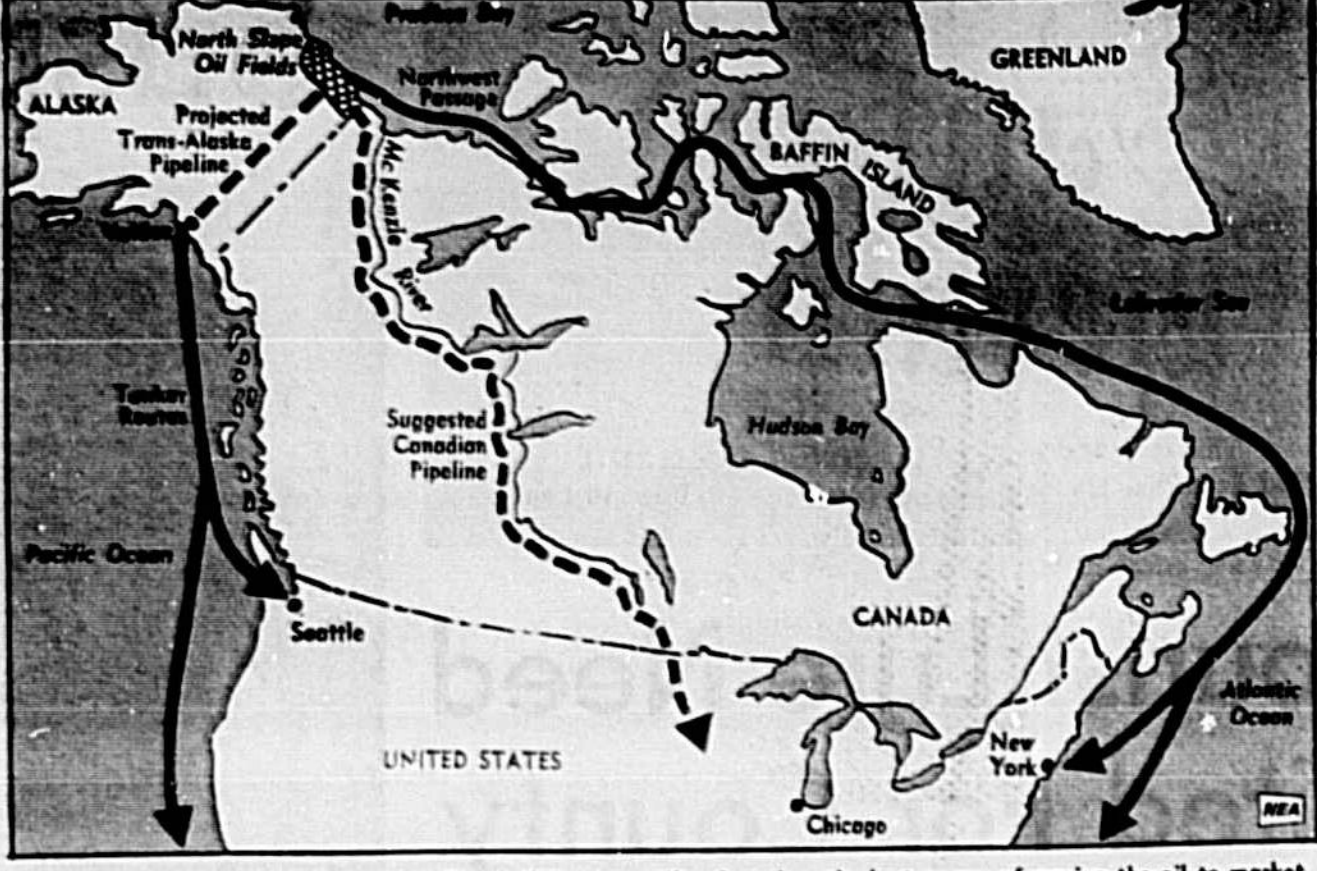

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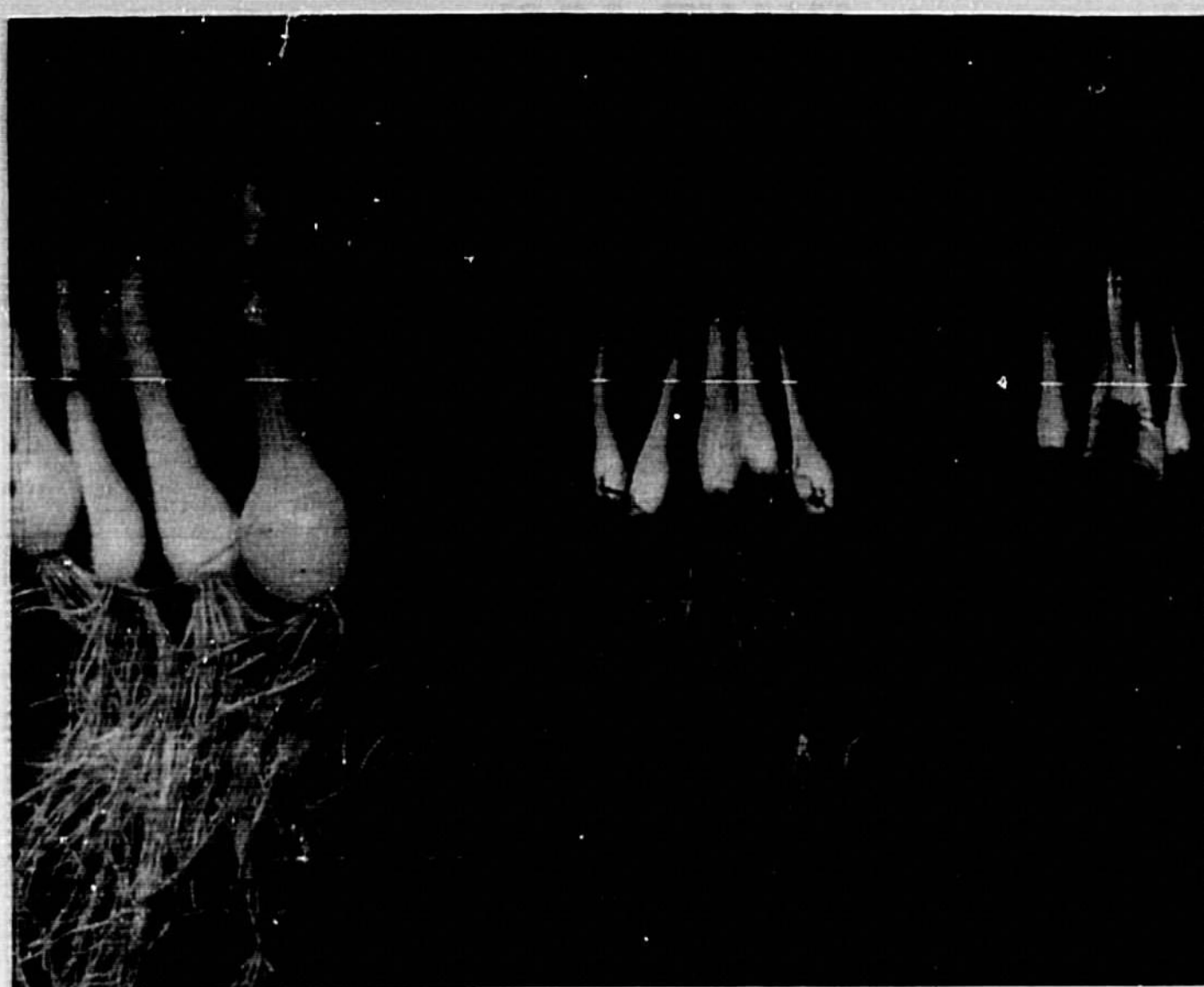

# Research To Save The Agri-Industry

The \$40 million five-county vegetable industry served by the Agricultural Research and Education Center — Sanford, formerly known as the Central Florida Experiment Station, is challenged by expanding urbanization and rapidly increasing labor costs. To meet these threats and to save this industry and its benefits to central Florida, the Center, a unit of the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, must increase its research effort. The main office and farm is located 12 1/2 miles east of Sanford on state road number 416. A branch office and farm is located on the Yellowwood tract, approximately 20 miles west of Sanford.

Present labor costs and the current threat of unionization of Florida agricultural labor will require considerable research input into better mechanization of production, harvesting, and handling methods. To continue production while faced with high costs of labor and materials, the growers must be provided with better and more uniform disease-resistant crop varieties, improved nutritional practices, and better techniques for pest control which do not contribute to the pollution problem.

