## It may seem hot, but it's been hotter Heat's no record-breaker FPL urges customers to conserve during crunch

Sanford, though the 97-degree mark in Orlando broke records set back in the early 1930s.

"It was a pretty average day in Sanford according to our records," Brown said.

According to Brown, the record high temperature in Sanford was set on Aug. 18, 1988 when it reached 107 degrees. On two occasions (on July 8, 1977 and on Aug. 21, 1983) the temperature reached 105 degrees.

"It looks like those were pretty isolated incidents," he noted. "Looks like 90s are pretty much the standard down here in Sanford."

Officials at the Sanford Research Center on Celery Avenue in Sanford keep track of the highs and the lows each day, as well as the rainfall amounts. They do not keep track of

blems. The Sanford plant unit 4 generator was shutdown Monday afternoon due to boiler tube leaks. FP&L spokesman Dale Thomas said. Two other generators at the plant are still operating. FP&L plants in St. Lucie, Port Everglades, Bradenton and Fort Myers are also off line reducing the 18,100 megawatts produced in peak summer months by about 2,800 megawatts.

FP&L serves about 400,000 customers in Central Florida, primarily in Brevard, Seminole and Volusia counties. Company officials are

## Sanford nixes church sign, chain fences

SANFORD — The city codes prevailed over citizen requests during Monday night's Sanford City Commission meeting. Chain link fences and a church's sign lighting were all denied based on violations of city ordinances.

Three requests had been submitted regarding chain link fences. In all three situations, their applications had been denied by the Board of Adjustment, and the requests were brought forward to the commission to appeal the denials.

The residences are located at 2603 Elm Ave., 904 W. 24th St., and 212 Bradshaw Drive.

In all three fence cases, the applicants cited the need in order to better protect small children. Anette Peralta, of 904 W. 24th St. explained that the fence, which had been up at one time, was taken down but has not been replaced. "Now they tell me I'm in violation and have to take it down," she explained. "I just can't afford that."

Beonarine Ramblisson of 212 Bradshaw Drive said his home had already been burglarized four times. "Since I filed this application," he said, "there has been a car go out of control, come up onto the lawn near our home and hit a child. I don't want that to happen to my three children."

Members of the city commission however, one by one, voted against the appeals and in support of the decisions made by the Board of Adjust-

## FLORIDA BRIEFS



### Fire injures crew

ST. PETERSBURG — Crewmembers put out a blaze in the engine room of a Bahamian-registered ship carrying jet fuel, and three injured crewmembers were airlifted with burns.

The fire broke out Monday on the ship Ice Purha out in the Gulf of Mexico, about 150 miles west of here. The Coast Guard responded with three helicopters and a C-130 backup plane.

One crewmember suffered severe burns while two others had minor injuries, said Petty Officer David Cameron of the Coast Guard Group St. Petersburg.

The fire was contained shortly after it broke out on the 616-foot vessel, which was carrying a crew of 31, he said.

"The vessel is out there. They feel their chief engineer can repair the problems to the engine room ... and get on their way," Cameron said.

### Jews for Jesus fight ban

TAMPA — Jews for Jesus and the group's Florida director have filed a lawsuit in federal court, challenging as unconstitutional a ban on passing out literature at Tampa International Airport.

The policy violates guarantees of free speech, peaceable assembly and religious freedom, the lawsuit filed Monday says.

The group's director, Steve Cohen, said airport officials and the Hillsborough County Aviation Authority told him last month distribution of literature is not permitted.

"There are some areas of constitutional law that are unclear, but this is not one of them," said attorney Mathew Staver, who is representing Jews for Jesus and Cohen.

Paul MacAlester, airport spokesman, had no comment.

### Historical Society finds home

TAMPA — After three decades, the Florida Historical Society is moving from the University of South Florida to a home of its own across the state in Melbourne.

Founded in 1856 in St. Augustine, the society is one of the state's oldest cultural organizations. The headquarters has bounced among various universities.

Having a place of its own is something the society has always wanted, said Nick Wynne, the society's executive director.

