Appeal By Joyce Is Denied By Lords

LONDON, Dec. 18. (AP)— Britain's court of last resort—the House of Lords—turned down an appeal by William (Lord Haw Haw) Joyce to escape the gallows. Joyce is under sentence of death for treasonable broadcasts he made from Germany during the war. He was not in the House when the Lords announced their decision.

The appeal for the Nazi propagandist was based on the contention that he was born in the United States—in Brooklyn—and thus could not be guilty of treason to the British Crown. Joyce was the second person to learn this week that his death sentence for treason would not be stayed. The British Home Office announced earlier that it would not reprieve John Amery—who also was convicted for his broadcasts for the Nazis. Amery is the son of L. S. Amery, Secretary of State for India in the Churchill war cabinet.

Amery is scheduled to go to the gallows tomorrow. However, no date has been set as yet for Joyce's execution. When the House of Lords announced its decision regarding Joyce today, a man sitting in the public gallery cried: "This man is innocent. I prophesied the death of Hitler and his return." Officials silenced the man immediately.

Point Score For Army Personnel To Be Cut On Dec. 31

Medical Department Officers Are Not Included In Point Reduction Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—Another cutback, effective Dec. 31, will make eligible for release 600,000 more service men and women. The point score for enlisted men will be reduced to 50, and their length of required service to 32 months. The point score for officers will be dropped to 70, and their length of required service to 48 months. This does not apply to male officers in the Medical Department. Three years have been lopped off the age limit which will be cut to 45 years for all Medical and Dental corps officers, Dental and Veterinary Corps officers except plastic surgeons, as officers, and Medical officers excepting certain specialists, the point score will be reduced to 65. One important change concerns WAC personnel. For the first time, their length of service will be computed. Enlisted WACs will be eligible for separation after two years and six months of honorable service. The release for WAC officers is set after three years and three months. Release will be granted on application to WAC officers and enlistees married to discharged veterans of World War II, regardless of the date of their enlistment. The critical score for WAC personnel will not be reduced by the cutback changes. The Army said it would continue its current policy toward personnel in this category who no longer are needed and who are not qualified for overseas duty. Insufficient points or service will not stand in the way of their prompt release.

First Sanford Celery Ready To Be Shipped

Escarole, Lettuce, Peppers Available For Mixed Shipment

First cutting of Sanford "golden heart" celery, quality of which appears to be excellent, is expected to take place Thursday morning at the farms of C. A. Linton and H. G. Behrens on the east side. Sanford was drenched last evening and during the night with the heaviest rainfall of the winter season, 1.36 inches up to 7:30 o'clock this morning, according to B. F. Walther, weatherman. If the weather clears up, it is expected that from six to eight cars of celery will be cut Thursday. Zellwood, first to start cutting had celery that suffered from cold damage, reported M. C. Collins, sales manager for Everglades and Celery Company. "The Everglades section is mostly fair to ordinary, with some good quality. Some growers started cutting too soon, and quality would have been better if left for two weeks. "Sanford has its share of troubles also; but if we can keep level headed, keep our paper crews working and do not jump too quick," he added. "We stand a good chance of having the best quality going out. Sarasota is also packing celery. "Movement should run 30 to 35 cars a day for two weeks, normal volume up to 60 a day around mid-January. Zellwood should finish by then, and other sections will speed up. About 25 percent of the stock is working up for shipment of this variety will be light until the last of January. "Mr. Cullum predicted that the cabbage movement will be normal volume in three weeks. "We admit being the best quality section of this vegetable in Florida, and most buyers agree," he stated. "Coulflower, retarded by weather, is getting under way in shipment. Escarole is available in carlots or mixed cars. Peppers, eggplant and iceberg lettuce are available for mixed cars. "Only hardly enough fruit on hand to supply the holiday demand, citrus packers yesterday and today were unable to get new supplies due to the rain interfering with the picking. Most packers will operate through Saturday and will probably be closed during the Christmas week, although some packers are not fully decided on this, pending reactions on a meeting of the Florida Citrus Commission, decisions of which may affect the marketing of fruit.

