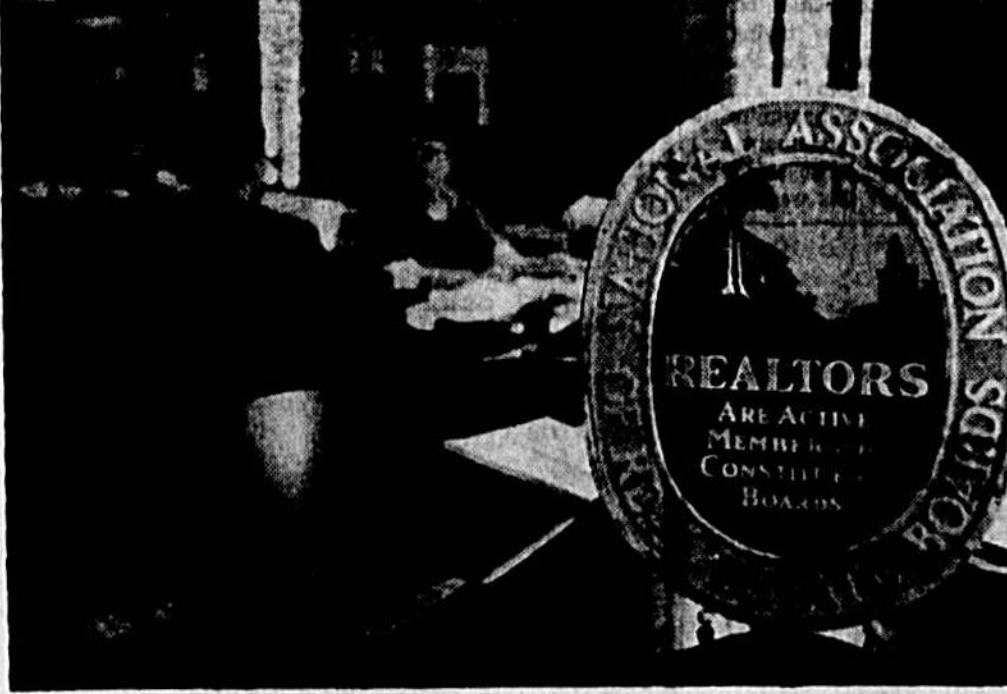
Television 'Louses Up' Own Show

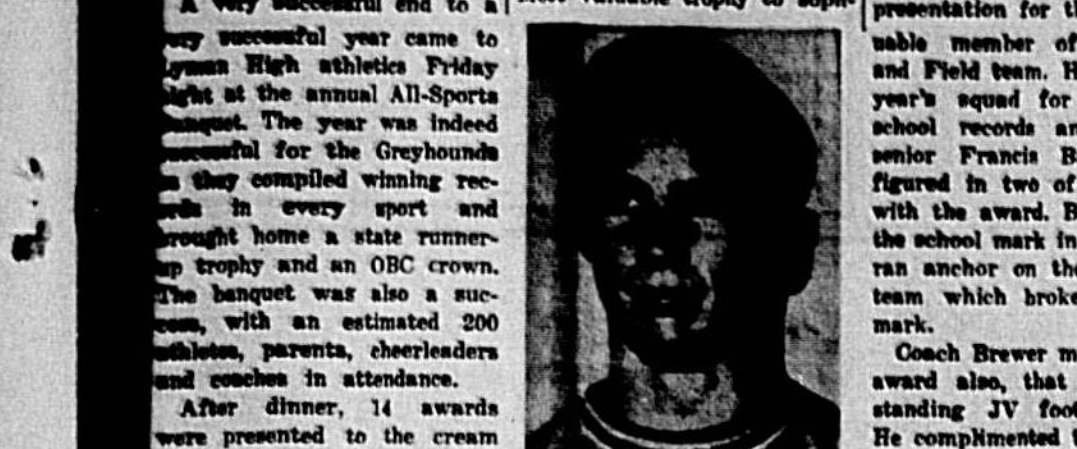

Commiss Slam Marines

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops made three ground attacks on U.S. Marines along South Vietnam's northern frontier Sunday and sent big rockets smashing into fuel and ammunition stores at the headquarters of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division.

The U.S. Command said the Marines repulsed the attacks near the Saoh and Con Thien, killing 127 North Vietnamese soldiers and capturing 38 weapons. Twelve Marines were reported killed and 49 wounded.

But the enemy's 100-pound rockets did "heavy" damage to the ammunition stores at Camp Evans, the 1st Air Cav headquarters 16 miles northwest of Hue, as well as "light" damage to fuel stores, material and facilities. "Light" personnel casualties also were reported.

