Unknown vandal damages stadium during breakout

SANFORD - Someone caused more damage breaking out than breaking in at Sanford's baseball stadium. Sanford police are trying to find out who that someone may be.

According to a police incident report, someone broke into the offices at Sanford Memorial Stadium, 1201 Mellogville Avenue Tuesday. Entry was reportedly made by breaking a window at the concession stand to gain entry into the offices. The only thing reportedly taken were the keys to a truck

parked within the baseball stadium grounds. The person then is believed to have entered the truck, proceeding to bang it against the concrete walls of the balifield, and ultimately crashing out through the gate.

City recreation supervisors examined the area Wednesday, and have determined that approximately \$1,200 in damage was done. During the break-in, the burglar is also said to have taken a fire extinguisher, and discharged It in the stadium's restroom. Even with the extensive damage caused by ramming the truck into the wall and gate area, city officials say damage to the truck was minimal except for a broken headlight.

Lyons disputes adding personnel

SANFORD - The city commission has officially accepted the tentative fiscal 1995/96 budget and the proposed millage rate although one commissioner dissented.

The actions were undertaken during Monday night's City Commission meeting, and are required to be adopted/acnowledged by law.

The proposed millage rate of 6.8759 was approved by a unanimous vote. The rate is tentative however, and may be lowered as the result of public hearings to be held prior to final consideration which will take place in September.

Revenue shortfall can be corrected By NICK PFEIFAUF Herald Staff Writer

SANFORD - A problem has surfaced in connection with the preparation of the City of Sanford fiscal year 1995/96 budget. An unexpected shortfall of revenue has been revealed.

During Monday night's city commission work session, Finance Director Carolyn Small reported that the original ad valorem tax revenue projections expected by the city had been improperly presented.

"This error resulted from a lower gross taxable value reported from the (Seminole County) property appraiser's office than originally estimated by staff," she said. "This lower tax revenue was discussed but had not been actually

booked before the budget workshop." The amount of money originally espected from ad valorem taxes was \$5,483,112. According to Small's figures, the actual adjusted amount expected is \$5,226.842, resulting in a difference See Shortfall, See Page 5A

financed with CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) funds, granted to the city through Seminole County's entitlement agreement with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The city's original application. made in March of 1994 requested \$365,396. Because of funding constraints however, the county awarded \$91,699.

The reduction of CDBG support forced the communities of Georgetown and Goldsboro, in cooperation with the city of Sanford. to rethink their redevelopment strategies.

By January of this year, a new design was formulated and the city presented its program to the county. By late June, the city's Community Development Department received the interlocal agreement from the county, which now allows for implementation of the program.

Sanford's Director of Community Development, Charles Rowe, observed. "All that's left now is the completion of an environmental review." Rowe said this will take at least another 45 to 60 days.

An environmental review is required by the federal government to Bee Park, Page 5A

Search intensifies for college president

SANFORD - The search is now underway.

When Seminole Community College's founding president Dr. Earl Weldon announced at the end of 1994 that he would be stepping down from his position, the board of trustees knew they had a year to find his replacement.

Though no one relished the idea

of trying to find someone to take over for Weldon who has been the head of the school since it first opened three decades ago, a committee was established to tackle

The 19-member panel is comprised of members of the community, of the college's professional staff. of SCC students and of members of the college's faculty-instructional staff.

They met for the first time last

week and have established a schedule of meetings at which they will discuss the qualifications of the applicants who have expressed an interest in the top job at the college.

There are 101 applicants representing 32 states who will be considered for the president's post. The committee is composed of the following:

Child protection system to improve

TALLAHASSEE - The murder of a 7-year-old Bradenton boy has prompted state officials to take steps to improve the child protection system.

Lucas Ciambrone died May 13 from a blow to the head. His adoptive parents, Joseph and Heather Ciambrone, have been charged with his murder. At the time of his death, Lucas weighed 27 pounds - half the normal weight for a boy his age. He had more than 200 injuries on his body.

Starting immediately, the statewide child abuse hotline operated by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services will forward any information about foster children to the district where the child lives, officials said Wednesday.

Previously, a call that didn't meet the legal standard for an abuse complaint wasn't sent to a district.

