

# War Hits Civilians Hard, Blanding Says

DAYTONA BEACH, June 11—(A)—Maj. Gen. Albert H. Blanding told Florida sheriffs Tuesday that in modern warfare civilians often suffer more than soldiers in the field and that defense preparations should be made accordingly.
