## Battle Of Atlantic Hits New Crescendo

### Arming Of U. S. Merchantmen Predicted As Nazis Report Continuing Attacks

### Gayda Flays FDR's Order

### Fascist Sees President's Speech As Declaration Of War

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The first Turkish comment of President Roosevelt's short-frist address came from official radio, which declared: "Germany flayed herself in the same blind alley as she did in the last war. The important thing is—how will Germany react?"

LONDON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Battered by two a-bomb attacks an air assault in a racing storm, and just missing a fight with a German surface raider, the bulk of the British convoy in the Atlantic, nevertheless, reached port with loss of only eight ships, the Admiralty announced today.

The battle of the Atlantic surged toward a new crescendo today as Germany reported that a continuing U-boat attack on a British bound convoy had sunk four more merchantmen and three escorting warships and Washington quarters predicted that American cargo craft soon would be armed.

Nazi High Command communique was issued and claimed a toll from a single convoy to 31—22 merchantmen and three warships.

Germany's attack on the U.S. merchantmen was intensified by announcement that another American-owned freighter of Panama registry, the *Montana*, was being directed to route to Iceland, about 12 hours before President's declaration against Nazi raiders.

In Rome, Virginia Gayda, an authoritative fascist writer, declared today that the United States had issued a "de facto declaration of war," and Italy and Germany would adjust their weapons to meet what he called a "threatened attack by the United States in any part of the world."

Gayda apparently meant a declaration of war actually without legal status as contrasted with a formal "de jure" declaration.

While Italy and Germany sought to fix limits and conditions of war, "American war mongering leaves the door open for a new world war," Gayda said.

The American-owned cargo ship *Montana* was torpedoed midway between Iceland and Newfoundland Thursday a short time before President Roosevelt warned Germany and Italy that Axis ships henceforth would be shot or sunk in United States waters.

The state department announced that the crew of 26, composed of 18 Danes, five Norwegians, one Greek, one Belgian and one Spanish, and the American citizens, took to lifeboats.

The vessel, one of the Danish ships requisitioned by the state department Aug. 2, was under Panamanian registry. It carried a cargo of 1,500,000 lbs. of lumber for Norway and three other Scandinavian ports.

The State Department did not say the vessel was sunk. As it is loaded with lumber, there was speculation it might be still afloat.

The State Department's announcement of the attack said: "The Department of State has been informed that the American-owned cargo ship *Montana*, under Panamanian registry, formerly the Danish ship *Faulk*, which was requisitioned by the state department on Aug. 2, 1941, was torpedoed and sunk in the Atlantic Ocean on Sept. 12, 1941, by a German U-boat. The vessel was carrying a cargo of lumber for the island of Norway.

## Opinions Of Sanfordites Vary On Amendment To City Charter

### Interest Grows In Proposal To Change Charter

### Relatively Heavy Balloting Expected In Tuesday's Election

Present indications are that the balloting will be relatively heavy as the registered voters of the City of Sanford go to the polls on Tuesday to decide upon important changes in the method of electing the Mayor and members of the City Commission.

With the pros and cons of the plan as set forth in a special bill passed at the last Legislative session replacing the oldest street corner parleys, interest in the proposed charter changes is apparently growing daily, leading to predictions of a good turnout of interested citizens when the question is finally decided at the ballot box on Tuesday.

The City Commission, adopting the slogan of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, "Vote As You Please But Vote," has urged all qualified voters of Sanford to give the question their serious consideration and to express their wishes in the matter at the polls Tuesday in accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the Legislature of the State of Florida in 1941, place an 'X' mark in front of the words "For the election."

Here is the question which will appear on the ballot Tuesday: "If you favor the Mayor and the members of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, being elected by the duly qualified voters of the City of Sanford, Florida, for a term of two years in accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the Legislature of the State of Florida in 1941, place an 'X' mark in front of the words 'Against the election.'"

## Nazis Concerned Over Production Of Planes In U. S.

### NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The overhwhelming concern of the German espionage system for American production of airplanes and their delivery to Britain in 1940 gave way in 1941 to a desire for information about the American air force itself and the character of American warcraft, it was disclosed yesterday at the trial of 18 men charged with espionage conspiracy.

In 1940, according to the message exchanged by headquarters in Germany and "seps" radio station on Long Island, the Hamburg gantop station demanded information ranging from weather conditions (which were asked to be broadcast daily) in plane and parts production of all the leading aircraft companies. Deliveries to Britain were stressed.

About the time agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation cracked down upon the spy ring, into which they had planted themselves firmly through counter-espionage measures Hamburg was demanding information about defense strength in Canada and the United States, size of forces, amount of equipment and shipyard locations and production.

One message dated June 11, 1941, received by the station here said: "How much money do you have left? In amounts as for the sake of the condition of the deposit."

"What has happened to air reports? We urgently need reports on condition American air force, industry and details accounts about falling off of production in factories, including machine tool factories through strike agitation."

Always in recent months, the messages indicated there was a desire on the part of Hamburg to keep agents well supplied with cash, and to prod them for still more information about American defense forces and production.

Hamburg also wanted near the end, that two more radio stations be constructed—one in the north and one in the south, and made suggestions as to their location by coordinates and train union lines were confirmed as they did the use through which more than 500 names were noted.

Public opinion seemed somewhat divided today in a poll conducted by The Sanford Herald on the charter amendment to be voted upon next Tuesday. A Herald reporter asked several citizens at random the question: "What do you think of the proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Sanford?" The opinions of the individuals who were interviewed varied considerably.

