## Kharkov Seizure Offset By Soviet Gains At Smolensk

### Germans May Have To Remove Reserves From South Russia To Central Front

(By Associated Press)

Spectacular new gains on the central front, where the Red army captured at least 47 towns toward Smolensk, threatened to offset somewhat the German victory at Kharkov although the situation in the south remained extremely critical today.

With the vital Smolensk bastion imperiled by an approach of four Russian columns—the nearest was reported only 50 to 60 miles away—it appeared likely the Germans would soon have to shift some reserves from the Kharkov zone.

Admitting the fall of Kharkov, the Russians reported violent but were continuing in the Siversk River area with the Germans still gaining bloody losses but claimed gains around Rostov and Stalinoz Rosta.

The Russians admitted withdrawal from the great industrial city of Kharkov only 24 hours after the Germans had claimed its capture in a smashing counter-offensive that has pulled the Russian back on a huge arc in southern Russia, an offensive carried by 225,000 German troops, nearly half of them fresh divisions rushed up from France.

"Our troops, after many days of fierce fighting by order of the command, evacuated the town of Kharkov," Monday, said the Russian midnight communique as recorded by the Soviet monitor.

The Germans claimed Kharkov fell on Sunday.

The Russian communique made no mention of Kharkov, which they had wrested from the Germans February 19 in a major triumph of their winter campaign.

The Russians had battled furiously in the suburbs of Kharkov in a vain attempt to stem the strategic center against an crushing attack by huge numbers of German infantry and tanks.

To the south, in the Middle Donets area, the Russians told of stubborn fighting against tank-supported German attacks, while the Berlin radio declared the counter-offensive had advanced to Chuguev, 25 miles south of Kharkov, and also extended in areas east and northwest to Kark, 125 miles north of Kharkov.

Indicating furious fighting southeast of Kharkov, the Russian midnight communique declared that 600 Germans were killed in an attack launched by large forces of Nazi infantry and tanks.

Anti-tank guns "broke up the enemy formation and destroyed 11 tanks," the war bulletin said.

The Hitlerites "tried to reform, but under the blow of our troops retreated, leaving about 600 dead on the battlefield." Despite these reports of Russian successes, it was clear that the Germans were continuing to throw powerful weight into their smash back eastward into southern Russia.

## Deceased Unclaimed In Charleston, S. C.

The body of Mrs. Florence Minor, who according to a Charleston, S. C. newspaper is said to have been in a motor car accident, was unclaimed at St. Paul's mortuary in Charleston.

Mrs. Minor, about 35 years old, was fatally injured in an automobile accident. She and O. E. Arnold were boarded at the same lodging house on the way to see a doctor for their landlady, but under the blow of her car, disappeared. Efforts to arrange for disposition of Mrs. Minor have been in vain, according to the Charleston newspaper stated.

## F. J. Richter Is Army Lieutenant

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., (AP)—Alvin C. Richter, 31, of Sanford, Fla., received his commission as a second lieutenant in the air force and wings of the aerial bombardier from the Air Force Advanced Flying School at Kirtland Field, Albuquerque, N. M., Sunday.

Mrs. Richter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry J. Richter of Sanford, is a former student of Seminole high school, graduating with the class of 1938. He attended the University of Florida where he was a member of the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity and Bachelor of Arts degree in Sanford.

After his advanced training at Kirtland Field, Lieut. Richter was stationed at the Santa Ana Army Air Field, Santa Ana, Calif.

His assignment in the air force, which he received from the director of the Santa Ana Army Air Field, is as a bombardier.

## Ross Collapses Shortly Before Time Of Address

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Mar. 16, (AP) Cpl. Barney Ross, former welterweight and lightweight boxing champion and a marine hero of Guadalcanal, suffered a recurrence of malaria he contracted in the Solomons and collapsed last night shortly before he was to have addressed a Red Cross rally in Madison Square Garden.

Ross was at a mid-Manhattan hotel with his wife and friends when he became ill. A Red Cross ambulance was called and stretch-bearers carried Ross from the hotel. He was hurried to St. Albans Naval Hospital on Long Island, where physicians said his condition was not serious.

Ross' appearance at the Garden Red Cross rally was canceled.

The former boxer, who is credited with killing 22 Japanese in an engagement on Guadalcanal, came to New York last week, and has been honored at several receptions.

In addition to contracting malaria in the Solomons, Ross was wounded several times by shrapnel.

Ross arrived here from Chicago and the West Coast late Friday for a series of Red Cross appearances although he confided to friends that he had been ill for three days the forepart of last week.

Friday night, before approximately 20,000 spectators, he received the Edward J. Neil trophy from former Mayor James Walker as the man who did most for boxing in 1942 and Sunday night as the guest at a private party where he received the Ring magazine's merit award for 1942.

Both citations were given the former champion of the light weight, welterweight and junior welterweight divisions for killing 22 Japanese late in November while protecting three wounded fellow marines during an all-night vigil on Guadalcanal.