Churchill To Visit Florida In February

British Statesman And Family Seek Warm Weather And Rest During Stay

LONDON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The laborite Daily Herald of London said today that Winston Churchill will resign from the leadership of the Conservative Party. The newspaper asserted that Churchill's resignation as opposition leader probably will be made public after his forthcoming visit to the United States.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—It is official that Winston Churchill is coming to the United States on a winter early next year. The White House announced today that the former British Prime Minister will arrive in New York in the middle of January. He will travel by the Seaboard Air Line's wreck-free Florida-bound "Silver Meteor" and coming visit was made simultaneously in Washington and London.

At the suggestion of his medical advisor, Churchill will spend a month or more in a warm location seeking a complete rest. However, he will make at least one public appearance, Churchill will discuss word affairs in an address at Westminster College, Fulton, Mo., on Mar. 5. The former premier will be introduced there by President Truman. Churchill has accepted the invitation of Col. Frank Clark to stay at his house in Florida during February. He will be accompanied to Florida by Mrs. Churchill and his daughter, Mrs. Sarah Oliver.

Freezing Weather Causes 34 Deaths Throughout Nation

CHICAGO, Dec. 19, (AP)—The weather man holds out chilly prospects today for every rise in the thermometer. Much of the nation is on a diet of snow and rain, sleet and sub-zero temperatures. At least 34 persons have died in a direct result of the weather. Snowfalls from the Midwest and southwest are piling white drifts and mountains along the Atlantic seaboard. Easterners can expect right to twelve inches of snow mainly in northern Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, southeastern Pennsylvania and southeast New York. Temperatures in the Midwest and belt will ease up somewhat, but the chill will continue at least until Friday. From eastern Montana westward to Indiana and Illinois, the temperature is only slightly above today. The mercury struck far below zero in several sections. Tarkio in northwest Missouri has registered an icy 17 below. Another batch of cold air from Canada is expected to reach the Dakotas and Minnesota over the week-end. Railroads across the nation are operating behind schedules and travel is disrupted in many sections. Industries in Illinois and western North Dakota have been left with a shortage of natural gas. North Texas also has had below-freezing temperatures as far south as Austin, Tennessee and Birmingham, Ala., have had two inches of snow. Miami boasts a wet, westerly weather yesterday, at 78 above.

Official Records Of Storm Troopers Tell Of Atrocities

NUERNBERG, Dec. 19, (AP)—Official records of Adolf Hitler's brown-shirted Storm Troopers tell the unvarnished story of atrocities perpetrated by these fanatical thugs during the high times of the former Nazi Regime. The documents have been introduced by the American prosecution in the trial of 21 top Nazis on war crimes charges. One part of the Storm Troopers' records told how a single brigade of the troopers blew up or burned 65 synagogues during a two-day outbreak of anti-Jewish terrorism. The records show that the storm troopers were organized ever before Hitler's rise to power to beat up and terrorize all political opponents. The American prosecutors introduced the records in an effort to win war crimes convictions against some 600,000 lesser Nazis as well as the score now sitting in the Nuernberg prison's box. The Storm Troopers are the third Nazi organization to have its secrets laid bare to the trial. The American prosecution contends that six German organizations should be convicted as criminal groups and their members held guilty of war crimes in varying degrees. Evidence already has been presented against the Nazi leadership and the brown-shirted storm troopers are in court as well as the Elite Guard, the German High Command and the Nazi Gestapo. However, sharply critical questions by both the American and British representatives on the international tribunal have indicated that the United States prosecution may have a hard job in attempting to convict the lesser Nazis en masse.

Sgt. Louis Rowland Is On Way Home

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 19, (Special)—Sgt. Louis L. Rowland, 611 Magnolia Avenue, Sanford, Fla., is on his way home by Air Transport Command liner to the separation center at Camp Blanding, Fla., after 28 months of service at Anchorage and at Ladd Field, 11th Air Force base, 75 miles below the Arctic Circle. He entered the service in November, 1942. During the war Ladd Field was the focal point of the Alaskan (Alaska-Siberia) route ferrying operations conducted by the Air Transport Command, Alaskan Division. It was at this base that more than 7,000 lend-lease planes were turned over to the Russian army after being flown here by pilots of the Seventh Ferrying Group, A.T.C. The Alaskan Division's certificate for "commendable service under severe conditions peculiar to Canada" Alaska requiring ingenuity, perseverance and devotion to duty," was presented to Sgt. Rowland prior to his departure by Col. Louis E. Merrick, base commanding officer.

