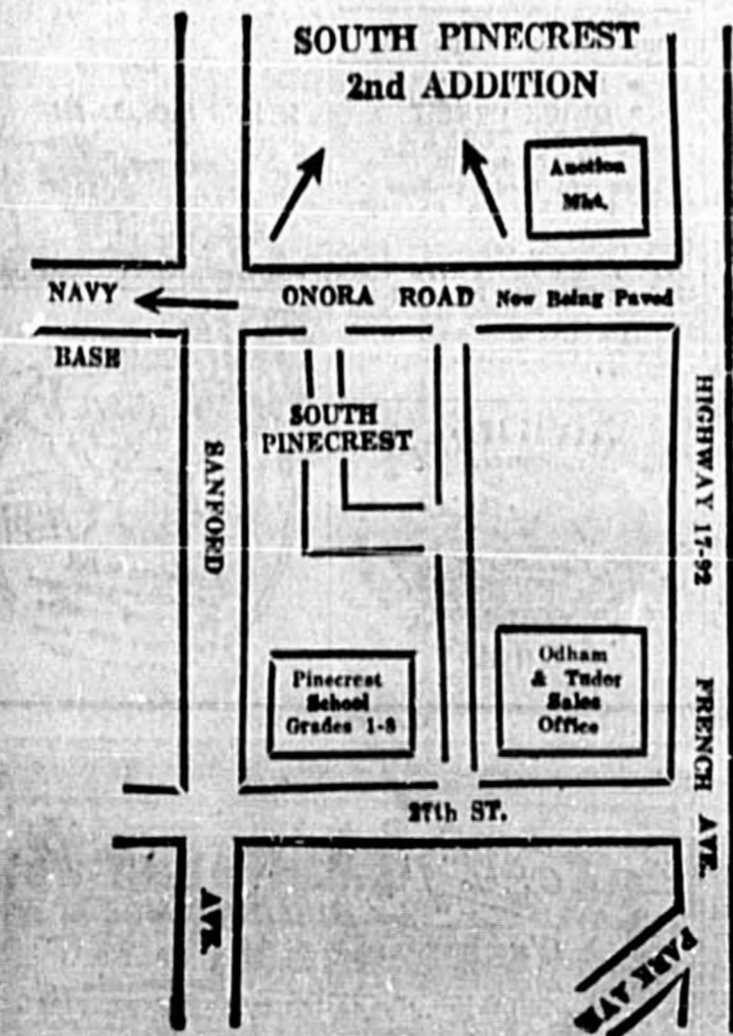

## Dulles Debates Issues With Mollet, Pineau At Paris Session Today

### Careers That Count Theme Of National Hospital Week

Career opportunities for young people in the hospital field, where a personnel shortage exists today in spite of great increases in both payroll and the number of employees, will be emphasized during National Hospital Week, May 12-20.

Harry Weir, administrator of Seminole Memorial Hospital, said today that the total hospital personnel in the nation increased 37 per cent in the past 10 years, while number of hospital beds rose only 12 per cent. Seminole Memorial Hospital will join with others throughout the United States and Canada in observing National Hospital Week by attempting to interest the people of the community in hospital careers. The theme of the week, sponsored annually by the American Hospital Association, is "Careers That Count."

Although nursing is one area in which many more personnel are needed, a wide variety of positions in addition to nursing are open to young people today, Weir said. He pointed out that about 200 job classifications exist in the largest hospitals, and added that Seminole Memorial Hospital has employees in 30 to 35 classifications.

Informational programs about hospital careers will be held throughout the community during National Hospital Week. Weir urged local attention to efforts to arouse interest in hospital careers. He said, "Modern science has made great advances in the prevention, control and cure of disease and disabilities. Medical progress means hospital progress, and this progress requires new tests, new treatments, new equipment, and, of course, additional personnel with new skills to make these services available."

### Senator Is Confident Of Market Money

Senator Douglas Stenstrom, in Sanford during the past weekend said that there is optimism surrounding the appropriation for rebuilding the Sanford State Farmers' Market.

"I am confident that the Senate committee will give us a favorable appropriation," Senator Stenstrom said.

The delegation went before the senate appropriations committee, explained Senator Stenstrom, and received a very sympathetic reception in view of the many applications before it to be considered. "It was the obvious desire on the part of the whole committee to want to help," he said.

The chairman of the committee did mention that it could act right then, although they would like to wait since the committee could act more wisely if additional information could be made available on the proposed rebuilding program for the Sanford State Farmers' Market," said the Senator.

The entire delegation will appear before both committees, he said, and he believes they will get a money bill this week.

