SANFORD - Seminole County residents have separated more garbage for recycling than county

About 2.2 percent of all the garbage collected in the county in January were recycled according to a report released by the Seminole County recycling office Monday. A total of 739.6 tons — 1.4 million lbs. — were separated into plastic bins for recycling in the unincorporated areas of the county and six

Sanford residents proved to be enthusiastic recyclers. A total of 41.6 tons of garbage were separated for recycling by city residents during the first month of the program last month.

"We're very pleased," said Gary Cinder, director of the Seminole County Environmental Services

Department. "We are well on our way."

Lake Mary charter unchanged

LAKE MARY - City Manager John Litton has rejected five residents' request to place a charter amendment on the ballot, a move spurred by an agreement between the city and Seminole County for the Lake Mary Boulevard beautification project.

Litton said this morning he rejected the petitions because the actions they demanded did not conform to the city charter. One petition called for an amendment requiring a referendum on any capital expenditures extending beyond one year, similar to a charter amendment approved by Longwood voters last month. The Lake Mary city charter does not allow for referenda on budget items or capital programs, he said.

The other petition asked for a citizena initiative on whether the city should take jurisdicof the interlocal agreement the city has agreed to in exchange for the county's help in paying for the boulevard landscaping. That petition was rejected on the same grounds, Litton said. The petitions were signed by

Iraq threatens terrorism

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia - U.S. warplanes today struck deep inside Iraq, hunting down missile laun-chers and hammering Saddam Hussein's crack troops. Iraq vowed vengeance, calling for terror attacks

on allied targets worldwide.

The USS Missouri's 16-inch guns boomed again overnight, silencing a troublesome Iraqi artillery battery in Kuwait with six 2,000-pound shells, the U.S. military said. On Sunday, the battleship's big guns were used in combat for the first time since the Korean War.

Baghdad was rocked during the night by another allied bombardment, AP correspondent Salah Nasrawi reported from the Iraqi capital. He said smoke and fire reached into the sky and terrifled residents fled to bomb shelters.

Nasrawi quoted travelers se say-ing Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit, 90 miles north of Baghdad, had also been under intense attack. Baghdad radio said starting

Wednesday, civilians will no longer be able to buy heating oil, gasoline, cooking gas or other fuels. Gasoline rationing was already in effect. Iraq's Foreign Minister Tariz Azi in a letter to Iraqi newspapers today, said Iraq's civilian casualties have risen to 428 killed and more than 650 wounded. Official radio reported 373 more air raids during

the night, and said residential areas

Ten service agencies in county looking for additional assistance

SANFORD - With the recent economic downturn, local social service agencies say, more and more Seminole Countians are without food and shelter.

The ailing economy is only com-pounding a need that has long gone unmet, said Irene Brown, director of the Sanford Christian Sharing

Faced with serving an increasing number of hungry and homeless,

the directors of social service agencles in Seminole County have formed Seminole Housing Advocacy Coalition (SHAC) to address the area's need for affordable housing.

About 10 agencies formed the coalition in August, and are now opening membership to other agencies and businesses they hope will add brainpower and energy to SHAC's cause.

"We 10 women didn't intend to be the saviors of Seminole County," Brown said. "We just wanted to get people to recognize the need for affordable housing that we have in Seminole County.

Social service agencies have been struggling to fill needs not satisfied by government assistance, Brown said. For example, a man or woman who is laid off would not be able to receive food stamps for six weeks after receiving a final paycheck.

"What do they do in the mean-time?" Brown asked. "There's a gap, and unfortunately, some very decent people fall into that hole."

Over the past few weeks, Brown said, the number of people seeking help at the sharing center has dramatically increased. During an average week, the center normally serves 10 people each of the five three-hour days it is open, she said. On Jan. 28, the center helped 39 families, she said, and 26 families received help Jan. 30.
In Longwood, the South Seminole Christian Sharing Center has also seen an increased number of people

looking for help with rent, director Angle Romagosa said. Last year the center in Longwood gave \$30,000 in rent and utilities assistance, she

But the sharing center cannot do enough to help many of the people who seek assistance there. Brown said. Only this year has money been made available to help clients pay rent, but the center has only \$2,000 a year for such help, she said.