Judge James G. Sharon, described it as being a part of "the good old democratic ruling" while James Huff, opposed to the bill, "in a way" and he approved of the present system of electing commissioners. "So far we have always had good commissions."

Mrs. Arthur Partin has not made up her mind how she will vote but she feels "an amendment of this kind will give the public more chance to express its opinion, since the Mayor is more directly involved."

Walter M. Haynes and Mrs. H. L. Perkins are both in favor of keeping the present policy. "I am well pleased with our present system and I see no reason for a change," Mr. Haynes stated today.

Flord Palmer said, "The voting 'yes' or 'no' on Tuesday is not a life or death proposition as I see it. However, the questions of politics and the benefits to one side or the other naturally come into the picture and while I am not politically inclined, I have been trying to detect a motive behind the amendment, if there is one. I see no reasons why conscientious commissioners from the old ones couldn't be elected if the public feels he is the best at the next election."

"As we need to feel that if this bill is carried, there will be drastic changes made? The present system is doing a fine job and a thankless one but if the 'wolves' on next Tuesday want a change, then let's forget it and 'pull together' just once."

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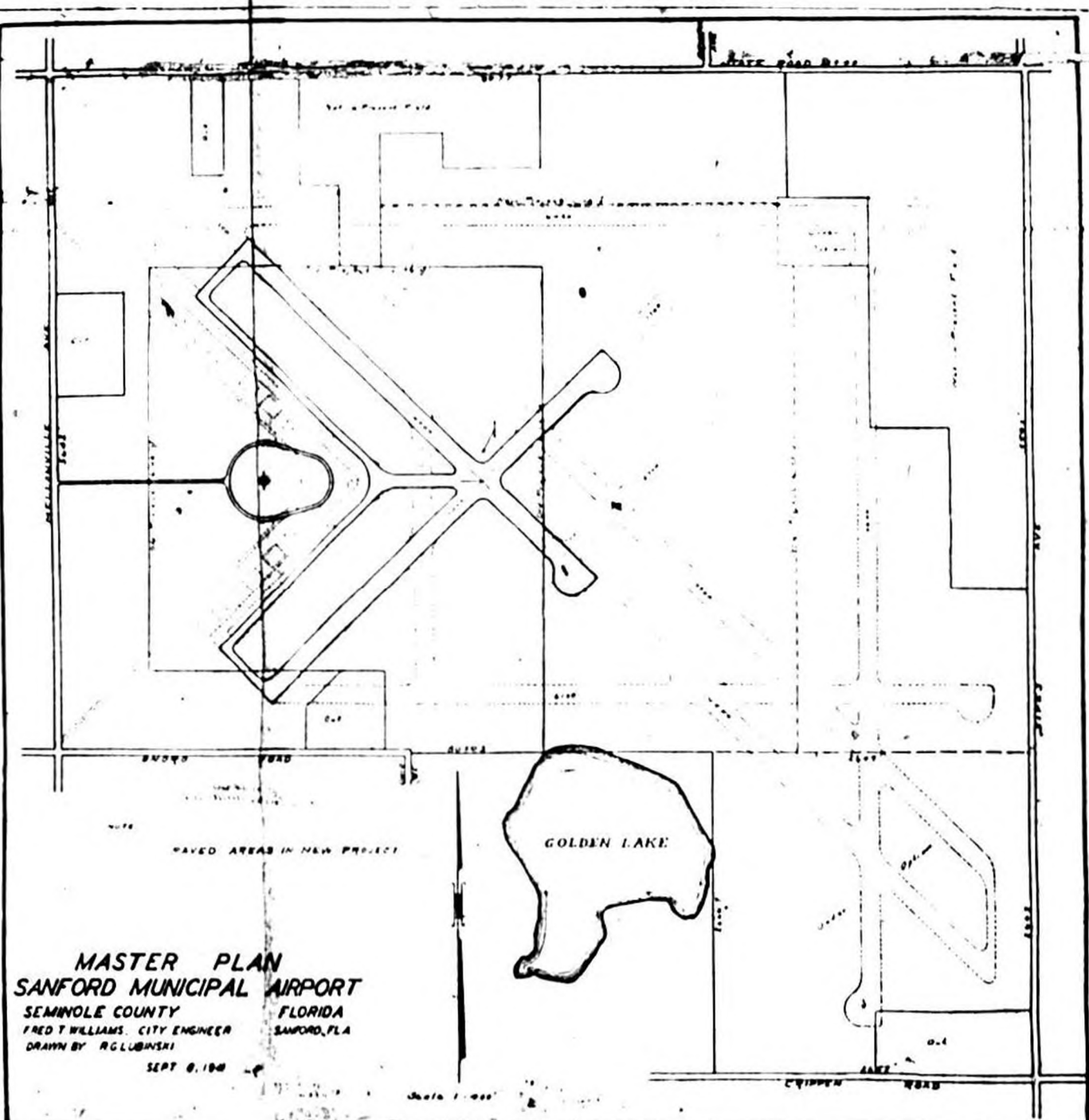

## Seafarers Walk Out Over War Bonus Dispute

### Unionists Ordered Off Ships Bound For Belligerents

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The Seafarers International Union of North America (S.I.U.) called a walkout today over the war bonus dispute by ordering its members off all ships bound for Axis or Allied ports.

In New York harbor three ships with cargoes of supplies for American defense bases in Bermuda and the West Indies cancelled sailings as the crews walked out.

Union Secretary-Treasurer John Hawk, said the strike would affect eventually the Union's 20,000 members employed on ships in all Atlantic and Gulf ports.