Heavy damage to the ammunition stores means that so much of it was blown up that the men at the camp could not continue their mission until their supply was replenished.

U.S. officials say five divisions of allied and North Vietnamese forces face each other in the northern sector on almost a man for man basis. The U.S. Command believes that enough allied troops are on hand to handle anything the enemy may try in the five provinces below the demilitarized zone.

In the heaviest attack Sunday, opened up on a small Marine unit sweeping a road two miles southeast of the Khe Sanh combat base in the northwest corner of South Vietnam.

Marine tanks quickly reinforced the ground troops to help beat back the enemy troops, who the Marines said left 86 dead on the battlefield. Eight

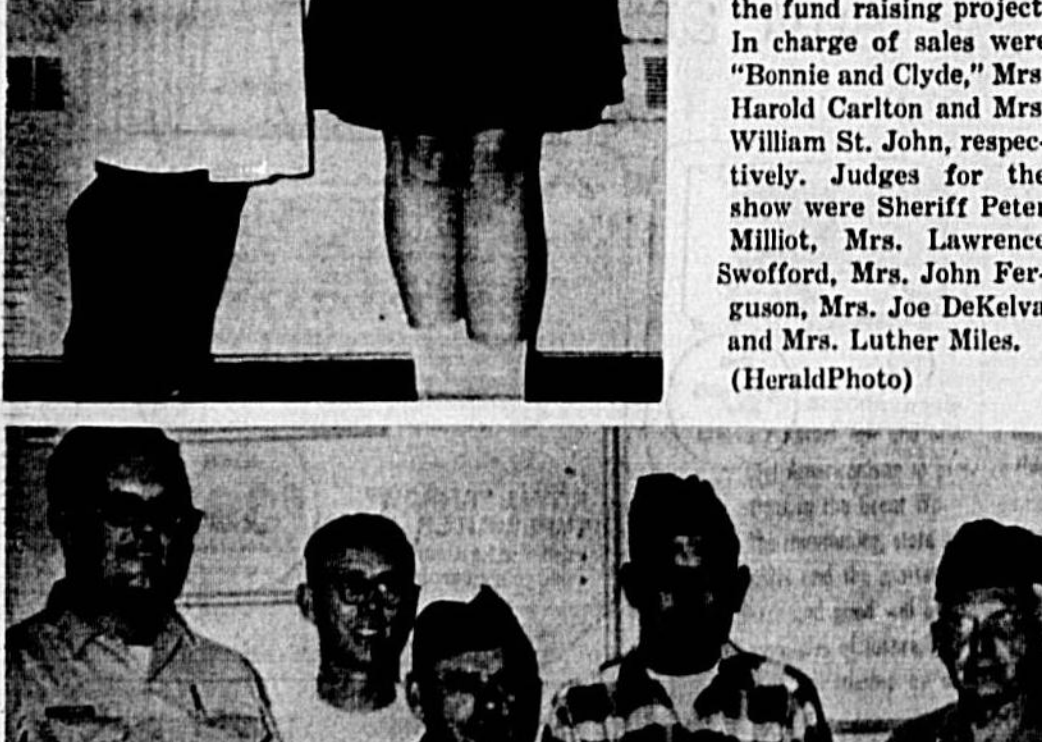

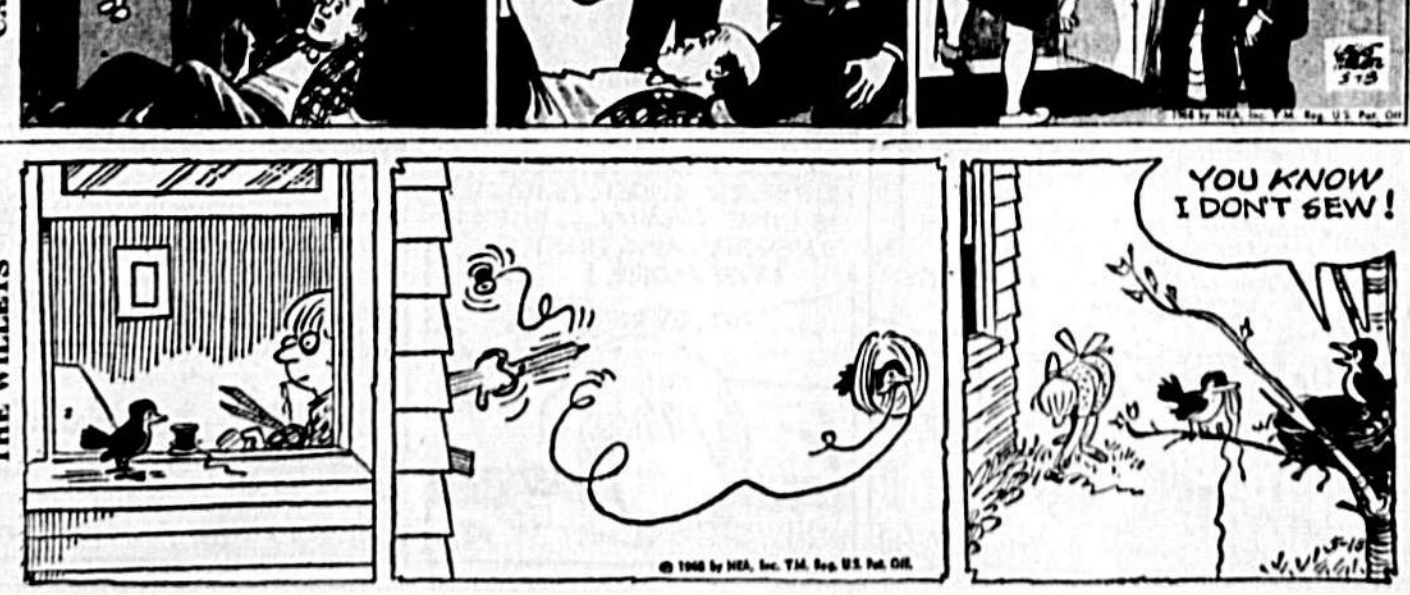

DeGaulle Faces Biggest Revolt In 3 Decades

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle's popularity was on the wane as he prepared to leave office in 1968. The 73-year-old leader of France's Fifth Republic was facing a revolt of unprecedented scale in the country.

De Gaulle returned home 14 days early from his state visit to Brussels, called back by the situation which began as a strike over a new law on strikes and ballooned into the largest strike wave in Europe since the 1930s.

De Gaulle conferred with officials in charge of national security and held a long meeting with Premier Georges Pompidou. Information Minister Georges Gorre told newsmen various measures concerning public order were being examined.

There was no indication what those measures might be, or when they might be employed. But De Gaulle gave no indication that he planned to advance his radio-television address to the nation, which was scheduled for Friday.

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Smathers' Supporters Slam Scott Kelly

Blasts of anger were heard today from Seminoles' two delegates on the Smathers cause as they took the floor to support the court action taken by former Sen. Scott Kelly to have the state removed from next Tuesday's primary ballot.

Robert G. Petree, of English Estates, termed the deliberate timing of the bringing of the suit unfortunate. Apparently Mr. Kelly wishes to deprive the people of Florida of an opportunity to cast their ballot in support of a slate composed of such distinguished leaders as Spessard Holland,

