POW's Names Released

The women told a news conference Tuesday they brought back 23 letters from the prisoners and mailed them in San Francisco Sunday on their return from a two-week visit to Hanoi.

Some of the prisoners' families had not heard from them for years. Mrs. Cora Weiss of New York City and Mrs. Madeline Buckley of Berkeley, Calif., told newspapermen they and Ethel Taylor of Philadelphia spent about an hour talking to three of the prisoners.

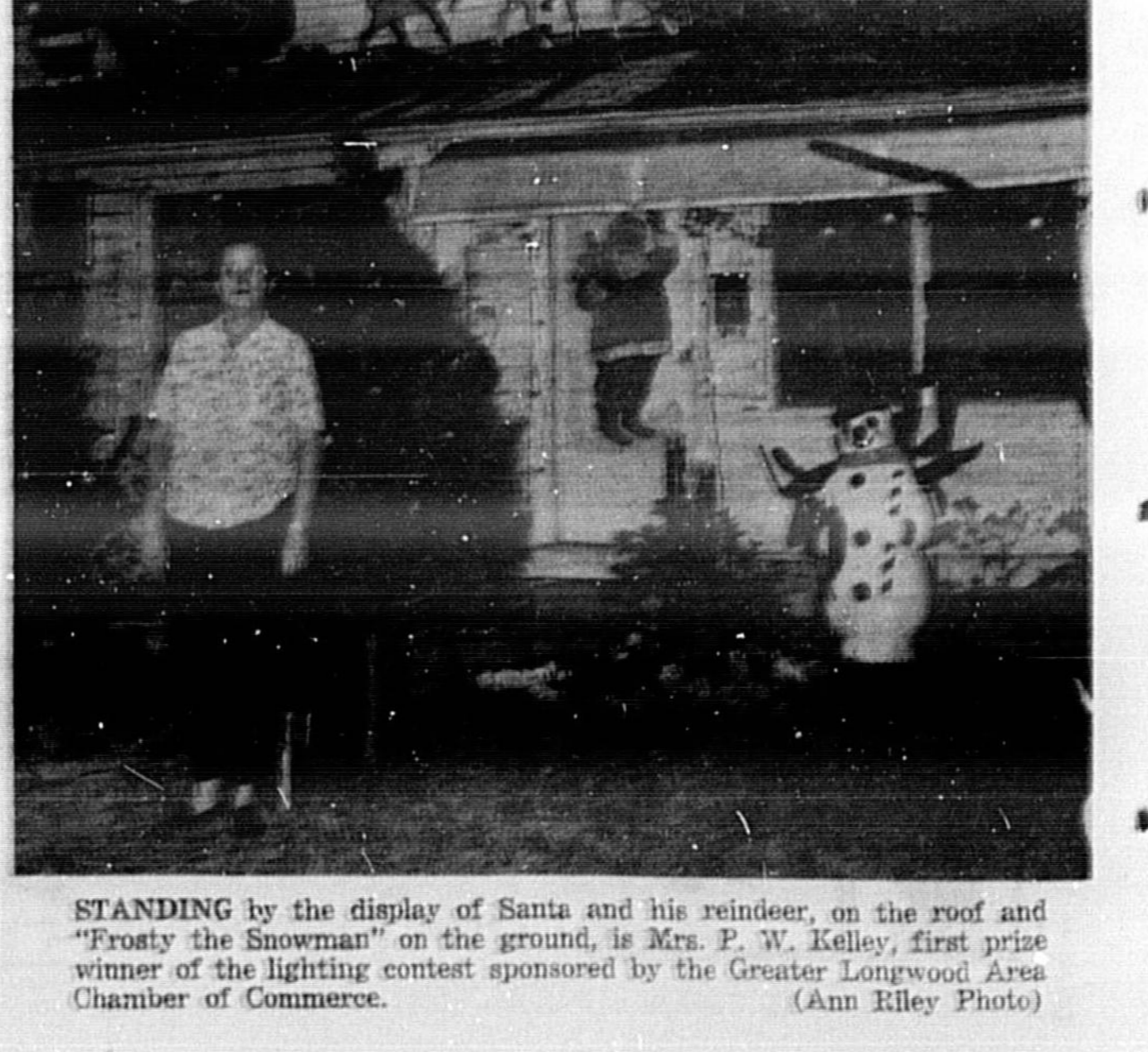
Lighting Contest Winners

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'Peace' Still The Message To Receive With Joy

P-E-A-C-E! What a word to conjure up images of thought in people everywhere. And what a variety of meanings is stirred.

Yet it is in this Christmas Season that the word attains a recognition and a force which invokes some practical as well as prayerful meditation.

On this Christmas of 1968, the word has an air of misgiving. It shares in the responsibility which underlies. Not only with words and their meanings, but with much more importance in terms which debunk and which challenge and spur individuals into personal involvement.

If peace is to be accepted as the absence of war, then we have peace now. For the United States is not involved in a declared war.