There is no doubt that this area is one of the best locations for an experiment station in Florida. Sanford has been a commercial vegetable production area since shortly after the great freeze of 1892. From 2 to 5 crops per year are grown on most of the central Florida vegetable fields. The mineral soil in this area is thoroughly infested with pests after 60 to 70 years of continuous cultivation. Vegetable growers are now facing problems which will be faced by other areas in the future. It has been said that if a pest control method will work in Sanford, it will work anywhere in the country. Because of this, several agricultural chemical companies, including Stauffer Chemical Company, ICI-Ag-Chem, and Chemagro Chemical Company, and from ancient times, had been farming from building ships by U.S. occupation authorities just as the Shogun had decreed shortly after Will Adams' death in 1629—a decree that was surprisingly observed up to the mid-1900s. The postwar orient, along with a ban on aviation and atomic energy development, came from Gen. Douglas MacArthur as supreme commander for the Allied powers.

Thompson Hayward Chemical Company have made large investments in field research stations located near the AREC-Sanford. Several large agricultural chemical companies are investigating the possibilities of locating in central Florida.

This is also in one of the most rapidly expanding areas in the United States, with N.A.S.A., Walt Disney World and Florida Technological University luring thousands of new residents into the area. Residential and industrial expansion has overrun thousands of acres of land formerly used for agricultural production. In the town, thousands of acres of new land are being put into agricultural production. A large percentage of this has been developed for vegetable production and north of Lake Apopka in Orange and Lake counties.

The expanding urbanization in this area has increased land values and forced relocation of many farms. New areas are being cleared and developed for vegetable production; further aggravating the pollution problem. Research emphasis needs to be placed on the effects of pollution from agricultural activities on our environment and on ways of keeping them at a minimum.

A dollar evaluation of the output of educational programs and programs designed to better our environment by the reduction of pollutants entering our lakes and streams and production of foods free of harmful pesticide residues is very difficult to determine. The input of the Center's resources for these programs amount to approximately \$40,000 per annum or 14.2 per cent of the total research effort of the Center. The remaining 85.7 per cent of the budget of the AREC-Sanford is devoted to crop research.

# Teacher Would Be Surprised Japan Is Top Ship Builder

**YOKOHAMA, Japan (AP)**—Will Adams, the first Englishman in Japan, taught the Japanese the ABC's of building ships and sailing them in the early 1600s. He would be amazed if he could see today's bustling Japanese shipyards construct super tankers and mammoth cargo ships.

The 100,000-ton to 330,000-ton vessels are a far cry from the tiny 10-to-25-ton ships Adams helped the Japanese build. Western know-how plus Japanese skill, energy and efficiency have reeked Japan into the position of the world's top shipbuilding nation. From conventional shipbuilding—beginning with the keel, building up the ribs and strakes and cladding them from stern to stern with steel plates bolted with rivets—the Japanese have revolutionized the industry. Today the Japanese assemble and weld together huge fabricated steel blocks ranging from 30 to 200 tons into units which make up super-tankers.

Much of the work now is computerized and automated with a shift toward remote control, and the Japanese hope to push this aspect of the industry further in view of the mounting shortage of manpower.

Although it took the Japanese more than seven years to build two of the world's largest battle ships—the Yamato and the Mutsu—only to lose them in a matter of hours in two World War II sea battles, Japanese shipbuilders now can produce 100,000 to 300,000-ton merchant tankers in two-and-one-half to six months after the keel is laid. "But the thrill and excitement, the color and romance of building ships," say two veteran shipbuilders, "threatens to become a thing of the past. The image is changing. Almost every facet of the industry is becoming too standardized and too automated. Everything is moving toward order-made ships."

Mitsuhiko Ono, 51, and Saburo Nakashima, 46, who built ships for Ishikawajima-Harima Heavy Industries Co. Ltd. (IHI) for more than three decades, nostalgically mix the rivet-tat of riveting guns, the clinking and clanking of workers swinging sledge hammers and the launching of a ship as the glistening hull is pushed into the sea.

"Twenty-three years ago," recalls Nakashima, "we were building 20-to-30-ton boats to fill the need for local shipping and fishing industries completely knocked out in World War II. Two or three years later it was 100-to-200-ton Bonito fishing trawlers. But our heart wasn't in ships. It was in working our

garden and getting our sto machi full by converting shipbuilding material into pots and pans and plough shares for the money to buy food."

Japan, a seafaring nation from ancient times, had been farming from building ships by U.S. occupation authorities just as the Shogun had decreed shortly after Will Adams' death in 1629—a decree that was surprisingly observed up to the mid-1900s. The postwar orient, along with a ban on aviation and atomic energy development, came from Gen. Douglas MacArthur as supreme commander for the Allied powers.

