## Volunteers to clean up St. Johns River

SANFORD — The St. Johns River (Lake Monroe) along the Sanford shores will be part of the massive cleanup project to be undertaken this Saturday. Called the 1998 St. Johns River Celebration, the cleanup will actually involve waterways in 17 counties.

An estimated 6,000 volunteers will be ridding the water and water's edges tomorrow morning beginning at 8 a.m.

The St. Johns is one of the few rivers in America that flows north, and the longest river in Florida. It is considered a vital part of the state's economy and provides natural habitats for several endangered and threatened species.

In addition to the 310-mile-long river, cleanup will also be underway in the Oklawaha, Wekiva and Econlockhatchee rivers. South Georgia and Northeast Florida counties are also getting together to clean up the St. Marys River along the state line.

## Suzy Goldman is one for the books

SANFORD — The appointment was hardly a surprise. Who better than Suzy Goldman to succeed Jean Rhem as Director of Library & Leisure Services in Seminole County?

Not only had Goldman worked with and learned from Rhem for 17 years, she retained the same enthusiasm as they say she arrived. "Suzy Goldman definitely has high energy," County Commissioner Grant Maloy said Wednesday.

Goldman's responsibilities include the county's public library system, historical mu-

seum, and 18 parks and recreation facilities. She was named acting director in December, and last week became director — the second in the history of the county.

"There is a diverse job," said County Commissioner Chairman Randy Morris. "Suzy Goldman not only has to see our libraries are run well but also look out for the athletes and passive walkers in our parks."

"I'm on my own," Goldman said Wednesday. "Jean Rhem is fully retired. There's a lot I have observed in 17 years and a lot that is already in place. We've devised a plan and it's

# Freon warning

Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford reminds consumers that the sale, distribution or use of liquefied petroleum (LP) gas-based automobile air conditioning refrigerants is illegal in Florida.

"These products contain highly flammable gases that expose both the consumer and automobile service technicians to potential injury," Crawford said.

He noted that cans containing the LP gas based refrigerant known as HC-12a have been subject to failure under the normal circumstances encountered during their transportation. Failure of these cans can result in serious personal injury, death and property damage.

Testing of these cans by an independent testing laboratory indicated that out of 18 cans, six burst, three leaked and seven were distorted. The federal government is investigating manufacturers of similar products to determine whether or not these same safety risks are associated with their prod-

ucts and packages.

Crawford strongly cautioned consumers and businesses against the purchase of any product marketed as a freon replacement without first determining whether or not it is a safe and legal product. Products identified as illegal for sale in Florida include OZ-1 and HC12a (both manufactured by OZ Technologies of Idaho) and Duracool or Duracool 12a (manufactured by Duracool Limited Refrigerants and marketed by Fox Tool and Supply of Tennessee).

Under Florida law, consumers must be told what products are being introduced into their automobile air conditioning systems and in what quantities. Customers who are unsure of a product's contents are asked to get the name of the product and contact the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Ozone Protection Hotline at 1-800-296-1996 for assistance.

Negotiated by Public Counsel Jack Shreve, Attorney General Bob Butterworth and BellSouth-Florida President Joe Lacher, with support from AARP, the agreement allows telephone customers to share in BellSouth earnings over a four-year period. This final refund installment represents a share of the company's earnings from last year.

"We are very pleased that BellSouth customers are able to share along with their

stockholders in the strong earnings that the company enjoyed in 1997," said Shreve.

He continued, "We are appreciative of the efforts of those who helped make this possible, including AARP and the attorney general as well as the Florida Legislature. Since passage of the legislation in 1995, BellSouth has reduced its rates by \$164 million and, including this latest refund, refunded \$188 million back to customers."

important to follow that plan. I'm grateful that our team is still here."

In the first quarter of 1998, Goldman said the county had added 11,000 books and intends to add 40,000 for the year. She said there are 325,000 books and 7,000 audio cassettes available at the five branch libraries.