John Amery Hanged For High Treason

LONDON, Dec. 19, (AP)—Great Britain hangs the United Nations Preparatory Commission to consider a small town in the eastern United States as the site for the United Nations Organization. The British have presented the commission with a list of considerations which, in Britain's opinion, should be held in mind in choosing the site.

Barge Line To Baltimore May Be Started Soon

C. of C. Officials Confer In Jacksonville On Proposal

President H. H. Coleman, Geo. D. Bishop, chairman of the Traffic Committee, and Edward Higgins, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, attended a meeting in Jacksonville yesterday with Elias Tresher of the St. Johns River Line and W. T. Wolfe, traffic consultant for the City of Sanford, regarding the inauguration of a barge system from Sanford to Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Trenton.

In a letter to the Chambers of Commerce at Sanford, Jacksonville, Miami and Fort Pierce, Mr. Tresher stated that if they will assist in making arrangements with the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to lease at a reasonable rate surplus equipment now available, he will immediately inaugurate a barge line operating from these ports in Florida to Baltimore, Philadelphia and Trenton.

The Rivers and Harbors Committee of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce met to discuss the matter yesterday. The matter will be presented to the Seminole County Special Traffic Committee immediately.

It is very evident that the coast line steamers will not resume operation for the present until equable rates can be worked out with the Interstate Commerce Commission, which means that a resumption of this service is postponed indefinitely. Mr. Higgins said, "If the plans of Mr. Tresher are carried out, the State of Florida will have the benefit of water rates for all the traffic that his outfit is able to carry. "It is planned to make a presentation in Congress to approach the Reconstruction Finance Corporation on this project, pointing out the importance of it to the entire State of Florida."

