Senior Lifesaving Course Scheduled For Casselberry

A 17-hour Senior Lifesaving Course, under the direction of Mrs. Martha Kilpatrick, Red Cross water safety instructor of Lake Mary, will open in Casselberry Thursday, weather permitting.

Assisting the instructor will be Mr. and Mrs. Tom Herald and Mrs. Joseph Klein.

According to Mrs. James Birkenmeyer Jr., who is in charge of arrangements, classes will be limited in attendance. Sessions will be held at a private pool, location to be announced, from 7:30 p. m. until 9:30 p. m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Persons interested in enrolling for the course should immediately contact Mrs. Birkenmeyer at TE 8-4415 or the Herald at TE 8-5894.

To qualify for the instruction, an applicant must be a good swimmer, be 16 years of age or older or a junior in high school. The only charge will be 75 cents for the purchase of a Red Cross lifesaving manual.

There is an urgent need for trained adults and it is hoped that many will take advantage of the classes, Mrs. Birkenmeyer says.

The senior course is a prerequisite for the approved water safety course to be held at the Sanford Municipal Pool in May which, if successfully completed, qualifies the recipients as certified lifesaving instructors.

A program of swimming courses in Casselberry is being planned to open in June after school is out. Last year, more than 300 children and adults took advantage of the water safety program in Casselberry.

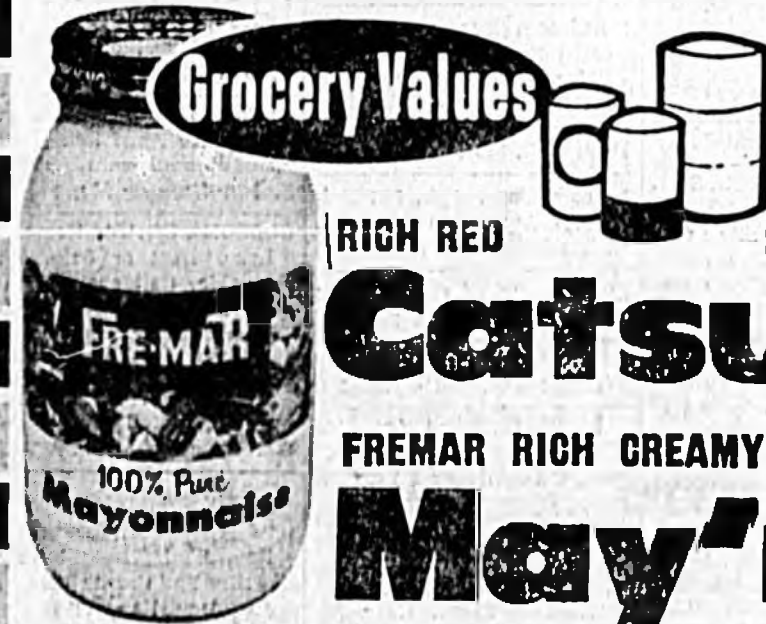

Supreme Court To Decide

OK 'To Pray Or Not To Pray'?

The Supreme Court hears arguments today on a subject of intense interest to many Seminole County residents and other Americans: Does non-compulsory recitation of a prayer in public schools violate the constitution?

Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee today said that students in all the 23 schools read the Bible and "The Lord's Prayer" which is a state policy. Two years ago a teacher in the school system was fired because, according to Milwee "he showed no interest in reading the Bible."

In recent weeks the court has received hundreds of letters urging it not to take God out of the schools. The justices do not see this mail. The great bulk of it has come from Pennsylvania, although the case to be heard originated in New York.

A group of parents in New Hyde Park, N. Y., brought the suit after the school board decided in 1958 that the so-called "regents' prayer" would follow the salute to the flag every morning.

The prayer, designed to be non-sectarian, was adopted in 1951 by the Board of Regents, which administers education in New York state. It may be used at the discretion of school districts.

The prayer is: "Almighty God, we acknowledge Thee, and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country."

The parents bringing the suit include Jews, Unitarians, members of the Ethical Culture Society and non-believers. They said the prayer is contrary to their beliefs; that it favors belief over non-belief; and that it necessarily results in coercion on the children.

The parents lost in New York state courts. Answering their appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court, the school board said that any child may be excused from the exercise on written request of a parent.

Sixteen other parents of children in the same schools joined the proceedings in state courts in support of the board. They include members of the Hebrew, Protestant and Roman Catholic faiths and one who is not a church member.