"We realize how much people like new books," Goldman said, "and we'll keep getting them. At the same time, others will be able to have quicker access to research material on computer. This, of course, affords more shelf space for our books."

Goldman's office is at the North Branch Library in Sanford. She has a roomy office off to one end of the building at Commercial and Palmetto. Her college degrees - including an MBA from Crummer Graduate School of Business at Rollins College - hang on one wall.

Modestly, she says she finished 12th in her class of 200 at Crummer. She was in the top 20 of 600 at Edgewater High School in Orlando and also graduated with honors in Humanities at the University of South Florida.

The daughter of an Air Force officer, Goldman was born in Springfield, Ohio and lived in Omaha and Baltimore before

coming to Florida when she was three years old. She made excellent grades through school, especially in science and math.

She aspired to be a Humanities professor but found it tough getting a job.

Her first work came as a Library Assistant at Hillsborough Community College in 1974. Seven years later she joined the Seminole County team, serving as a Technical Services Librarian. In 1991, she was named Manager of the Technical Services Division.

Goldman is married to Steve Goldman, a small business owner and they have an 11-year-old daughter, Rachel.

Her leisure hours are spent at art exhibits, chamber music or Bach festivals or at aerobics and fitness walking.

## Baha'i faith to celebrate new year, nine holy days

A new year begins for members of the Baha'i Faith on March 21, the first day of spring and the first day of the year 155 B.E. The letters "B.E." mean "Baha'i Era" and the year dates from 1844, when the religion originated in Persia.

The Baha'is of Orlando will celebrate the new year (Naw-Ruz) on March 21 with a picnic from 10 a.m. to sunset at Langford Park, 1808 E. Central Boulevard, Orlando. Games and activities are planned for everyone and the public is invited. Call Liz Rosario, 648-1356 for more information.

Naw-Ruz is one of nine Holy Days each year when Baha'is suspend work, and it comes at

the end of 19 days of fasting, when the members of this world religion abstain from all food and drink between the hours of sunrise and sunset.

The Baha'i calendar is solar, and consists of 19 months of 19 days each. Every month is named for an attribute of God, such as Glory, Beauty, Perfection, Justice, and Mercy. The Baha'i month begins with a community gathering called a Feast, when members meet together for prayer, consultation, and fellowship. The Baha'i day begins and ends at sunset.

The Baha'i Faith is the second most widely spread religion in the world, after Christianity, and its sacred literature has been translated into more than 800 languages. The World Center of the Baha'i Faith is in Haifa, Israel.

