## Jr. College Ready To Build Temporary Units OKd

Permits have been issued for the construction of temporary portable classroom buildings for Seminole Junior College.

The buildings will house the students until permanent construction at the college site U. S. 17-92 near Five Points.

Building permits for May in Seminole County were at the highest level of the year, according to figures in the office of Robert S. Brown, planning and zoning director.

Estimated cost of May construction in the county is expected to be \$603,012.

The figure includes 23 permits for new homes at a cost of \$14,828 and two industrial permits for \$13,000.

The May figure surpassed that of April by almost \$100,000. There were 74 permits issued for May.

Estimated cost of building for the first five months of 1966 now is \$23 million.

## New Era Starts For The Herald

Beginning today, The Sanford Herald is being printed on its new presses, installed in the newspaper's future home on French Avenue.

The "new look" apparent with today's issue is a temporary one, although it reveals many of the changes planned when the Herald moves fully into its new home.

As today, the newspaper will be printed in eight columns of news type rather than nine.

All functions of The Herald are continuing to take place in the First Street quarters, with the exception of press work.

Use of the new presses is a trial run to insure proper working conditions for unskilled service which the Herald makes its official move to the new plant.

Two presses are being used to print The Herald now. One is capable of printing 16 pages at a time and the other 34 pages. The presses are "wind-up" and when run in tandem can produce a 40-page paper in a single run.

The new presses are capable of printing 20,000 40-page newspapers per hour. The old press printed 14,000 12-page newspapers an hour.

## Cdr. Jesse Cleveland Navy Base 'Exec O'

Cdr. Jesse S. Cleveland, a native of Chocoma, Texas, has taken over duties as executive officer of Sanford Naval Air Station, succeeding Capt. Chester L. Dillgar, who is retiring June 30.

Before assuming duties as executive officer, Cleveland was operations officer for the station. He has been at Sanford NAS since last September.

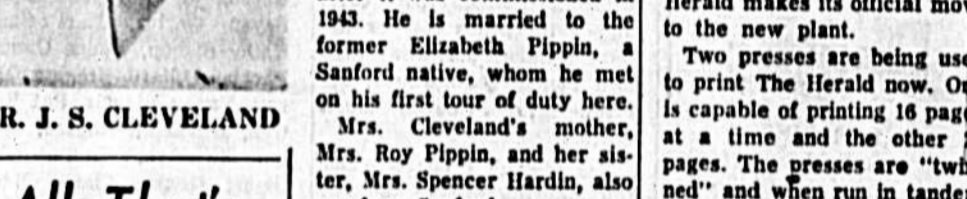

# GIs Deliver Bloody 1-2 Punch

**SANFORD (UPI)** — Helicopters and averaging U. S. paratroopers advanced into the jungle Monday to a North Vietnamese regiment today after being ordered by the United States Command to destroy the enemy's base in what officials described as "one of the largest" raids of the war.

The bloody one-two punch was aimed at annihilating the battered remnants of the North Vietnamese force which retreated after five days of vicious fighting against troops of the 101st Airborne Division in the highlands about 200 miles north of Saigon.

"I think we put the North right on top of them," said Lt. Col. Henry R. (The Gunfighter) Emerson, of Milford, Pa., who substituted two bloody but unwounded companies of his battalion from a Communist trap in the area only hours before capturing his own trap.