In addition, social services workers will be required to report all abuse complaints to the hotline and forward any allegations of abuse reported by foster children when youngsters leave their foster homes.

Boot camp grads get extra perks

DUNNELLON - Up to 40 juvenile boot camp graduates will get extended school, job and social skills training at a remote forest work camp under construction.

The \$2 million facility in Goethe State Forest will open in January, Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford said at a groundbreaking ceremony Wednesday.

It is designed for 16- to 18-year-old male offenders who have completed a boot-camp program.

The long trip into the woods to the camp. Crawford said, "is symbolic of the extended training, education and counseling many of these youngsters need to become productive members of society.

The facility, 40 miles southwest of Gainesville, will have a classroom and administration building, a food service building and a dormitory and will be managed by the Division of Forestry, part of Crawford's department.

HRS employees accused of fraud

TALLAHASSEE. Fla. (AP) - Ten current and former employees of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services have been accused of defrauding an insurer of at least \$50.000.

The suspects, who live in Dade and Broward counties, submitted phony medical claims to collect anywhere from several hundred dollars to \$11,000, the Department of Insurance said Wednesday.

Each of them had signed up for accident and disability coverage from Colonial Life and Accident Insurance Co. in Columbia, S.C. The policy is an option offered to state workers.

The suspects conducted the bogus scheme from 1991 to 1994 until an insurance adjuster questioned the claims being submitted, said Lt. John Askins of the insurance department's fraud division.

Seven of the suspects were arrested Wednesday and authorities were seeking three others. More arrests are expected, said Askins.

They are being charged with insurance fraud and grand theft.

HRS on Wednesday fired those employees who still worked for the agency, Askins said.



MIAMI BEACH - House Speaker Newt Gingrich believes the federal government can't solve crime, drug abuse and other urban ills by itself.

Wednesday, the Georgia Republican told the National Urban League people should do their part to improve their neighborhoods.

"Government by itself hasn't succeeded," Gingrich told the league's annual conference via satellite. "We're trying to find a way to increase volunteerism.

He said President Johnson's Great Society program hasn't succeeded and it's time the government stop micromanaging people's lives - themes he has repeated often since becoming speaker last year.



Habitat, which counts former President Carter as a member, is a Christian organization that builds homes for the poor. The future homeowners are required to help build their homes and those of others.

Earning for Learning pays children \$2 for each book read. It has spread to 17 states and encourages learning, Gingrich said.

Gingrich's statement he would meet with the Urban League to come up with plans to help poor urban youth was greeted with a smattering of applause.

We don't want to spend our time in a sterile debate over what hasn't worked." Gingrich said. "Every person without money should have access to opportunity."

Not all delegates of the Urban League, a civil rights and community service organization founded 85 years ago, were impreased with Gingrich's message.

Shawn Barney, student government president at Howard University in Washington, D.C., doesn't like that Republicans want to cut Head Start, a school readiness program for the poor, and dismantle affirmative action.

Barney also said the Republican welfare reform package would harm poor minorities by slashing funds for public housing and job training.

Old Faithful not living up to its name

PARK, Wyo. - Old Faithful has become Somewhat Less Rellable. A series of small carthquakes

in early June appears to have caused a gradual slowdown in the famed geyser's cruptions, says research geologist Rick Hutchinson.

The average time between cruptions is now more than 80 minutes and sometimes as much as 100 minutes, an interval rarely seen in the past. Hutchinson said.

Earlier this year, the average interval was about 75 minutes. The longest interval between cruptions since records have been kept is 120 minutes.

Geologists think carthquakes sometimes shift the earth's crust enough to affect the natural underground plumbing that feeds geysers.

Do you know where your children are?

The Sanford Herald has had several stories regarding City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB) undercover activities almed at drug sales. One of the most frequent areas in Sanford is the intersection of Third Street and Olive Avenue.

From arrest reports at the sheriff's office, lists of persons arrested are compiled. In cases where they are Sanford, Lake Mary. Longwood, or northern Seminole County residents, their addresses are also listed. It's part of the public record.

What is not listed however, is the number of juveniles who are taken into custody during this type of CCIB activity.

Only 10 arrests were listed in the Herald regarding Saturday night's crackdown at Third and Olive. In actuality, CCIB agents covered the area Friday as well as Saturday. with 21 to 23 arrests made.