The 2,000-member society plans to move its headquarters to an old home donated by two sisters, with a second home and \$2.75 million in cash promised upon their deaths.

But board members say they've heard heirs of the two sisters have challenged the bequest. They wonder what will happen to the society's collection of books, maps and letters, including a book of letters written by Florida's governor during the Civil War.

### Cross burning plans evaporate

WHITE CITY — Two Florida Panhandle men have discovered alcohol may fuel the fire of racism but kerosene can evaporate it.

Robert James Hicks, 27, and Robert Brian McLeod, 20, remained free Monday on conditional release pending trial on charges of violating Florida's Hate Crime Act last Wednesday night.

The two men, arrested and released Thursday, are accused of trying to burn a crude 5-foot by 3-foot cross outside a home occupied by a white woman and a black man.

The suspects, who had been drinking, poured kerosene on the cross but ran off when they thought someone had spotted them, said Gulf County Sheriff Frank McKeithen. They later returned and tried to ignite the cross, but by then the kerosene had evaporated, witnesses told deputies.

### First tests offer few clues

JACKSONVILLE — Preliminary results from medical samples taken from three of the 97 people who fell ill during a hotel conference have failed to show bacteria was the culprit.

People attending a business conference at the Marriott Hotel at Southpoint reported symptoms of nausea, headaches and diarrhea after eating a buffet meal served last week at the hotel.

Kathleen Ward, a biological scientist for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said Monday investigators are now focusing on whether the illness was caused by a virus.

"We feel fairly certain it was not salmonella or any other bacterial pathogen," she said.

### Fish story ends in guilty plea

MIAMI — A Miami Beach fisherman has pleaded guilty to illegally importing 2,500 pounds of Bahamian fish for commercial sale in Miami.

The \$2,000 shipment carried from Bimini by the Privateer III fishing boat was not inspected as required for export from the Bahamas. Then, it wasn't properly reported on arrival at the Port of Miami, either, prosecutors charged.

Randall Lacey, 50, could face a five-year prison sentence and fines of up to \$250,000 at sentencing Oct. 30 before U.S. District Judge James L. King.

# Squabbles threaten Hispanic commission

TAMPA — Already trying to survive with its state money cut off, Florida's embattled Commission on Hispanic Affairs could close up entirely by year's end as vacancies go unfilled.

The panel was created in 1977 to study the needs of Florida Hispanics. But this year, lawmakers cut out its appropriation of more than \$116,000 a year.

And while private money will let the group operate until December, Gov. Lawton Chiles may not fill seven seats that become vacant next month.

The governor can make the appointments, but the Florida

Legislature would have to approve funding to continue the commission. Chiles aide Joseph Pena said.

"They're not abolished," said Pena. "They're still on the books, but if you have no money and no staff you're not going anywhere. We may reappoint — or hold off and see what the future may hold."

Though some officials accuse the panel of carelessly researched, overly critical reports, backers say letting it die would hurt under-represented Hispanics.

Dario Ruiz of the League of United Latin American Citizens, the nation's largest advocacy group for Hispanics, said the

state should heed the commission's reports.

"Unless we really pay attention ... it's only going to get worse," said Ruiz. "Hispanics are the fastest-growing minority group in the United States, and by the year 2000 will be the largest minority in the United States. They're an important group, and they do good work."

Victor Alvarado, who chairs the commission, said its demise would betray a commitment to Hispanics.

"This is a governmental agency, and here we are searching for corporate money to survive," said Alvarado. "I feel betrayed on everyone's part. The message I received from this

budget cut was that Hispanics are not important enough."

The 15-member panel produces annual reports on governmental groups' progress in hiring Hispanics, among other issues.

Its last two reports gave falling grades to the state university system and more than a dozen state agencies, accusing them of inadequate efforts to recruit and hire Hispanics.

But Pena countered late last week that the commission reports were carelessly researched and failed to show progress made at some state agencies.

"We didn't see numbers of any kind that reflected the positive changes that have been made," he said.

urging its 3.4 million customers statewide to set thermostats to 80 degrees, close curtains and blinds and avoid using dishwashers and other appliances this afternoon.

