The committee to assist in the hiring of a Chief of Police for the City of Sanford will meet for the first time at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday at City Hall. City Human Resources Director Joe Denaro said that more than 100 applicants have sent resumes and that the committee's initial tasks will be to prepare a "profile" for the position and then to study each resume. "When the committee determines its short-list, we will send a self-assessment questionnaire to those on the list," Denaro said. The next step in the process would be to bring in the top candidates for interviews. City Manager Tony VanDerworp eventually will decide on the position - subject to approval by the City Commission. The new chief and the city's fire chief will report to VanDerworp as the result of a referendum approved in March. VanDerworp, Denaro, Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger, Altamonte Springs Police Chief Bill Liquori, Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and citizen appointees Linda Kuhn and James Purdy constitute the committee. Acting Police Chief Ray Bronson is among the applicants. He has been the SPD's top cop since Joe Dillard announced his retirement at the start of the year.

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Television Pullout

State investigates teen dance center

LONGWOOD - The state Commission on Ethics is considering a complaint from a Longwood city commissioner that people who work for the city are doing business with the city through a corporation that sponsors a weekly teen dance program.

Terry Baker, Longwood's director of public safety, serves as the President for The Center for Youth Diversions, Inc. Baker and two additional city employees work with the non-profit corporation, according to Commissioner Paul Lovestrand's complaint.

Lovestrand said in his complaint that a city employee doing business with the city "points to a conflicting em-

ployment or contractual relationship."

Baker said that he does not think that he is conducting business with the city, or that the Center for Youth Diversions is conducting business with the city.

State law permits confiscation funds to support non-profit crime prevention programs and youth activities.

"I hope this investigation will be over as quickly as possible," Baker said. "I don't think we have anything to worry about."

The ethics commission on March 18 requested an accounting of the police confiscation funds given to the Center for Youth Diversions from 1995 to 1998 to support the teen dances.

Even though state law re-

quires an accounting of funds from the confiscation account by the Center for Youth Diversions, the City has not required the accounting in the past, City Administrator John Drago said.

"It does not sound like they're doing it right," Lovestrand said.

Baker said that the lack of accounting for confiscation funds used to support the teen dances was an oversight.

According to the accounting provided by the City on April 15, the Center for Youth Diversions received \$17,950 from confiscation funds to support the teen dance program from 1995-1998.

The dances, held at Longwood's Teen Center, are fully funded for the remainder of the year. The average annual cost to the City for the Teen

Dance is \$26,000, according to City Administrator John Drago.

Drago told Lovestrand in a memo on March 26 that because the City has no formal contract with the Center for Youth Diversions requiring financial disclosures, the Center is not compelled to provide the records.

Drago also said in the memo that he had found no facts that supported the statement "that anyone was instructed to do anything" regarding financial disclosures.

A letter from Greg Manning on Dec. 2, who at the time was the acting City Administrator, addressed to the City Commission said that Baker would be required to have financial records prepared for the Teen Center "made available to the Commission" at

the end of each calendar year.

Mayor Rusty Miles said this week he was concerned about the manner in which the Teen Center controversy has been handled.

"Quite honestly I'm disappointed that it was not resolved by this board (the city commission)," Miles said.