Patton Continues To Show Improvement

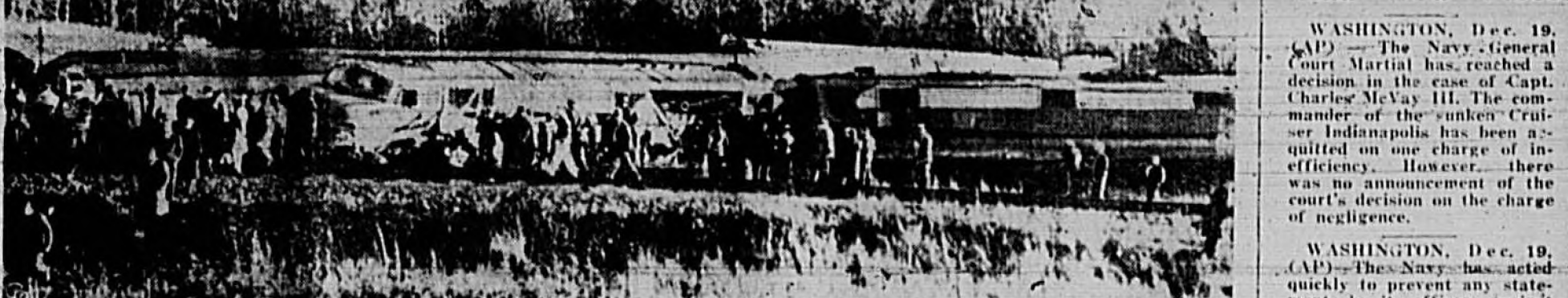

Firms Urged To Use Facilities Of Employment Office

Betty Ball Moseley, manager of the local United States Employment office, today urged business men and firms to use the facilities of the employment bureau to obtain skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled employees. Mrs. Moseley also made this appeal to enable the employment office to facilitate the placement of returning veterans, both colored and white, into positions for which they are best qualified. She said that many firms are hiring returning veterans without the aid of the employment service, thus causing a break in the chain of instructions the veteran receives when separated from the service. He is instructed to report to the employment office by Selective Service officials. The employment office currently has many openings for skilled employees and a good number of openings for other types, but a greater number must be filed with the employment service in order to accommodate the vast number of returning veterans in the near future. Mrs. Moseley declared that a number of men have applied for work during the holiday season and any business man or firm needing additional holiday employees is requested to contact the employment office. Mrs. Moseley stated that some veterans have been placed on jobs by the office but have left the position for various reasons. These veterans are requested to report their current location to the employment office for filing purposes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The Navy General Court Martial has reached a decision in the case of Capt. Charles McVay III. The commander of the sunken Cruiser Indianapolis has been acquitted on one charge of inefficiency. However, there was no announcement of the court's decision on the charge of negligence. WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The Navy has acted quickly to prevent any statements by its officers against the unification of the armed services recommended today by President Truman. A memorandum was issued to all Navy and Marine officers even as the President's message was being read before Congress. Under the Navy order, officers are forbidden to express their opposition to the merger except when called as witnesses before committees of Congress.

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GENERAL WING DIES

RUTLAND, Vt., Dec. 19, (AP)—Death has taken one of the war's great aerial commanders, Major General Leonard F. Wing, died early today at his Rutland home. Wing, who was 52 years old, succumbed to a heart attack. He led the 43rd (Winged Victory) Division in four major Pacific campaigns and landed in Japan with General Douglas MacArthur's occupation troops. In private life he was a Vermont lawyer.

ELECTED PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Dec. 19, (AP)—A woman has been elected president of a \$2,000,000 New York City department store — she is the first of her sex to head a store of this size. She is Miss Dorothy Shaver and she has been First Vice President of Lord and Taylor since 1937. Miss Shaver succeeds Walter Hoving, who has been Lord and Taylor president for ten years. Hoving has resigned to set up a new nationwide amalgamation of department stores.

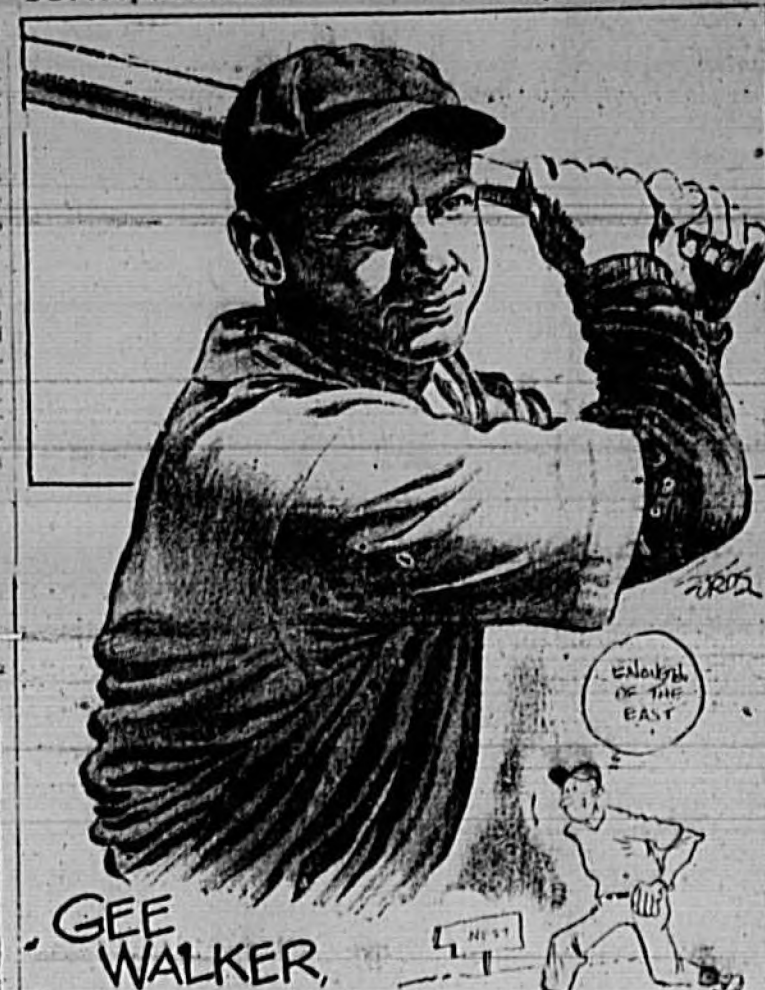

Home Accidents

The expression "Safe at home" is gradually coming closer to actual experience, according to a recent study on the trend of mortality from home accidents made by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