When a plant is shut down, the company spokesman said, the company would normally buy power from other utilities to make up the deficiency. However, Monday, the other utilities did not have extra power to sell.

The record breaking heat is increasing the demand for elec-

tricity. If the voluntary conservation measures don't reduce the demand, customers face periodic interruptions of service.

Thomas said the company also implemented its load management program between 4:30 and 7:30 p.m. Monday, selectively cutting power to some of the 395,000 customers on the program. Individuals or businesses who are on the program agree to allow power to be cut to an air conditioner, water heater or pool heater, for example, from 15 minutes up to three hours, in

exchange for a reduction in their electric bill.

Rolling blackouts similar to the ones implemented at Christmastime 1989 are possible if the current demand for electricity is not reduced.

The 97-degree high Monday broke the 32-year old record set in Orlando 1963 by 2 degrees. Sanford's high of 95 degrees was several degrees below the 1988 record of 107 degrees, according to the Southeast Regional Climate Center.

Sometimes referred to as the

"dog days" of summer, the period between early July and early September is when the hot humid weather of summer usually occurs in the northern hemisphere. Although some may think the label stems from dogs lazing away the day in the coolest spot they can find, the period is named from the heliac rising of the Dog Star (Sirius). The heat wave that has gripped much of the Midwest and eastern United States has claimed over 500 lives in Chicago.

# Kids sexually abuse kids

## Out of 1,548 reports, nearly half under 5

SARASOTA — In six months of investigation, the state gathered 1,548 reports of children raping and molesting other children. Nearly half the victims were under 5.

"I am appalled at some of the stuff I've learned," said state Rep. Shirley Brown, D-Sarasota, and co-chairwoman of a state task force on juvenile sex offenders. "The numbers are startling."

But the numbers are no more startling than some of the offenders. One boy, Josh, talks about baseball and girls and seems like an ordinary 12-year-old.

But Josh has sodomized and molested more than 20 children in his neighborhood, including his younger brother and sister.

The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services began collecting data in October on children sexually abusing other children.

While research indicates treatment works for about 85 percent to 95 percent of young sex offenders, Brown's task force found that Florida rarely provides it. The Tampa Tribune reported Monday.

A law she sponsored that took effect July 1 requires monitoring of young sex offenders and notification of law enforcement and school officials when an offender is released from a program.

That is only a beginning, said Brown, who estimates only one-fourth of juvenile sex offenders and their victims get the help they need.

The problem has gained attention in the past decade as more people have come forward, and some experts say it may be more frequent partly because children are bombarded by sexual images and violence in the media.

Sexual abuse among children differs from what child psychologists consider normal sexual experimentation, such as playing doctor.

It usually involves one child who is older, larger or in authority over the other, such as a baby sitter. Offenders force, bribe or threaten their victims into sexual acts, including fondling, oral sex and intercourse.

The acts can be violent, and

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

### Codes fence in decision makers

Sanford's city commission mulled over a number of issues last night dealing with chain link fences. The city has been attempting for some time now, to enact an ordinance regarding who should or should not be allowed to have the fences.

All three requests were denied. But it is similar to other decisions faced by the commission when it becomes a matter of the general public versus city codes.

No matter what is decided there will be objections. If one neighbor has a chain link fence, it is difficult to understand why another neighbor can't. If new fences are allowed for properties near an existing fence, what is to determine the definition of "near"? Would it be immediately next door, across the street, within the same city block, or adjacent in back lots?

The city commission is charged with making these particular decisions, just as it is with other ordinances pertaining to the life of the city. In this case, it's a matter of preserving the historical codes which are in effect for the city of Sanford.

Many people believe erecting a chain link fence around their homes or businesses is the only way they can give protection against burglars. We believe few want the fence for any other reasons unless it's a dog fence. Even then, it's a matter of protection.

We find ourselves therefore, walking a thin line. What should have more importance, historic preservation or safety from crime?

Arguments can be made, and for that matter, have been made, on both sides of the question.