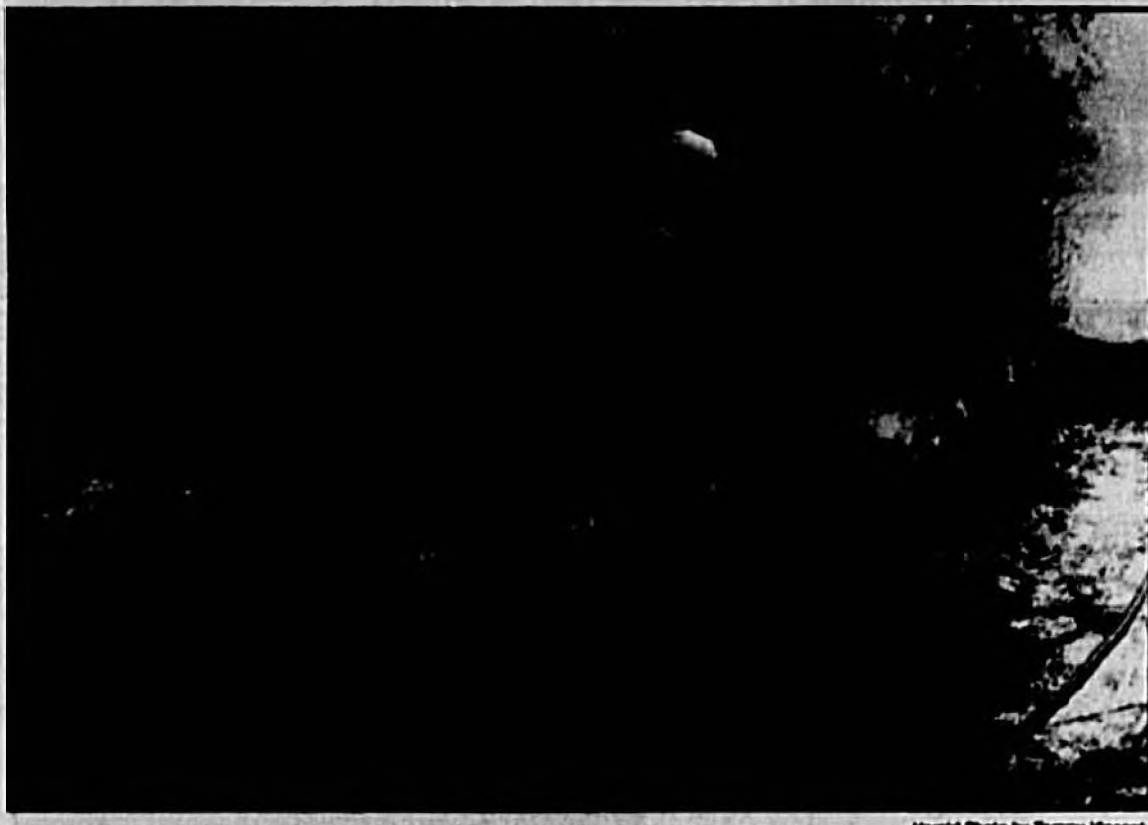
Lovestrand said that he did try to bring the matter to the city commission, without success. He said that at the Nov. 16 commission meeting he raised questions about the Center for Youth Diversions.

"I have nothing against the teen dance program," Lovestrand said. "I am concerned about the operation of the Center for Youth Diversions."

City Attorney Richard Taylor said he is not aware of any

Dry weather sparks no-burn rule

Seminole braces for wildfire season

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County hopes to avoid the flames that burned hundreds of acres last summer.

More than 200,000 acres of the state have burned since January, and Governor Jeb Bush Thursday requested a state of emergency declaration from President Clinton to receive federal assistance.

Faced with a growing threat of wildfire and a continuing severe drought, Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob

Crawford is banning open fires for land clearing.

"We're taking this action to further safeguard our citizens and their property," Crawford said. "I know that this closure places a burden on many people, but it is the right thing to do at this critical juncture."

The ban affects all agricultural, silviculture and rural land-clearing operations, including yard trash. Crawford also directed state forestry officials to include recreational campfires on state for-

ests in this ban.

People violating the ban face a second degree misdemeanor charge punishable by a fine of up to \$500 and up to 60 days in jail, or both.

Crawford is forming a special arson task force and increasing the reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction for a wildfire arsonist by up to \$5,000. To report information of wildfire arson, call the arson hotline at 1-800-342-5869.

Inmate may have spread tuberculosis

SANFORD - County health officials are examining whether an inmate recently released from the Seminole County Jail who developed an active case of tuberculosis may have passed the respiratory infection to other prisoners and employees.