Optimism about economy jumps

GAINESVILLE - The start of the Persian Gulf War improved Floridians' optimism in the national economy, while the rest of

the nation reported only a temporary rise before dropping off again, a University of Florida survey showed.

"Responses to the survey before Jan. 16 (when the war started) show an index of only 66, while for Jan. 16 and after the index is 78," said David Densiow, an economist with UF's Bureau of Economic and Business Research.

As a result of the rise after the war began, the Florida

Consumer Confidence Index reached 73 for the month of January, up from 68 in November, Denslow said.

Floridians' optimism remained high during the second week of the attack, while the national confidence index that hit 75 during the first week of the war alumped to 62, Denalow said.

The first week of the war boosted Florida's index to 76, up from 66 during the first half of January. But, in contrast to the national drop, Floridians' optimism soared to 81 points Jan.23-28.

Gunter reappointed, Messersmith ousted

TALLAHASSEE - in a decision filled with political overtones, longtime Public Service Commission member Gerald Gunter was reappointed but a Republican counterpart lost his seat on the utility-regulating panel.

The nine-member Public Service Nominating Council on Monday selected Terry Deason, an assistant in the public counsel consumer advocate's office, to replace Frank

Messeramith. Messersmith had served only since June, when he was

appointed by then-Gov. Bob Martinez. Both Gunter and Deason will serve four-year terms on the PSC, if confirmed by the state Senate. PSC members, who regulate electric, telephone, water and other utilities in Florida, carn \$90,404 a year.

Men arrested for breaking horse's leg

TALLAHASSEE - Florida agriculture officials say the arrest of two Illinois men for breaking a horse's leg may give investigators a lead on a nationwide ring of animal cruelty and insurance fraud.

The two men were arrested Saturday night as they left the Canterbury Farms stable near Gainesville. Undercover investigators from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services had watched them break a thoroughbred horse's right rear leg with a crowbar at about 10:10 p.m., said Lt. John O'Brien, head of the department's law enforcement

O'Brien said Monday that his department received a tip about the men and had them under surveillance when the incident occurred — but were too far away to stop them.

Three drown after picnic

PEMBROKE PINES — Three people leaving a family picnic in a driving rain storm drove into a park lake and drowned after apparently mistaking the water for a parking lot, police said. Police on Monday were still investigating what happened during the accident Bunday at C.B. Smith Park.

The compact car rolled alowly down an embankment, alid into the water and flipped before sinking in 13 feet of muddy brown water, witnesses said.

The bodies of the three victims - two men and a woman were found in the back seat, where air pockets may have formed before the car completely filled with water, police said. The victims were the uniter Hector Rondon and passengers Gladys Cobo and Jose Alcantara, all of Hislesh.

A fourth person, Carlos Doque, of Hollywood, escaped through the car's front passenger window. He was examined at Humana Hospital Pembroks and released.

Florida's dropout rate drops

TALLAHASSEE - Florida's dropout rate has remained essentially unchanged for three years, Education Commissioner Betty Castor said as she released statistics on

every high school in the state. During the 1969-90 school year, 65 of every 1,000 teens dropped out for a total of 31,464 students in grades nine through 12 leaving school, Castor said Monday. That rate of 6.47 percent was a slight improvement over the year before when the statewide dropout rate was 7.54 percent.

"It's just frustrating that we cannot get below that 30,000 mark," she said as she released statistics on all 340 high schools and 67 districts in Florida.

Although Castor said the latest dropout figures are the best in six years, a letter she wrote every school board, superintendent and high school principal said "the state dropout rate has remained largely unchanged for the last three years."

Despite the progress made in some areas. the statewide figures "continue to be unacceptable," she told reporters Monday, adding that releasing the progress of every school will "drive individual school im-

Fifty-four high schools were listed on an "honor roll" for cutting their dropout rate from 1988-89 in half or better. Five school districts - Hillsborough, Bay, Franklin, Collier and Holmes - all reported that same dramatic improvement.

Improvements were reported by 211 of Hispanic students dropped out.

the state's 340 high schools and 53 of the 67 school districts.