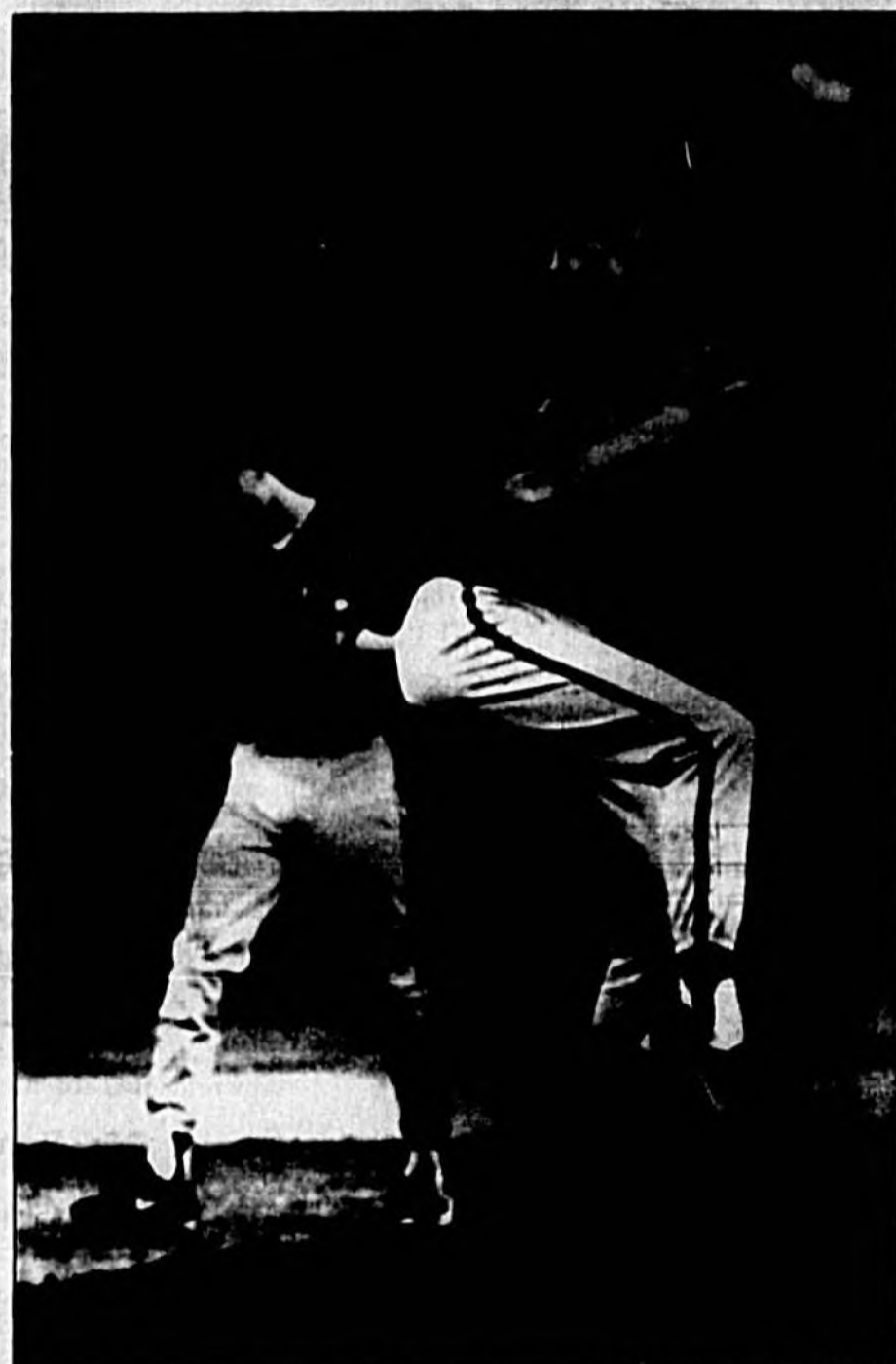

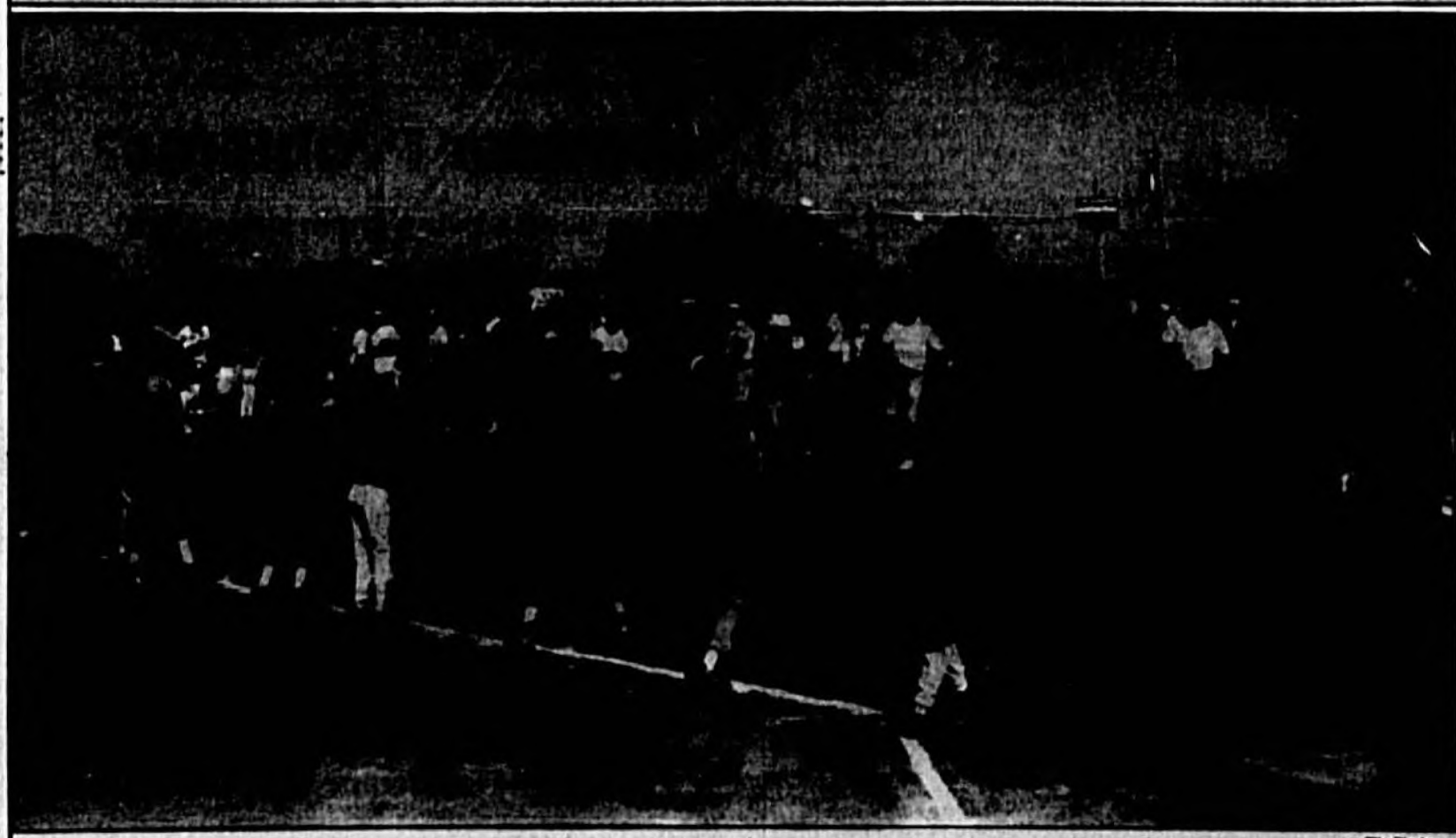

**DeBary Hall Chronology**

1815 Frederick deBary born Jan. 12 at Frankfurt am Main in Germany

1840 Frederick in New York as first agent for Mumm's Champagne

1844 Frederick returned to Europe to marry Julie Scherpenhauser

1845 Adolphe, a son, is born to Frederick and Julie

1858 Eugenie, a daughter, is born to Frederick and Julie

1861 Civil War broke out but barely affected the deBary business

1868 Frederick's wife, Julie, died when Eugenie was 10. Adolphe was 23

1871 Frederick began construction of DeBary Hall and back in New York moved to West 52nd St near his friends the Vanderbilts and Astors

1876 Frederick originated his large steamboat line on the St. Johns River. The DeBary Merchants' Line prospered carrying tourists, citrus and the U.S. Mail between Jacksonville and points south including Enterprise and Sanford

1898 Frederick, age 83, died Dec. 23 at Adolphe's home in Summit, N.J.

1901 Adolphe, his wife Augusta and their children spent part of almost every winter at DeBary Hall until Adolphe's death

1928 Adolphe died and DeBary Hall was placed in a trust for his grandchildren, Leonie deBary Lyon and Adolphe deBary Lyon

1937 Frederick deBary's great grandson, Adolphe deBary Lyon, was killed while rescuing a young girl from being hit by a car just two years after he had graduated from Harvard

1941 Frederick's great granddaughter, Leonie, and her husband Benjamin Brewster, the final deBary heirs to enjoy visits to DeBary Hall by flying their private plane into the Sanford or DeLand airports, died in a mountainside plane crash flying from Long Island to Philadelphia. In 101 years, four American generations of the deBary family had flourished and tragically ended.