People need to be safe and protected from intruders. On the other hand, it was Sanford citizens who took part in the massive compilation of information and suggestions involved in establishing the Duany historic district codes, and subsequently the rules and regulations which guide the historic areas.

The question of who can and cannot have a chain link fence is not gone. The city of Sanford, as well as our other cities, will continuously be faced with such decisions.

No matter what our government bodies decide, there will be people who object. Is it any wonder many people hesitate to seek political office? There is a great deal of stress to such a job, especially in a situation where someone is bound to lose no matter what is decided.

# Blame game begins, wreck looms

A major new poll indicates that cynicism about government is at a 40-year high, but it will get even worse if Congress and President Clinton fail to avoid the government-stopping "train wreck" they are barreling toward this fall.

Instead of cooperating to avoid a collision, Hill Republicans and the White House are gearing up to pin the blame on each other. Likely as not, they'll share it and encourage the public to look for a third-party savior in the 1998 elections.

The bipartisan Americans Talk Issues poll recently released shows that 76 percent of Americans rarely or never trust the government to do what's right, the highest level the "cynicism index" has ever reached - 13 points higher than during Watergate and 7 points higher than in 1980, when inflation was running at 15 percent. Americans trust the United Nations significantly more than they do the U.S. government.

The pollsters who conducted the study, Democrat Stan Greenberg and Republican Fred Steeper, said their findings indicate an unprecedented opening for a third-party candidate such as Ross Perot or Colin Powell.

Meantime, congressional Republicans and the White House are stepping up their game of fiscal "chicken," pushing the accelerator and blaming the other side for risking a crash. Not even in

secret, apparently, is anyone making sure that

the brakes work. In an all-out crash, key government agencies might shut down for days or even weeks, inflicting serious damage on the economy.

At the White House three weeks ago, House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., suggested to President Clinton that the two sides form a staff-level group to prepare for compromise, but there has been no follow-up, and meantime the atmosphere between the sides has become more confrontational.

In the latest round, Gingrich and Senate Majority Leader Bob

Dole, R-Kan., declared recently that Congress would complete action on all 13 appropriations bills by the beginning of the new fiscal year on Oct. 1, serving notice that if Clinton vetoes any of

the measures and government stops for lack of funding, the responsibility will be his.

Meanwhile, Clinton has personally issued threats to veto five funding bills - Labor-HHS, VA-HUD, Commerce-Justice-State, Treasury-Postal Service, and the legislative branch. Other officials have issued explicit veto threats to two more in his name - Agriculture and Interior - and have warned that the Defense appropriation also may be vetoed.

While issuing the threats, the White House and congressional Democrats have been blaming Republicans for moving legislation along too slowly to permit post-veto negotiations before the fiscal deadline of Oct. 1, threatening the "train wreck."

That's the action in public. In private, each side is acting like an underworld gang preparing for war - forming up inner councils to plot strategy and persuading themselves that the other side is likely to buckle under pressure.

Republicans say that Clinton has often shown a tendency to cave in to confrontations, that he realizes his administration would suffer more from a government shutdown than Congress, and that he has a political interest in showing he can govern along with a GOP Congress.

# Challenge of Social Security

As the commissioner of Social Security, I appreciate the statement by historian Kenneth Davis that Social Security represents "the most important single piece of social legislation in American history."

Yet, to speak of Social Security only in terms of history is to consign it to the past. Its legacy, which reached the 60-year milestone Monday, is far too vital to allow that.

I recently viewed some historical film footage from the early years of the Great Depression through the signing of the original Social Security Act. In the flickering, static-filled newsreels, I saw men and women of vision and talent cope with the serious economic issues of their era. And I could glimpse the passion and fulfillment that the signing of the Social Security Act evoked.

The strong emotions associated with that early legislation may be hard for most Americans today to understand, since Social Security has become so much of the backdrop for our lives. But we need to recall the social turmoil from which Social Security emerged in order to understand how the program has developed - and how we can shape it to meet future needs.