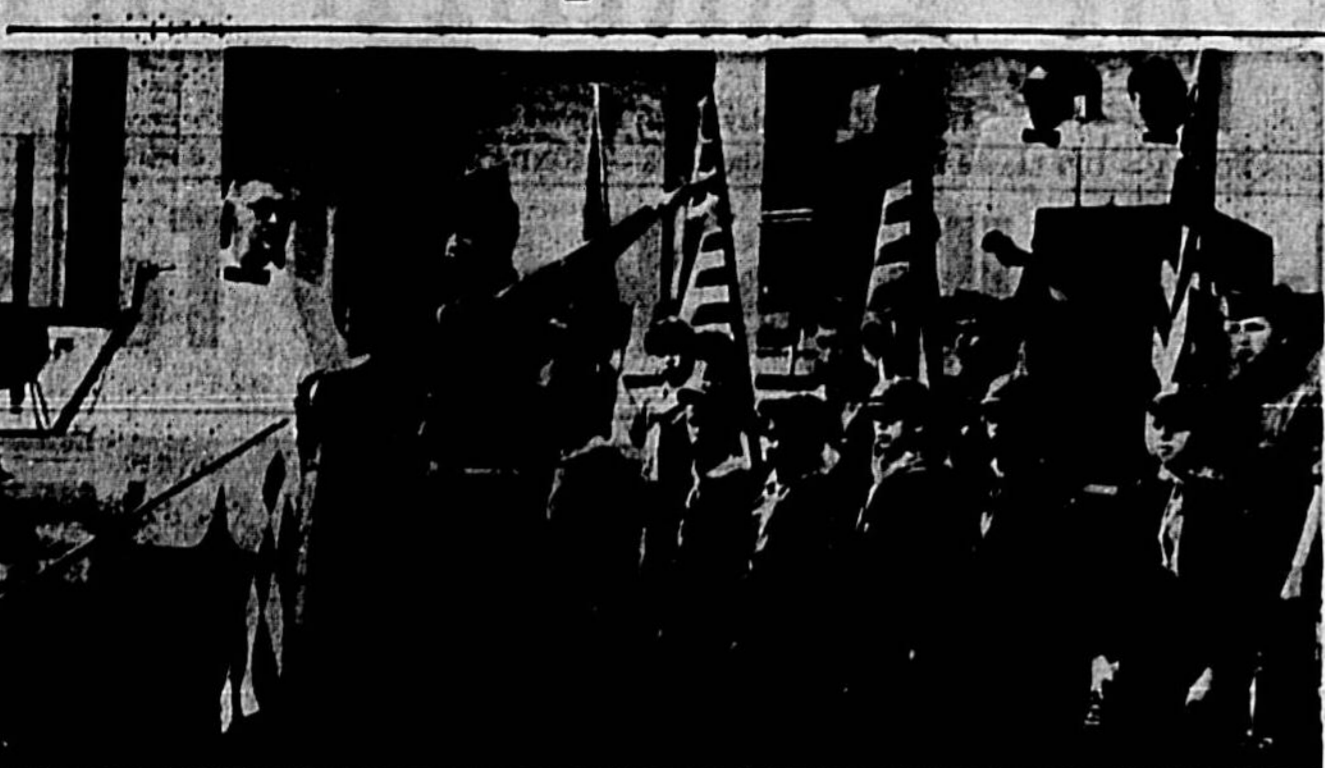
While other paratroopers blocked enemy routes from about five miles of jungle, Emerson's men drove into the base, entered, immediately killed 30 Communists trying to flee. Helicopters landing like angry bees poured rockets and machine fire along a ridge where enemy Communist units were spotted.

The strike force drawing first blood was commanded by Capt. Walter B. Brown, of Chattanooga, Tenn., who spent two days along with Capt. Bill (Lonesome End) Carpenter's battered company, holding off and fighting their way through a vastly superior force of crack Vietnamese regulars in one of the most heroic battles of the war.

Officials said the estimated Communist death toll in the widely swirling fighting already has soared to 765 with a confirmed count of 285 and perhaps hundreds more bodies lying in the jungle.

"Of course, it is still too early to be sure, but I think the strike force may have wiped out of the battlefield."

In the air war, U. S. aircraft have been credited with the capture of a C-47 transport plane from the enemy. The plane was shot down over North Vietnam Sunday and possibly a second one.