1947 1000 acres are sold to Plantation Estates, Inc.

1959 Florida Federation of Art, Inc. (FFA) utilized DeBary Hall and five acres for their headquarters and an art gallery.

1967 FFA turned DeBary Hall and property over to the State of Florida

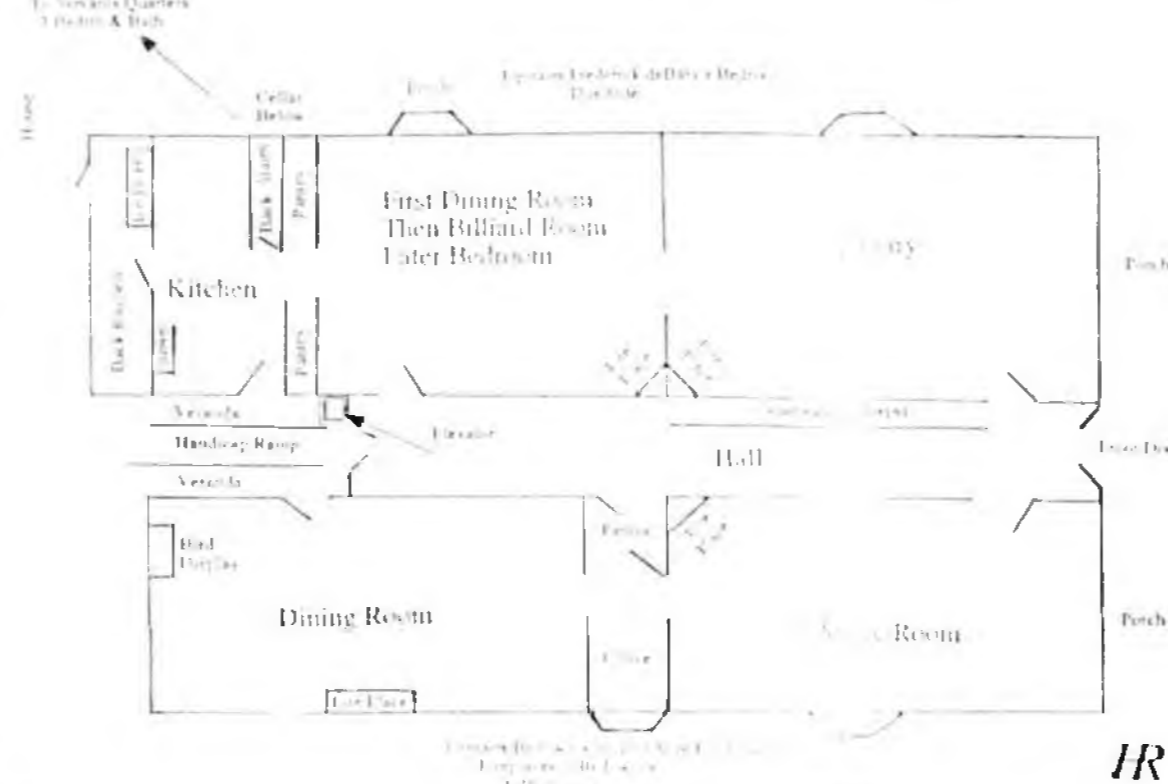
1973 DeBary Hall placed on the National Register of Historic Places

1975 FFA terminated their lease of DeBary Hall

1977 DeBary Hall Senior Center, Inc. leased the mansion for use as a senior citizens and community center

1989 Volusia County Council on Aging terminated its program at DeBary Hall

1990 Florida Department of Natural Resources leased DeBary Hall to Volusia County for a fifty year renewable lease

Brooks wrote of deBary's incredible 90-hour journey from New York to oversee construction of his new \$20,000 plantation mansion near Lake Monroe. Little did he realize the impact his business ventures would have on the future growth of major industries and settlements in Florida.