"We were perfectly willing to wait and hold off on the action of the committee," said Senator Stenstrom, "until we could get together the information that the appropriations committee requested. John Parton will provide the necessary data regarding the proposed size, type of building, and materials."

"We believe that we're going to be successful in getting a substantial appropriation," said Senator Stenstrom and added "I wouldn't say the \$150,000 amount."

J. Bralley Odham, chairman of the local committee, called the meeting at the Seminole County Court House so that it may be thrown open to the public.

Odham, in arranging for the open meeting, stated that "Anyone may attend the meeting, express their opinion and ask questions."

William A. Dial, Road Board Member of this district, Richie Greene, State Road Department District Engineer of DeLand, and H. E. Lewis, Federal Engineer for federal interstate highway will attend the meeting to answer questions from the audience.

The original route of the federal interstate highway which starts from a point approximately two-tenths of a mile east of the Lake Monroe Bridge and continues through Seminole County, has been completed. This route is the proposed direction of the highway and goes through groves and residential sections as well as through the municipal area of Altamonte Springs and Maitland.

An alternate route has also been surveyed, it is reported, and will possibly be ready by Friday night's hearing.

It is expected that Seminole County citizens from every area of the County affected by the limited access highway will turn out for the hearing.

Sheriff Luther Hobbs said yesterday that Deputy Sheriffs Ed Cowan and Arthur Williams pulled the youngster from the water after the second try and applied artificial respiration.

Justice of the Peace W. Hugh Duncan and Constable J. Q. "Slim" Galloway were called to the scene to assist in the investigation.

The young boy was found missing by his father who noted that the youngster's fishing pole was floating in the water.

They made their home in Sanford at 518 West First St.

Seven year old John Henry Wilkin was born Jan. 16, 1950 in Albany, Ga., and has lived in Sanford for two years. He attended the Free Methodist Church.

He is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Seth D. Wilkin; four brothers, Robert, Seth D., Robert B., and James Wilkin; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Seth B. Wilkin of Colquitt, Ga. and Mr. and Mrs. J. Schriver of Ft. Pierce.

Remains will be sent to Colquitt, Ga. for funeral services and burial.

PARIS — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles met for an hour today with French Premier Guy Mollet and Foreign Minister Christian Pineau said afterwards they ranged conversationally over issues ranging from NATO to Algeria and Suez.

Pineau did not comment on reports that the French feel the United States has been "inconsistent" toward Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

Informed sources had said before the meeting that Dulles would attempt to defend himself against French charges to that effect. They said Mollet would press for a Suez Canal boycott and a "harder" policy toward Egypt and Nasser.

But Pineau ducked any discussion of such a topic in a conversation with reporters outside Mollet's official residence.

He did say Dulles and Mollet were "largely in agreement on the subjects discussed" at the session attended by experts from both sides.

Pineau was with Mollet, and new U. S. Ambassador Amory Houghton accompanied Dulles.

An outlined by Pineau, the first topic considered was the recently concluded North Atlantic Treaty Organization conference of foreign ministers in Bonn. Pineau described the NATO conference to reporters as "more interesting than usual."

Then, he said, Mollet outlined the French position in rebellious Algeria to Dulles.

The third item they got around to, he said, was Suez and Soviet penetration in the Middle East. France still regards the Suez situation itself as "extremely dangerous," Pineau said, and the Americans don't like the situation either.

Americans continue to be the moviest people. Figures compiled by the U. S. Bureau of Census show that 33 million persons of all ages changed homes in the year ending March, 1956. This represented one person out of every five in the civilian population, a proportion which has shown no important change from year to year over the past decade.

The majority of these movers were young under thirty, but there were a substantial number of older persons as well, including those to one and a half million persons 65 years old and over.

Some 22 million persons who moved during the period changed homes within the same area in which they lived, but those to six million more went from one county to another and an additional five million crossed state lines.

## Watch For Bike Riders

Safety bicycles is what the two-wheeled pedal vehicles in use today were called when they first appeared around sixty years ago. The safety designation was probably meant to inculcate their superiority over the high-wheeled contraptions previously employed for pedal transportation.

Now the modern low-wheeled bicycles are in need of cooperation to maintain their reputation for safe operation. Approximately 20 million bicycle riders are wheeling along streets and roads these days and their number is growing.

## Plan Developed For Mentally Ill

A committee of the Seminole County Mental Health Assn. under the chairmanship of Sidney Ives III in cooperation with the County Health Dept. has developed a definite plan and procedure for the processing of persons who might be mentally disturbed and in need of treatment.