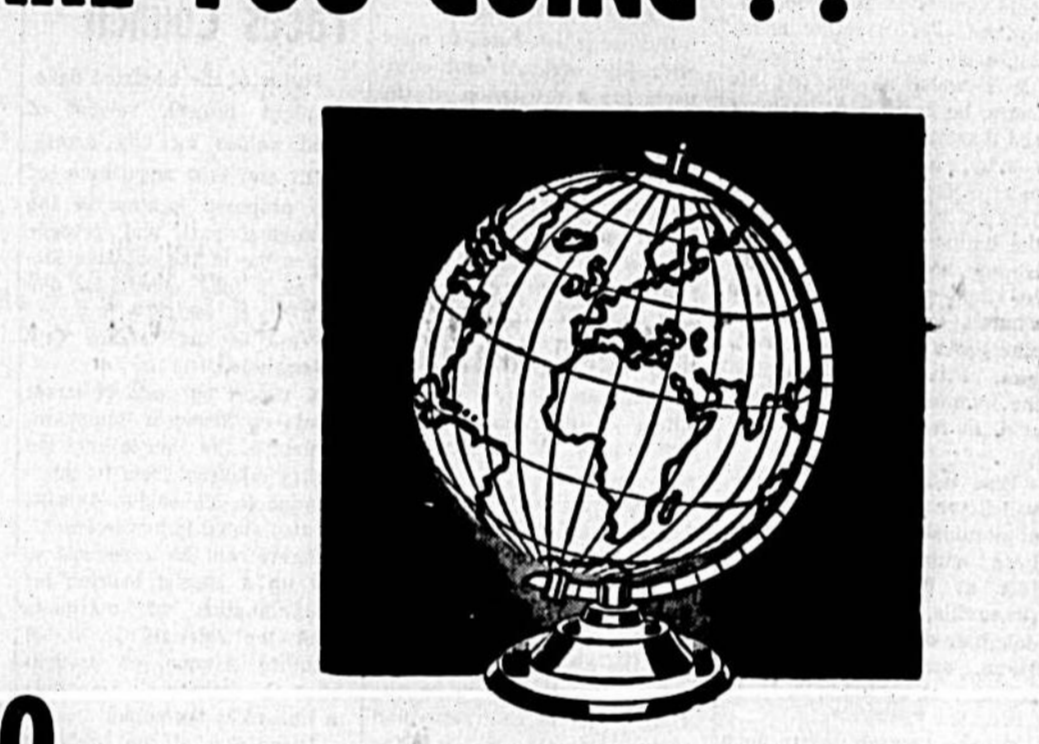

# Change Sweeping Spain

In all of the fervor over the future of NATO, it is easy to lose sight of the forces for change in the West.

On the final day of the NATO summit in London, the 16 nations have announced a new arrangement between the 16 and France, attention focused on future to reach agreement on what the status of the 12,000 French troops currently stationed in West Germany will be when France withdraws from NATO on July 1.

In succeeding months there will be many such distractions, including the postponed and rescheduled NATO military headquarters from France and setting up new headquarters arrangements in Belgium.

Quite obviously NATO as a military organization is going to survive, with or without France.

Since both France and West Germany appear to agree that the presence of French troops in Germany is desirable, that issue probably also can be settled.

But more important than these distractions is the fact that Europe, both West and East, is in a state of change, that new accommodations are being sought.

And that, with De Gaulle's defection, is what finds NATO in a crisis of leadership.

The United States is barred by the very fact that it is one of the world's two superpowers from being a neutral party in this matter that is set from a position of collaboration and not detachment.

The facts of history bar Germany.

Britain might assume it but, although interested, is not a member of the European Common Market and therefore is unable to play a full continental role. Geography and size are against the others.

And yet there is a strong urge toward at least a beginning of what De Gaulle has foreseen as a Europe extending from the Ural mountains to the Atlantic in the West.

Few would say that at the moment there is any great Soviet military threat against Europe.

The move is toward an East-West peace probe in which the reunification of Germany would be an end result rather than an early condition of peace.

De Gaulle's grand design calls for a West European third force under French leadership that would be the balancing power between the Soviet Union and the United States. He would eliminate United States influence in Europe.

He has been and continues to be a frustrating influence for the United States. But he himself also suffers frustration.

He has cited U. S. efforts in Southeast Asia as one clear indication that U. S. interests do not lie clearly in Europe.

But other West Europeans have shown that, even with that risk, they would rather remain under the U. S. nuclear umbrella.

But just as there is ferment in the West, so there is ferment in the East. Neither De Gaulle nor the Russians can speak wholly for those they would represent.

We welcome participating and non-participating people, students, too.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Republican leaders may not be as lively in their support of the big money boys who are expected to win the big money boys will defect if the party's right wing is not continuously and warmly endorsed.