Lt. Jack Cash, commander of the CCIB told the Herald. "What is not generally known is that possibly half of the arrests connected to drug buys were juveniles." He said the youngest was 14. although a 13-year old girl was connected with the activities but was not arrested.

Cash said the main aim of targeting specific areas is to displace drug buyers. "It's unbelieveable what these concentrated type drug sale activities can do to a neighborhood." he said. "People are afraid to go out of their houses, and the areas become places where gunshots are fired just to prove someone is important, debris including broken glass is often strewn all over the streets, and the areas are virtually destroyed.



UNITED NATIONS - American diplomats have shared with at least two other nations on the security Council intelligence about a steady supply of arms and money going from Iran to the Bosnian Muslims - in violation the U.N. armsembargo.

Nine months to new point of view

BOSTON - It's almost nine months now, nearly a full gestation period. Time to come to term, or at least to terms, with a new point of view

In November, there was something akin to good news in the often gloomy world of AIDS research. A federal study found that HIVinfected women who took the drug AZT during their pregnancy could reduce the risk of transmitting the virus to their bables by as much as two-thirds.

This not only changed the odds of having a healthy baby, it added weight to the importance of HIV testing. Until last fail, the message a pregnant woman got from testing positive sounded like a death knell. Now, she had the chance at least to protect her fetus.

In a little more than a trimester, the study changed the public argument about HIV testing. For a long time, the endless debate about mandatory testing was cast as a struggle between civil rights and public health. But if two-thirds of the 2,000 bables born HIV positive every year could be saved from infection, the sides had to be weighed all over again.

So, during the months of this "gestation period," new legislation has cropped up to enforce testing of pregnant women or at least newborns. It appeared in state legislatures from Florida to New York. It was proposed most recently as an amendment to an AIDS funding bill before Congress - the Ryan White **Reauthorization Act.**

At the same time, the Centers for Disease Control has just recommended for the first time that all pregnant women be tested routinely. But voluntarily.

So the argument goes on. There is a special moral obligation now on the part of a pregnant woman to be tested for HIV. But there remains an ethical dilemma in forcing her to do so.

After all, if we can mandate HIV testing - for the sake of the fetus - surely we can mandate all sorts of other tests, even genetic tests.

More importantly, as Dr. Martha Rogers of CDC says, mandating tests only guarantees test results. It doesn't guarantee treatment. The next step, mandating treatment for pregnant women, heads down the alipperiest of slopes.

Even AZT, the drug in this study, has its problems. We don't yet know the long-term side effects of giving AZT to a fetus, especially a healthy fetus. Without any treatment, only a third of the babies born to infected women will be infected. It's not an uncomplicated decision.

As the treatment of choice, moreover, AZT must be taken five times a day for five and a half months of pregnancy and then given to a newborn five times a day for six more weeks. There is simply no way to mandate that short of imprisoning and strapping a a woman down. As for mandatory testing of newborns, even Rep. Tom Coburn, the Oklahoma Republican and M.D. who wants this condition attached to the AIDS funding bill, acknowledges that he really wants to reach the pregnant women in their first trimester. There is value in testing newborns, but, again, testing ian't treatment and treatment against a mother's will would entail, what? Taking the baby away? That's

hardly an idea that you want to consider as a first report.

The first, second and third resort ought to be better counseling, reaching out to women, getting them into a trusting relationship with medical care. A relationship that will help them through the unimaginable crisis of facing their own illness and even mortality, while bringing another life into the world. This is not a relationship that can be built by adversaries or by

force.

When women are counseled thoroughly, as many as 95 percent choose to be tested. When women know about the benefits, well, there is already evidence that, in just the first months after the study about AZT was released, as many as half the HIV positive pregnant women were on the drug.

There has always been a segment of the political population more interested in mandating testing than providing care. There's always a segment that believes women have to be coerced into providing their children with a potentially life-saving treatment.


It's time to move from a heated debate about civil rights and moral wrongs to a discussion about what works. As Dr. Rogers says, "We need to get off the debate about voluntary or mandatory testing. We need to reach women who don't seek prenstal care. We need to think about how we get inem services, how we pay for them, how we handle patients when they're identified as HIV. That's where our energies should be focused."