Long before the original Social Security legislation had been drafted, Franklin Delano Roosevelt spoke eloquently of "the forgotten man at the bottom of the economic pyramid." The bottom of that pyramid included many aged or aging workers who had little or no hope of a respite from work in their lifetime.

More than half of all older Americans lived in poverty. Depression-era savings were low, and nine million Americans who had managed to save money lost all or part of their savings in bank failures. Pensions - for the few who had them - averaged less than \$20 per month. And jobs were scarce even for the young and strong-bodied - more than a quarter of the total workforce was unemployed.

When President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act in 1935, it provided a ray of hope for older Americans. It also set in motion change that would forever alter the way Americans live and work and the way we think about retirement and income security.

Over the last six decades, Social Security has become increasingly important to Americans

- \* there are now 11 times as many Americans over age 65 as there were at the turn of the century - and even this number could more than double by the middle of the next century;
- \* more than 9 out of 10 older Americans now get Social Security benefits; and
- \* fewer than 13 percent of older Americans today fall below the poverty line, but without Social Security benefits that number would be nearly 50 percent.

While Social Security has become increasingly important to American lives and continues to enjoy strong support, it is also true that many baby boomers and younger Americans lack confidence that Social Security will be there for them, as it has been for their parents and grandparents. That sense of confidence is intangible, but it is important. John Kennedy once said, in fact, that "The basis of effective government is public confidence."

Confidence can be ephemeral, since it represents a constant interplay of attitudes and facts.

I believe, though, that facts can shape attitudes. I am therefore committed to educating the public about their Social Security system. It is important that they understand what they have in order to make intelligent decisions about making changes.

At its core, Social Security has evolved into a practical response to universal human needs. Throughout history, people have had to come to terms with the problem of economic security for those who are no longer fully employed due to age or disability, or when a breadwinner dies prematurely. In many situations, Social Security has kept families together in difficult times.

The country's Social Security program provides a framework for meeting basic levels of need in these situations. Not only do 30 million retirees and their families count on Social Security, but so do more than 5 million disabled workers and their families, and more than 7 million family members of deceased workers. Included in these figures are more than 3 million children who receive monthly Social Security benefits. As Commissioner of Social Security, I have spoken throughout the country with men and women of all ages and circumstances about the Social Security program. I have heard some people say that Social Security is so large and complex, that it is difficult to understand the issues involved. I have heard some people say that the program seems immutable to change.

Neither is true. In the 60 years that have passed since FDR signed the Social Security Act, the program has constantly evolved and changed to meet the needs of Americans. As we look beyond this 60th anniversary, we will need to modify and adjust the program once again to meet the future needs of Americans.

While it is true that Social Security faces long-term solvency problems, it is also true that we are not in immediate danger. There is ample time to develop options and recommendations, and to identify solutions that will keep the program healthy for another 60 years and beyond.

When he signed the Social Security Act, FDR referred to the new law as a cornerstone in a structure that is by no means complete. As we continue to build on that foundation, we must acknowledge that our work is not finished. Throughout its history, Social Security has been an idea - a work in progress - designed to help more of us cope with what FDR called "the vicissitudes of life."

Our challenge today, on this 60th anniversary, is to protect and preserve the legacy of Social Security's past while we alter and adjust the program to address the needs of the future. I invite all Americans to join me in meeting this challenge.

### Richardson eyeing Domenici's seat?

WASHINGTON - Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., who has spent the past couple of years sowing peace around the world, is on the verge of starting a huge political war here at home.

Top advisers to Richardson tell us he's seriously weighing a challenge to Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., who's up for re-election next year. The race would pit a rising star in the House Democratic leadership against the powerful chairman of the Senate Budget Committee in what would easily become the hottest Senate race of 1998.

Richardson has bolstered his political stock in recent years, by serving as a part-time diplomat who has handled delicate negotiations in global hot spots from Haiti to North Korea. Nevertheless, private Democratic polls conducted earlier this year showed Richardson trailing Domenici by 26 points in a hypothetical matchup. Political analyst Charles

E. Cook said in February that "as long as Domenici seeks re-election, it's difficult to imagine why any credible contender would want to challenge the most revered political figure in modern New Mexican history."