About 100 schools have met the state's goal for 1995 of reducing dropouts to 4 percent. Sixteen districts are at or below that statewide goal.

Even though whites make up 64 percent of the student population, 56 percent of the 31,464 dropouts were white. Just over 28 percent were black, even though only 22 percent of high school students are black. Some 14.5 percent of the dropouts were Hispanic, even though Hispanics make up 11.7 percent of the student population.

In other words, while 58 of every 1,000 white students dropped out, 83 of every 1,000 black students and 81 of every 1,000

Opposition dwindles on AIDS testing

TALLAHASSEE - Medical advances in the treatment of acquired immune deficiency syndrome may mean a bill requiring mandatory reporting of positive AIDS tests might face less opposition in the Legislature this year, a lawmaker said. However, Rep. Lois Frankel,

said Monday that funding may derail the bill.

Frankel, who sponsored the state's 1968 anti-discrimination AIDS law, has opposed statemandated reporting in past years. Historically, reporting has been required for sexually transmitted diseases so the state can notify partners in an effort to contain the spread of the dis-

But AIDS has been treated differently in Florida and elsewhere because officials thought some people would de-cide not to be tested out of the fear that positive results would become public, costing them their jobs, insurance policies and homes.

Some things have changed, Frankel said. There is more motivation to test now because there are more medical options

Frankel said there is still "bias and hysteria" about AIDS in society and that people living in small communities, as opposed to big cities, might be justifiably worried about having their condition known. dition known.

She said she is researching the issue but had not yet reached a conclusion. However, even if the issues of confidentiality and public trust are resolved, the question of cost-effectiveness remains, she said. In a tight budget year, even a \$1 million price tag for the program, especially if the money come out of the appropriations for AIDS treatment, would be too much. Frankel said.

"The bottom line is it comes down to a funding issue," she

FORT LAUDERDALE - Proving you're poor in Florida has become a full-time job that is discouraging some destitute Floridians from seeking state benefits.

"You have to secure a mountain of paperwork," said Susan Silverman, one of two Legal Aid paralegals in Broward County who help people solve their problems with the welfare system.

Some welfare forms require the signatures of bosses who fired the applicants, or landlords who evicted them. Others demand that even a neighbor who lends a few dollars sign a statement.





No 'adult' businesses for 60 days

LONGWOOD — No adult en-tertainment businesses will be allowed to settle in Longwood for the next 60 days following the city commission's adoption of an emergency moratorium last

night. Not that this city is a den of adult bookstores and massage parlors. No such business is now located within the city limits, City Planner Chris Nagle said. but the city is revisiting its already strict codes to make them more uniform with those

in surrounding communities.
The commission adopted an emergency ordinance placing a 60-day moratorium on permits for adult entertainment establishments to allow the commission time to review per manent standards for such busi-

The Lake Mary city commission in January adopted an ordinance limiting adult theaters, bookstores, massage pariors and clubs to M-2 soning and requiring a 1,500-foot buffe between such businesses and churches, schools, bars or simi-lar establishments. The Sanford city commission has asked city staff to research adult enter-tainment ordinances in sur-

rounding cities. Longwood's moratorium de-fines adult entertainment establishments as "taverns. lounges, package stores, indoor recreation facilities, or other establishments, businesses or clubs selling or allowing the on-site or off-site consumption of alcoholic beverages or other in-toxicants."

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

Stalinist tactics

The progressive disintegration of the Soviet Union has reached a critical point.

Unable to quell the separatist movements in the Baltic republics and elsewhere, Mikhail Gorbachev has allowed the unleashing of the Soviet Army and Interior Ministry troops to crush peaceful demonstrations and democratic institutions. The Kremlin's bloodstained crackdown in Lithuania and Latvia is a tragic throwback to the Stalinist tactics that held the Soviet empire together for seven decades.

But, at this advanced stage of the reform movement begun by Gorbachev, it is far from certain that brutal repression alone can stifle the drive toward political liberalization and regional independence.

Moscow's campaign to quash dissent is being challenged defiantly by powerful noncommunist leaders such as Boris Yeltsin and by hundreds of thousands of citizens who have poured into the streets to protest a return to dictatorial rule. Meantime, in Riga, the elected government is raising a local militia composed of young men who have refused to be drafted into the Soviet army. In response, Gorbachev has threatened to impose direct presidential rule on Latvia, dissolving all local control.