Almost nine months after the good news, we're reaching the due date for a change of attitude.

extreme Islamic law. But officials also know that the Bosnian Serbs are the aggressors in the war, and that the frantans are doing what **Congress wants America to do: unilaterally** lift the arms embargo and supply the Bosnian Muslims with the means to defend themselves.

Congressional leaders now fear that if the United States doesn't lift the arms embargo soon, Iran will have undue influence in the new and future Bosnia.

U.S. intelligence reports note that other Muslim countries - such as Turkey. Malaysia and Pakistan - are also supplying arms to the Bosnians. Yet Iran seems to have taken the lead, and has become most clever at skirting the U.N. arms embargo. Oil-rich Persian Gulf states such as Saudi Arabia have been helping the effort by funding some of the arms purchases.

Several key officials in the American mission believe the United Nations' Anal hours in Bosnia are near. Behind closed doors, however, they've been discussing ways that the administration could turn this sullen quagmire into a diplomatic victory:

First, the United States would covertly ask Saudi Arabian officials to double or triple their financial support for the Bosnian Muslims. All the Saudis would want is assurance that the United States would provide diplomatic and political cover in world capitals if it exploded in their face.

The Saudi money would then be used to buy arms in Poland, the Czech Republic and possibly other Eastern European countries. These new democracies are not only starving for the cash, but they've got tons of arms ready to sell.

What makes the plan so intriguing is that the Bosnian Muslims prefer Warsaw Pact weaponry - with which they trained for years when Yugoslavia was Communist - to American-made arms. It also takes America out of the visible equation, allowing the administration to keep peace with its European allies, who don't want the embargo lifted. No Pentagon approval or knowledge of the operation is needed, and no third country with American arms needs to serve as a conduit.

'This may be pie in the sky at this point to put together such a deal, but it seems to us that it might work." one of the diplomats told us. He added that U.S. Ambassador Madeleine Albright was "beside herself" trying to figure out a legitimate way to help the beleaguered Bosnian Muslims.

Within the Clinton administration, Albright has been one of the most vocal critics of the status quo, which she regards as a guarantee that the Serbian aggression will continue. Yet our sources say that so far, she has not signed off on any cable authorizing the kind of covert operation her underlings are drafting.

would be a great historical loss to the community if they were to demolish the building. It has, however, been listed as surplus property since 1988.

The building was constructed before Seminole County was even incorporated. And for nearly two decades it served the students of Sanford and the surrounding area. Booms were added. Some were taken away and sold as "negro residences" when the growth of the area had made the facility obeolete.

Over the years, the remaining portion of the school, which is there today, was used as an o other school facilities around town. The school was used by the district until the 1980s for various purposes before it was declared surplus. In 1990, the facility was leased to a community

group known as the Temporary Living Center (TLC). That group occupied the building until the end of 1993 when they left because of safety concerns.

According to Diane Kramer, executive director of facilities planning for the district, extensive

structural repairs would be necessary in order to bring the facility up to code. The school metric did not have the money to renovate the building. Neither did they have the

money to demolish the facility. "The cost to demolish the building would be high, both monetarily and historically." Kramer

The city intends to preserve the building, but details of their specific plans are not known at this time.

Korean War Veterans Memorial dedicated

The Korean War Veterans Memorial is to be dedicated in Washington, D.C. today, This date represents 45 years to the day when an armistice was signed at a place called Panmunjom.

The Korean War was actually started on Nov. 26, 1950 involving C. Company, 23rd Infantry. 2nd Division on a hill in North Korea called Kunu-Ri. Other records indicate the beginning of this war was started when United Nations forces reacted to a North Korean attack on Seoul, Korea on June 25, 1950. The U.S. 1st, 5th, and 7th Marine Regiments and the 32nd Infantry Regiments of the Republic of Korea (ROK) joined units and the three-year death march began.

Another important date also is recorded on Sept. 10, 1950 at 3:30 p.m. in Inchon, Korea when General Douglas MacArthur led our troops to recapture the city of Scoul. This beautiful city was destroyed in battle because the type of fighting was hand-tohand combat with grenades, rifle fire and tanks pushing their way into the city.

The capture of Seoul took only 13 days. At this early point in the "military action" close to 50,000 North Korean soldiers were either killed in action, wounded, captured or missing.

