The Lookouts dropped their sixth straight encounter last night at the Municipal Athletic field after allowing the Daytona Beach club to slip into the lead in the eighth inning. After taking the count only to lose by a score of 7 to 6.

The Islanders went into the first half of the ninth inning with the score knotted 6 to 6. After Sanford called to score three runs in the half of the eighth to tie the count. After one man had come down with the ninth, Fresh doubled to the left field wall and scored when Dix singled to center field to make the winning tally.

The Lookouts had an opportunity to knot the count again in their portion of the ninth when Pete Mihale doubled to the left field wall. He was sacrificed to ground to McNeese who threw Mihale out at the plate for the second out.

A new Lookout pitcher, Joe Gaylin, started on the hill for the Lookouts, but retired before getting a man out, yet not a single hit was gotten off him. Four errors by six men in the first inning drove him from the mound in favor of Big "Chick" Cook who hurled the next eight frames before he was taken out for a pinch hitter in the Sanford half of the eighth.

Hitler's Czech Desires Given Il Duce's Okey

Sanction Of Italy's Dictator Conflicts With Anglo-French Settlement Plans

Insurgents Widen Loyalist Breach

Stalemated Conflict Increases Chinese Hopes For Victory

European diplomacy ran into another of its countless danger-laden convolutions with the report that Premier Mussolini had given Hitler a free hand in Czechoslovakia...

Il Duce, entering his partner in the Rome-Berlin Axis, was said by German sources in Rome to have promised to bring diplomatic pressure on Czechoslovakia to be "reasonable" and to have proclaimed his own disinterest in the middle European republic.

This did not fit well into the peace-making efforts of British and French diplomats who had been instructed to deliver notes to Germany and Czechoslovakia warning them against violence in the settlement of demands by Nazi leaders of Czechoslovakia's 3,500,000 Sudetan Germans.

Hitler's "Rhineland" offensive, the great artillery and air show in Hitler's honor but gave both Hitler and Mussolini time to polish brief speeches tonight in which they may disclose part of the subject of their conversations.

In Spain, the insurgent drive to widen the breach in government territory, fanned into a general offensive along a strategic line east from Teruel in the Mediterranean. Troops under General Miguel Aranda broke through government defenses at a dozen points under orders to "fight, rain or no rain."

In addition to the exhibits, an array of booths has been set up for the entertainment of visitors and again tonight a movie, scheduled to begin at 7:30 o'clock, will be a featured entertainment. The screen will be set up on the campus at last night but a completely different set of films will be shown, Mr. Johnson added.

These movies will feature scenes from the lives of the school in order to present them with the value of visual education in the program. Mr. Johnson said, the recently organized school groups at the fair will be represented by a group of 100 members.

Publicity Given City In 2 Recent Rail Magazines

Sanford Plan To Draw Retired Employees Is Topic Of Articles

The plan of the Railroad Employees Retirement Committee, by which retired railroad men are encouraged to settle in Sanford, received publicity from two rail road magazines recently.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers' Magazine, edited by R. L. Glenn, former resident of Sanford, carries an article in its May issue on the plan, and the Atlantic Coast Line News also carries a short article.

Quoting from the article in the former, it states that "Special inducements are being offered by the City of Sanford, Florida, to encourage permanent settlement there of retired railroad veterans."

"The Railroad Employees Retirement Committee, local sponsors of the plan, launched its program by placing advertisements in the February and March issues of our Magazine, in response to which the committee has received inquiries from 15 states."

The article explains the provisions of the plan whereby the City Commission has agreed to enter into contracts conveying, without cost, lots in the Bel-Air section acquired through tax and special assessment foreclosures, to eligible parties upon the condition that they begin the erection of dwellings thereon within six months.

Only railroad employees, it is made clear, who have retired or will become eligible for retirement, are eligible for the plan.

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Crops Hurt, Lake, River Low Due To Lack Of Rainfall

Danger Seen Of Ocean Water Flowing Into Streams And Lakes

As a result of the drought in this section, spring crops have suffered considerable damage and the death of rainfall at some points has become so acute that a shortage in the supply of irrigation water is being feared.

The first of the month of this year, the precipitation in this section has been only about one quarter of normal.

According to the report of the Sanford Weather Bureau, the St. Johns River and Lake Manatee are about as low as the water level will go. It is expected that with a drop of another foot or two water from the ocean would come into the lake.

At the present time, the water level in the lake is about 18 inches, and falls as much as three inches when there are late rains on the coast. The water level in Lake Manatee is over three feet below normal and has fallen seven feet from the high water stage during the fall and winter months.

Water in the lakes and ponds in the county, many of which are frequented by anglers, are also at a very low ebb and warnings of contamination have been made by health officials to bathers.