The prospect of armed clashes between the Soviet military and local self-defense forces protecting the rebellious republics stirs fears of a bloody civil war that could spread swiftly

As president of the Russian Federation, which encompasses half of the Soviet popula-tion, Yeltsin poses the biggest threat to the Kremlin's authority. Unlike Gorbachev. Yeltsin was democratically elected and thus has a popular mandate and base of supportwhich the Soviet dictator lacks.

In recent days Yeltsin has fanned the civil strife by appealing to Russian men in the Soviet army not to follow orders to attack peaceful civilians in the Baltic. He has become the country's leading voice for self-determination in Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, enraging the reactionary Communist Party leaders arrayed around Gorbachev. And, in his most incendiary challenge to the Kremlin, Yeltain has proposed creating a Russian army or national guard that could defend the autonomy of the republic against the central authorities.

Yeitsin has vowed to use the considerable economic and political power of Russia to block a return to totalitaranism. Utlimately, the growing confrontation between Yeltain and Gorbachev may be the vehicle that brings the crisis to a climax.

The Western democracies have relatively little leverage over the course of develop-ments amid the spreading economic collapse and political chaos of the decaying communist order. Nonetheless, Gorbachev must understand that he cannot have both the crackdown and Western assistance. Regrettably, however, he appears willing to sacrifice his entire reform drive in a bid to preserve the iron flat that the Kremlin has wielded since Czarist times.


They never let us eat any.

War is a very dirty business

BOSTON — The newest victims of this war wear no dog tags. They carry no proof of nationality. They espouse no conviction that God or jutice or history is on their side. Indeed they take no side.

Yet the oil-soaked cormorants of the Persian Gulf have become an early warning sign of a massive assault on nature. Stiff before the camera, dying by the thousands, they are now the "poster species" for a war being waged against the environment as well as the enemy.

First the birds, the Persian Gulf watchers tell us, then perhaps the dugongs, the sperm whales, the sea turtles, the mugger crocodiles, the shrimp. Caught by the huge Saddam-made oil slick cozing its way down the Persian Guif, the sea life will provide proof of Gen. Schwarzkopf's axiom: "Everyone knows that war is a dirty business."

They will provide proof that the booty of war — oii — has now become a weapon of war, proof that the "dirty business" has become pollution and the target is not just the enemy. It's an entire sea and its inhabitants.

But they will not tell us if this is just the nature of war, or a matter of environmental terrorism. Is there such a thing as a war crime against nature? Should there be?

The environment has suffered war wounds before. The Iraqi oil assault against the Saudi water supply has its precedents.

In our own Civil War, Gen. Sherman waged his acorched-earth policy against the soil of the South as well as the people. In the Vietnam War, we deliberately used Agent Orange to remove the green "camoullage" of that country, never mind the ecology. Again and again, enemies try to destroy not just each other, but each other's turf.

What is different now is, in part, the greening of our consciousness. No one who watched the oil spill in Alaska, the cleanup of the Exxon Valdez, can be unaffected by a deliberate, one-man assault on a sea. No one in the recycling, rain-forest-saving, conservation mind-set can fail to be appalled by such deliberate "wasting."

We know nature is more fragile and see ourselves as more destructive. However terrible our capacity to kill each other, our capacity to kill nature is final. If we are not wholly self-destructive, apocalyptic, then even in war there are lines to be drawn, rules to be made.

Such laws have existed and do still. During the biblical era, soldiers were not permitted to cut down the trees that bore fruit, even in enemy territory. In the Middle Ages it was against the rules of war to poison wells.

At times, the idea that there are rules to war sounds ludicrous. It is permissible to kill the enemy leader by bombs from 30,000 feet, but not by a pistol from three feet. A Marine can shoot an enemy, but carries a card telling him not to harm the man once he surrenders.

We have, through conventions, codified some of the do's and don'ts of war as if it could be tamed, made rational. Nations have promised, among other things, not to torture prisoners, rape women, bomb hospitals, initiate the use of poison gas.