If peace is to be defined as the absence of fighting, then there has literally never been peace. Not here, nor anywhere.

But such a defeatist attitude, such a negative approach is unworkable. For what everyone must acknowledge is that the kind of "Peace On Earth" which was heralded by the angels and demonstrated by Jesus Christ must be sought, believed in and valiantly championed right here and right now.

We have not and should not have the tendency to state more than this generally.

Yet it must be admitted that the "Peace" movement in this 1968 Christmas season is definable in at least two of its aspects.

The one which has been disturbing our national being more than any other is, of course, our involvement in Vietnam. It has cost incalculable amounts of our men, our resources, our goods, our thoughts and our energies.

President Nixon's policy of gradual withdrawal is gradually building up a reserve of public approval that has made this aspect of "peace" at least more than a dark vision with no light at the end of the tunnel.

Its other aspect and one which does, in fact, call more to the individual to recall that gospel which was preached and lived on the hills of Galilee and on the shores of the River Jordan is as near as our neighbors.

Intolerance, misunderstanding, violence, prejudice and all of that ilk are the enemies which invite war. These and those who embrace them are the ones which challenge the better instincts of every individual to resist, battle and defeat.

But to fulfill each one's personal destiny and to take part in what can be the enormously vital and challenging decade which opens a few days away, let the "Peace" message continue to sound-out with bold deeds and inspired thoughts!

Salvation Army!

One of the traditional and happy sounds of Christmas here and almost everywhere is the bell-ringing at Salvation Army kettles where collections are made from passers-by.

Ordinarily the response is high in the number of well-wishers who drop in silver or the occasional bill and the total is impressive.

This year, with the stores ringing up sales which are expected to surpass those of other holiday seasons the total of kettle contributions may fall short of the mark.

We believe that this should not be allowed to take place. The Salvation Army's record of devoted and practical service to all who need help, and usually among those where other channels are blocked or do not exist, is not to be questioned.

Here in Sanford the real assistance, the practical and realistic service which Capt. Jack Downs and his staff render every day and every week and every year is something that has to be seen to be appreciated.

We have seen and we do appreciate.

Thus we urge—even at this late date—that whoppers drop the contributions into the kettles, receive the heartfelt blessing and walk away with a warmth that far surpasses any other reward.

To those who have been doing their holiday buying on the prevalent and quite acceptable credit card basis and thus did not have the cash in pocket to drop into the kettles we recommend mailing to the Salvation Army a check to show the support which is so greatly needed.

Would this not be in the true spirit of Christmas? Christmas without the sound of the Salvation Army bells, which keep up their merry notes in fair weather and foul, in country lanes and on city streets would be a poor imitation of the real thing.

On Dec. 10, a military coup toppled Zanzibar's civilian government headed by Dr. Emile Zinno.

