

## Heat's no recordbreaker

SANFORD - It'll have to get a lot hotter than this if you want to set a record.

According to Milt Brown of the Southeast Regional Climate Center in Columbia, S.C., the mercury has soared above the 100-degree mark on more than one occasion in the last two decades.

Monday's relatively cool 95 degrees was no record-breaker in D See Heat, Page 5A

## Sanford, though the 97-degree mark in Orlando broke records set back in the carly 1930s.

'It was a pretty average day in Sanford according to our records." Brown said.

According to Brown, the record high temperature in Sanford was set on Aug. 18, 1988 when it reached 107 degrees. On two occasions (on July 8, 1977 and on Aug. 21, 1983) the temperature reached 105 de-

grees. "It looks like those were pretty isolated incidents." he noted. 'Looks like 90s are pretty much the standard down there in Sanford."

## FPL urges customers to conserve during crunch

SANFORD - Steamy, sultry. tropical, withering, blistering or just plain HOT are words local residents may be uttering in the midst of the current summer heat wave. Caught in an energy crunch between increased consumer demand and reduced generating capacity due to plant shutdowns, Florida Power & Light officials are urging customers to conserve electricity or face rolling blackouts.

Five of FP&L's 34 power plants are experiencing technical problems. The Sanford plant unit 4 generator was shutdown Monday afternoon due to boller tube leaks. FP&L spokesman Date Thomas said. Two other generators at the plant are still operating. FP&L plants in St. Lucie, Port Everglades. Bradenton and Fort Myers are also off line reducing the 18,100 megawaits produced in peak summer months by about 2,800 megawatta.

FP&L serves about 400,000 customers in Central Florida, primarily in Brevard, Seminole and Volusia counties. Company officials are

## Sanford nixes church sign, chain fences

SANFORD - The city codes prevalled over citizen requests during Monday night's Sanford City Commission meeting. Chain link fences and a church's sign lighting were all denied based on violations of city ordinances.

Three requests had been submitted regarding chain link fences. In all three situations, their applications had been denied by the Board of Adjustment, and the requests were brought forward to the commission to appeal the denials. The residences are located at 2603 Elm Ave.,

904 W. 24th St., and 212 Bradshaw Drive.

In all three fence cases, the applicants cited the need in order to better protect small children. Anette Peralia, of 904 W. 24th St. explained that the fence, which had been up at one time, was taken down but has not been replaced. "Now they tell me I'm in violation and have to take it down." she explained. "I just can't afford that."

Beonarine Rambissoon of 212 Bradshaw Drive said his home had already been burglarized four times. "Since I filed this application," he said. "there has been a car go out of control, come up onto the lawns near our home and hit a child. I don't want that to happen to my three children." Members of the city commission however, one by one, voted against the appeals and in support of the decisions made by the Board of Adjust-

## Fire injures crew

ST. PETERSBURG - Crewmembers put out a blaze in the engine room of a Bahamian-registered ship carrying jet fuel. and three injured crewmembers were airlifted with burns.

The fire broke out Monday on the ship Ice Purha out in the Gulf of Mexico, about 150 miles west of here. The Coast Guard responded with three helicopters and a C-130 backup plane.

One crewmember suffered severe burns while two others had minor injuries, said Petty Officer David Cameron of the Coast Guard Group St. Petersburg.

The fire was contained shortly after it broke out on the 616-foot vessel, which was carrying a crew of 31, he said.

## Jews for Jesus fight ban

TAMPA - Jews for Jesus and the group's Florida director have filed a lawsuit in federal court, challenging as unconstitutional a ban on passing out literature at Tampa International Airport.

The policy violates guarantees of free speech, peaceable assembly and religious freedom, the lawsuit filed Monday says.

The group's director, Steve Cohen, said airport officials and the Hillsborough County Aviation Authority told him last month distribution of literature is not permitted.

There are some areas of constitutional law that are unclear. but this is not one of them," said attorney Mathew Staver, who is representing Jews for Jesus and Cohen.

Paul MacAlester, airport spokesman, had no comment.

### Historical Society finds home

TAMPA - After three decades, the Florida Historical Society is moving from the University of South Florida to a home of its own across the state in Melbourne.

Founded in 1856 in St. Augustine, the society is one of the state's oldest cultural organizations. The headquarters has bounced among various universities.

Having a place of its own is something the society has always wanted, said Nick Wynne, the society's executive director.

The 2.000 member society plans to move its headquarters to an old home donated by two sisters, with a second home and \$2.75 million in cash promised upon their deaths.