But Richardson has also been winning rave reviews back home since last month's dramatic mission to Iraq to bring home two Americans who had been jailed by Saddam Hussein. A confidential poll conducted shortly after Richardson's return shows that Richardson has climbed 14 points in a head-to-head race with Domenici and now trails by just 12 points.

Domenici campaign manager Diana Daggett dismissed the numbers with a shot across Richardson's bow. "In the 14 years that I've done campaigns, I've never heard of a candidate testing the waters who didn't claim to have a favorable poll," Daggett told our associate Ed Henry. "What that means is nothing. It sounds like he polled Democrats in his own district."

Richardson's reaction to the poll is more notable than the accuracy of the numbers. "Before Iraq it didn't seem doable," one source close to Richardson told us. "But the poll numbers are such that it would now be a competitive race." Sources say Richardson is also planning to meet during the congressional recess with heavyweight Democratic consultant Robert Shrum, an adviser to President Clinton who has already spoken to Richardson at least once about jumping into the race.

It would be a hardball match-up between two former minor league pitchers, and Richardson loyalists believe he has some curveballs to throw at Domenici. Though Domenici secured 73 percent of the vote in his last re-election fight, he outspent his opponent \$1.9 million to \$38,510. Richardson is expected to level the financial playing field, and his partial Mexican heritage might help him win votes in a state that is 38 percent Hispanic. Richardson strategists say he's also anxious to saddle Domenici with blame for the draconian GOP budget cuts.

"Congressman Richardson will sit down with his family in January to decide which course to pursue," Richardson spokesman Stu Nagurka said of the Feb. 13 filing deadline. "The only thing you can assume at this point is that he will not retire from politics."

Based on previously undisclosed nuggets about Richardson's Iraqi mission, his diplomatic skills will come in real handy - and no detail will be too small - if he does take the senatorial plunge.

The votes were all unanimous. Regarding the church sign, First Baptist Church, which has been undergoing a massive building program, took down its sign in August of last year in order to allow for construction to the building and paving of the parking lot. They now wish to put the sign back, relatively near where it once was.

The Historic Preservation Board had approved allowing the sign to be erected. They told the church, however, that the lighting in the interior of the sign (backlighting), is no longer allowed under the city codes. They subsequently denied the lighting request, suggesting lights be placed with front flood lighting.

The church then appealed the denial, saying power lines would have to be extended as well as outside spotlights installed in order to light the front of the sign.

Jim Cornell, representing the church, and architect Mark Schweizer were both on hand at the commission meeting to explain the church's position. Cornell explained how two nearby churches had backlit signs.

"The First Baptist Church sign has been there for over 20 years," Schweizer said. "This sign is what people expect to see. It's part of the church's tradition."

Chris Cranias, a member of the Historic Preservation Board which denied the backlighting, was on hand at the commission meeting. He explained how the request had to be turned down. "It is a fact that internally lit signs are not allowed once they are torn down," he said. "It wasn't our decision, but it is written in the codes through our ordinances, and we have to go by them."

During discussion, it was reported that Sanford City attorney Bill Colbert is a member of the church as well as its board of trustees. Mayor Bettye Smith also acknowledged that she is a member of First Baptist Church.

"It all comes down to this," said Commissioner Lon Howell. "It's non-conforming, and therefore, we cannot approve it."

Howell then moved to deny the appeal for the lighting. The motion carried by a unanimous vote of the commission.

Also during the work session, Tony Walter of LYNX Bus and design consultant Fred Hallback briefed the commissioners on designs for the shelters planned for installation around Sanford, to protect potential bus riders from inclement weather and the heat of the sun.

"We have six sites presently determined in Sanford," Walter said. "Two will be on Mangoustine, near the Central Florida Regional Hospital, two will be on First Street at Fort Mellon Park and Cypress Ave-

nues, and the other two will be on opposite sides of the street at the County Services Building on E. First Street."

He observed that while the six were now being planned, other potential sites were being examined for the future.