## Airfield Construction Expected To Begin Within Next Ten Days

### \$67,000 WPA Project Covering Initial Phase Of CAA Development Makes Final Rounds In Washington

While the second WPA project for development of the Sanford Municipal Airport is working its way through official Washington channels to the President's office for final sanction, plans are being made by City officials to begin work within 10 days on one of Central Florida's largest national defense projects.

This WPA project covers the initial phase of the further development of the airfield made through the Civil Aeronautics Administration and unless some unforeseen obstacles arise within the next few days, the application is expected to be in the hands of the State Administrator by the latter part of next week, with the actual construction to begin almost immediately thereafter.

With funds totaling approximately \$600,000 already appropriated by the City of Sanford and government agencies, upon the completion of the project Sanford will have one of the finest air fields in the state. The location of Sanford in the heart of Florida increases the military importance of such a field which is sufficiently large to permit its use as a base for operation of the Army's largest type bombers.

The project, as it stands today, has been designated as "necessary for national defense" by the Civil Aeronautics Administration and that agency has appropriated \$115,000 for the development of the field. A total of \$67,000 of this amount is a WPA non-labor allocation for the clearing, grading, draining, mcholing and sodding of the two landing strips which will be 500' x 1200'. The fencing of the field is also provided for in this allocation. The remaining \$148,000 will go for contracts to pave runways and taxiways and to install the basic lighting facilities.

The WPA project for the non-labor allocation of \$67,000 is making the final rounds at the Capital, according to advice from Rep. Joe H. E. Smith, while here the bids are being cleared and ready to begin work on the project within the next 10 days.

Meanwhile, the WPA project for an all-over grass field, including the clearing of the 400 acre plot, is still in operation.

In reviewing the work that has been done on the project by the City Commission and others, it is recalled that last April the tract was purchased by the City upon the advice of Washington authorities. A WPA project was immediately submitted and approved for the clearing and grading of an all-grass field, the project which is in operation at the present time. This project called for an expenditure of federal and local funds in the amount of approximately \$115,000.

In June the City Commission made application to the Civil Aeronautics Administration for the certification of the Sanford airport for national defense, requesting an allocation for the future development of the field.

This request was granted as outlined in a letter to Mayor W. C. Hill, dated August 4, 1941, from the regional manager of the CAA in Atlanta. The letter reads in part as follows:

## Nazi Thrust Turned Back By Russians

### Reds Claim 26 Towns Are Recaptured In Gigantic Struggle On Central Front

### Withdrawal Near Kiev Is Admitted

### 10,000 Germans Said Lost In Stalling Of Bryansk Drive

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A flow of British and United States made plans to Russian warfront is expected in well informed quarters to be increased soon through ferry man in part by Americans, it was disclosed tonight.

In the gigantic struggle between the Russians and Germans, the Red army was reported today to have rolled back a great German offensive on Bryansk, 220 miles southwest of Moscow and to have recaptured 26 towns and villages and inflicted the loss of almost 10,000 Germans in a long and bloody battle.

The Germans themselves had little to say of the Eastern front. The Russians, while claiming to have the better of it generally all along the eastern front, acknowledged early today their withdrawal from Chernikov, 80 miles northeast of Kiev along the lower central front.

This meant the Nazis had crossed the Dnieper above that Ukrainian capital, extending 30 miles beyond the river a salient from which a flanking attack could be made to the southwest to take the Kiev defenders from behind.

All this, however, was well to the south of the main Russian counter-offensive in the Gomel-Smolensk area and did not imply any check of that operation.

German reports emphasized the difficulties being met in mud, rain and bad terrain but insisted that "still more heavy" Nazi troops would fall before winter sets in.

Moscow, in a series of optimistic reports, declared: "That the Russian Baltic fleet had entered heavily into the defense of Leningrad, bombarding German troop concentrations and tank columns on the city's approaches and beating back the German navy."

That the full power of the Nazi offensive could not much longer be sustained in that theater in the face of losses which the Soviet spokesman, S. A. Lozovsky, described as the greatest ever suffered by German arms.

That the long Red counter-offensive at the center still was uninterrupted and that in the south a new counter-offensive had been launched, Russian troops having recaptured the Dnieper river to the west at four points, capturing a strategic island and two villages. More than half of the 16 Nazi-occupied divisions thrown against Odessa on the Black sea had been annihilated, Lozovsky asserted.

Six more Seminole County men have answered Uncle Sam's call to service and will report for duty and assignment at Camp Blending on Monday, S. P. Collier, chairman of the Seminole County board said today.

The men are James Ralph Williams, Marion Harmon Thomas, Elijah Clyde Walker, Henry B. Longwell, Marshall Urquhart, Al Longwell and Levi Jennings. McNab who has been living at Fort Lauderdale. A quota of seven colored men will leave on Sept. 17.

## Plane Found Near Newfoundland Town

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The wreckage of a three plane found in the wilderness of Newfoundland today today of the disaster which killed Thomas H. Smith who set off alone for a trans-atlantic adventure in a "shanty clipper" from Miami in May 1939.

"Walking out to avoid freezing," said the note left in the plane. No trace has been found of the plane.

RAF Smashes At Baltic Port And Kiel Naval Base

LONDON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Royal Air Force bombers, diving from a cloudy sky, smashed at the great German Baltic port of Rostock for the first time Thursday night...

The raids, against bases used by the Germans for operations against the Russian Baltic fleet, were believed part of a British drive to lighten Nazi pressure on the Kiel naval base again.

The pilots reported that fires at Rostock were visible for a half hour as they headed back toward Britain.

The raids on Kiel, which has been a regular RAF target, were made from less cloudy skies than those over Rostock and "big fires" were set in the harbor and shipyards.