The inmate was diagnosed at an area hospital after spending three months in the jail this year. The patient is undergoing treatment. Anyone who had contact with the inmate is being examined by medical staff, according to the Seminole County Health Department.

"There is one known case of tuberculosis," Maureen Dentzard, a senior nursing program specialist with the Seminole County Health Department, said. "There is not an outbreak."

Tuberculosis may be transmitted when a person infected with active tuberculosis coughs or speaks. The germs may be inhaled by others and can result in tuberculosis infection.

"It is relatively rare," Dentzard said.

Most tuberculosis infections occur when people are confined in small, poorly ventilated areas, over extended periods of time. Infection de-

Board considers policy to set school districts

The Seminole County Board of Education will discuss a proposed policy change that will establish clear school attendance zones.

The proposal will be presented at the 7 p.m. Seminole County Public Schools board meeting Tuesday. It authorizes Dianne Kramer and her facilities planning staff to facilitate "an advisory committee of stakeholders to address future planning and funding options."

Kramer's team has redrawn maps numerous times based on input from an array of stakeholders, not just parents, but current development zone planning excludes

the land. Recent rezoning debates have occurred when Tusawilla parents fought to keep their children at Keeth Elementary and helped prompt the proposal to keep the vacant land unzoned until the platting and permitting process.

School officials point to numerous parent complaints that some developers, builders and real estate agents guarantee student placement in certain schools. Many parents said they didn't know to question these guarantees.

Larry Furlong, school board chairman, said during recent public hearings that the district is basically acting to participate in the zoning

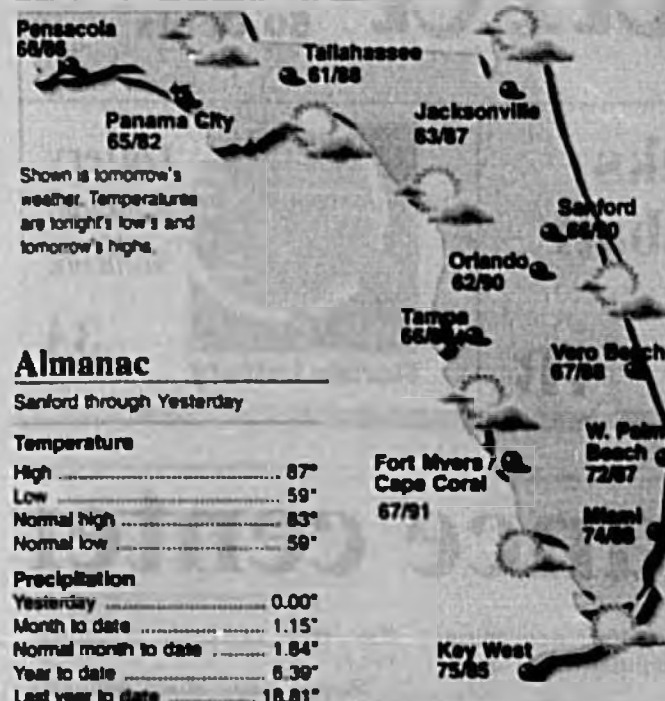
"What I did with Richard Nixon was a very short course," he said Thursday. "What we're doing today in the county is for the longer

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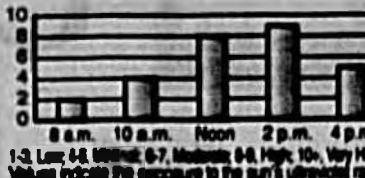
Florida Weather

pends on how infectious the source case is, as well as how susceptible the person who has contracted the case is to catching tuberculosis, health officials said.
In its early phase, tuberculosis infection is often controlled by the body's immune system. Progression to active disease usually occurs in about 10 percent of cases, and can be effectively stopped if a course of preventive therapy is completed.

BAB members suggested advice be sought from a "Blue Ribbon" advisory panel, Furlong favors the participation of Leadership Seminole members, because they are already up-to-date on all community issues.

