





Many Jap Planes, Ships Are Ruined By U.S. Bombers

Americans Credited With Destruction Of 62 Vessels And 50 Fighter Craft

U.S. bombing crews today received official credit for the destruction of 60 Japanese fighter planes in aerial combat alone, and the sinking or damaging of 46 enemy transports and 16 warships up to Mar. 1, off the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines, in a report by Col. Eugene Eubank, of the U. S. bombing command, Australia.

The Australian communists revealed heavy damage to military installations in the Allied bombing attack on Japan-occupied Lae and Gelinga. Seven Japanese planes raided Darwin and two Australian ports today without inflicting damage.

Japanese planes attacked a base hospital in the American-defended Bataan peninsula today, inflicting a number of casualties, the War Department reported, adding the hospital was plainly marked.

Heavy aerial bombardment on Malaya Bay fortresses accounted for fire from enemy shore batteries, continued day and night, the Department said today. Damage was described as slight. On Bataan, sharp patrol clashes were reported, but there still is no sign of the threatened all-out Japanese offensive against the long besieged American and Filipino troops.

LONDON, Mar. 31.—German naval attacks on a convoy carrying British and American supplies to Murmansk have been beaten off by British and Russian forces with one large Nazi destroyer crippled three. One German heavily damaged but not sunk, officially announced today.