The air ministry said that three planes were missing from the night's operations which also included heavy attacks on the Danzig coast where two ships were reported hit and shipping off the Norwegian coast where one vessel was struck.

University Marine Studio May Bring New Scientists To Miami

CORAL GABLES, Sept. 12.—(Special)—A marine station which may bring scientists from distant points throughout the Americas to South Florida to study tropical reefs and ocean life is being planned by the Biology department of the University of Miami.

The laboratory is to cost from \$7,000 to \$25,000 and will be built on Elliott's Key, a few miles south of Miami, on a site donated by Charles B. Moore, operator of the nearby Ledbury Lodge.

Facilities will be provided for the systematic examination of the life histories of fish, shellfish and sponges, their feeding habits and habits of increase, the embryology and physiology of marine plants and animals and the environment in which they live.

Complete laboratory accommodations for 20 advanced students will be situated in a main building measuring 35 feet square. Chemical nets, gear, diving equipment and the like for biological and chemical research will be stored in the building.

The University of Miami Marine Biological Station will be the only one of its kind in the United States and may remain as the only one of its kind in the world.

### Chicago University Sells Average Mortals Ticket To Swank Estate

By E. L. ALMEY  
 CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—People whose income dictates a modest existence are getting a glimpse of living in the grand manner since the University of Chicago acquired Mill Road Gardens.

The university has put down the welcome mat at the \$7,000,000 estate 20 miles north of the city, near fashionable Lake Forest.

Gates which once were closed to all but select visitors have been opened to anyone who wants to pay the price equivalent of a movie ticket.

The 415-acre estate, a horticulturalist's playground, was donated to the university by Albert D. Lasker, former chairman of the board of Lorillard & Thomas advertising agency and once chairman of the U. S. Shipping Board.

Lasker stipulated that the university hold the property for two years while it determines whether the estate is to be sold for educational use. Therefore the university may dispose of the estate as it sees fit. No decision has been announced.

For three weeks in September and October the gates will be open for a chrysanthemum show, featuring acres of hardy strains, developing under the direction of the university botany department.

The estate is centered on a 50-room French provincial manor house surrounded by 92 acres of formal grounds and gardens. A half million dollars worth of furnishings, most of them antiques, fill the structure.

The whitewashed brick mansion was designed by Architect David Adler and was completed in 1927. Some of its walls were imported from France. The splendor of the manor house is matched by that of its surroundings.

Here are some of the items: A topiary (landscape) garden of dwarf Chinese elms cut in various animal, human and geometric designs—chairs, spirals, balls, chickens, squirrels and dancing girls.

A cutting garden—source of freshly cut flowers, the manor's garden in which flowers bloom according to the season; a sun dial garden where the time in 57 cities of the world

may be read.

Fifty-six acres of farm land, 90 acres of wooded land, 100 acres of 18-hole golf course which Bobby Jones and Gene Sarazen have called one of the best in the nation.

Approximately six miles of clipped hedges ranging from one to 21 feet in height.

Hundreds of geranium trees 11 to 15 years old and eight to nine feet high; scores of espaliered (trained) trees.

Greenhouse-cultivated figs and grapes; peaches and nectarines; a variety of orchids, hundreds of tuberoses, begonias, and large hanging baskets of fuchsias.

A floodlight swimming pool bordered by statuary and shrubs.

Bath houses that look like small homes, and gatekeeper's and superintendent's lodges which would appear pretentious in any other setting.

An air-conditioned recreation building with sound movie equipment and about 25 luxurious chairs, called "the most expensive movie per chair in existence."

### Shaffer To Manage Orange Show Again

WINTER HAVEN, Sept. 13.—(Special) Amos R. Shaffer, who has been executive manager of the Florida Orange Festival for the past few years, will again manage the show and planning to return here in the fall to make plans for the 1942 festival which will be held Jan. 19-21, inclusive, John A. Seiler, Jr., president of the festival association, announced this week.

Shaffer is now handling the civilian national defense exposition in New York but is in touch with festival officials and is working out plans for his arrival here in December.

Shaffer is planning certain improvements which will put greater emphasis upon the idea of a "community citrus show" centering around the visit of 2,000 members of the National United Fruit and Vegetable Association during the week.