Everyone of the

Geneva Conventions has been broken by enemies, including the current enemy. Saddam Hussein. But they have served the purpose of de-fining some minimal standard, established a rule of law and a definition of outlaws. They are the way we define that curious concept "war

morality." In 1977, there was an attempt to add a protocol to the Geneva Conventions to protect, the envi-

fered war wounds beronment by prohibiting "methods of warfare likely to cause such damage and thereby jeopardise the health or survival of the population...." Neither we nor the Iraqis signed this law.

It's true that an international body which cannot stop war cannot always enforce the conditions of war. The fear of Mutually Assured Destruction — MAD — may have done more is prevent a nuclear holocaust than moral qualms or codes.

War by its nature kills. Before this is over, oil refineries may be set ablase, spewing layers of soot across the Northern Hemisphere. The desert ecology may be shattered by tanks.

But even in the devastating business of killing each other, there may be enough sanity for a consensus, enough sense of preservation to at least have a rule on the book and in our minds against waging war on the very environment we must share when the war is

This is what we know from counting the bodies of the cormorants. Killing a sea ten't just an act of war against the designated enemy. It's a crime against humanity and that innocent bystander: nature.

War finds medical people are scarce

WASHINGTON — Add another casualty to the Persian Gulf war — the entire U.S. health-care system.

The call-up of more than 60,000 medical professionals with their reserve units to buttress Operation Desert Storm has left hospitals, clinics and laboratories short staffed. Some rural communities have lost not just the best doctor or the favorite doctor. but the only doctor.

The American medical establishment, shorthanded and overworked before Saddam Hussein became a household word, is now stag-gering from the loss of doctors and nurses. Reservists have been called to raian Gulf report to military hospitals in the United States so that full-time military staffers at those hospitals can go to the front.

group lost more than half One physician group in rural South Carolina lost more its staff. than half of its staff. A hospital in Ten-

nessee had two physicians who specialize in rehabilitation, and both were called up.

A small clinic in Nebraska sent its only physical therapist to Operation Descri Storm, leaving patients in pain and administrators acrambling for a qualified replacement.

The shortages are not limited to small, rural facilities. In the nation's cities, hospitals have sent doctors and nurses to the war. Often the medical slots are filled, but not with the same caliber of professional.

At Mt. Sinai Hospital in Chicago, the head emergency room nurse left her post for Desert Storm. The head operating room nurse and other nurses at the hospital could be shipped out any day.

One hospital was too short staffed to keep a constant eye on a disoriented patient with a head injury. State law prevented the hospital from locking the patient in his room to keep him from wandering off. So, a hospital representative told us, off the record, that the staff tied a bedsheet to the doorknob and then anchored the door to a hospital cart outside

Covering the vacancies is no small task There was a nationwide dearth of qualified professionals before the call-ups. Many administrators won't say it publicly, but patient care is suffering. Privately they worry that catastrophe looms if the war drags on too long and the wounded are added to the mix.

"We're just not ready to take care of them beyond medical stabilization and immediate acute care." said a spokeswoman for the Murer Group, a firm representing more than 500 hospitals, nursing homes and clinics. "Our system just couldn't take a sudden flow of injured soldiers."

The Department of Veterans Affairs and military hospitals would provide the primary care for wounded soldiers, but the VA is already acouting for extra beds in private hospitals when the military hospitals run out

of room. Kaiser-Permanente, the nation's largest health maintenance organization, says its hospitals are full and short staffed. Already, 120 of its nurses and 30 of its doctors have

been called up for Operation Desert Storm. Other experts say that not only is there a lack of space for the wounded, but there is

also no plan for long-term care and re-habilitation therapy for soldiers.

We recently reported that the VA does not have a credible program for treating head-injured soldiers. Now, as the Persian Gulf war saps the strength of the medical establish-ment, it looks like soldiers won't be the only ones waiting for a doctor.

Bush asking banking reform

WASHINGTON - Faced with an evermounting toll of bank and savings institution collapses, the Bush administration is proposing the most sweeping package of financial system changes in more than 50

If adopted by Congress intact, the package would propel fundamental and irrevocable changes in financial services industries touching nearly every American who bor-TOWS OF SAVES.