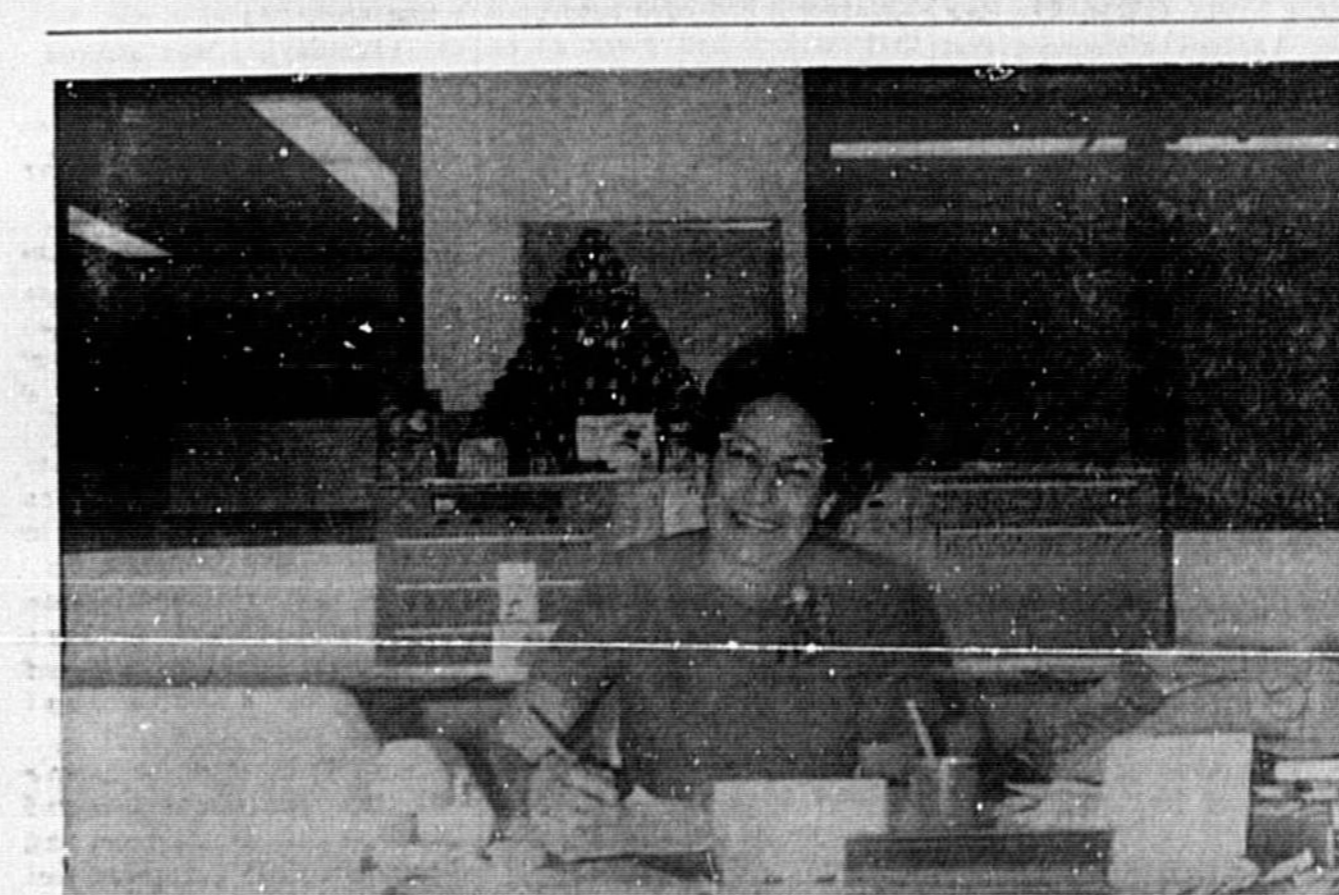

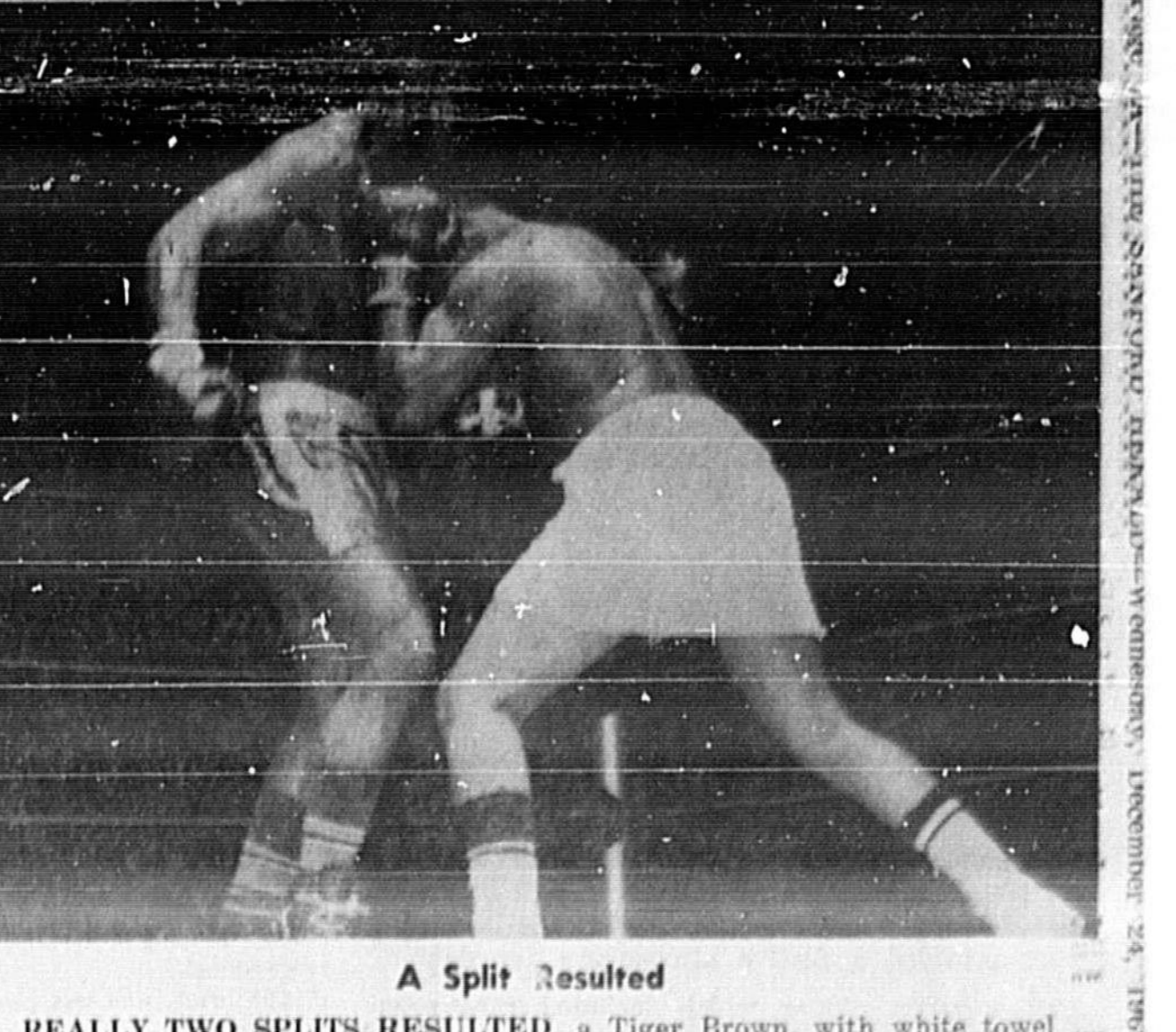

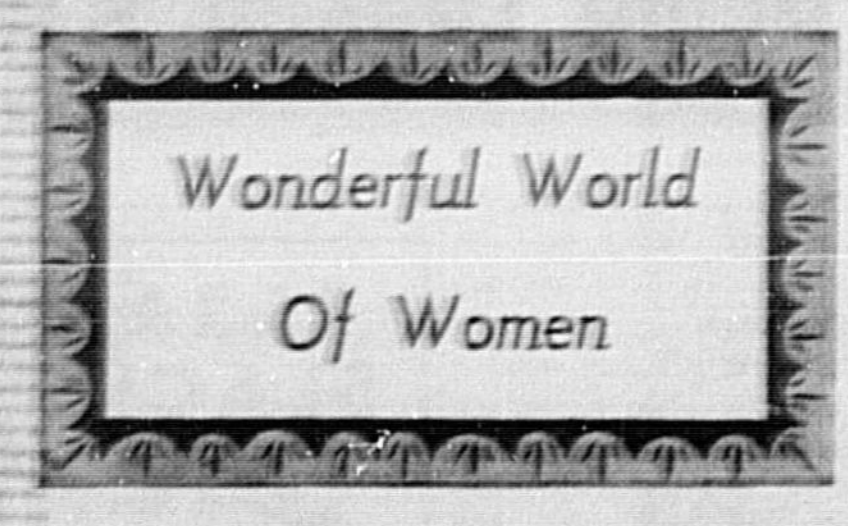

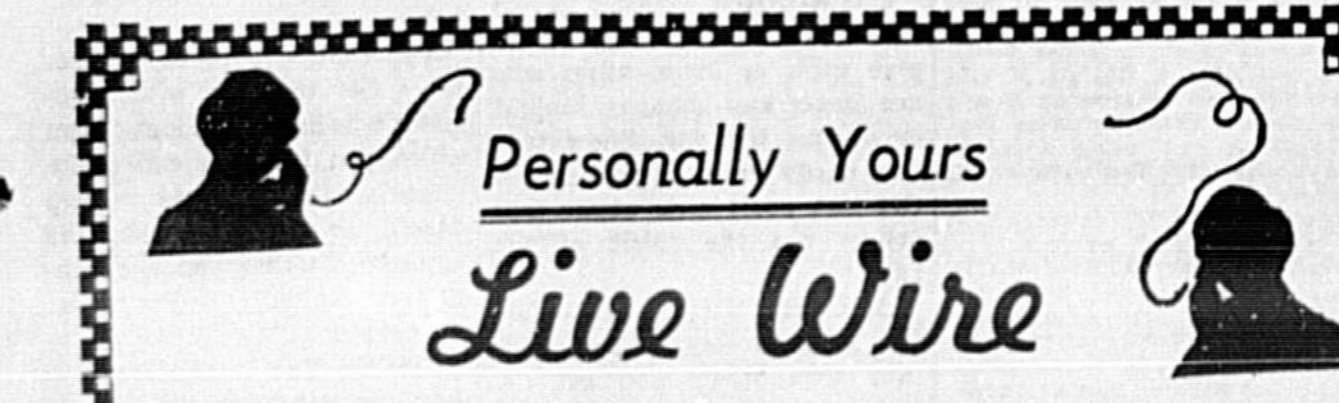

Hound Heart Patients' Guinea Pig

 BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — A shy furore named Brumby, a module of tissue which regulates the heart's pumping action.
 Conventional pacemakers are powered by mercury-cell batteries which must be replaced every two or three years. This requires reopening the implant area in the patient's chest, as was done recently in Justice Douglas' case. While this is a simple and minor surgical procedure, it is inconvenient and expensive. Also, occasional battery failure can pose an emergency situation.
 In contrast, the atomic-powered version is designed to last at least 10 years, and possibly 20, without replacement. It is fueled by the same radioactive material, plutonium 238, which is powering scientific instruments on the moon. Heat from the radioactive material is converted directly into electricity

by a device called a thermocouple.
 Brumby and her masters, the Atomic Energy Commission and the National Heart and Lung Institute, are engaged in the tests designed to explore the reliability and safety of the atomic pacemakers prior to possible first trials in humans with

St. Nicholas saved them by gifts of gold. Each time, he threw the gold into the house, in order not to be recognized.