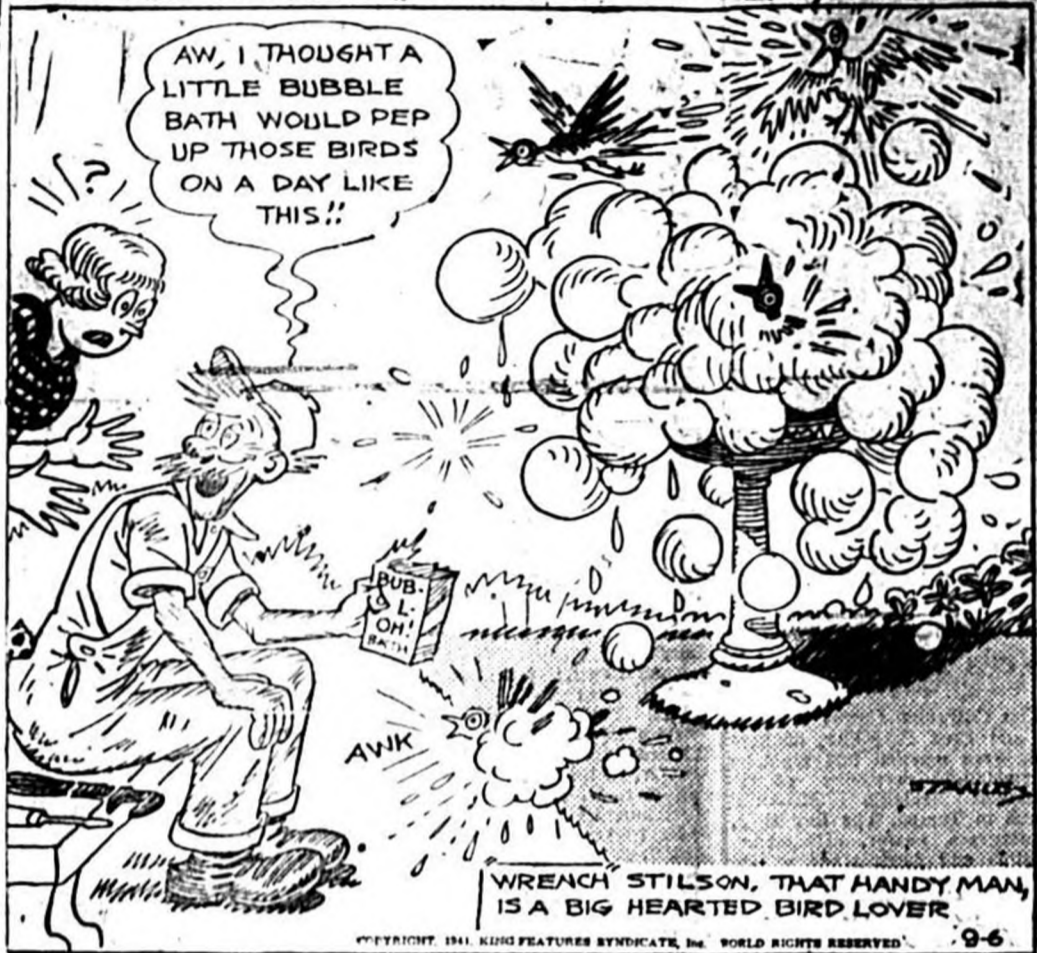
### Hog Show Will Be Held In Trenton

### Meetings Called For Consideration Of Housing Plan

TALIAHASSEE, Sept. 13.—(Special) Meetings of the boards of county commissioners, to be held the week of Sept. 15, have been requested by Governor Seward L. Hodges to consider regulations to create the Central Florida Regional Housing Authority in the counties of Citrus, DeSoto, Hardee, Highlands, Indian River, Manatee, Marion, Martin, Okechobee, Orange, Pensacola, Palm Beach, Polk, St. Lucie, Sarasota, and Sumter, according to Amma McClellan, State housing coordinator.

Notices of a public hearing to be held by the board were published last week. The county agent, county farm demonstration agent, farm security administration supervisor, local realtors, building and loan officials, bank officials, and civic leaders have been invited to attend the hearings. The Governor has advised the chairman of the boards that the State housing coordinator will attend the meeting to explain the entire program.

For a county to benefit by the USHA-aided rural housing program, it is necessary that the county commissioners adopt certain resolutions to comply with the rural housing authorities law, enacted at the 1941 session of the Legislature.

After this formal action to comply with the legal requirements, and upon the recommendation of the board of county commissioners, the governor will appoint one person from each of these counties as a commissioner of the Central Florida Regional Housing Authority. The appointees will organize and then apply to the United States Housing Authority for an earmarking of the \$500,000, which was allocated last May for the construction and operation of 250 low-cost rural homes for farmers, sharecroppers, tenants and rural wage workers, to be rented to rural families of very low income, who are now occupying

### Chicago University Sells Average Mortals Ticket To Swank Estate

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—(AP)—People whose income dictates a modest existence are getting a glimpse of living in the grand manner since the University of Chicago acquired Mill Road Gardens.

The university has put down the welcome mat at the \$3,500,000 estate 30 miles north of the city, near fashionable Lake Forest.

Gates which once were closed to all but select visitors have been opened to anyone who wants to pay the price equivalent of a movie ticket.

The 416-acre estate, a horticulturist's fairyland, was donated to the university by Albert D. Lasker, former chairman of the board of Lord & Thomas advertising agency and once chairman of the U. S. Shipping Board.

Lasker stipulated that the university hold the property for two years while it determines whether the estate can be put to an educational use. Thereafter the university may dispose of the estate as it sees fit. No decision has been announced.

For three weeks in September and October the gates will be open for a chrysanthemum show featuring acres of hardy strains developed under the direction of the university botany department.

The estate is centered by a 50-room French provincial manor house surrounded by 52 acres of formal grounds and gardens. A half million dollars worth of furnishings, most of them antiques, fill the structure.

The whitewashed brick mansion was designed by Architect David Adler and was completed in 1927. Some of its walls were imported from France. The splendor of the manor house is matched by that of its surroundings.

Here are some of the items:

- A topiary (landscape) garden of dwarf Chinese elms cut in various animal, human and geometric designs—chairs, spirals, balls, chickens, squirrels and dancing girls.
- A cutting garden—source of freshly cut flowers, the madam's garden in which flowers bloom according to the season; a sun dial garden where the time in 57 cities of the world

may be read.

Fifty-six acres of farm land, 90 acres of wooded land.

A 178-acre 18-hole golf course which Bobby Jones and Gene Sarazen have called one of the best in the nation.

Approximately six miles of clipped hedges ranging from one to 31 feet in height.

Hundreds of geranium trees 14 to 15 years old and eight to nine feet high; scores of espaliered (trained) trees.

Greenhouse-cultivated figs and grapes, peaches and nectarines; a variety of tuberoses, begonias, and large hanging baskets of fuchsias.