Longstanding laws barring commercial and industrial companies from owning banks would crumble, as would the division of banking from the insurance and securities industries.

And, for the first time since the Insurance Corp., have been postponed. establishment of federal deposit insurance in 1934, government guarantees to bank customers would shrink rather than

The administration also would lift restrictions on interstate banking dating to the 1920s, allowing giants like Citicorp and Bank of America to establish branches to compete with local institutions.

The core of the administration's proposal, a 550-page study prepared by the Treasury Department, was being released today, although most of its provisions have been known for weeks.

Today's study focuses on long-term changes. Specific proposals for curing banking's most pressing short-term problem, the weakness of the Federal Deposit

The fund has been depleted by more than 800 failures over the past four years, and banking trade groups are discussing ways to replenish it without turning to the taxpay-

Advocates of the Bush plan say it is long overdue. Innovations in the delivery of financial services have cut banks off from some of their best customers. Wealthy depositors open money market accounts with brokerage houses. Large companies isaue their own commercial paper rather than borrowing from banks.

Opponents, however, say it could lead to a dangerous concentration of financial power. depriving local communities of control of their financial institutions.



DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia -Two weeks into the war with Iraq, even the Navy brass was beginning to concede center stage to the Air Force.

This is really and truly an Air Force effort ... and we're participating and we're trying to add to it as best we can," said Rear Adm. Douglas J. Katz.

But on Sunday, the venerable USS Missouri snuck up close to the Kuwaiti coastline and lobbed seven 2,000-pound shells from its 16-inch guns at an Iraqi command and control center near the Saudi border. The 47-year-old battleship's thunderous performance served notice that the Navy, too, is a major player in Operation Desert Storm.

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
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Police beat supporters at trial

JOHANNESBURG. South Africa — Prosecutors at the kidnapping and assault trial of Winnie Mandela today tried to head off a defense bid for dismissal. Police later swung clubs to hold back her enthusiastic supporters outside, injuring several neonle.

The melee broke out when a confident-looking Mrs. Mandela emerged with her husband, African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela, from an initial court session. They were greeted by about 200 cheering supporters, and Mrs. Mandela responded with clenched list salutes.

Police, batiling to restrain the excited crowd, used clubs to disperse some of the chanting people. The injuries appeared

The case against Mrs. Mandela threatens her credibility as a black activist and possibly that of her husband. It could even hinder political negotiations between this country's white minority government and the black majority.

The ANC, the country's leading opposition group, has called the charges against Mrs. Mandela harassment by white authorities

Kremlin bolstering joint patrols

MOSCOW — The Kremlin is increasing by more than 50 percent its new joint military-police patrols, wh⊋h have detained about 5,000 people nationwide since they were launched last week, officials said today.

The announcement came the day after the Kremlin widehed its law-and-order crackdown with the announcement of strong new measures to light organized crime.

The joint patrols, however, have been viewed by reformers as a sign of creeping dictatorship.

In Monday's decree, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev ordered the creation of a new "main directorate" within the Interior Ministry to fight organized crime, corruption and drug dealing.

Drug bosses ask extradition ban

BOGOTA, Colombia — A day before an assembly begins rewriting Colombia's 104-year-old constitution, Medellin drug busses asked assembly members Monday to declare extraditions to the United States illegal.

The cocaine traffickers insisted that their recent hostagetaking and murders were not meant to intimidate the constitutional assembly, according to a statement bearing the letterhead "The Extraditables," the cocaine cartel's pseudonym.

Rain forest activist shot to death

SAO PAULO. Brazil — A union movement has blamed ranchers or miners for the assassination of a labor leader who clashed with them while defending workers and safeguarding the Amazon rain forest.

Expedito Ribeiro de Souza, president of the Farm Workers Union in Rio Maria in the northern state of Para, was shot as he left his office, the National Rural Workers Movement announced Monday. The father of nine children was killed Saturday.

He was one of more than a dozen rural activists slain since the beginning of 1990 in the vast Amazon region, where ranchers and loggers have destroyed 10 percent of the fragile, ecologically important rain forest.