North Korea had not surrendered, which was the first terrible fact. The second terrible fact was that China and the then Soviet Union were North Korea's neighbors and the United Nations feared a third world war if either party entered to assist the Koreans.

American soldiers were in-

Again, as the rule book of war read, General MacArthur (who duties by President Truman on was the first commander of this conflict), proceeded to attack North Korea. His original plan was to drive the leaders of North Korea out, merge the South and North Korean peoples and place in power a South Korean government to rule both Koreas.

This action did not work and the rest is history.

Thousands of military personnel and civilians lost their lives directly because of MacArthur's military decision. It is estimated that the total number of Koreans and Chinese lost was 1.5 million; over 300,000 men from 15 United Nation countries served in Korea: 58,000 South Korean a war with no peace treaty. solutions lost their lives; 170,000 South Koreans were wounded: 54.000 American soldiers lost their lives: 103,000 were wounded from our country; an original figure of 944 Americans were considered missing in action (but this figure does change from year to year): 22 American soldiers defected to the Communist side.

Many battles became headline news in America and the world. Such was Pork Chop Hill, a 5-day encounter with the Chinese. One story was of Company A. 17th Infantry Regiment. 7th Division of 200 men. One hundred ninety were either killed or wounded, according to a Pennsylvania soldier. Only 10 men were left from his unit. Scientists show that hormone controls weight of obese mice

WASHINGTON - Extremely obese mice became lean and healthy within a short time after daily injections of a slimming hormone, and scientists say the research may lead to shots or pills to help heavyweight humans shed pounds of fat.

Studies at three different laboratories verified that a hormone called leptin forces the body to burn excess fat, while having no apparent effect on lean tissue.

Dr. Jeffrey Friedman, of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute at Rockefeller University, who first isolated the hormone and gave it a name. said the protein somehow tells the body it has too many fat cells and then triggers a slimming process that also boosts energy and lowers appetite.

'The effect is rather dramatic," he said in an interview Wednesday. "The protein resulted in almost a complete disappearance of body fat in these mice.

He said it is still not known, however, if the hormone is safe for long-term use.

"There appeared to be no side effects to the hormone." said Friedman. "but my instinct is to be cautious."

The hormone is naturally produced by a gene, called ob, that was discovered in the 1950s and cloned by Friedman's lab just last year.

Friedman said other genes related to weight control also must be identified before scientists thoroughly understand how the body controls its weight. At least one other rodent fat gene, called tub, has been cloned by Millennium Pharmaceuticals, a partner of Hoffman-La Roche Inc. of Nutley, N.J.

Three reports on leptin hormone studies will be published Friday in Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Douglas Coleman, a researcher for Jackson Laboratories in Bar Harbor, Maine, said the work by Friedman and others is 'a major breakthrough" in understanding the root causes of obesity, but he warned that the safety of the hormone leptin has yet to be proven for humans.

"In mice, if you get too much of it, it can cause death," he said. "The animals simply starve to death. It doesn't take much to have an effect." Coleman was an early researcher on the ob

Americans spend an estimated \$30 billion a year to control body weight, but most efforts eventually fail because the lost fat is regained within a few years, experts say.

Leptin, a name derived from the Greek word for "thin," is found in the blood of normal mice, but not in a mouse breed that has a flawed ob gene. These flawed mice become grossly obese and diabetic.

In the new research, scientists tested the effects of leptin by injecting ob mice daily with the hormone. The mice quickly began losing fat cells, ate less food and spent more time exercising.

'It was very, very rapid." said Friedman. Within two weeks, he said, most of the extremely fat mice reduced their body weight by about 30 percent. And even normal mice injected with leptin experienced a steep loss of body fat, he said.

The safety of leptin is now being intensely researched, said Dr. Frank Collins, a researcher at Amgen Inc., a Thousand Oaks. Calif., drug company that holds a license from Rockefeller University for use of the ob gene and its leptin hormone.

if the work goes smoothly, he said, experimental human trials on leptin could begin in about a year.

Science on Friday also is publishing leptin research by Collins at Amgen and by Hoffman-La Roche scientists.

In the Rockefeller study, researchers gave daily shots of leptin to ob-defective mice, to normal mice and to mice with a gene defect that makes them diabetic.