The study shows that among adult male policyholders the age-adjusted death rate declined 43 per cent between 1933-34 and 1943-44, while the decline among adult females in the same period was 37 per cent.

The situation is somewhat different among children. War conditions, which deprived youngsters of some of the safeguards they enjoyed in normal times, are held at least partly responsible for an increase in mortality from home accidents observed among children at ages 1 to 14.

The general decrease in mortality among adults from home accidents, the company reveals, "is especially gratifying inasmuch as accidents of this kind present one of the fiercest of dangers to the general public."

The modernization of the home, in which many household hazards have been materially reduced through the use of safer appliances and equipment, has been a factor of considerable importance in cutting down the toll of home accidents.

In the construction now in progress to meet the demand for more homes, the Metropolitan points out that "Architects can make material contributions toward reducing the heavy loss of life in home accidents by giving greater attention to safety factors in the designing of new buildings."

The manufactureres of household appliances can also aid by making safer equipment.

Peace-Time Army

Reaching into every city, town and hamlet in this country, into every army unit at home, into occupation forces overseas, is the most intensive campaign in the nation's history to recruit volunteers for the regular army.

Proposals for universal military training, the general said, will have no bearing on this recruiting drive, inasmuch as the regular army is being prepared to take over when the present emergency is ended by Congress.

The development of atomic energy and other scientific discoveries related to war demands a regular army of high caliber and adequate numbers, says the general. Young men of 17 and 18 are being offered travel, excitement and adventure as well as educational advantages such as college or technical training on a three year enlistment.

Alluring enlistment propositions like these present one more worry to parents who want to keep their boys at home. It cannot be denied, however, that volunteer enlistments form the ideal basis for standing armies. The country has an obligation, however, to see to it that the glamorized promises bear fruit exactly as advertised.

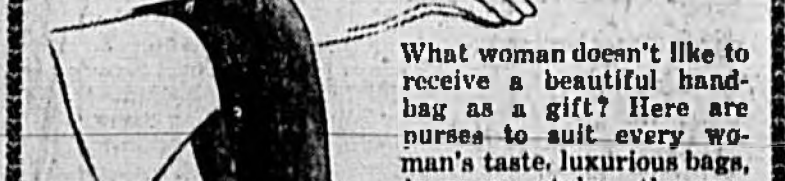

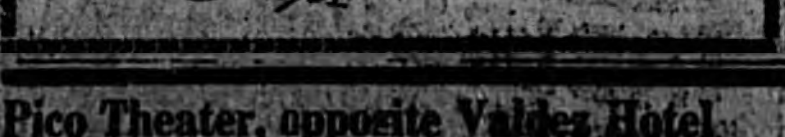

Red Grange Believes There Is Room For National All-American Grid Loops

Football's rapturing ghost, Red Grange, believes that there is room on the professional gridiron for both the national leagues and the proposed All-American Conference.

However, Grange warned that the two leagues should not engage in what he termed "a battle of backs," Grange, who once was one of the highest-paid players in the professional game, says that wide-open bidding for talent would result in financial ruin for one or both leagues.

Grange pointed to the reported \$20,000 contract signed by Bob Waterfield of the Cleveland Rams as an example of what he means. While asserting that the players deserve good pay, Grange returned to Waterfield's new contract this way: "There just isn't that kind of dough in professional football."

The great college football star, Buddy Young, is scheduled to get out of the Navy before long, and then he must decide where he is going to continue his education. Young was a freshman backfield sensation at Illinois in 1941. During the next season, he led the Fleet City Bluejacket to an unbeaten season.