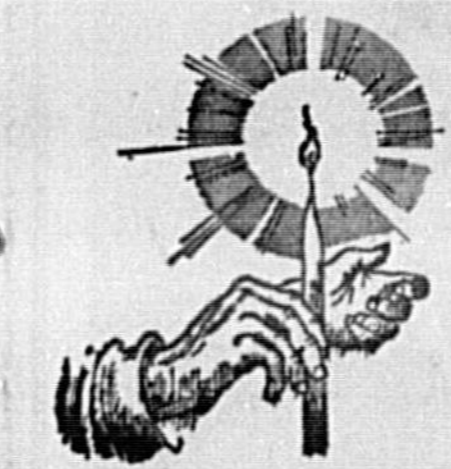
One version tells it that he threw the gold down the chimney, where it fell into a stocking hung there to dry.
 And so to this day children hang up their stockings for gifts from this real Saint.

why are mince pies and plum pudding traditional at dinner?

Mince pie has been traditional for as long as history records. It is usually full of spices and fruits, representing the exotic treasures of the East, the home of the Wise Men. Originally it was made in a loaf shape, to simulate the manger.

Plum pudding, to the contrary, signifies the humble virtues. Legend has it that in the early days of England a king and his men were lost in the forest on Christmas Eve.

Not having provided for this delay in their journey, the cook threw everything he had to make one dish for all... thus the plum pudding! We're just guessing, but we are sure plums have had some good reason to be part of the name.



"Christmas" sometimes is written "Xmas."
 "X" is the Greek letter symbol that is used to represent the name, "Christ."

This symbol has been discovered by many archaeological expeditions on the walls of early Christian period catacombs.

Not long ago, a group of scientists discovered the name of Jesus, carved before 70 A.D., among the inscriptions on eleven early-Christian urns, uncovered in a cave on the Bethlehem to Jerusalem Road.

In Greece Christmas is called "Genethlia," feast of the Nativity.

Noel is the term used for Christmas in France.

An Italian name for Christmas is "Nativita" from which probably derived the Spanish "Nativity."

The German "Heilige Nacht" signifies "holy night."

The likeliest derivation of our own "Christmas" is from the Hebrew "mas" which means tribute.

An elegant meat dish served in royal houses during Medieval times at Christmas, was the roast peacock. This dish was called "food for lovers and meat for lords."
 A royal dish it was, too. The cooks carefully removed the skin with all its brilliant plumage. After it had been baked and partly cooked, the feathers were replaced and the tail spread out, just before the hearer entered the hall.

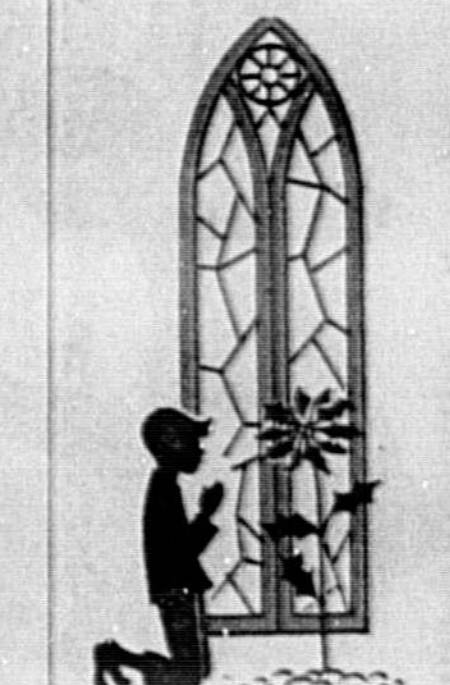
Dickens Story: Mr. Pickwick's Christmas...



Bells Have A Special Magic At Christmas

Medieval people considered bells almost living beings. They were dedicated before being hung and the dedication was almost like a baptism. During the ceremony prayers were offered that the sound of the bell might summon the faithful, stimulate devotion, drive away storms and banish evil spirits. One document of days long ago comments: "In those dark chambers, high above the turmoil and strife of human life, dwell the apostles of peace, whose salutations were never so welcome as at the time of the great Winter feasts of Christmas."

The novelist Victor Hugo writes the ringing of the bells "the open of the Stoeples." Bells come in all shapes and sizes. Their moods span the ages... from the rattle of the African chieftain to the sweet-toned church bells.

Bells were originated according to legend by Bishop Paulinus, in Nola, in Campania, in the fifth century. From his town and district are derived the name Campanula, the Latin for bell.

"Whoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas and the like, either by forbearing labor, feasting, or any other way upon such account as aforesaid, every such person so offending shall pay for each offense five shillings as a fine to the country."

