## British Aid Report Made By Roosevelt

Over \$75,000,000 In Defense Supplies Transferred Under Lease-Lend Agency

LONDON, June 11—(AP)—The British government today announced that it had transferred to the United States under the Lease-Lend Law, a total of \$75,000,000 worth of defense materials.

The report, the first made to the public, showed that the materials included a wide variety of equipment, including tanks, trucks, and aircraft.

It is estimated that the total value of the materials transferred under the Lease-Lend Law will reach \$1,000,000,000 by the end of the year.

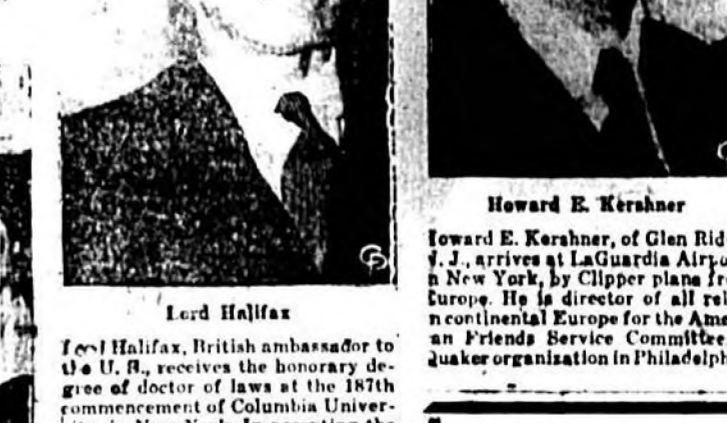

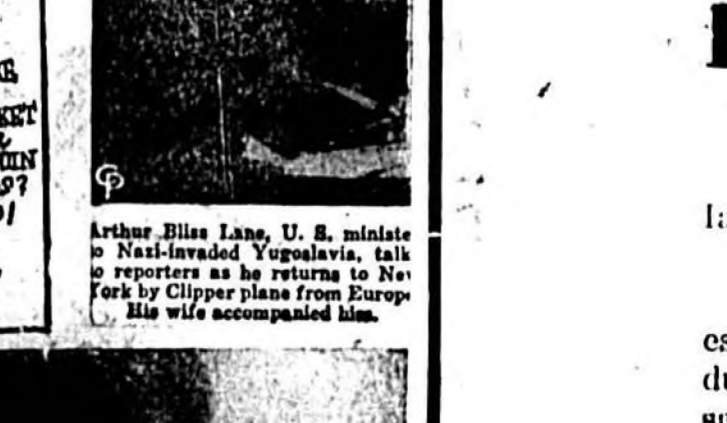

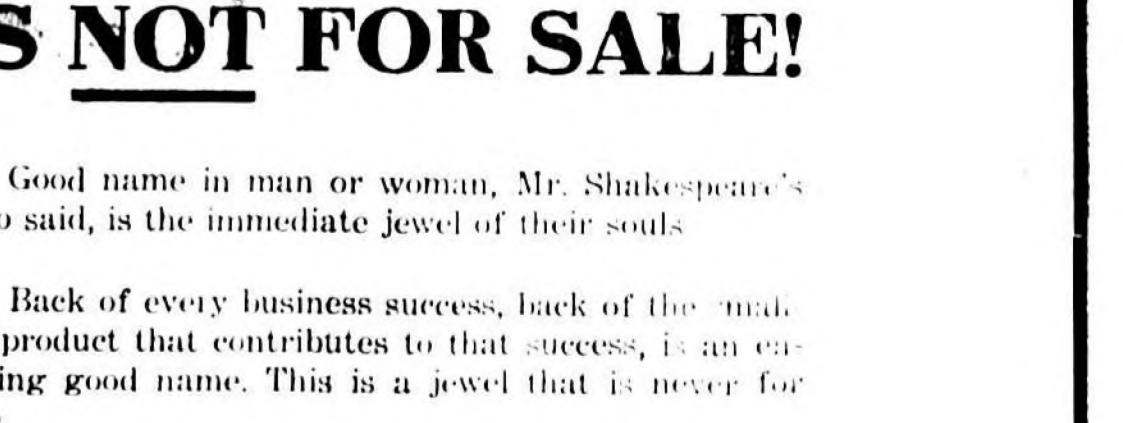

# Stewart Asks:

What Manner Of Censorship Will We Get?