**DEBARY FOUNDER**

Frederick deBary was born January 12th, 1815 at Frankfurt-am-Main in Germany. His family later moved to Rheims, the wine producing area of France. In 1840 he went to New York and started an importing firm for Mumm's Champagne and other fine wines.

In 1870 Frederick came to Enterprise, Florida for a visit to Brock House, he bought 400 acres to start a hunting and fishing preserve. DeBary Hall was built for the family's winter home. His holdings grew to 9000 acres and included a steamship line. Frederick deBary died December 23, 1898. His son Adolphe, and his wife Augusta, inherited DeBary Hall. Frederick's great granddaughter Leonie Brewster, the last heir to enjoy visits to DeBary Hall, died in a plane crash in 1941.

## As It Once Was.....

In 1871 Frederick deBary built DeBary Hall Mansion in a grove of live oak trees surrounded by cool green pines. While the deBarys were at the mansion they landscaped and developed the land for both personal and business reasons.

An extensive park stretched from the lake where steamships docked and unloaded its cargo, past the pool, deBary Hall and out to the deBarys farm. Violets covered the ground in season while trails were covered with crushed shell taken from Indian Midden from the deBary estate.

The pool was made with wide cypress boards and had a pure white sand bottom. The pool was filled with water provided by natural springs. Exotic shrubs screened dressing huts at one end of the pool. Visitors walked a path from the pool to the hall lined with brilliant colored oleanders creating a living arbor. All that is left of this arbor today is a few photos that show its existence.

Inside the fenced mansion grounds the deBary family planted many fine

expensive trees and shrubs. Multiple palms, camellias, cedars, camphors and bamboo are a few of the plants that graced the gardens. Wine bottles lined the drive and garden borders. The center of the front yard held a terra cotta fountain with two children holding an umbrella. There were two other fountains also in the garden located on either side of the front drive.

One of the oldest plants on the property is a *Cyrass Revoluta*. It is a native of Japan and China. It is believed that this species is one of the worlds oldest living plants. This low growing plant is here about commonly called the Sago Palm. Located in the front of the mansion this tree is believed to have been planted in 1900.

A green house was located behind the mansion on the east side. The deBarys cultivated rare plants and exotic flowers. Students in the summer of 1997 unearthed the brick foundation of this green house located at the edge of a bamboo patch.

Beyond the mansion grounds and stables were many other plants. There

was a broad pasture for cows to graze and an extensive vegetable garden to provide food for the family.

Orange groves were planted south west of the mansion grounds. The packing house was built beside the lake pier. The groves were filled with citrus in the winter of December 1894 when a freeze destroyed the fruit. It was followed in February 1895 by a freeze that killed the trees. Frederick was so upset he had the trees dug up and Pecans planted in their place. The pecan trees however were not successfully grown and provided only enough nuts for local squirrel's.

We have a 100 x 200-ft. lot contain-

ing a small patch of grass (I use the word grass loosely) plus one small fountain, various shrubs and trees. It is a constant battle between disease, weeds and watering to keep what we have. Pulling together my husband and I have had the help of books, electricity, sprinklers, and Suniland.

I admire the first DeBary residents for the work and time that must have taken place to help sustain this grand estate. I will continue to work and support DeBary Hall Inc. to help recreate this era so we too can walk the grounds as they once were.

## How important is it to eat breakfast?

A recent survey found that as many as 30 percent of children between the ages of 8 and 13 do not eat breakfast every day. In the frenzy of getting out the door in the morning, breakfast can seem like an unnecessary bother. However, research suggests that eating breakfast makes a real difference in our day, leading experts to advise finding ways to make a morning meal part of our lifestyle may be more than worth the effort.