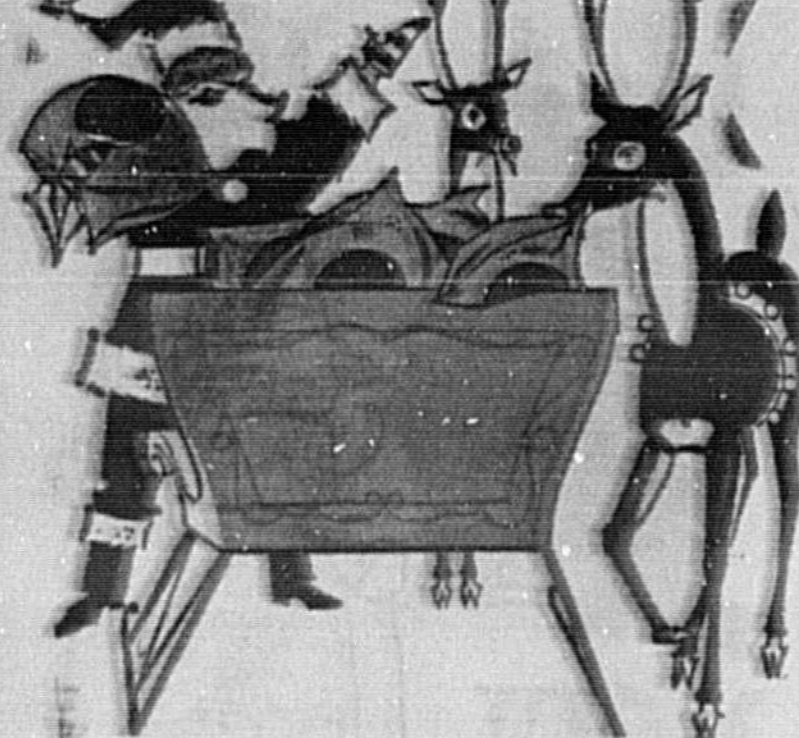

Animals, Bees And Birds
 Play Important Yule Role

One legend tells us that the
 barnyard animals show their
 devotion of the Child by fall-
 ing on their knees just at mid-
 night on Christmas Eve.
 When the American Indians
 learned of the Baby Jesus,
 quite naturally they believed
 that the deer knelt at midnight
 on Christmas Eve.
 The people of Norway honor
 all animals, even fish, at Yule-
 tide. Cattle, birds, fish are as-
 sured of safety during the time
 which is known as the Peace
 of Christmas. No snares are set
 during this period. The farm-
 ers feed their cattle salt from
 a cow-bell in the belief that
 they would be able to find their
 way home at night.
 In old Italy on Christmas Eve
 a curious ceremony often took
 place in the farmer's barn. The
 farmer and his shepherd would
 carry lighted candles into every
 corner of the animals' abler
 holding the tapers high so that
 the light was shed into every
 dark corner.
 In Scandinavian literature
 there is a story of Jesus as a
 boy helping His playmates to
 make clay birds. When he had
 finished modeling his bird, He
 would clap his hands and the
 bird would take wing and fly
 off into the skies.
 Even the bee has his niche
 in Christmas lore. In England
 long ago it was believed that
 the bees sang to the Christ
 child at midnight on Christmas
 Eve. Some beekeepers still
 place a bit of holy on the bee-
 hive at Christmas.
 Rather than be caught up in
 the many meaningless chores
 of Christmas, why not let some
 of them go undone and concen-
 trate your efforts on the true
 meaning of Christmas. You'll
 find you've created a warm
 feeling of family closeness and
 love. When Christmas morning
 comes, you'll be able to meet
 it with a new joy in having
 found the unadorned and mean-
 ings of the Lord's
 feast.
 Home Decorations—in the
 very early days of the Christian
 Church the Holy Fathers took
 a cautious stand on the matter
 of Christmas decorations and
 festivities. The Pope felt that
 some of the emerging customs
 were too pagan in origin, as
 indeed, many were.
 The church gradually accept-
 ed and blessed the practice of
 decorating both the church
 buildings and the Christian home
 with plants and flowers on the
 feast of the Nativity.
 Pope Gregory I (604 A.D.) in
 a letter to St. Augustine of Can-
 terbury advised him to permit
 and even to encourage, popular
 customs he reflected, which in
 themselves were not pagan but
 natural, and could be given
 Christmas interpretation. It is
 a matter of spirit and individual
 intent, he indicated.