When he was a radio news director in Memphis, Weinberg went to Graceland. Elvis was dead. "I didn't meet him," Weinberg said. "I interviewed visitors to Graceland the year after Elvis died."

process more efficiently. This particular item is one that officials as parents have faced themselves, according to Furlong.

"Developers, builders and home owners assume that school districts are cast in stone, but they are not. If we can redistrict existing subdivisions, we can do so with undeveloped property as well," explained Furlong.

If the proposal is adopted, vacant, unplatted parcels with more than 50 individual homes would be designated with a "to be determined" School Attendance Zone. The developer would apply for school zone designation at the time of plat or final site plan approval, allowing the board to "more evenly distribute enrollment without constant rezoning," said Kramer.
The new policy would affect

only development of parcels with more than 50 homes, allowing lone vacant lots and parcels developed for less than 50 units to be included in existing attendance zones.

District officials recently heard the views of the developers, their attorneys and a Home Builders Association of Mid-Florida representative during a worksession following the April 13 meeting. Most parents left after the regular board meeting, where they had spoken on the specific rezoning approval.

Furlong previously attended a Business Advisory Board meeting, where the builders' group challenged the proposal due to the declining rate of growth in the county. They consider the policy revision to be unnecessary when viewed in light of the shrinking growth rate.

Were the good old days really good?

The boondocks are growing today at twice the rate of the large cities. Do the emigrants from the metropolitan centers know something about where to find happiness that confirmed city-dwellers don't?

Or are they being taken in by the nostalgia kick that has made us wistful for "the good old days" when life was lived at a slower pace?

Were "the good old days" really better, or do they just seem better in retrospect?

All of us, of course, can recall unhappy times in our past, but somehow those times don't seem as bad as what we are going through today. That is because old troubles mastered-- no matter how big-- never seem as painful as current troubles unmastered-- no matter how small.

In his 1971 book "This is how it was" (Dillon/Liederbach Inc.), William Laubenstein recalls his growing-up years in Minersville, Pa.

He looks back fondly to those days when "a penny bought candy 'fried eggs' in a tiny tin pan or a sugar waffle hot off the griddle...when the Fourth of July meant firecrackers and a big parade and Decoration Day meant honoring the dead...when a farmer came to the door and a doctor came to the patient."

According to Laubenstein, in those turn-of-the-century days in Minersville (now about to pass out of view), "people went to church, begot children and were taken care of in old age by their children. And they died, were decently mourned and buried in family plots. It was all unhurried and unharried."

Yes, but wasn't it frightfully dull? the young people in the audience are apt to ask.

I think that there is no doubt that life today is more interesting. And more comfortable. We wouldn't want to go back to the days before indoor plumbing and central heating.

But in some ways surely the old days were better, and if we can slow down in our 21st century rat race and discover what those old days were, it is possible we can have the best of both worlds.

For instance, in the old days there was less excitement.

I wonder if we realize what we have lost in the quality of life through our preoccupation with activity and excitement.

Bertrand Russell said, "A happy life must be to a great extent a quiet life, for it is only in an atmosphere of quiet that true joy can live."

Russell recommended a life in which monotony played a part. Constructive purposes, he said, don't form themselves in a mind full of constant distractions.

For this reason, said the British philosopher, "a generation that cannot endure boredom will be a generation of little men."

Did he mean us?
G.K. Chesterton seemed to

According to meteorologists, the La Nina weather phenomenon is playing a key role in the low rainfall. La Nina makes Florida warmer and drier than normal during spring.

On April 13 a brushfire burned 40 acres of Lake Jessup Park, with winds pushing the fire to the lake. There were no injuries or property damage in the fire, in contrast to the extensive property damage of last summer.

Since January of this year, 2,613 fires have burned 221,895 acres across the state. Officials said 59 homes have been destroyed, with another 81 damaged.