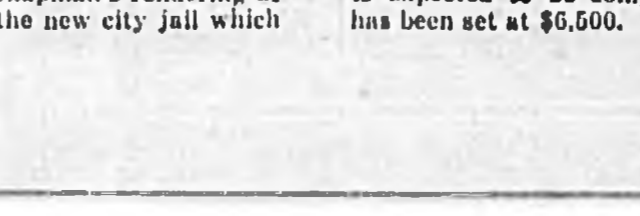

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Centaur To Make Debut

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) A mighty Atlas-Centaur rocket will make its debut as America's newest space vehicle within a few days with a 15-minute workout in the skies above the Atlantic Ocean.

Informed sources said the launching has been set for Friday, although the National Aeronautics and Space Administration would pinpoint it no closer than "in the next several days."

From the standpoint of range, the flight will be a modest one. Scientists plan to fire the rocket and its revolutionary second stage about 300 miles into space and 1,176

miles across the Atlantic. It will carry no payload.

But, said experts, "it is estimated that 80 per cent of the functions ultimately expected to the Centaur vehicle will be attempted" on the maiden flight.

These will include separating the Atlas booster, shifting the second stage around in space and firing the Centaur's two engines, powered by a potent combination of liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen.

The liquid hydrogen, supercooled at minus 423 degrees Fahrenheit, is what gives the 107-foot rocket its added "muscle." Hydrogen offers a more pounds of thrust per pound of propellant than any

other fuel possible with chemical rockets, scientists said.

As the seven-shot test program for Atlas-Centaur starts, the United States is limited to a maximum of about 2 1/2 tons it can put into orbit with a single rocket. This can be accomplished with the Atlas-Agena-B.

Scientists said Atlas-Centaur will be able to put 4 1/2-ton satellites into orbits 300 miles above earth, send 2,300 pounds of instruments to the moon or hurl probes weighing about 1,400 pounds to Mars and Venus.

On its first flight, the all-very Atlas-Centaur will be rigged with several special devices to give scientists a de-

tailed blow-by-blow picture of how the hydrogen-powered second stage performs.

One will be a small, cylindrical television camera installed directly in the hydrogen fuel tank. With the help of a 160,000-watt strobe light, the camera will photograph movement of the fuel once every two seconds, and relay the pictures to ground tracking stations.

The second device is a "Christmas tree" arrangement of sensors mounted on a metal skeleton running the length of the hydrogen fuel tank. The sensors will measure movement of the hydrogen through the tanks and into the fuel lines.

CORE Official Shot By Wife

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UPI) The wife of the president of the local chapter of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) was arrested today in connection with the shooting of her husband.

The CORE official, Hyden Jackson, 36, told police he was shot Monday night by three "shabbily dressed Negroes" on a factory district street.

But police said the shooting actually took place in the Jackson home during a family quarrel and that Jackson made up the story about the street attack.

Jackson's wife, Carmel, 24, was arrested on a charge of assault with intent to kill in the shooting of her husband, a veteran of four years in the Marine Corps.

Jackson is a Negro.

Jackson told police that Monday night's shooting occurred when three men stopped him on the street and demanded money.

Jackson said that, when he turned the men down, one of them shoved him and another drew a pistol from his belt and shot him.

One of the favorite complaints in bridge circles after a contract has been set is: "Our hands just did not fit together. We had enough strength if only some of the high cards had been in different suits."

The short suit game try after a major suit raise is designed to reduce the number of such cases. Not only is it designed to do so, but it does.

South has enough strength so that no one could really criticize a jump rebid to four spades after the raise to two and some rebid is clearly indicated. North has an excellent raise and would surely go on to game if it were not for the information conveyed by the short suit try.

South's rebid to three diamonds tells North that South does not hold more than two diamonds. Hence, North knows that this king and queen of diamonds will be of little value to South and that either his small hearts or small clubs are likely to be losers. In spite of the maximum quality of his initial raise, North merely goes to