GEORGE CREEK favors a wireless censorship of cables, but as a newspaperman, he opposes a censorship of the press. He has been named as a member of the committee on Public Information (the so-called Compub) while the United States was in the last World war, and I myself represented the press as its defender in Buenos Aires. Consequently, I know pretty well what George's policy was.

It is true that his effort was to get pro-Yankee stuff into print that in the direction of suppression. South American editors quickly recognized that he wasn't trying to muzzle them. They not only didn't resent his activities, they outright approved his services, asked for it and published it ad lib. The Compub was afraid.

I don't particularly quarrel with cable censorship, either. It's a nuisance, which can be carried to ridiculous extremes as it was during the 1914-18 period. I had to experience with that, too, for I was a Yankee correspondent in London, and off and on, on the West coast, before we entered the war. I was in the line of fire. It always made me have a dumb-headed censor which is perfectly harmless. I don't think I'd shed. Still, I can't say that a certain amount of censorship, relative to international communication, may be necessary in such an emergency.

**Radio Censorship**  
George also supports a radio censorship. I begin to get a bit sensitive on that subject. The suggestion hints at an abridgment of the right of free speech. My idea is that a citizen's entitled to speak of his mouth about as he pleases, and it's a privilege that he can't do it if he happens to be standing in front of a mike. Of course, it's arguable that we have left much use in putting a censor on cables if the same information can be transmitted just as well by wireless. It wasn't much of a problem during the last war. The Allies severed Germany's cable connections at the 1918 stage of the game and the wireless was a dependable source.

to signify materially. For a few months after that routine started before I was dispatched to Europe and then South America, I was a foreign news editor in New York. I got rooms of wireless copy from German sources (their cables being cut) and it was seldom that I could sort out an intelligible sentence. Now it's entirely different. On the whole, I agree with George Creek. Censor the cables if we must. I'm not a radio broadcaster, so I'm concerned as to those broadcasters' fate only in an academic way. But as a newspaperman, I'd be prepared to holler my head off at press restrictions—except as to libel and a little stuff like that.

However, there's an evident tendency toward a regular censorship of the press itself. The superficial chat in advocacy of organization of another Compub, like George Creek's—just informative, or even propagandistic, if you care to call it so. But the undercurrent in Washington is to another agency that authority believes ought to be kept corked up.

Lowell Mellett, himself a newspaperman and an old personal friend of mine, is the chief most frequently suggested to handle the job. He denies that a real censorship is what's aimed at, and I presume from what I know of him (and that's a lot), that he's sincere. But there are others.

**Knox's View**  
Navy Secretary Frank Knox is a newspaperman also—publisher of the Chicago Daily News when he left on leave of absence, as he is now, in charge of our sea forces. Frank's scheme is what he refers to as a "voluntary censorship." That is, our newspapers are to censor themselves. But who's to be the final judge of the competency with which they do it? It seems as if the task would require an official administrator. And what will he be? A chief censor or what?

Publisher Arthur Hays Sulzberger of the New York Times is a newspaperman likewise. "I believe," he says, "that we can have military censorship and still preserve a large measure of our freedom."

A large measure of it—huh! But not all. And there's a distinction between what Frank Knox said and what Art Sulzberger said. Frank proposed a VOLUNTARY censorship—the newspapers to impose it on themselves. Art mentioned a MILITARY censorship—with an army or navy officer sitting alongside the editor, telling him what he can and can't print. I've been an editor myself. I wouldn't have liked that.

## Americans Urged To Buy Winter Coal Now

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—Anticipating "very grave danger of a shortage" of coal next winter, the Government urged householders, throughout the country, last night to buy winter coal now.

At the same time, Secretary Ickes removed the qualification "probably" from forecast of an oil shortage and said definitely that easterners "will have to get along with less gasoline for their cars and probably less oil to heat their homes." No indication was given, however, as to when restrictions would be imposed.

Both coal and oil shortages are threatened not by lack of supplies but by the demands of the defense program in making transportation facilities. The coal shortage may be avoided, officials said, if the campaign for summer buying succeeds.