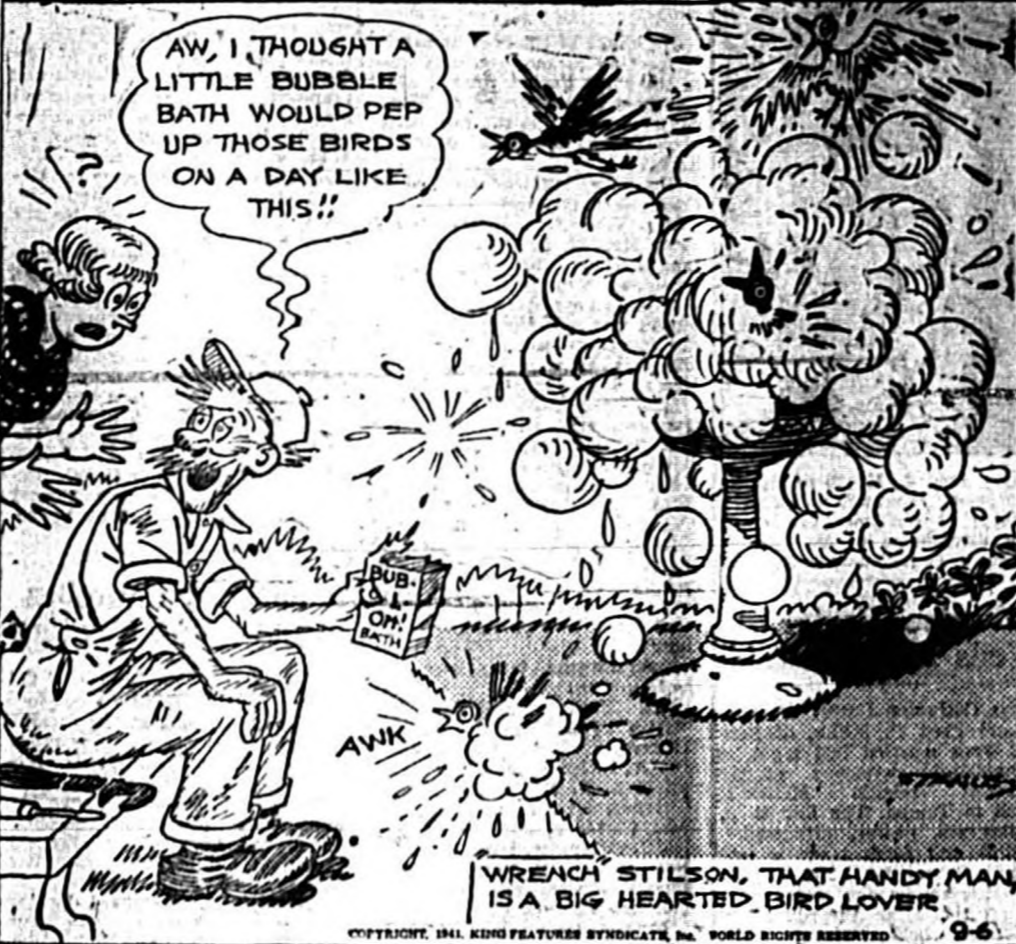

The Governor has advised the chairman of the boards that the State housing coordinator will attend the meeting to explain the entire program.

For a county to benefit by the USHA-aided rural housing program, it is necessary that the county commissioners adopt certain resolutions to comply with the rural housing authorities law, enacted at the 1941 session of the Legislature.

After this formal action to comply with the legal requirements, and upon the recommendation of the board of county commissioners, the governor will appoint one person from each of these counties as a commissioner of the Central Florida Regional Housing Authority. The appointees will organize and then apply to the United States Housing Authority for an earmarking of the \$500,000, which was allocated last May for the construction and operation of 226 low cost rural homes for farmers, sharecroppers, tenants and rural wage workers, to be rented to rural families of very low income, who are now occupying

