
(b). An associate member is one who has given active service to the Garden Club of Sanford in the past. Such a member may have the privileges of attending all club meetings and of the club, and of the club, and of which club membership is provided for, but shall not vote or elect officers.
(c). Honorary membership shall be conferred only on individuals of outstanding horticultural achievement of more than local reputation, and only by unanimous vote of the club. This confers no special responsibility.
Sec. 2.—Methods of admission for active membership shall be presented to the board of managers in writing, by the chairman of circles, endorsed by five active members, previous to any general meeting of the club. Unanimous consent of the board shall be necessary for election.
Sec. 3.—The constructive character of active membership from meetings shall forfeit membership.
ARTICLE II. DUES
It is proposed to amend the article by striking it out entirely, and substituting the following—
Sec. 1.—The dues for active members shall be \$2.00 per year payable at the annual meeting in February. \$1.50 is to be retained in the treasury of the general club, and .75 to be returned to the circle to which each member belongs, including a dollar which shall be one dollar, divided in the same proportion as the full annual dues.
Sec. 2.—The dues for associate members shall be \$3.00 per year, payable at the circle to which members have previously belonged.