Within two weeks, said Friedman, the ob mice lost all but about 9 grams of body fat. Ob mice not given the shots eventually gained 38.30 grams of body fat. A normal mouse has about 5 grams of body fat.



CHARLOTTE, N.C. - From the outside, it looks like your basic garage that might be found anywhere across the United States: 16-by-24 feet, burnt red clapboard siding and dark gray fiberglass roof shingles.

Inside, however, it contains not cars, but car parts. And not just any car parts. Illegal car parts. Tons of them. The work of legions of creative would-be geniuses who crossed the line and were caught.

It is, quite simply, a sort of cheater's hall of fame for stock car racing's top circuit. "You name the infraction, and we've got it

here." Dick Beaty says. As he speaks, Beaty swings open the door to the hall of infamy, which is actually just a storage facility for parts confiscated during his 13-year tenure as the top cop on NASCAR's Winston Cup series. There are no tours, and the garage, which is on private property, isn't open to the public.

"I haven't even been in here myself in probably three or four months," Beaty says. Beaty, who retired at the end of the 1992 season, had the garage built while he was NASCAR's competition director. Illegal parts that were confiscated before he joined the sanctioning body in May 1980 were often stored in assorted warehouses or given away to auto racing museums.

Beaty wanted a central point to put the stuff, so the garage was built and he lined it with shelves that reach all the way to the rafters. It turned out to be a prudent move.

Today, the garage is jammed from front to back and floor to ceiling with hundreds upon hundreds of parts. Each one is tagged with the number of the car from which it

came, the date, the violation and the fine. The parts range from tiny - illegal boits to large - trunk lids and engines.

Likewise, the offenders cover a wide spectrum. It's a parallel to the 1995 Winston Cup season, when not even the team of points leader Jeff Gordon has escaped the long arm of NASCAR's team of inspectors.

Probably the most notorious violation that ended up in Beaty's garage is the engine Richard Petty used in winning the October 1983 race at Charlotte Motor Speedway. During the post-race inspection, the engine was found to be larger than the approved 358 cubic inches. Petty was allowed to keep the victory, but he was fined \$35,000 and assessed 104 points - at that point the most severe penalty in NASCAR history.

Browsing around the garage, a visitor notices several other tags with "No. 43" on the car entry line. "Yeah." Beaty says with a playful

chuckle. "ol' Richard was a bad boy."

Ask Beaty who was the most persistent offender during his era, and he says he's can't be certain. There's no index to the parts stored in the garage, so the exact number of parts and their origin cannot be casily verified.

Ask him about the most common violation, and that's easy. "Fuel," he says. "Fuel consumption and fuel storage. Everybody's always looking for an edge there.

Inquire about who was the craftiest crew chief, the one who made the NASCAR inspectors scratch their collective heads the most, and Beaty immediately fires back two words that may catch you off guard: Gary Nelson.

Nelson is the man who succeeded Beaty

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"Gary had a wonderful imagination - not dirty, mind you, but very resourceful." Beaty says. "He kept us on our loes."

These days, other crew chiefs are trying to keep Nelson on his toes, and Beaty's enjoying life as a retiree.

'I don't miss all the traveling and the long hours, getting up at 4 a.m. and all that," he says. "But I miss the people. The Frances were wonderful people to work for, and the way the organization was set up. I think we had the respect of everybody in the garage. They didn't always agree with everything we did, but I think they respected us. And that's what's important."

It's uncertain what will happen to all the contraband in the garage. NASCAR says it's planning to build a central storage facility for all the parts from the Beaty and Nelson eras, but the project is still in the planning stage.

Meantime, NASCAR continues to go after cheaters with the same philosophy as it did during the Beaty years.

"Words like 'unapproved' and 'nonconforming' don't mean anything." Beaty says. "If it hasn't been approved, it's illegal. It's as simple as that."

As Beaty gets ready to close the garage door, he acknowledges that yes, somewhere inside - he's not sure exactly where or what it is - there's a piece confiscated off a car prepared by then-crew chief Nelson.

"You'd have to ask Gary what it was." Beaty says. "I'm sure he'd remember."

Nelson broke into a smile when asked about his previous transgression. Those memories, he says with an ever-growing grin, are no longer clear.