According to local Meteorologist G. P. Paston, the rainfall in inches for the first four months of 1938 are as follows: January, 1.81; February, 1.11.



### President Is Given Report Upon Progress Of Wage-Hour Bill And Spending Plans

### Some Supporters Urge 'Stump' Trip

### Cite Renomination Of Pender As Evidence Of New Deal Power

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The Senate today gave final approval to the compromise Tax Revision Bill, The \$5,000,000,000 measure, which sponsors contend will encourage business expansion and curb inflation, and give the President authority to raise the tariff. When the House approves it, the body will go to President Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, back from a deep-sea fishing trip in the West Indies, talked over the legislative program with Congressional leaders, receiving a report on the progress of his spending-lending plan and the success in forcing the wage-hour bill to the House floor.

There was no announcement after the conference as to the Chief Executive's views toward the legislative program, but Speaker Bankhead has had a conference with the President and is expected to announce his views on the bill before May 25.

### Head Of State Democratic Committee Died On Saturday

LAKE CITY, May 9.—(AP)—Funeral services for James B. Hodge, 65, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, who died suddenly here Saturday night, will be held Tuesday at 11 A. M. at the First Baptist Church.

Hodge, chairman of the Democratic committee for six years, was found dead in his law office by friends. The examining physician said death was due to a heart attack.

Hodge, center of controversy last winter because of his criticizing President Roosevelt's policies, announced before the May 8 primary he would not seek to retain his membership in the party executive committee.

## Salon Calls On President To Curb Hague

### Writes President If Civil War Is Necessary To Make Him Take Some Action

WASHINGTON, May 9.—(AP)—Representative Jerry O'Connell, Montana Democrat, denies a permit to speak at a Jersey City, N. J. mass meeting Saturday night, said he had written President Roosevelt asking "whether there has to be a civil war to curb you to do something about the shocking situation in Jersey City."

O'Connell and Representative John T. Bernard, Minnesota farm lobbyist, abandoned their Jersey City speaking engagement after a crowd of 5,000 had gathered. The two men were persuaded not to attempt a defiance of the city ordinance after a four-hour conference with officers of the International Labor Defense committee, which planned the anti-Hague rally.

As the two congressmen boarded their train in New York with their wives, O'Connell was assured by Jerome Britton, American Civil Liberties union counsel, that "when you come back two weeks from tonight we'll see that everything is arranged and that you will speak in Jersey City."

Meanwhile Mary Hays, role here and role in the Democratic national organization, was attacked anew even though Hays had credited him "and his company" with a victory in preventing the O'Connell and Bernard speeches.

The 42-year-old mayor, while in New York, had been in the department of justice to request a writ of habeas corpus for the anti-Hague law and "give him hell."

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## France Woos From Afar To Win Mussolini

### Hitler Obtains Inside Track With Assurance Of Free Hand In Czechoslovakia

### French Statesmen Plead In Geneva

### Seek To Patch Up Old Quarrel Arising Out Of Ethiopian Affair

British and French diplomats, ardent but belated suitors for the favor of Italy, wooed her from afar today while Adolf Hitler, their rival with the inside track, started winding up his Italian visit which brought new pledges of mutual Fascist affections.

Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, and Georges Bonnet, French foreign minister, went into the 101st session of the League of Nations council at Geneva virtually assured of the success in patching up the 1935 quarrel in which their predecessors tried to halt the Italian conquest of Ethiopia with economic pressure from 52 nations.

Hitler went from Rome to Florence today bearing fresh assurances of Italian Fascist friendship which high Fascist officials intimated included a promise by Premier Mussolini to let him have a free hand in Czechoslovakia. Hitler's visit will end tomorrow.

The Spanish insurgent drive to put Valencia and Castellon de la Plana under Generalissimo Franco's colors continued despite Italian and government country attacks along a jagged battlefield from Tortosa east to the Mediterranean north of two vital government ports.

In China, Japanese bombing planes raided along the Lunghai railway, trying to break the central front deadlock by cutting off lines of supply for the numerically superior Chinese army.

Japanese reported defeating the Chinese guerrilla warriors which had threatened to wipe out the Japanese garrison at Nantungchow, 60 miles north of Shanghai, feeder base for the southern operations against Lunghai.

ROME, May 9.—(AP)—A bargain to divide central Europe and the Balkans into Italo-German spheres of influence appeared to be the major outcome of Adolf Hitler's \$30,000,000 visit to Italy. This was indicated strongly by high fascist quarters as the chancellor spent his final day here watching the Italian air force display its knowledge of how to make war from the skies.

King Vittorio Emanuele and Premier Mussolini accompanied their guest to the Tyrrhenian coast where two 23,000-ton condemned merchantmen were sunk off Furbara and tons of bombs were dropped in a mock battle in which 400 airplanes took part.