The group that included Dr. C. L. Park Sr., County Surgeon and Dr. Terry Bird, County Health Officer, and George Touhy, president of the mental health organization, have set up the plan for working toward the benefit of those requiring professional attention.

Of considerable concern are the children who are emotionally unstable. These able to pay for the required care will be treated by the family physician or another doctor called in on the case by him. The MHA and the County Health personnel would serve in an advisory capacity.

If after investigation it is determined that the family of the child is unable to assume the bills for the treatment, the MHA will

cooperate in having the child report with his parents to the County Health office. Proper referral then could be made to the Child Guidance clinic in Orlando.

Here a valuation on a course of treatment would be made. This would be followed up by the County Health Nurse. Should more for the treatment the MHA will undertake to get them.

It is quite possible that transportation if otherwise unavailable can be arranged by the MHA. In handling cases of adults, the family may request aid from the MHA or from the County Health Office.

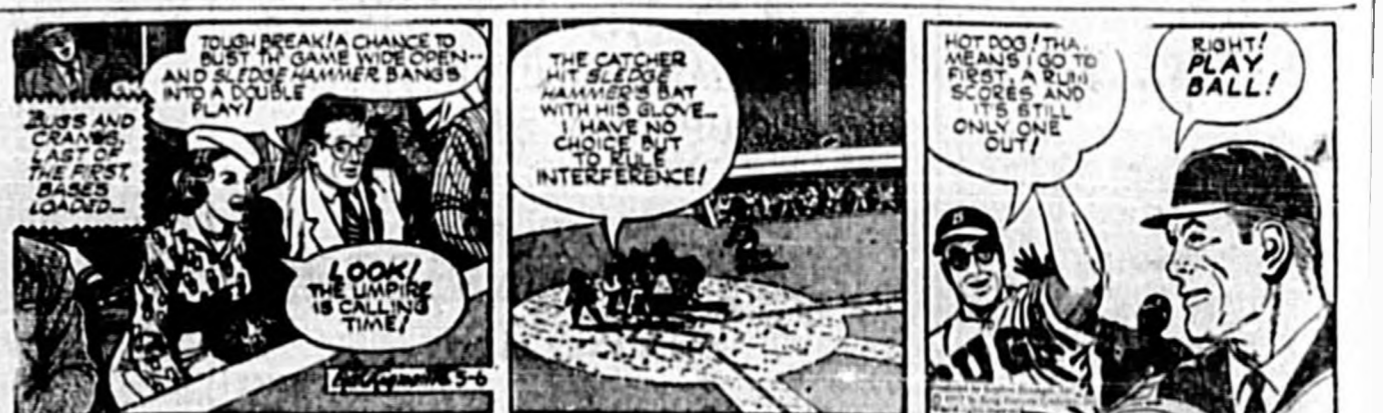
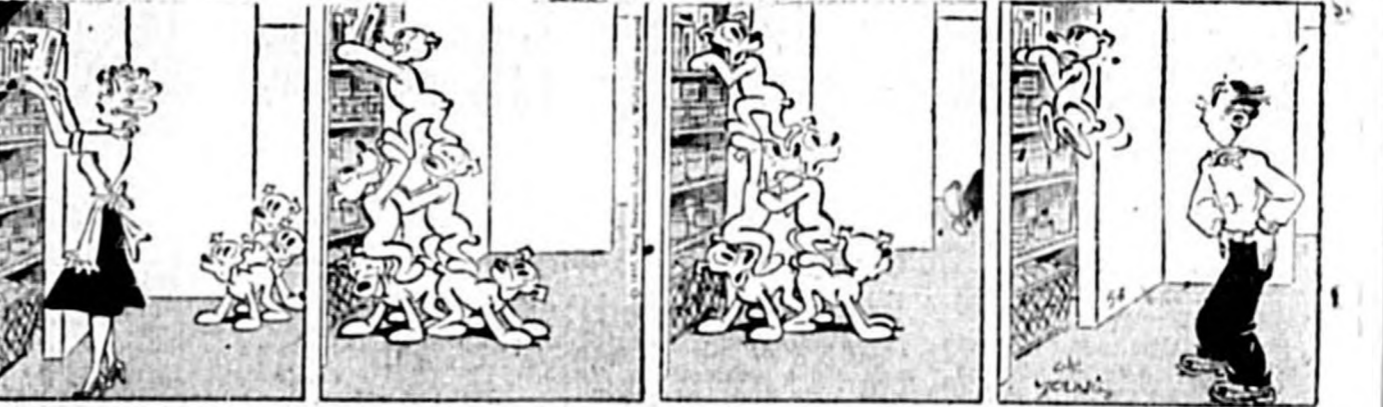