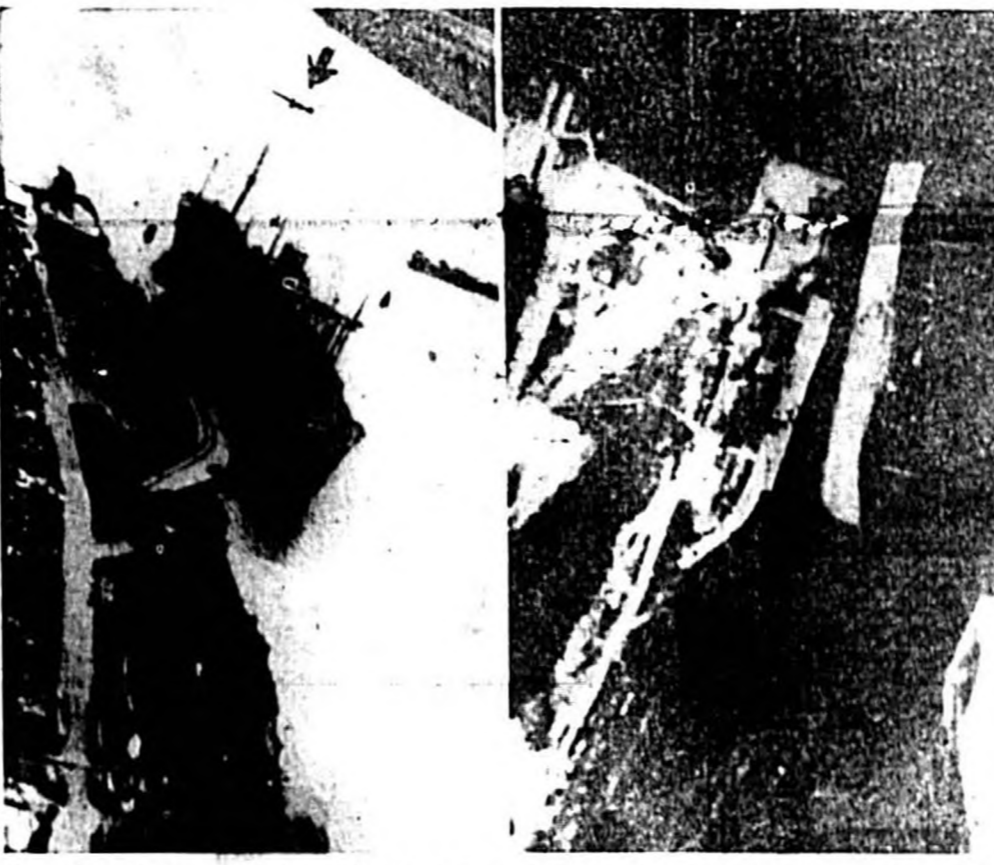

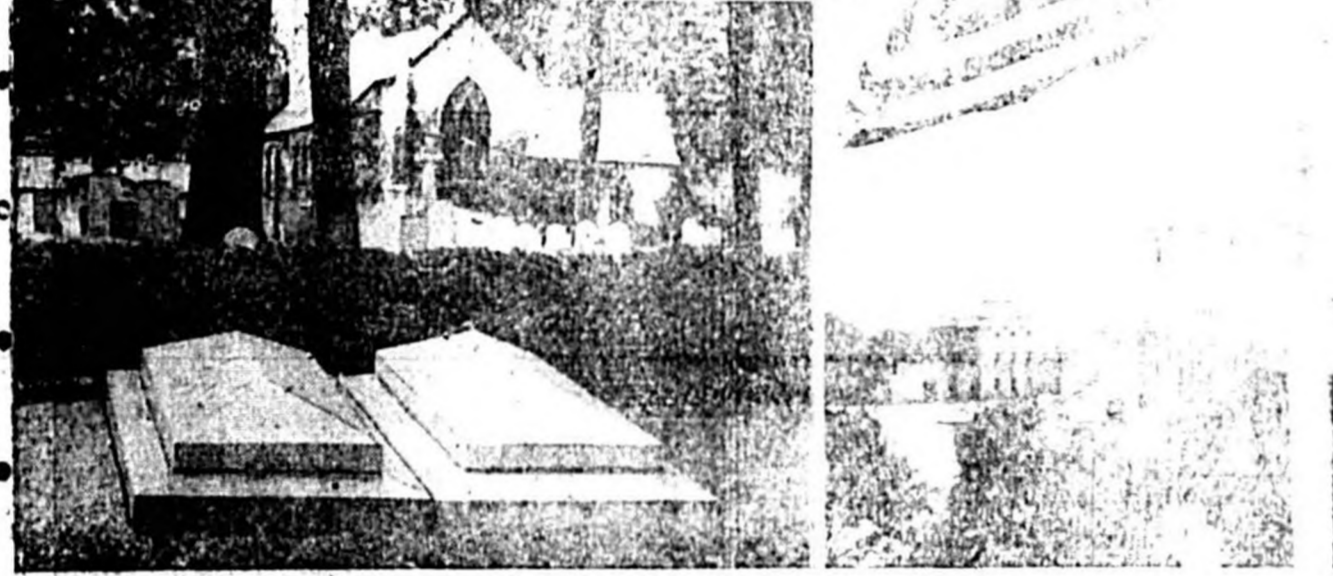

## Neutrality Act Is Under Discussion; No Plans Are Made

### \$6,000,000,000 Request For New Lend-Lease Appropriation Expected

### Army-Navy Plans Joint Censorship

### Roosevelt Reports \$190,447,870 In Supplies Exported

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—Speaker Rayburn today told a press conference that a revision of the Neutrality Act was discussed by legislative leaders with President Roosevelt but that no conclusions had been reached.

At the same time, Rayburn said the President would send a message to Congress Thursday on the subject of a new lend-lease appropriation which increased sources said would amount to about \$6,000,000,000.

Roosevelt, meanwhile, reported to Congress that actual reports of American war supplies to the nations fighting the Axis, under the present lend-lease program, had totaled \$190,447,870 up to Aug. 31.

House leaders from the Navy Department today said that joint Army-Navy plans have been worked out for censorship of international communications and that no provisions for censorship of international communications are included in the present lend-lease program.

Responsible bi-partisan sources said last night that President Roosevelt may be contemplating sending United States merchant ships requesting permits to the neutrality law, but that he has made no decision as yet to congressional leaders.

They did not rule out the possibility that Roosevelt might be postponing eventually, but emphasized that "up to the present time" Roosevelt has given "no intimation whatever" that he may be considering moves which would require revision or repeal of the act.

This position was set forth as the capital buzzed with speculation that Roosevelt would follow up his check-against orders with proposals to arm American merchantmen and to permit them to enter combat zones.

Roosevelt holds his regular weekly conference with legislative leaders today but whether the question of the neutrality act will be discussed then was entirely matter of conjecture.

## Mole Cricket Danger Great, Says Dawson

Faced with a possible serious loss in the early crop due to mole cricket damage, farmers of Seminole County are awaiting the action growing out of a survey to be made by a representative of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the United States Department of Agriculture. C. R. Dawson, county agent, stated today.