"Most of the state is already suffering from drought conditions and state meteorologists tell us no significant rainfall is in sight," Joe Myers, director of the Division of Emergency Management, said.

On April 17, 35 to 40 Panhandle residents evacuated their homes due to fires. The next day, fires in the Everglades forced the closure of a portion of Interstate 75. The smoke also interfered with radar used by airports in Dade County, including Mi-

ami International Airport. The fire threatened more than 80 homes, as well as power lines, officials said.

Bush declared a state of emergency in Florida last week. No Seminole County homes have been lost from fire damage so far this year.

At this time last year, only 9,000 acres in Florida had burned, officials said.

In June, 1998, a Seminole County fire hopscotched across 2,000 acres, destroying nine residences and 25 vehicles. The fire decimated more than 600 acres of the Bears Nest Ranch, owned by Sanford Mayor Larry Dale.

Cities across the county, including Sanford, cancelled the Fourth of July fireworks celebrations due to dry conditions.

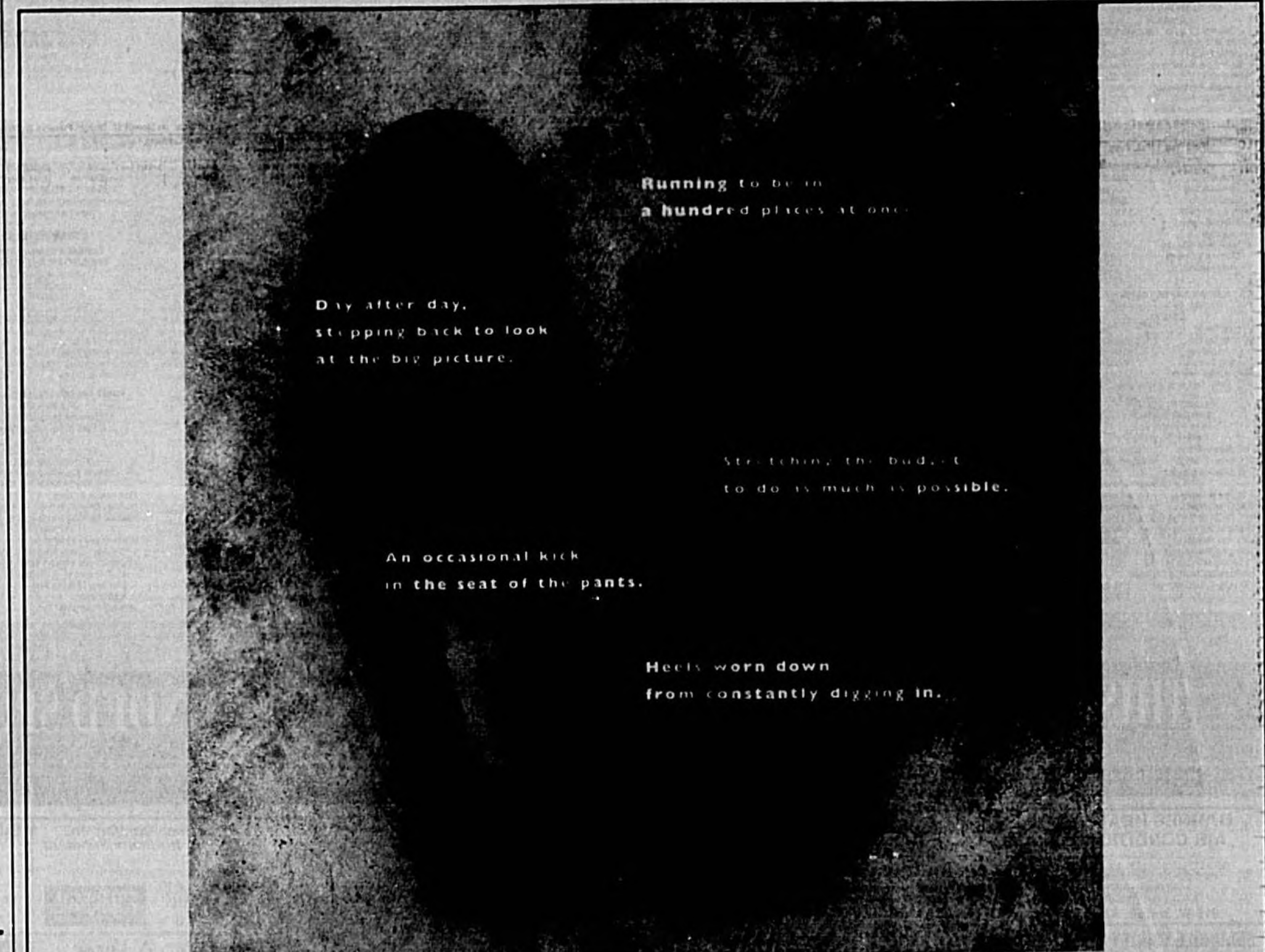

Don't make excuses for not eating well

A lot of people develop a mindset that it's simply not possible to eat well; it would be too inconvenient. Or they believe eating right is too punishing and leaves out too many good-tasting foods. But many of the reasons that have become standard alibis for not following better diets are based on misunderstandings about what it takes to achieve good nutrition. Herewith, four common excuses for not eating more healthfully - and easy ways to get around them.

1. Eating right costs too much. Four out of 10 people think fruits, vegetables, fish and other foods that fit easily into a healthful diet cost more than the items they buy currently, according to a survey conducted by Princeton Research Associates. But that's not necessarily true, as investigators at Pennsylvania State University and Cooperstown, New York's Mary Imogene Bassett Research Institute have demonstrated.

When they gave me some 300 people with high blood cholesterol how-to home videos on cutting fat from their diets, those whose cholesterol levels



dropped the most after nine months lopped and average of \$1.10 each day from their food bills. For a heart-healthy family of four, that would come to a yearly savings of \$1,000.

