Florida shipments, however, increase in freight rate for every mile west of Minneapolis,

Harvey's London Speech Was With Coolidge Approval

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25,-Col Geo. Harvey spoke with the entire approval of President Coolidge and Secretary of State Hughes when he informed the world last night in his farewell speech in London that the United States is willing to help Europe settle her troubles if Europe wishes it.

The ambassador said, however, that the United States does not intend to "kick the door down" in roder to get into a position of helpfulness. That is the Coolige-Hughes policy. Given the proper invitation, accompanied by manifestatio nof a sincers desire to better conditions, America is willing to help Europe settle the reparations problem and any others that are now keeping the old world embroiled.

Co. Harvey spoke in London to an English audience, but his remarks were really addressed across the English channel to the French government, which eleven months ago summarily snubbed Secretary Hughes' auggestion for adjusting the knotty reparations problem, and accompanied it with a virtual invitation to Washington to mind its own business.

France's brusk rejection of the Hughes proposal-for an economic commission of experts to determine the amount of reparations Germany can pay and still live-has for eleven months kept Washington completely out of all associations with the reparations controversy and Washington considers the reparations problem as the crux of the whole European