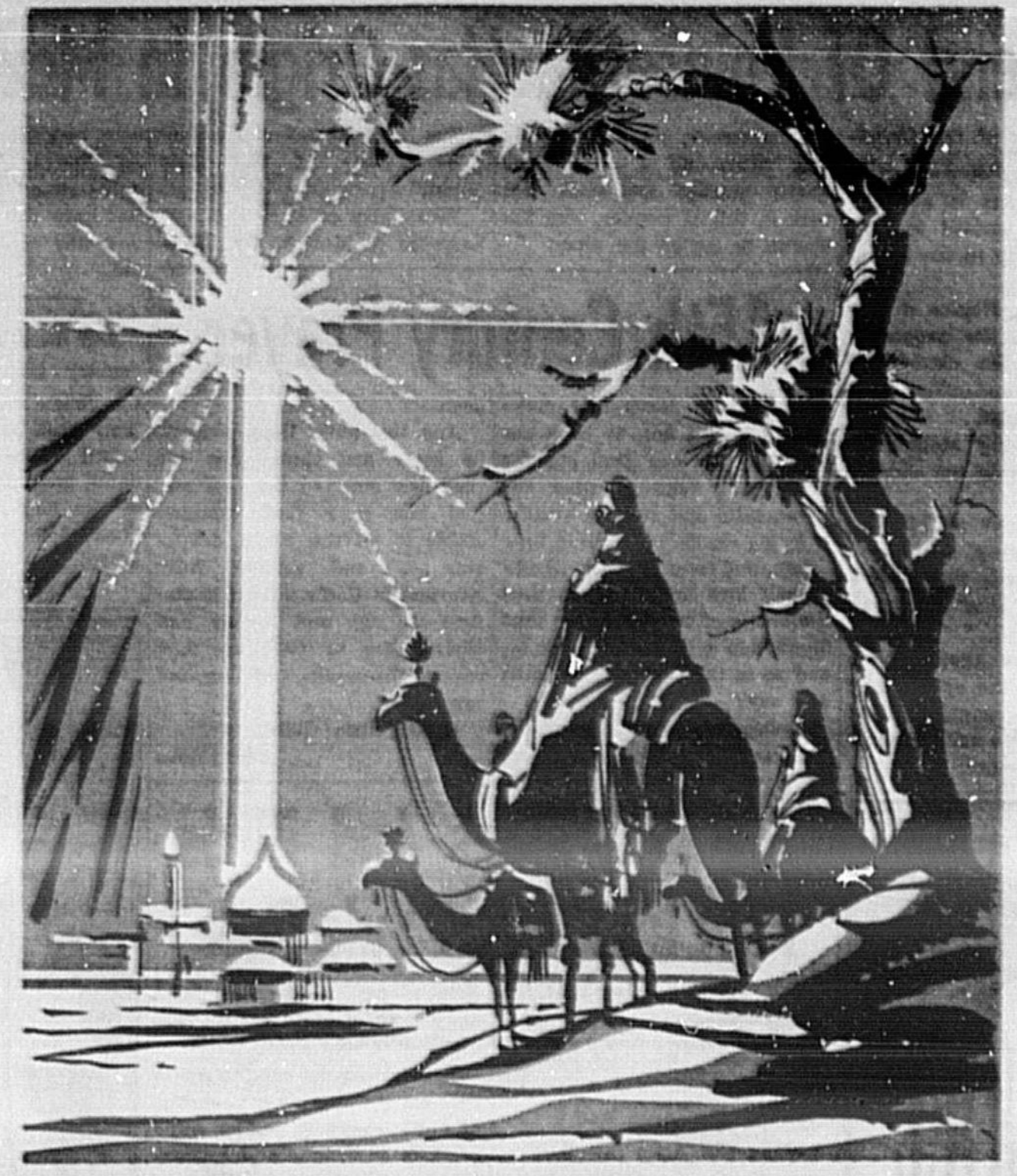

Symbols Of Christianity Adorn Trees

Something of a phenomenon took place recently in certain areas of Southern California. It was in regard to the trimming of Christmas trees. Instead of using lots of lined and garish-colored balls which suggest the barbarian superficial celebration of the season, the people hung stars, crosses and other emblems of the faith from the green branches. These are known as "Christmas monograms," the word coming from "Christmas" and "monograms."

In other words, the designs are monograms of Christ and the message of Christmas. At one Lutheran church, a 20-foot tree was decorated with more than 300 Christmas, each from 4 to 10 inches in diameter. Meaning of each of the symbols is stylized.

- 1—The circle symbolizes eternity, and the triangle the trine God—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.
- 2—Alpha and omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, the beginning and the end.
- 3—Chi Rho, the first two letters of Christ in Greek. Also, it is said, it refers to Christus Rex, or Christ the King, in Latin.
- 4—The first three letters for Jesus in Greek. Also Jesus Hominum Saviour.
- 5—The cross, a reminder of His sacrifice for all men, of forgiveness and salvation.
- 6—The crown symbolizes the King of Kings.
- 7—The sun or righteousness refers to Malachi iv. 2 in the Old Testament, prophesying the birth of a Saviour.
- 8—The rose symbolizes the nativity.

- 10—Star made of crosses with slanting arms, intended to represent the connection between Christmas and Easter.
- 11—Christ over the world, as in Matthew ev. 15, "Go ye into all the world."

Legend has it that a pine tree sheltered the Christ Child during the flight of the Holy Family from Herod's soldiers. As the family huddled 'neath the tree, the pine dipped its branches to hide them—until the soldiers passed on. And, when the danger was over, the baby Jesus blessed the tree. If you will cut a pine cone lengthwise at Christmas time, you will see the imprint of the Holy Infant's hand.

