TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 19--(IP) A Leon County grand jury to-day returned indictments against three persons formerly connected with Florida A. and M. college for Negroes here. Neither the identities of the per-

sons indicted nor the charges made against them were announced since they are not in custody. In a formal report, the jury said

it was convinced there had been gross mismanagement, immorality and dishonesty" committed by the other persons at the institution but it did not have sufficient information to warrant indictments.

. The jury said it felt a president of an institution is largely responable for management of his school and "the former president of Florida A. and M. College failed to maintain proper standards and permitted gross mismanagement.

W. H. Gray, Jr., resigned as A. and M. president last July after charges were made on the floor of the legislature he was quilty of questionable practices. The jury which reported today is the third to investigate the Negro college since Gray's resignation but the first to announce any findings.

The jury made it specific recommendations to the legislature, the Governor, the hoard of control and other agencies on correction of conditions at the college.

The jurors declared their investigations disclosed "an unfortunity state of affairs reflecting unfortunity agency when coefsin members