Children and adults who eat breakfast score higher on tests, have longer attention spans and better concentration, and exhibit better muscle coordination than those who skip breakfast. Many people think that skipping breakfast will help them lose weight, however, studies do not support this belief. In fact, breakfast skippers are more likely to be overweight. Researchers say that may be due to a drop in the rate our bodies burn calories when they go a long time without food. It may also reflect the well-documented observation that those who eat very lightly during the morning and afternoon tend to overeat at dinner and throughout the evening.

There is also a more profound reason to worry about breakfast-skippers. The report on diet and cancer recently released by

The American Institute for Cancer Research emphasized that eating at least five servings of fruits and vegetables every day could prevent 20 percent of cancer incidence. By waiting until lunch to start moving toward that goal, your chances of achieving it are greatly decreased. Starting the day with sliced banana on cereal, raisins in oatmeal, or berries whirled in a fruit smoothie, can start you on the way to getting your five a day.

If time is the major obstacle to making breakfast, prepare as much as you can the night before to speed things up in the morning. Pack a breakfast you can eat on the way to work or as soon as you get there. Enroll your children in the school breakfast program, where they may be

more likely to eat if they can socialize at the same time.

If your stomach doesn't tolerate food too well first thing in the morning, try eating on an early morning break, being careful not to ruin your appetite for lunch. Research shows that many people who don't feel like eating breakfast have often eaten large amounts of food at dinner the night before or just prior to going to bed. By eating earlier in the day, your body will adjust to the new schedule, allowing you to eventually eat less at night. Not only will this allow you to eat breakfast more easily, but you may feel an increase in energy throughout the day and experience a gradual loss of weight.

Breakfast doesn't have to mean eating traditional morning foods. Just try to include grain products (like cereal, toast, or pasta), a little protein (such as milk, yogurt, cheese, or peanut butter), and a solid serving of fruits or vegetables. For the little effort involved, research suggests you will get great returns.

## When your young child is very active

Dear Mary,

Our 1st grader has always been very active. We've learned to live with it, but his teacher is getting fed up. He's constantly getting out of his seat without permission, and she says his restlessness disrupts the other kids in the class.

He's always been a lot more rowdy than his older sister, but we figured that's just the way boys are. Now he's having trouble with reading and his teacher isn't sure he will master all the work in 1st grade without going to summer school. His teacher wants to have him evaluated for hyperactivity or Attention Deficit. She thinks he may need medication to help him settle down, but we're real nervous about doing that. We've heard all kinds of horror stories about kids 8 and 9 years old getting addicted or turning into zombies.

We sure don't want our son to fall behind in school, but we

don't want him drugged either. We're in a quandary and need some advice on how to proceed.

Rowdy Boy's Mom and Dad

Dear Mom and Dad,

The best way to make a decision like this is to consider all the options and choose the one either most likely to be helpful or least likely to cause harm. Diagnosing ADD (Attention Deficit Disorder) or ADHD (Hyperactivity Disorder) requires input from numerous adults who see your child in

different settings. It can't hurt, and may be helpful, to have school personnel and you, yourselves, complete ADD/ADHD checklists concerning your child. These checklists will be rated against normative data. You can then take these checklists to your son's pediatrician and together you and the doctor can at least make some educated guesses as to whether medication may be helpful. Most physicians feel that these medications don't do much "sedate" the child, as they help to correct a possible biochemical imbalance, which allows the child to focus his attention and regulate his energy level more normally. There are also behavioral techniques both you and the school personnel can try, to see if his behavior and activity can be regulated non-medically.

In any case, the worst thing you can do, in my opinion, is nothing. You already know he's

headed for trouble both behaviorally and academically. There really isn't time to see if he will "outgrow" his problem. Start gathering information now from teachers, your son's physician, and other professionals, to help you make an informed decision on how to help your son.

## Woman's obesity weighs on sister-in-law's mind

DEAR ABBY: My sister-in-law is a wonderful woman who has a severe weight problem. She's 50 years old and has no bad habits except for eating. She refuses to discuss diets and gets very upset when the subject is broached. She has fallen down stairs because she was unable to see the steps.