Now that Young is scheduled to be released before long, there is a powerful tug of war going on behind the scenes between alumni, students and friends of the University of Illinois, and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Young is said to have told an Illinois official recently that he intends to return to his old school. But that hasn't stopped friends of UCLA, which is the campus where such other negro stars as Kenny Washington, Jackie Robinson and Woodrow Wilson gained athletic fame.

UCLA officials are taking no part in the move to get Young to attend the Los Angeles school, although it is reasonable to assume that they will not try to discourage him. The real pressure is being brought to bear by the able and influential of Central Avenue in Los Angeles' negro quarter.

The Holy Cross Crusaders are not getting in much practice for their Orange Bowl grid game with Miami. So far, weather conditions have prevented the Crusaders from getting any more practice than running under punts and chalking passes. And unless

Charles (Red) Barrett of St. Louis won the most victories, 23; pitched the most complete games, 24; the most innings, 285; faced the most batters, hits, 287.

Max Bentley of the Chicago Black awks is setting a fast scoring pace. In the National scored 16 goals and 13 assists for 29 points. His teammate, Bill Moshanko, has 24 points.

Other leaders are Toe Blake of Montreal, Clint Smith of Chicago and Doug Bentley of Chicago, 19 each. Alex Kalela, another Chicago player, has 17 points.

Postmaster Urges Citizens To Mail Cards First Class

Because of the many advantages that will result, Postmaster Joel S. Field today urged mailers to send their holiday greetings at the first-class rate of postage, explaining that when so sent the greetings written messages not otherwise permitted, therefore having a personal appeal which is, of course, more highly appreciated by the recipients; and such greetings are dispatched and delivered first given directory service, and, if necessary, forwarded without additional charge; also, if undeliverable, they are returned without charge provided the sender's address is shown on the envelope. On the other hand, printed Christmas greetings mailed in unsealed envelopes at the third-class rate which cannot be delivered as addressed, because of the removal of the addressee or for some other reason, must often be destroyed as waste, thereby causing disappointment. Greetings mailed at the third-class rate are not entitled to the free forwarding privilege accorded those mailed in sealed envelopes at the first-class rate, and, consequently, the sender in many cases never know that the greetings were not received by the addressee. This would not occur if the greetings were mailed sealed at the first-class rate.

"When addressing Christmas cards," said Mr. Field, "if you use the first name of a married woman as 'Mrs. Mary Doe who customarily receives her mail in her husband's name as 'Mrs. John A. Doe' he sure to give the street or the box number to which you wish the mail delivered."

Danger Seen In Cold Wave To Florida

62 Deaths Reported As Nation Shivers In Icy Grip Of Sub-Zero Readings

CHICAGO, Dec. 20, (AP)—The thermometer hovered at sub-zero readings at many points in the midwest today as the entire eastern half of the nation shivers in the grip of a pre-winter cold wave. That same half of the nation was blanketed for the part under a heavy fall of snow.

Southerners are shivering in the coldest weather of winter so far with sub-freezing temperatures extending into Florida. Citrus City reported 22 degrees this morning. Tallahassee had a low of 25. Jacksonville 31. Daytona Beach 39 and Miami 66.

The forecast calls for freezing temperatures further south tonight, possibly into the Lake Okechobee region, inland from West Palm Beach.

Farms and groves in Florida stand to suffer the greatest disaster in its history if the record-breaking current cold wave in the north moves down the Florida peninsula with any intensity, it is believed.

Not only is the annual \$2,000,000 vegetable crop just now at the vulnerable stage but there are \$60,000,000 worth of lime and avocado trees which are being nursed back to health after being battered by the September hurricane. For all these crops, the present trend of the weather is crucial.

Elsewhere the cold and snow combined to continue a snarl of transportation in the northeast. Many schools and a curtailment of production in many industries throughout the affected area.

The pre-winter weather has accounted in one way or another for at least 62 deaths.

Federal forecasters in Chicago predicted a temporary break in the prolonged cold wave. But they felt it up and down the East. A new cold front is moving down from central Canada.

