



Administrator Frances E. Roumillat III announced that all plans have been approved by all agencies concerned and all permits have been granted, such as drading by the Internal Improvement

Initial costs of the building progra will be borne by loans from local banks. Fund trustees. Bids will be opened by the Authority at 11 a.m. June 19. Roumillat said the successful bidder will be allowed 300 days to construct the port facility. The Port Authority has acquired the 125-acre site on the west side of the St. Johns River, north of the SCL, 1-4 and Hwy. 17-92 bridges, across from the Florida Power and Light Company pow-er plant