Abby, she refuses to see a doctor, my brother tells me, because she knows a doctor will confront her about her weight. I suggested she should at least have her blood pressure taken at the local pharmacy. She ignores me.

I believe she needs psychological care. I can't bear to lose her, and I fear that she will die soon if she doesn't try to help herself.

DEAR SCARED: Although some people use food the way junkies and alcoholics use drugs and alcohol, I know of no intervention program for people with life-threatening weight problems. Indeed, she may need psychological help in order to win her battle. # Adult fear of injections

DEAR DR. GOTT: Some time ago, you wrote a column about the irrational fear of injections. You said that, when properly administered, shots don't hurt. You also discouraged the use of topical anesthetics to dull the pain.

Your answer was typical medical doctrine. I don't agree with it. I suffer from the ANTICIPATION of shots and blood tests. Weeks before my appointment, I begin to get nervous. The apprehension is far worse than the actual injection. I believe that a topical anesthetic would help me get through this.

DEAR READER: Physically it won't, but if it does, you can thank the placebo effect. You believe that it will help, so it does. As I've written before, most adults who are afraid of the needle recognize the irrational basis for their fear. No amount of persuasion or vapid reassurances will reduce that fear. However, by receiving a relatively painless injection, their apprehension is usually reduced. As you stated, it's not the pain, it's the anticipation. A splinter in the finger is far more uncomfortable than a properly administered injection.

I think that you could easily overcome your phobia (which probably dates from a previous childhood fear) by repetitive confrontation. Once you have had several painless shots, the whole issue should disappear. If topical anesthetics help you to get through this, fine — but they're really unnecessary.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I used to be a fine athlete with a well-developed, muscular body. Now, at 76, I'm ashamed to look in the mirror and see how much muscle I've lost. I eat well but don't exercise as regularly as I should. Is there something I can do to build up my muscles?

DEAR READER: As they age, men and women alike lose strength and muscle mass. Past medical dogma dictated that these changes were inevitable, we all suffer from them if we live long enough.

Recent experiments have shown that this dogma is incorrect. Several studies have proved that men and women can build muscle strength through a program of weight training. I urge you to sign up at your community fitness center and begin an active program of muscle strengthening. While you will probably never become a champion body builder or recapture your successes as a youth, you will certainly be gratified at the improvement you'll experience. This weight training will also lead to additional benefits, in the form of pleasurable activity, fellowship with other participants, and improved cardiovascular fitness. In short, getting old doesn't mean that you have to give up.

# WIN AT BRIDGE

## Seven days later

By Phillip Alder

Last Friday, I gave a deal in which a declarer claimed he had played with the odds by following the old rubric "eight ever, nine never." When you are missing just the queen in a suit, with a combined eight cards you finesse on the second round, whereas with a combined nine cards you play off the ace and king, expecting the queen to drop.

That is a reasonably reliable maxim to follow when you have eight cards. But when you have nine, for several reasons it may be right to finesse on the second round — or even on the first round.

Against three no-trump, West leads the spade seven: four, 10, queen (or king). How should South continue? From the Rule of Eleven, it is known that West has a spade suit that is

## ready to run if East can gain the lead and push a spade through South's remaining honor. Subtracting seven (the card led) from 11 tells South there are four spades higher than the seven in the other three hands. Here, declarer has seen them all: the eight in the dummy, East's 10, and his queen and king.

Declarer has five tricks outside clubs: one spade (trick one), three hearts and one diamond. So, four club tricks are enough. The right line is to play a club to dummy's ace and a club to the jack. If the finesse loses, the contract is safe because West cannot run his spades. Here, the finesse wins and declarer has 10 tricks. Note, though, that if declarer plays off the ace and king of clubs, East wins the third club trick with his queen and returns a spade, killing the contract.

Always consider the deal as a whole — and don't forget the Rule of Eleven.