It makes sense. Cereal with milk can cost less than a donut or muffin bought at a drive-through.

Of course, some people resist spending money on healthful food. The same person who thinks nothing of spending \$3 on a pint of his or her favorite premium ice cream might balk about spending \$2.99 for a pint of strawberries in the dead

of winter to top that ice cream or \$7 for a pound of fresh fish.

2. I can't fit the recommended five daily servings of fruits and vegetables. A lot of people think eating more produce means eating a fruit instead of a candy bar. And of course, when it's a Snickers bar you really want, an apple is just not going to cut it.

But what about slipping in vegetables and fruits on the sly, say, by layering a couple slices of tomato and a lettuce leaf into a tuna sandwich? Or adding a cup of finely shredded carrots to a pot of spaghetti sauce?

Other options for adding fruits and vegetables unobtrusively: puree apples and pears in the blender with a pinch of sugar to make a dressing for pork or chicken? Or make fruit smoothie in less than a minute by blending at high speed a cup of milk plus a cup of strawberries, a pinch of sugar, and a dash of vanilla.

3. I don't have time to eat right. The average adult watches about 22 hours of TV a week. All it would take to make a delicious lasagna layered with vegetables is about an hour.

You can even speed things up by using bottled tomato sauce and other step-saving

items. Granted, the more you cook from scratch, the more you can control the amount of fat and sodium you eat (and the better the dish will probably taste.) But taking at least a little time to make a meal rather than buy one or simply munch on whatever's around will probably net you a more nutritious dinner than you would get otherwise.

4. I eat too much to ever be able to eat right. Who doesn't eat too much sometimes? The best way to avoid doing it too often is not to beat yourself up about it when you do overindulge. The better you can be about letting yourself off the hook for the occasional binge, the easier it will be to return to your regular healthful eating habits the next day. It's in people's punishing themselves emotionally for how much they've eaten that they set themselves up for vicious cycles of "being good" and "letting all heck break loose" in the kitchen.

