



The Supreme Court hears arguments today on a subject of intense interest to many Seminole County residents and other Americans: Does non-compulsory recitation of a prayer in public schools violate the constitution?

Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee today said that students in all the 23 schools read the Bible and "The Lord's Prayer" which is a state policy. Two years ago a teacher in the school sys-

tem was fired because, according to Milwee "he showed no interest in reading the Bible." In recent weeks the court has received hun-

dreds of letters urging-it not to take God out of the schools. The justices do not see this mail. The great bulk of it has come from Pennsyl-

A group of parents in New Hyde Park, N. Y., brought the suit after the school board decided in 1958 that the so-called "regents" prayer" would follow the salute to the flag every morning.

The prayer, designed to be non-sectarian, was adopted in 1951 by the Board of Regents, which administers education in New York state. It may be used at the discretion of school districts.

The prayer is: "Almighty God, we acknowledge Thee, and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country."

The parents bringing the suit include Jews,

Unitarians, members of the Ethical Culture Society and non-believers. They said the prayer is contrary to their beliefs; that it favors belief over non-belief: and that is necessarily results in coercion on the children.

The parents lost in New York state courts. Answering their appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, the school board said that any child may be excused from the exercise on written request of a parent.

Sixteen other parents of children in the same schools joined the proceedings in state courts in support of the board. They include members of the Hebrew, Protestant and Roman Catholic faiths and one who is not a church member.

A Need To Wake Up

The United States Supreme Court again has displayed its talent for keeping the pot boiling. The high court, coasting somewhat after its momentous 1954 decision that called for an end to school segregation, last week issued an edict that is causing nearly as much furor as the desegregation ruling.

The court, ruling on an action brought by Tennessee residents, decreed that a federal court can decide whether constitutional rights of 11 persons have been violated because they are not duly represented in the rurally-controlled legislature. The ruling, in effect, said that the residents in any city who feel that they are not properly represented in the state Legislature can go to a federal court to seek better representation.

Muny of those who vociferously oppose the high court's decision contend that it is another serious infringement of state's rights by a federal body. True, it is, and it should be up to the state legislatures, to see that the people of their states are fairly represented.

But there are undoubtedly many state legislatures, or more accurately powerful groups within the legislatures, that find it more convenient to ignore the reapportionment issue.

In the case of Tennessee (an example) the state has not reapportioned since 1901.

the state is required to reapportion every 10 years. The last time the legislature was changed was in 1945 and prior to that in the 1920's. Florida is attempting, however, to reapportion again. State voters will vote on a 45-senator, 104-representative proposal in the November general election. The plan already has the approval of the legislature. Both Reps. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Gordon Frederick favor reapportionment to give the populous areas of the state more equitable representation, but both are opposed to intervention of the Supreme Court into an issue they believe is entirely up to the state.

Under the Florida Constitution,

We do not believe the high court order will have the "far reaching" effects some have predicted. Those who decide that they are not fairly represented and that they will appeal to a federal court will indiscriminately call for reapportionment. Proof of malapportionment will have to be proved conclusively. In another light, the court de-

cision may well serve as a gentle hint to drowsy legislatures that the time has come for a realistic survey of its apportionment. Government, both state and federal, is necessary, and we believe that it was those state governments through procrastination on the apportionment question, that extended the invitation for intervention by the federal government.