WHITE CITY - Two Florida Panhandle men have discovered alcohol may fuel the fire of racism but kerosene can evaporate



## Kids sexually abuse kids Out of 1,548 reports, nearly half under 5

SARASOTA - In six months of investigation. the state gathered 1.548 reports of children raping and molesting other children. Nearly half the victims were under 5.

"I am appalled at some of the stuff I've learned." said state Rep. Shirley Brown, D-Sarasota, and co-chairwoman of a state task force on juvenile sex offenders. "The numbers are startling."

But the numbers are no more startling than some of the offenders. One boy, Josh. talks about baseball and girls and seems like an ordinary 12-year-old.

But Josh has sodomized and molested more than 20 children in his neighborhood, including

his younger brother and sister. The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services began collecting data in October on children sexually abusing other children.

While research indicates treatment works for about 85 percent to 95 percent of young sex offenders. Brown's task force found that Florida rarely provides it. The Tampa Tribune reported Monday.

A law she sponsored that took effect July 1 requires monitoring of young sex offenders and notification of law enforcement and school officials when an offender is released from a program.

That is only a beginning, said Brown, who estimates only one-fourth of juvenile sex offenders and their victims get the help they need. The problem has gained at-

tention in the past decade as more people have come forward. and some experts say it may be more frequent partly because children are bombarded by sexual images and violence in the media.

Sexual abuse among children differs from what child psychologists consider normal sexual experimentation, such as playing doctor.


It usually involves one child who is older. larger or in authority over the other, such as a baby sitter. Offenders force, bribe or threaten their victims into sexual acts, including fondling, oral sex and intercourse. The acts can be violent, and

very young children can be another child in the previous sex offenders, but they can learn victims. According to one report, year. kindergartners at a Sarasota

sex offenders have been physiclementary school fondled and engaged in oral sex with classmates during nap time. Abuse also occurs at state-

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

## Codes fence in decision makers

Sanford's city commission mulled over a number of issues last night dealing with chain link fences. The city has been attempting for some time now, to enact an ordinance regarding who should or should not be allowed to have the fences.

All three requests were denied. But it is similar to other decisions faced by the commission when it becomes a matter of the general public versus city codes.

No matter what is decided there will be objections. If one neighbor has a chain link fence, it is difficult to understand why another neighbor can't. If new fences are allowed for properties near an existing fence, what is to determine the definition of "near"? Would it be immediately next door, across the street, within the same city block, or adjacent in back lots?

The city commission is charged with making these particular decisions, just as it is with other ordinances pertaining to the life of the city. In this case, it's a matter of preserving the historical codes which are in effect for the city of Sanford.

Many people believe erecting a chain link fence around their homes or businesses is the only way they can give protection against burglars. We believe few want the fence for any other reasons unless it's a dog fence. Even then, it's a matter of protection.

We find ourselves therefore, walking a thin line. What should have more importance, historic preservation or safety from crime?

Arguments can be made, and for that matter, have been made, on both sides of the question.

People need to be safe and protected from intruders. On the other hand, it was Sanford citizens- who took part in the massive compilation of information and suggestions involved in establishing the Duany historic mently the ru district codes, and sub regulations which guide the historic areas. The question of who can and cannot have a chain link fence is not gone. The city of Sanford, as well as our other cities, will continuously be faced with such decisions. No matter what our government bodies decide, there will be people who object. Is it any wonder many people hesitate to seek political office? There is a great deal of stress to such a job, especially in a situation where someone is bound to lose no matter what is decided.



## **Richardson eyeing** Domenici's seat?

WASHINGTON - Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., who has spent the past couple of years sowing peace around the world, is on the verge of starting a huge political war here at home.

Top advisers to Richardson tell us he's seriously weighing a challenge to Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., who's up for re-election next year. The race would pit a rising star in the House Democratic leadership against the

powerful clusisman of the Senate Budget Committee in what would easily become the hottest Senate race of 1996.

**Richardson** has bolstered his political stock in recent years. by.scrying es a part-time diplomat who has handled delicate negotiations in global hot spots from Halti to North Korea. Nevertheless, private The race would Democratic polls easily become the holtest Senate race of conducted earlier this year showed **Richardson** trailing 1996. Domenici by 26 points in a hypothetical matchup. Politi-cal analyst Charles E. Cook said in February that "as long as Domenici seeks re-election, it's difficult to imagine why any credible contender would want to challenge the most revered political figure in modern New Mexican history." But Richardson has also been winning rave reviews back home since last month's dramatic mission to Iraq to bring home two Americans who had been jailed by Saddam Hussein. A confidential poll conducted shortly after Richardson's return shows that Richardson has climbed 14 points in a head-to-head race with Domenici and now trails by just 12 points.

ppreciate the statement by historian Kenneth Davis that Social Security represents "the most important single piece of social legislation in American history." Yet, to speak of Social Security only in terms

of history is to consign it to the past. Its legacy, which reached the 60-year milestone Monday. is far too vital to allow that.