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Think first, play later

In my classes, I constantly stress the necessity for counting and planning before playing from the dummy at trick one. Those who follow my guidelines become proficient players; those who ignore them charge ahead, going down in makable contract after makable contract.

"But the opponents complain if I spend time at trick one," observed one such declarer.

"Of course they do," I replied. "They know that if you play immediately, you are more likely to make a mistake; you are more likely to make a mistake; you are more likely to make a mistake."

One South was guilty of this crime in today's deal. In four hearts, how would you continue after winning the first trick with the spade ace? Did West have a more effective opening lead?

The first South found the best line:

He led his club at trick two. West ducked, hoping for a misguess, but South remembered the overall. He went up with dummy's king; then he ruffed a club and led a diamond. West (correctly) ducked again; declarer won in dummy, ruffed a club, ruffed a spade, drew trumps, and claimed 10 tricks from one spade, six hearts, one diamond, one club and a spade ruff in the dummy.

At the other table, South promptly ruffed a spade at trick two, then paused for thought. Was it unlucky that he was now destined to finish one down? Suppose South calls for dummy's diamond king. West wins with the ace and switches to a trump. South must lose two spades, one diamond and one club.

It is tough to find, but West does better to lead a trump initially. If South plays his club, West wins and returns his second heart. Later, West ducks one round of diamonds.

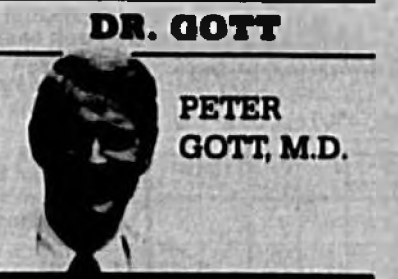
ASK DR. GOTT

Skin may become sensitive with age

DEAR DR. GOTT: I live in Florida, have golfed for years and never had trouble with sunburn until now. If I don't keep my arms covered and wear a ridiculous hat, the sun causes me to break out in a prickly rash. Suntan lotions don't help. What's my next option?

DEAR READER: Your sensitive skin is crying out for protection from ultraviolet rays. This can become more of a problem as people age, even if they have a modest tan. Sometimes sun allergy is caused by medicine, especially tetracycline, so if you are taking medication of any type, ask your doctor if the drug could be reacting with the sun to cause photosensitivity.

Wearing long sleeves while exercising in a warm climate can be a bore. Moreover, most clothing will not prevent the sun from reaching your hands and neck. I think the simplest and most obvious solution is to use sunscreen preparations. Pick and choose according to your needs: high ratings for prolonged sun exposure, low ratings for off-season or misty days. As a general rule, you should not have to use sunscreen with an

SPF that exceeds 15.

DEAR DR. GOTT: At 62 I still swim one and a half miles, five days a week. I don't swim fast, just at a steady pace. Is it possible that I could overdo? I hope not, because I could swim a lot longer!

DEAR READER: Bravo for your continuing and regular exercise. Of course, anybody can overdo strenuous activity, but if you keep a steady pace and don't push yourself to the point of exhaustion, I think that you will experience only health benefits from your endeavor. If you feel comfortable swimming longer distances, by all means do so. But work up gradually and make sure you have qualified supervision until you become accus-

ustomed to the higher level of exertion.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I despise drinking milk. Also, I don't need the calories. I'm 17, 5 feet tall and weigh 158 pounds. If I can get enough protein, iron and vitamins from other sources, do I need to worry about calcium?

DEAR READER: Yes, you do. Although you can safely avoid milk, you might try other dairy products — such as cheese, yogurt and dietetic ice cream — that would supply the calcium you require. On the other hand, if you are calorie-conscious or abhor all milk products, start taking calcium pills. I suggest 1500 milligrams of calcium and 400 units of vitamin D a day. I purposely put these figures on the high side for someone your age, because research has shown that bone strength and density in later years are directly proportional to calcium intake during childhood and adolescence. I would like you to build strong bones for the future.