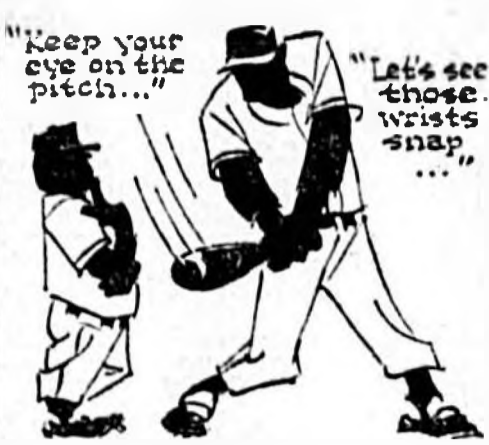
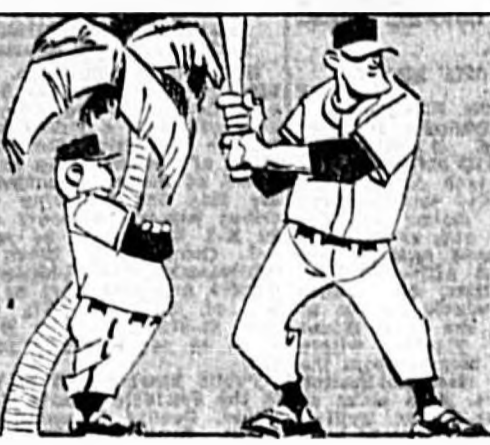

Board Ejects Citizen; One Threatened

Mayor Denies Zoo Admission Charge To Non-Residents

Connecticut Man Seen As Best For Post

The county lost its engineer Tuesday but appears certain to get a new health director by June 30.

County Engineer Carlton Bliss submitted his resignation effective April 15 to accept a job with a private firm in Boston, Mass.

At the same time, John Fitzpatrick reported that he interviewed "the best prospect" for the health director's job while James P. Avery agreed saying, "this is the man for the post."

Although no definite action was taken indications are that the board will hire 48-year-old Dr. Frank Leone, a resident of Newton, Conn.

Fitzpatrick and Avery, both appointed to a committee to name a new health director, passed on Leone's application to the rest of the board for their approval and final action on Leone is expected at the next regular meeting.

Leone had indicated he would be available after June 30.

A check of his application reveals that he served 10 years on the staff of the New York Polytechnic Hospital.

Although he has no Florida license now, Fitzpatrick said he, "is working toward one."

"I'm ready to take action now on him," said Ted Williams but Fitzpatrick suggested that the rest of the board study the application.

Bliss, in his letter of resignation said, that he had been offered a position "which I find impossible to refuse."

He has been engineer for the past 20 months.

The board agreed to have Bliss advertise for a replacement in engineering publications "immediately."

Guy Stenstrom, assistant engineer will carry out the engineer's duties after April 15 if a replacement can not be found in time.

Halt Nuclear Production-U. S.

GENEVA (UPI)—The United States proposed today that the world halt production of material for nuclear warheads and called for an early East-West study on how to do it.

At the same time, the United States accused the Soviet Union of trying to "remove the motor" from systems laboriously agreed-upon for insuring compliance with a ban on nuclear weapons testing.

Chief U. S. delegate Arthur H. Dean called upon the 17-nation general disarmament conference to turn its immediate attention to the problems of eliminating stockpiles of nuclear, bacteriological and chemical weapons and of ending production of plutonium and uranium for use in nuclear warheads.

of Lake Mary. The sheriff's office reported that according to statements of another man who was walking with Abney at the time of the accident, the victim apparently stepped in front of the car.

No charges have been filed at this time, but it is possible that an inquest will be held.

Zoo Action Rescinded By Board

Sanford Mayor J. H. (Jimmy) Crapps today denied that the city would start charging admission to the zoo from non-residents after the County Commission Tuesday rescinded its action appropriating \$8,500 for the facility's upkeep.

Crapps said that at one time "we talked about it, but not now. I think it's a shame that the county declined to help us when 78,000 people use the zoo annually."

The board agreed to rescind the motion by a 2-2 vote. Ted Williams who earlier voted to appropriate the funds made the request.

"I didn't intend politics to get mixed up in it," said Williams adding, "I guess it's best to withdraw the motion."

Commissioner James P. Avery declared that the whole issue had turned into a political football while John Fitzpatrick, who along with Avery voted against rescinding the motion, said that "Sanford has a right to benefit from the tax dollar like any other municipality."

Avery said "we can't use every tax dollar for welfare purposes and that the zoo, one of the major attractions in central Florida, is still free."

"It benefits everyone in the county and I think it's terrible that civic groups refused to take a stand on this issue because of the personalities involved," he added.

Avery called their judgment "shocking" and "immature."

"It's just unfair for Sanford to support the zoo by itself," Avery added.

Vernon Dunn, who seconded Williams' motion said that the previous motion allowing funds for the zoo was not even legal adding that "we can't commit future boards to this appropriation."

Dunn also complained that he was not even informed that the matter was to be brought up and "came like a shot out of the blue."

Chairman J. C. Hutchison said he felt that the zoo was important but emphasized "there were more important projects where Sanford could be aided."