Hayden Burns, George Smathers, Ben Hill Griffin and others.

At the same time, Mrs. Sheila Roberts, of Sanford, slapped at the ex-Lake Wales resident by pointing out, "Mr. Kelly's quest for political power has been denied three times in recent years by the voters of Florida. It appears now that he is attempting to use the courts to eliminate his opposition for him."

Mrs. William L. Kirk told The Herald today, "I was chosen as an alternate delegate to support Senator Smathers for president of the

United States. To me he is one of the most capable men in our nation today. The favorite son plan is as American as apple pie and I plan to go to Chicago and support Senator Smathers."

Kelly's suit, filed in court yesterday in Tallahassee, brought a ruling from a circuit judge there ordering the secretary of State Tom Adams to remove the slate from next Tuesday's primary election ballot or to show cause in court Monday why he not.

Of the opinion of the court, Petree said, "I think the opinion ignores what has happened."

Mrs. Roberts stated her confidence in the Supreme Court will rule favorably on our slate and that next Tuesday the voters of Florida will once again return Mr. Kelly to political oblivion.

"It is my intention, if elected, to go to Chicago," she added. "I shall vote for whom I subsequently released by the Senate. I shall vote for whom I then consider to be the best candidate. I am sure that all of us on the slate have every intention of fulfilling our obligation to support him until such time as he returns to this committee."

"This has traditionally been true in favorite son delegations and there is no reason to believe that 1968 will be any different. Personally, I resent this attack by Mr. Kelly on my integrity and the integrity of the state of delegates pledged to George Smathers," Mrs. Roberts said.

Far from abating, the strike which has idled more than six million workers was still spreading. A Paris newspaper estimated about half of France's 15 million workers would be away from their jobs by nightfall.

Sumner by President Charles de Gaulle, the ministers approved an amnesty bill at a 25-minute meeting. Information Minister Georges Gorre announced the bill, which all but guaranteed the delegates for qualification.