The New York-based human rights group. Americas Watch, on Monday expressed its "deepest concern" about the murder. It called on the Brazilian government to investigate.

Major Brazilian newspapers, headlining the killing, compared Souza to Amazon campaigner Chico Mendes, who was fatally shot in 1988 in a western Amazon town. A cattle rancher and his son were convicted of the Mendes murder.

"All we can say at this moment is that Souza was shot in the head four times by one gunman, probably hired by ranchers or gold miners." Isaias Vedovatto, a director of the Rural Workers Movement said by telephone.

He said Souza "was always denouncing ranchers who destroy the rain forest to create pasture for their cattle and who hire gunmen to expel and often kill landless workers who occupy their land. He was also an enemy of gold miners who pollute the rivers with mercury."

In April, Souza requested police protection in the aftermath of the murders of four rural activists from Rio Maria, including two sons of the union's assassinated former president, Joao Canuto.

Trial underway for Chinese protest leader

BEIJING — A Chinese court today began trying the first of four leaders of the 1989 democracy movement who are charged with plotting to overthrow the Communist government.

The proceeding marked a new phase in a monthlong series of trials of several dozen leading participants in the movement.

Most of the others were charged with counterrevolutionary incitement and sentenced to up to seven years in prison. Today's defendant, 29-year-old Chen Xiaoping, is one of only four charged so far with sedition. It is a crime punishable by death.

Chen, a law lecturer at the University of Politics and Law, helped organize a Beijing citizens group that joined in 1989's student-led protests for democratic reform. He was arrested shortly after the June 1989 army attack that killed hundreds of protesters and ushered in a new cra of hard-line Marxism.

Human rights activists have suggested the Chinese, stung by earlier Western outrage over the crackdown, are trying to resolve the cases now while the world is preoccupied with the Persian Gulf War.

A heavy contingent of plainclothes and uniformed police took up posts around Beijing's main courihouse today and barred foreigners from coming near until early afternoon, when a single police car with its red lights flashing pulled out of the court compound. It apparently was carrying Chen back to Qincheng Prison, where political prisoners are held.

DEAR READER: Diabetes is one of the most common causes of impotence, regardless of whether the disease is controlled by diet or requires medicine, such as pills or insulin. Diabetes is associated with premature arteriosclerosis, progressive arterial narrowing due to the accumulation of plaque, which

- like rust in an iron pipe - plugs blood vessels. Because erections depend on a free-flow of blood into the penis. arteriosclerosis often causes sexual malfunction when this supply of blood is reduced by plaque. Aside from the purely physical consequences of impotence, the affliction may cause severe psychological trauma. too. Impotent men are frequently ashamed; they quite naturally believe that their very manliness is diminished. Unfortunately, they may be too em-barrassed to seek medical assistance.

I recommend your husband swallow his fears and get honest with the doctor.

One fact is clear: The situation is not likely to improve as long as your husband tries to "tough it out" by refusing to seek help. He owes it to himself - and, probably, your marriage - to share his concerns with the


Responding to South's overcall, North pushed with an aggressive limit raise inviting game. South accepted, but he had to catch a little luck after discovering the bad trump split.

East won the ace of clubs and returned a low diamond. Declarer took the ace in dummy and played a low trump. When East showed out, South had to play just right. The first step was to win the spade ace and play a heart to dummy's 10. East took the ace and played another diamond, declarer winning the

ting.
The play from this point may seem sophisticated, but in fact declarer cannot fail as long as he leaves himself in a favorable position. So declarer played king of clubs, shedding a diamond from dummy, and ruffed a club. He next cashed dummy's heart

king and ruffed a heart, and then ruffed his last diamond in dummy. That left nothing but trumps in the South and West hands, so declarer led the 10 of spades from dummy and played low. West had to win the trick and lead back into South's K-9 to concede the game-going tricks.

Why is it that declarer cannot fail? His alternative play after winning the diamond king would be to finesse again in hearts and then cash the heart king, pitching a diamond. He could then ruff a diamond, play king of clubs and ruff a club, and play as before. It's hard to admit. but even Willy Nilly would have made this contract, unless he gave up and resignedly cashed both the ace and the king of trumps right away.