The judges in the county also will be contacted about this defensive driving course for traffic of lenders and attempts will be made to see that this training is included in driver's education courses. If they are not already a part of the course, the safety aspect of Sand Lake Road, which will have three schools completed on it within the next two years, was explored. County Commission Chairman Greg Drummond observed that local government may be forced to become more sidewalk conscious as a result of urbanization.

The committee declared that the intersection of U.S. 17-82 and SR 436 is the second most urgent traffic safety hazard existing in Seminole County—along with SR 436 intersection being No. one problem, and upon which the committee took action in February. The Commission chairman stated that he will be presenting the opinions of this safety committee regarding these two areas to the U. S. Department of Transportation in Washington later in the month.

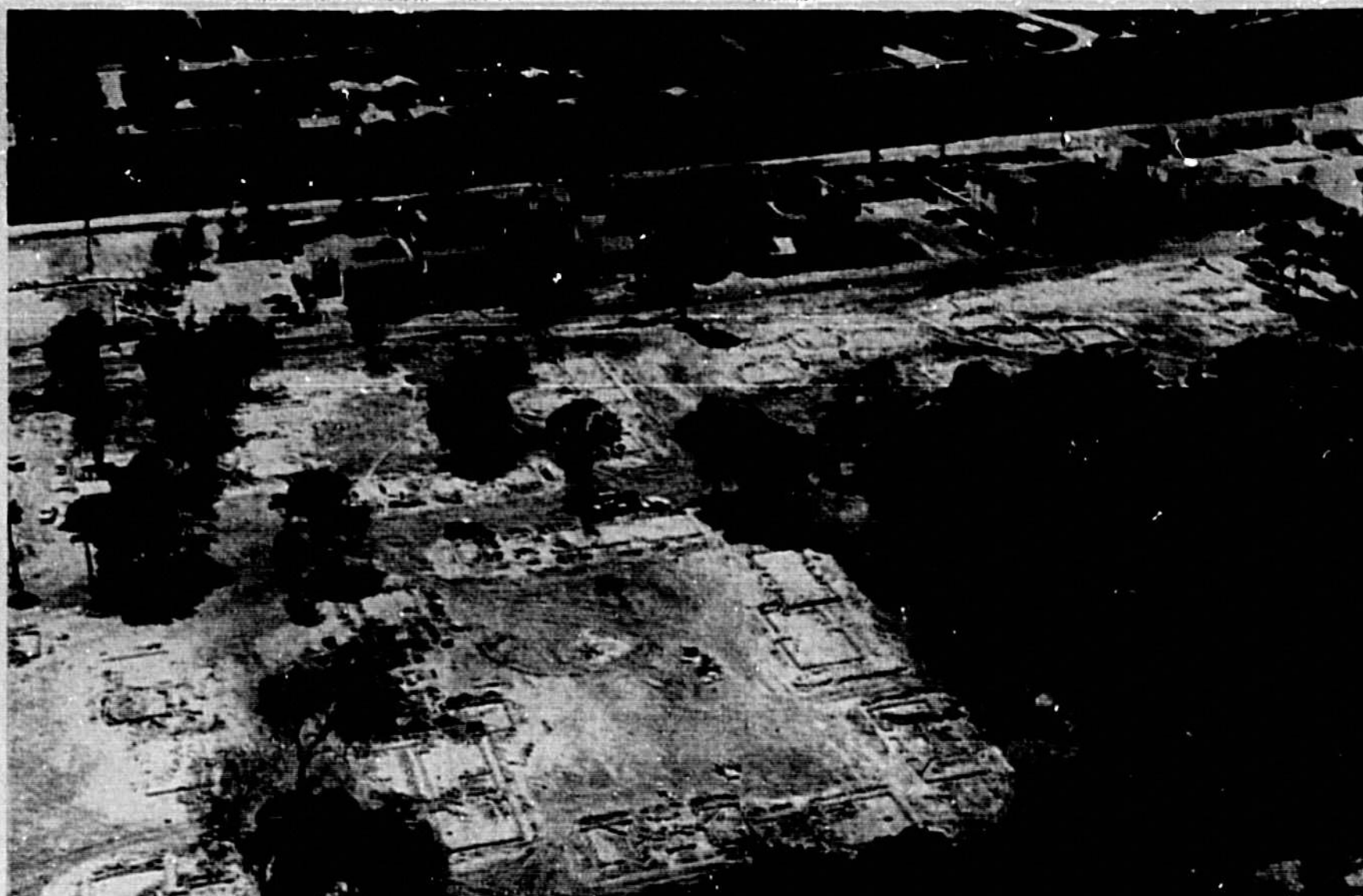