Both Mr. Dawson and the County Commissioners have made recommendations to the Control Committee of the State Plant Board to have mole cricket bait distributed here. The Commission made a resolution to that effect at its last meeting and had the resolution sent to the State board, Mr. Dawson said.

In a report made to the State board on Sept. 6, Mr. Dawson stated that 4,500 acres of early seed beds would suffer severely if the mole cricket were not controlled. Season of greatest injury would be in October and November, the report read.

The early crop in this county has prospects of being very valuable due to the failure of the anticipated increase in acreage in the Everglades to materialize, Mr. Dawson reported to Dr. W. L. Dawson, chairman of the state mole cricket control committee.

"Any damage done to a very valuable crop would be of more serious nature than to a less valuable crop," Mr. Dawson stated in the report.

When the representative is sent here to make a survey of conditions, it is hoped that the control of the mole cricket, which we are unable to do, Mr. Dawson added.

## Polls To Open At 7:00 O'clock For Election

### Voting Expected To Be Heavy Though Not Equal To Record Fall Vote

Polls open tomorrow morning at 7:00 o'clock for citizens of Sanford to decide whether they will change the present system of electing commissioners on a staggered term and having the Mayor elected by the members of the commission.

Voting is expected to be heavy, according to interest being shown, though it is not expected to equal the record vote of last Fall that brought 1,473 to the polls as a number of citizens are absent in the Army or at work on defense projects outside of the community, City Clerk H. N. Beyer said this morning.

No provision has been made for absent persons to vote. Everyone who voted in the municipal election last Fall is eligible to vote in the election tomorrow, and no additional registration is necessary, Mr. Beyer said. Persons who vote, must reside within the city.

## Action Flames Anew On North African Front

### British Report Axis Columns Based In Libya Penetrated 35 Miles Into Egyptian Territory But Were Routed By British Mechanized Forces

The British reported two Axis columns based in Libya penetrated 35 miles into Egyptian territory but were routed by British mechanized forces.

They said there was every indication that the Libyan situation would be "boiling" by early October and added that more than half a million Allied troops are now in the Middle East, the largest force since the start of the war.

A wing of the royal air force, believed to include some of the latest type American-made fighting planes, has reached the Russian front, ready for battle, authoritative sources said yesterday.

British pilots, ground personnel and equipment were believed to have been included. It said that at least four fighter squadrons were in the wing. Russia badly needed long-range pursuit planes to beat off the swarms of German bombers assailing Leningrad and the Smolensk sector.

A new type German fighter, the Messerschmitt-110, capable of 400 miles an hour, was said to have made its first appearance on the Russian front, and it was believed that Britain was sending her best available fighters to combat it.

(In Moscow the British military mission confirmed reports of the R. A. F. wing's arrival in Russia.)

The British press service in New York said an R. A. F. wing comprised two to four squadrons of nine to 12 each.

Informants said the wing would go into action as soon as it had been fully equipped. They said the wing was the forerunner of other forces going to the Russian front.

Military observers believed that so far only fighters had been sent to Russia, but they said British and American bombers also might make their appearance on the eastern front soon. They pointed out that the stationing of an R. A. F. Bomber unit in Russia would constitute a virtual "encirclement" of Germany by British bombing planes.

## Nazis Tell Of Slashing Through Leningrad's Defense Front At One Point

### Pope Pious Prays For Shortened War

### Observers Forecast German Sea Drive Against Crimea

Threats to Russia's second and third greatest cities heightened today as the Germans reported they had slashed through Leningrad's "defense front" at one point and the Russians admitted that a Nazi pincer movement was tightening the ring around Kiev. Simultaneously, observers at Ankara forecast a sea-borne Nazi drive against the Russian Crimea near the site of the big Soviet Black Sea naval base of Sebastopol.

American air stirred, meanwhile, by reports that a German sea raider was operating in the Pacific approaches to the Panama Canal.

While spectacular mass air battles raged over Leningrad, the British reported they are rushing RAF pilots into the 80-day-old struggle on the Eastern Front. The first fliers to arrive in Russia are already in action against the Nazis.

It was reported from Rome that Pope Pious XII had asked Catholics through the world to pray during the month of October for a shortening of the war.

The Germans claimed last night they had broken into the Leningrad defense front and said the Russians were blasting away blocks of buildings to clear a space for a death struggle in the heart of the great city.

"The favorable course of operations in the east prepares the way for new successes in battle," said Adolf Hitler's announcement. "After strong German forces broke Leningrad's defense front closer encirclement of the city continues without interruption despite bitter defenses."

Offsetting the German claims to some extent were these war reports from Moscow and London:

The Russian central army of Marshal Semen Timoshenko is closing in on Smolensk, on the road to Moscow, and the Germans in that area are falling back.

## Lewis Tate's Home On Sanford Avenue Burns To Ground

Lewis Tate, railroad conductor, returned to his home on South Sanford Avenue last night to find that his house was burning and that the fire was out of control. Deputy Sheriff and Jack Hickson said today that Mr. Tate believed the fire was deliberately started. Two unsuccessful attempts have been made before, one about a year ago, and the other about six months ago, he said. The latter had done some damage to the outside of the house.

The deceased was a member of the Lake Mary Presbyterian church and the funeral services will be conducted there Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, the Rev. A. B. Biers officiating. ## Export Freight Is At New August High

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Export freight car loadings other than grain at Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific ports reached a new high of 56,011 cars in August, the Association of American Railroads reported Sunday.

It was the largest number of loadings for any one month since the completion of such statistics began in November, 1935, exceeding by 1023 the previous high in July of this year, and by 1758 the number for August, 1940.