I recently viewed some historical film footage from the early years of the Great Depression through the signing of the original Social Security Act. In the flickering, static-filled newsreets, I saw men and women of vision and talent cope with the serious economic issues of their era. And I could glimpse the passion and fulfillment that the signing of the Social Security Act evoked.

The strong emotions associated with that early legislation may be hard for most Americana today to understand, since Social Security has become so much of the backdrop for our lives. But we need to recall the social turmoil from which Social Security emerged in order to understand how the program has developed - and how we can shape it to meet future needs.

Long before the original Social Security legislation had been drafted. Franklin Delano Roosevelt spoke eloquently of "the forgotten man at the bottom of the economic pyramid." The bottom of that pyramid included many aged or aging workers who had little or no hope of a respite from work in their lifetime.

More than half of all older Americans lived in poverty. Depression-era savings were low, and nine million Americans who had managed to save money lost all or part of their savings in bank failures. Pensions - for the few who had them - averaged less than \$20 per month. And jobs were scarce even for the young and strong-bodied - more than a quarter of the total workforce was unemployed.

When President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act in 1935, it provided a ray of hope for older Americans. It also set in motion change that would forever alter the way Americans live and work and the way we think about retirement and income security.

Over the last six decades, Social Security has become increasingly important to Americans

\* there are now 11 times as many Americans over age 65 as there were at the turn of the century — and even this number could more than double by the middle of the next century: \* more than 9 out of 10 older Americans now

get Social Security benefits; and fewer than 13 percent of older Americana

today fall below the poverty line, but without Social Security benefits that number would be nearly 50 percent.

While Social Security has become increasingly important to American lives and continues to enjoy strong support, it is also true that many baby boomers and younger Americans lack confidence that Security will be there for them, as it has been for their parents and grandparents. That sense of confidence is intangible, but it is important. John Kennedy once said, in fact, that "The basis of effective government is public confidence.

## CHATER Commissioner of Social Security

Confidence can be ephemeral, since it represents a constant interplay of attitudes and facts.

I believe, though, that facts can shape attitudes. I am therefore committed to educating the public about their Social Security system. It is important that they understand what they have in order to make intelligent decisions about making changes.

At its core, Social Security has evolved into a practical response to universal human needs. Throughout history, people have had to come to terms with the problem of economic security for those who are no longer fully employed due to age or disability, or when a breadwinner dies prematurely. In many situations, Social Security has kept families together in difficult limes.

The country's Social Security program provides a framework for meeting basic levels of need in these situations. Not only do 30 million retirees and their families count on Social Security, but so do more than 5 million disabled workers and their families, and more than 7 million family members of deceased workers. Included in these figures are more than 3 million children who receive monthly Social Security benefita. As Commissioner of Social Security, I have spoken throughout the country with men and women of all ages and circumstances about the Social Security program. I have heard some people say that Social Security is so large and complex, that it is difficult to understand the issues involved. I have heard some people say that the program seems immutable to change.

Neither is true.

In the 60 years that have passed since FDR signed the Social Security Act, the program has constantly evolved and changed to meet the needs of Americans. As we look beyond this 60th anniversary, we will need to modify and adjust the program once again to meet the future needs of Americans.

While it is true that Social Security faces long-term solvency problems. It is also true that we are not in immediate danger. There is ample time to develop options and recommendations, and to identify solutions that will keep the program healthy for another 60 years and beyond.

When he signed the Social Security Act, FDR referred to the new law as a cornersione in a structure that is by no means complete. As we continue to build on that foundation, we must acknowledge that our work is not finished. Throughout its history, Social Security has been an idea - a work in progress - designed to help more of us cope with what FDR called "the vicioalitudes of life."

Our challenge today, on this 60th anniversary, is to protect and preserve the legacy of Social Security's past while we alter and adjust the program to address the needs of the future. I invite all Americans to join me in meeting this challenge.

Domenici campaign manager Diana Dag gett dismissed the numbers with a shot across Richardson's bow. "In the 14 years that I've done campaigns. It would be a hardball match-up between two former minor league pitchers, and Richardson loyalists believe he has some curveballs to throw at Domenici. Though Domenici accured 73 percent of the vote in his last re-election fight, he outspent his opponent \$1.9 million to \$38,510. Richardson is expected to level the financial playing field, and his partial Mexican heritage might help him win votes in a state that is 38 percent Hispanic. Richardson strategists say he's also anxious to saddle Domenici with blame for the draconian GOP budget cuts.