Festival Of Lights Reflects Old Traditions

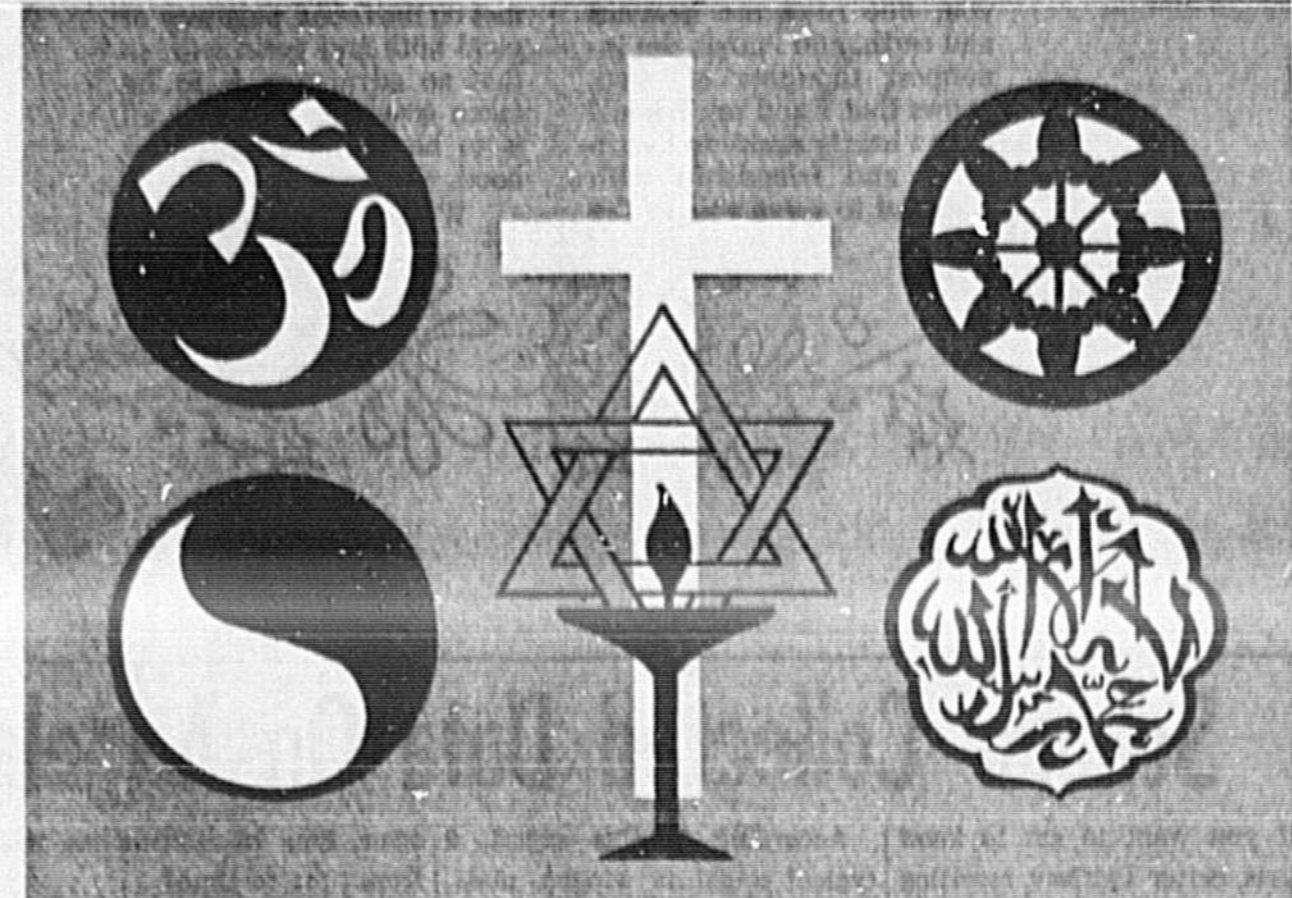
Since the dawn of recorded history man has observed that there is a period during the year when "the days begin to lengthen and the cold begins to strengthen." It is the Winter solstice when the sun began to rise ever the world with renewed vigor and power for fertility, after a period of low ebb.

The people of the North considered the sun as a wheel which alternately threw its glow upon the earth and away from it. This sun wheel was known as "hweol" and perhaps this is the origin of our word "yule."

To the Jews this period was the Festival of Lights or Dedication, called Hanukkah. According to their history, in 165 B.C. a force of Maccabees met and vanquished an army of Syrians. Judas Maccabees entered Jerusalem with his army and found it desolate and in ruins. He began the work of purification; on the 25th day of Kislev it was finished and a sacred light was lighted.

In their destruction of the temple the sacred oil was almost depleted. However they did find a jar which they estimated would burn for one day. Miraculously, it burned for 8 days. Therefore every year the Jews celebrate that the 8 days prior to December 25 be celebrated.

The first night two tapers are lighted. One is called the torch. The second night a third candle

Though we may speak of Christmas-card writing as a chore, in reality, to most of us, it is one of the pleasantest "chores" of the year.

It gives us a chance to remember and reach old friends, and also to say "hello" to new acquaintances we might like to know better.