His wife, Catherine, accompanied him here from the West Coast and will substitute for him at the Red Cross meeting.

Ross was stricken at his hotel shortly after addressing a Red Cross gathering in the lobby of the New York Life Insurance Building.

He then escaped from there.

Police arrested Jacobs at a C. L. Depot here when word was received that he was trying to escape to the police station, he was taken further suspicion by his refusal to have fingerprints made. When this was finally done, a wire of the Utah State Police was sent to Salt Lake City, Chief Williams said, and added that he was waiting further word from that authority before sending the convict back here.

## Union Refuses To Take Spain Materials

TAMPA, Mar. 16, (AP)—The National Maritime Union, from whose ranks have come the bulk of the 2817 merchant seamen killed in action, has served notice on the state department that it will "not be a party to carrying vital materials to France which are needed by the United States and which will be used to bolster the Nazi war machine."

A resolution adopted by the part of New York membership declared that M. U. members would "cease being the transmission belt by which American supplies are shipped to our enemies," the Tampa chapter was notified yesterday.

The union condemned the state department's "protectionist policy as inimical to the best interests of the American people" and declared that some sections of the state department have been flirting with notorious fascists and seem intent upon using the peace medals which they have issued to thousands of seamen and soldiers are doing to win the war against fascism.

The union said that it will keep the fact that Spain and has troops fighting the most effective ally, the Soviet Union, probably with considerable success.

"We feel that providing valuable supplies to France Spain is the same as diverting them to Hitler Germany. We believe that the materials to France which are needed by the United States will be used against American people some future date, just as Japan used our supplies to kill her."

## Movie Idol Suffers From Jungle Fever After Adventures In Pacific War Zone

AN ADVANCED SOUTH PACIFIC BASE, Mar. 16, 1943 (AP)—Lieut. Comdr. Henry (Bob) Montgomery, Jr. has taken part in numerous adventures that could hardly be equalled in a Hollywood production and the former movie idol is convalescing from jungle fever.

Henry Montgomery, Jr. is better known as Robert Montgomery. He is a former Hollywood actor who went to the Pacific to fight the war. As Robert Montgomery, he made \$5,000 weekly. As Henry Montgomery, Jr.—his real name—his earnings are \$100 weekly and he is in the hard way.

His most recent action was with a destroyer division and motor torpedo boats in Guadalcanal. He went through the last sixteen days of the strenuous Guadalcanal campaign aboard the flagship, the USS Albany, and was seriously sick in those 16 days.

"By day the fever in which he was suffering was bombing any positions and by night they were smashing the Tokyo area," said the train of destroyers which tried to bring Japanese reinforcements to Guadalcanal.

After the Japanese had evacuated Guadalcanal, Montgomery was discovered ashore shaking like a leaf with fever. He had suffered a recurrence of jungle fever previously contracted in the Panama Canal Zone.

Rushed here by plane, Montgomery has received daily medical treatment and probably will be ordered to the United States for cooler weather to expedite his recovery. While here he is promoted from lieutenant to lieutenant commander.

Montgomery is no Stork Club admiral. Anti-Nazi in action as well as speech, he was in England making a film during the war's first months. When the Germans invaded France he persuaded the film studio to give him an assignment to go to France.

## Wage Raises Made On Inequality Basis

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16, (AP)—The Little Steel formula is fast becoming a factor in wage increases approved by the War Labor Board and the bulk of adjusted wage rates now made are being set by the board.

The reason is that most groups of employees already have been raised 15 percent by the permitted formula. More than 2,000 wage like requests were granted in the month ending Mar. 5 on an inequality basis.

## Martin Called To Duty In Seabee

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16, (AP)—Robert M. Martin, 308 Park Avenue, has been called to active duty with the Navy's Seabees. He was assigned to the 17th Naval Construction Battalion at Camp Peary at Williamsburg, Va. He was announced in Jacksonville by Lieut. Comdr. T. J. Newell, Jr., officer-in-charge of Navy recruiting.

At the naval construction training center, Martin will undergo several weeks of specialized training before drawing possible foreign duty assignment for the building of advance and mobile bases for the Navy.

## Clothing Frills Said Unnecessary

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16, (AP)—A program to standardize designs and ruthlessly trim unnecessary frills from civilian and military goods was offered today by the War Production Board as a means of freeing more manpower for war work.

The plan was devised by WPB's conservation division, headed by Howard C. Conroy. Conroy estimates the plan will release 6,000,000 for war work if adopted throughout American industry.

Instructions On Letters To Jap Prisoners Given

ATLANTA, Ga., Mar. 16. — (Special) — Immediately upon official notice of capture by the Japanese, letters may be sent to prisoners by ordinary mail, according to Lieut. Colonel Hartley B. Dean, Chief of Postal Service Headquarters Fourth Service Command.