The heaviest blanket of snow is in the eastern states. Upper New York continues to dig its way out of a mantle of white five feet deep in some areas. New York City has its heaviest snowfall in more than 10 years—12 inches. The fall measures 20 inches in Hartford, Conn., and 10 inches in Boston.

The temperatures in most areas have been right in line with the rest of the weather. Bowling Green, Ky., reports a low below zero weather to claim the dubious distinction of being the coldest spot in the Southern States.

Residents of Grand Forks, N.D., could say that was not all. They shivered in 15 degrees below zero temperature as they read of Miami high of 84 yesterday.

Hirohito Kept Hands Off As War Approached

Diary Shows Emperor As Only One With Power To Stop Army

TOKYO, Dec. 20, (AP)—Emperor Hirohito was pictured today as the only one in Japan who could have controlled Japan's war-bent militarists and who was said to have failed to take any positive steps to exercise that control.

This assertion was contained in the memoirs of Prince Fumimaro Konoye, once a close advisor of the Emperor. Konoye killed himself by taking poison last Sunday. He committed suicide rather than face trial as a result of the Emperor's order.

In his memoirs, Konoye looked back on the long but fateful peace negotiations between Japan and the United States. He said that Emperor Hirohito's "hands off" policy with regard to the Japanese Army and Navy, as well as the diplomatic corps, was "never deeply."

Nevertheless, Konoye asserted that Hirohito, at all times, maintained what Konoye said was a "sincere wish for peace."

Konoye, however, made no attempt to fix blame in his factual account of the two cabinets he headed prior to the war. However, he did condemn Japan's system of government which allowed the Army to have a free reign.

MUERNBERG, Dec. 20, (AP)—Records of the Nazi Elite Guard (SS) disclosed today that a surge of government troops fired a bullet into the concentration camp at Buchenwald to observe how the bullets would work.

The records were introduced by the American prosecution at the Nuremberg war crimes trial. They showed that the surgeons carefully recorded the symptoms as the victims slowly died. The SS records disclosed poisoned bullets caused death for three out of five prisoner victims.

These and other charges were leveled against the notorious black-shirt elite guards. The American prosecution is continuing to support its charge that the SS and five other organizations were convicted as criminal groups.

Only 20 of the 22 top Nazis on trial at Nuremberg were in the prisoners' box at today's trial session—the last before the court adjourns for two weeks over the Christmas-New Year holiday.

Former Nazi Security Police Chief Ernst Kaltenbrunner has suffered a recurrence of a cranial hemorrhage and could not attend the trial session. Army doctors said his condition was improved somewhat, but they say he may die from his ailment.

The 23rd defendant—Adolf Hitler's former deputy, Martin Bormann—is being tried in absentia. He still is listed officially by the Allies as "missing."

A six-foot-four-inch Gestapo henchman—Lieut. Col. Otto Skorzeny—told today how he was ordered personally by Adolf Hitler to kidnap Benito Mussolini and how he carried out those orders.

Skorzeny told Allied interrogators that he was quite surprised when he was summoned to Hitler's headquarters in Sept. 1943. There he was ordered to abduct Hitler's axis partner—Mussolini—from the forces of Italian Marshal Pietro Badoglio.

Congress Passes Bill Assuring Farm Laborers

\$25,000,000 Program Only Needs Presi- dent's Signature

Sanford celery growers are assured of securing services of Bahaman farm laborers following the announcement last evening by Representative Joe H. Pepper that the House of Representatives had approved the deficiency appropriation bill which carries an appropriation of \$25,000,000 and which now requires only the President's signature to make it effective.

Senator Claude Pepper yesterday advised M. L. Cullum, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, that the deficiency appropriation bill, including applications for the Government labor program had passed the Senate Tuesday evening, was reported out of the conference committee for the House, and that action was expected this week on the bill.

The reply by Senator Pepper followed after the County Farm Bureau, represented by Mr. Cullum, had telegraphed him as follows: "We are greatly concerned over failure of Congress to pass appropriations which we understand are necessary to bring in or keep foreign labor here this winter to harvest perishable crops."

