Parents Level Criticism On

A group of some 25 to 26 parents of Southside Elemenlary School p upils dropped three major problems into the laps of Seminole County School Board members Thursday afternoon and none o them were resolved.

The group wanted bus transportation, more police protection for children at major thoroughfare crossings and the starting time changed from 8 a.m. to a later hour. Recently Southside was made a "walking - area" school but the parents complained that it was extremely dangerous for elementary school children, particularly first and second graders, to havet o walk on such streets as Sanford, Melloqville and Celery Avenues with no sidewalks and traffic lights, particularly during winter months when it is still dark when some would have to leave home.

The elimination of bus iransportation, parents told the Board, has created a traflic problem.

The board explained that according to state law pupils who reside within a two-mile radius of the school cannot be transported by school buses. This rule, it was explained, has been in effect for some time but this year it is being enforced and as a result some 1,448 courtesy rides were elim-

While the board agreed that the Sanford Police Department has been extremely cooperative and performing efficient service, more protection was needed at crossings adjacent to the school. It said it would call this to the attention of the City, Meanwhile, mothers agreed to investigate