"Congressman Richardson will sit down with his family in January to decide which course to pursue," Richardson spokesman Stu Nagurka said of the Feb. 13 filing deadline. "The only thing you can assume at this point is that he will not retire from politics."

Based on previously undisclosed nuggets about Richardson's Iraqi mission, his dipiomatic skills will come in real handy - and no detail will be too small - if he does take the senatorial plunge.

ment. The votes were all unanimous.

Regarding the church sign. First Baptist Church, which has been undergoing a massive building program, took down its sign in August of last year in order to allow for construction to the building and paving of the parking lot. They now wish to put the sign back, relatively near where it once was.

The Historic Preservation Board had approved allowing the sign to be crected. They told the church, however, that the lighting in the interior of the sign (backlighting), is no longer allowed under the city codes. They subsequently denied the lighting request, suggesting lights be placed with front flood lighting.

The church then appealed the denial, saying power lines would have to be extended as well as outside spotlights installed in order to light the front of the sign.

Jim Cornell, representing the church, and architect Mark Schweizer were both on hand at the commission meeting to explain the church's position. Cornell explained how two nearby churches had backlit signs.

"The First Baptist Church sign has been there for over 20 years." Schweizer said. "This sign is what people expect to see. It's part of the church's tradition."

Chris Cranias, a member of the Historic Preservation Board which denied the backlighting, was on hand at the commission meeting. He explained how the request had to be turned down. "It is a fact that internally lit signs are not allowed once they are torn down," he said. "It wasn't our decision, but it is written in the codes through our ordinances, and we have to go by them

During discussion, it was reported that Sanford City attorney Bill Colbert is a member of the church as well as its board of trustees. Mayor Bettye Smith also acknowledged that the is a member of First Baptist Church.

"It all comes down to this," said Commissioner Lon Howell. "It's non-conforming, and therefore, we cannot approve it."

Howell then moved to deny the appeal for the lighting. The motion carried by a unanimous vote of the commission.







The County has received a Development of Regional Impact - Application for Development Approval (Substantial Deviation) application for the Oviedo Crossing DRI from the Viera Company (the Applicant) to undergo development-of-regional impact review, as provided for in Section 380.06, Florida Statutes. The proposed Substantial Deviation would amend the approved final master plan for the Oviedo Crossing DRI to permit a regional shopping center and medical campus/weilness center as a part of the overall ORI development plan, and would delete the approved multi-family residential use. The Applicant has also submitted an application to amend the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan to change the land use from Higher Intensity Planned Development (Transitional) to Higher Intensity Planned Development (Core) and from Planned Development (Office) to Planned Development (Retail Services/Office and Wellness Center) on approximately 94.4 acres of the DRI property. (Note: On March 1, 1995, the LPA/P&Z, at a public hearing, recommended the associated plan amendment to the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan). The request also includes an amendment to the approved PUD (Planned Unit Development) Final Master Plan. The Oviedo Crossing DRI is located in the immediate vicinity of the Central Florida GreeneWay (S.R. 417)/Red Bug Lake Road Interchange in unincorporated Seminole County, with a portion of the proposed development being located in the City of Oviedo, and contains approximately 435 acres (see map below) (BCC District 1).

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## When is protein intake the most beneficial?

DEAR DR. GOTT: What are the optimum times for protein intake when lifting weights? I lift an hour a day, five days a week. I cat most of my daily protein at two meals - one 1-1/2 hours before lifting and another 1/2 hour after.

DEAR READER: I'm sure that body builders have their own personalized dietary habits -and these methods probably are all equally effective. The important consideration is to avoid strenuous exercise before digestion is complete.

Although most of a highprotein meal is undoubtedly digested within 90 minutes, it wouldn't hurt to play it safe by allowing two or three hours before your next work-out. The timing of your second meal is less important.

But remember that you should "cool down" for 20 or 30 minutes before cating, otherwise your intestines will draw blood, for digestion, away from your muscles. This may reduce the effectiveness of your weight training.

I'd also suggest spreading out your nutrition a bit. How about a good, solid breakfast, too? To a large extent, it probably doesn't matter so much when you cat as what (and how much) you consume.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Several friends have pancreatitis or pancreatic cancer. What's causing this? Can some of the discase be treated with medication or other control?

**DEAR READER:** The pancreas is an organ that manufactures digestive enzymes and insulin. It may become inflamed due to a number of reasons, such as galistones, cancer and overactive parathyroid glands. In the United States, the most common cause of pancreatitis is chronic alcohol abuse.

Symptoma include abdominal pain and poor digestion, progreasing eventually to olly stools and diabetes.

The diagnosis is made by blood test. X-rays and other special examinations.