That threat has hung over the party since before the prime Goldwater days. Particularly in certain key states, GOP candidates' views appeared to be tailored to please—or at least avoid offending—major conservative campaign contributors.

Leaders' constant call for "party unity" is privately acknowledged by some prominent Republicans to be a response to the real or presumed threat of a money revolt.

There is evidence today, however, that the threat may not be as great as imagined. There is evidence that at least a fair number of tough-talking conservatives do not yet feel their money where their mouth is.

The evidence is found in a report on 1964 campaign financing by Herbert Alexander, director of the privately funded Citizens' Research Foundation in Princeton, N. J.

A commonplace of Barry Goldwater's presidential campaign, from presentation time on, had it that GOP fat cats would give big only if he were the nominee. That was said to be particularly true in what was then often called the "Goldwater areas" highly favorable to him, which included California, Texas, Illinois and Ohio.

The foundation report shows, however, that on the basis of contributions of \$500 or more to national-level presidential committees, the big money boys (big) in less than California and Illinois than they did four years earlier for Richard M. Nixon.

In California, 1960 contributions of \$500 or more came to 188 for \$21,737, while for Goldwater in 1964 there were 212 contributions aggregating \$160,288.

In Illinois, the \$500-or-more crowd gave Nixon \$254,324 and Goldwater just \$242,032, though in 1964 this reporter was told many times that the total they gave was calling the turn with their "Goldwater or no-money" routine.

Goldwater did indeed get much more money in this category in Texas and Ohio (in this state the ratio was 2 to 1 over Nixon). But in the remaining 10 Old South states, many of them hot for Barry, big contributions were down from 1960 in three and only narrowly higher in two others.

In states like Michigan and Minnesota, where large but not dominant Goldwater factors included no other nominee could crowd big contributors, the total they gave was either greatly or substantially below the amounts given Nixon.

Only the fact that big Goldwater contributions were widely spread through southern and western states showed his total over Nixon's by the 1964 campaign.

"I have no political debts," he said.

However, he expects to fill offices as they fall vacant, and has already announced his appointment to the Citrus Commission this week.

He anticipated no upheaval in the changeover in January and said he wanted to see his administration's program continued.

"Florida is fortunate, first in the protection of the Cabinet system of government which would, to a large degree, prevent any stress or upheaval either by a retiring governor or the incoming governor," he said.

He added that the Legislature wisely designed most boards on the staggered term basis which protects continuity of government through periods of change.

Besides his work at the capital, Burns plans a trip to the national governor's conference in Los Angeles in July and a San Francisco Shrine convention the same month. He also has tentatively planned a trip to Hong Kong early in September with a side trip to Vietnam.

After January, he said he will return to his home town of Jacksonville and go into business there. He did not specify the business, but he has been an industrial relations consultant in the past and probably will open a similar concern.

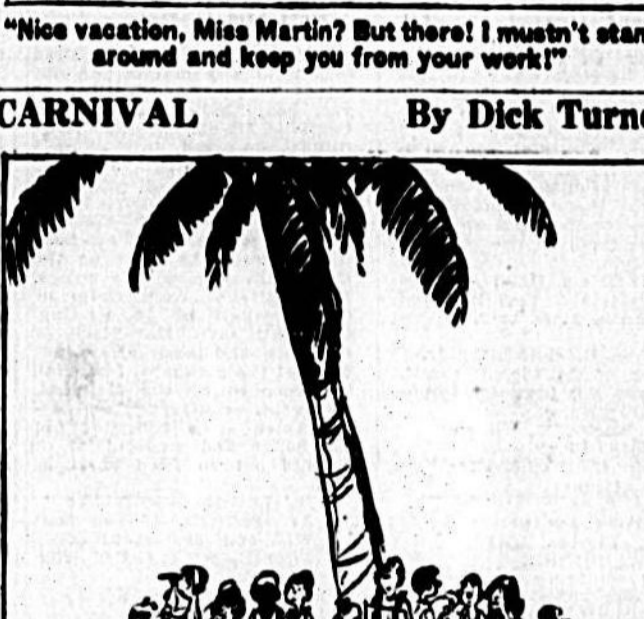