Extreme care should be taken in addressing these communications, he said, "and the following procedure is necessary."

The address itself should consist of the prisoner's rank, full name and branch of service, then on the second line should be written in parenthesis either U. S. Army, U. S. Navy or U. S. Marine Corps, as the individual case may be.

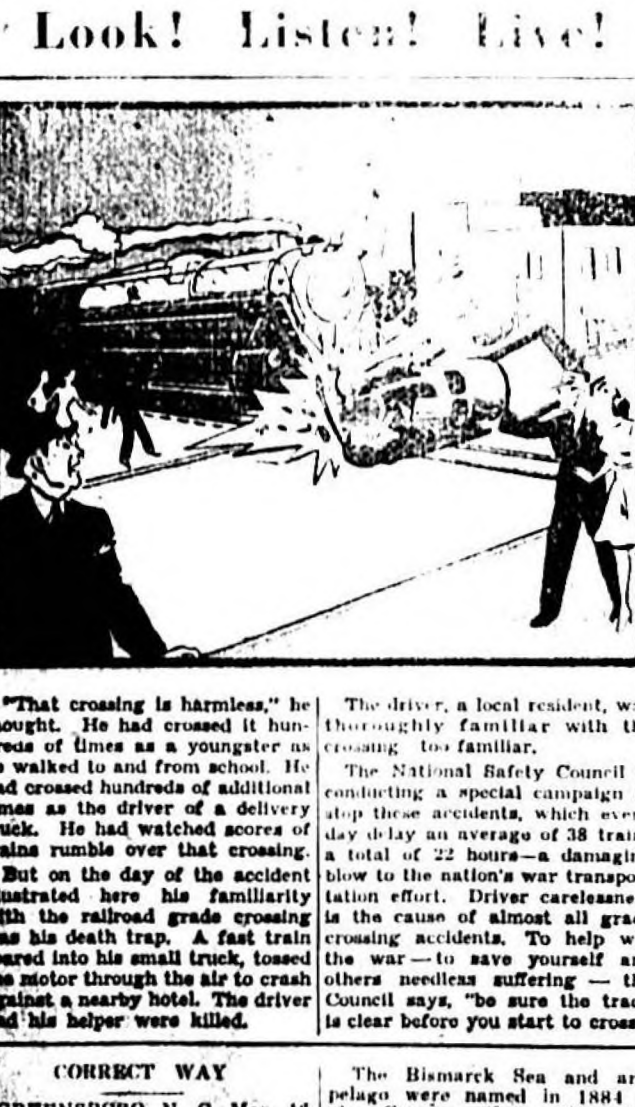

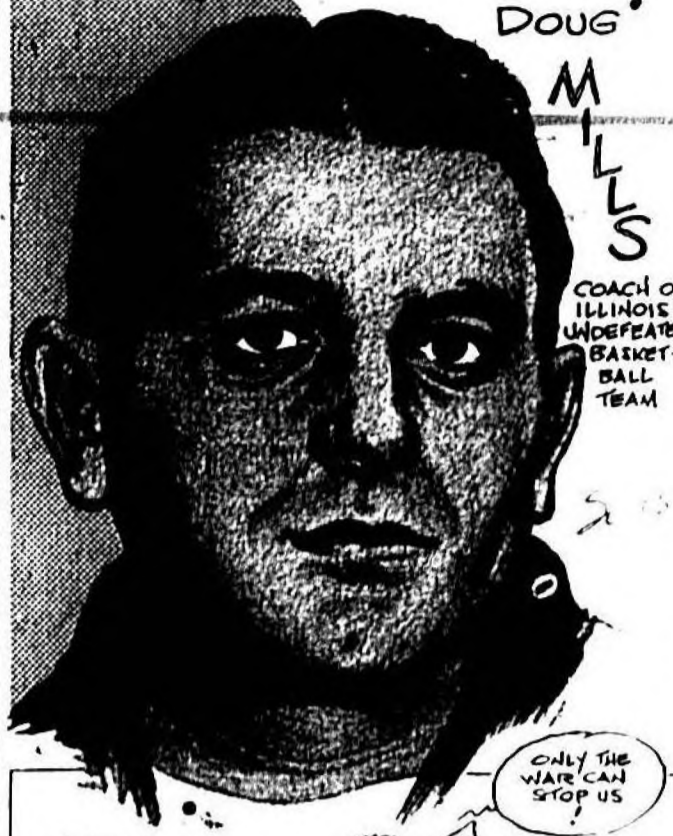

Operated under the direction of Capt. L. H. Lachiotte, the clothing assembly line is both a speedy and accurate method of clothing the large number of men who pass through the Reception Center. Out of a total of 14 items received by each man, an average of only 1 per soldier requires alteration.

As he passes along the line, the novice is gradually dressed in Army apparel. He tries on the clothes he is going to wear. He dons an O. D. Shirt, puts one away in his bag, and so on down the line in 45 minutes or less.