"The Sanford district alone needs a minimum of 325 of these workers. Failure to get them may conceivably mean more than a half million dollars loss, which could cripple many farmers for several seasons, if not bankrupt them. What is the status or prospects for passage of this bill?"

A telegram urging vigorous House action on the bill was recently sent by W. C. Cullum to Senator Hendricks, who replied with a telegram announcing House action on the bill.

Trio Of Bandits Captured After Bank Robbery

\$50,000 Jewel Theft Reported In Miami

WINNAN, Mo., Dec. 20, (AP)—Two bandit suspects are in jail and a third has fled and stolen himself in a woodland farmhouse after the trio had been apprehended by a posse of 20 Missouri hunters and police officers after the capture of the Bank of Winnan, Mo., and held up and robbed of \$50,000. The capture and suicide came nine hours later.

State Highway Patrol Captain H. A. Hanson, has been assigned to lead a posse of 20 men from near the farm. He was a 30-year-old farmer at whose house the capture took place. The other two were Frankford, Kansas, and were being in Sullivan County, Mo.

MIAMI BEACH, Dec. 20, (AP)—The biggest jewel robbery in 35 years was reported here today by Miami Beach Detective Chief Earl Carpenter, who said that thieves made off yesterday with \$50,000 in jewelry from the home of an Atlanta society woman.

G.M. Declines To Open Books In Wage Study

Fact-Finding Board Hears Company Plea That Profits Should Not Be Considered

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20, (AP)—The General Motors Corporation has declared flatly that it will refuse to participate in hearings before President Truman's fact-finding board if prices and profits are to be considered. The corporation's statement was given to the fact-finding board today by a General Motors attorney, Walter Merrill.

He declared that the union is demanding highly technical and confidential information on the company's financial position, much of which, he said, is based on predictions of future conditions.

These figures, the lawyer argued, are entirely irrelevant to the fact-finding process, inasmuch as the company is not pleading inability to pay.

Before the company attorney appeared before the board, union Vice President Walter Reuther reviewed once again his organization's position in the General Motors wage dispute. Reuther charged that the company had resorted to what he termed jungle law in dealing with the union wage demands, and had refused to consider the economic arithmetic of the dispute.

The union official attacked the company's assertion that it could not grant pay increases unless it were allowed higher prices on its cars. Reuther said that the union could not be a party to any such deal. But he added that if the fact-finding board decided that the company's argument was valid, the union would back down and reduce its demands.

The fact-finding board must rule on whether or not it will consider prices and profits before it continues its hearings. In Detroit the CIO United Auto Workers' Union explained today why it turned down the Ford Motor Company's offer of a 12 per cent wage increase. Union officials said that the 12 per cent increase would not be enough to offset the rise in the cost of living, and that under the Ford plan many workers would receive little or no increase at all.

The company statement that it faces a loss of \$35,000,000 in 1946.

Presidential Order Extends Life of FEPC

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20, (AP)—A Presidential order today extended the life of the Fair Employment Practices Committee until June 30, 1946. This directive removed existing doubts as to the committee's authority. Members will continue to investigate and report on job discriminations in private industry engaged in military or recovery-production. The committee received \$25,000 for its continuance under the War Agencies Appropriation Act. A bill is pending in both the Senate and the House to make the Fair Employment Practices Committee permanent.

A second directive by President Truman went to federal departments and agencies headed by the Chief Executive but had been informed that some government employees had been discriminated against because of race and creed. His directive asked those in charge to analyze the personnel policies, and prevent any further discrimination of the kind.

REDMON ENROUTE HOME

Corporal Louis Redmon, United States Army, is enroute to his country aboard the U.S.S. Marine Aider, according to information received today from the Service Force Commander of the United States Pacific Fleet. Col. Redmon is among 1000 Pacific Theater veterans aboard the vessel. Mrs. Redmon resides in Ovid.

HEIDELBERG, Germany, Dec. 20, (AP)—The condition of General George Patton has taken a slight turn for the worse. The General's physicians say that he has contracted a respiratory ailment which is delaying his recovery from paralysis and a broken neck received in an automobile accident. The midday bulletin from Heidelberg said Patton had spent an uncomfortable night.