While LYNX has three different types of shelters, ranging from 10 by 10 to 15 by 15 in size, the smaller ones were predicted for Sanford. "Of course if the passenger load increases we can always expand the shelters or replace them with larger ones," Walter said.

"LYNX is really stepping out in good fashion for the Sanford area," Hallback commented. "This will be an outstanding design for this community."

The sheltered sites, referred to by Walter and Hallback as "Customer Amenities" would be in addition to the regular bus stops being provided to establish regular bus service routes to and from the Seminole Towne Center Mall.

Thousands are expected to attend the public service at Lovers Lane United Methodist Church. Mantle's family would have preferred to keep

it closed but instead will hold a separate, private wake.

The former New York Yankee died Sunday of liver cancer at age 63.

Bobby Richardson, a lay minister whose counsel helped ease the final hours of his former teammate, will officiate at the 2 p.m. CDT service. NBC broadcaster Bob Costas will deliver the eulogy.

Teammates Whitey Ford, Moose Skowron, Hank Bauer, Johnny

Blanchard, Yogi Berra and Bobby Murcer will serve as pallbearers. Ford, Skowron, Bauer and Blanchard visited Mantle last week.

Country singer Roy Clark will sing "Yesterday When I Was Young," according to his spokeswoman Carol Anderson. She said Clark and Mantle had been friends for 35 years, and Mantle had requested personally that Clark perform the song at his funeral

many years ago.

Among those expected to attend is American League president Gene Budig; former league president Bobby Brown, who also was a teammate of Mantle's; and Donald Marr, president of the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y.

The sanctuary at the church seats 1,500, but two other areas will be set up to handle the overflow of mourners who will watch the service by video feed.

# When is protein intake the most beneficial?

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** What are the optimum times for protein intake when lifting weights? I lift an hour a day, five days a week. I eat most of my daily protein at two meals - one 1-1/2 hours before lifting and another 1/2 hour after.

**DEAR READER:** I'm sure that body builders have their own personalized dietary habits -- and these methods probably are all equally effective. The important consideration is to avoid strenuous exercise before digestion is complete.

Although most of a high-protein meal is undoubtedly digested within 90 minutes, it wouldn't hurt to play it safe by allowing two or three hours before your next workout. The timing of your second meal is less important.

But remember that you should "cool down" for 20 or 30 minutes before eating, otherwise your intestines will draw blood, for digestion, away from your muscles. This may reduce the effectiveness of your weight training.

I'd also suggest spreading out your nutrition a bit. How about a good, solid breakfast, too? To a large extent, it probably doesn't matter so much when you eat as what (and how much) you consume.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Several friends have pancreatitis or pancreatic cancer. What's causing this? Can some of the disease be treated with medication or other control?


**DEAR READER:** The pancreas is an organ that manufactures digestive enzymes and insulin. It may become inflamed due to a number of reasons, such as gallstones, cancer and overactive parathyroid glands. In the United States, the most common cause of pancreatitis is chronic alcohol abuse.

Symptoms include abdominal pain and poor digestion, progressing eventually to oily stools and diabetes.

The diagnosis is made by blood test, X-rays and other special examinations.

Patients with chronic pancreatitis must avoid alcohol completely. They require special nutritional supplements (such as vitamins) and pancreatic enzymes in pill form, as well as pain medication and -- sometimes -- insulin injections.

Chronic pancreatitis is often associated with cysts in the pancreas, adding to the abdominal discomfort. Some authorities have suggested that the chronic inflammation may predispose to pancreatic cancer.



I suspect that your friend's pancreatic problems stem from the widespread over-use of alcohol in our society. Chronic pancreatitis is yet another result of years of excess alcohol consumption.

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

Hendrik Van Loon, the Dutch-born American journalist and historian, wrote, "The history of the world is the record of a man in quest of his daily bread and butter." He might have added "often at someone else's expense."

Two of Van Loon's words vaguely relate to today's deal. North might have passed over four hearts, but with two aces and three trumps, he took the aggressive course, chasing a higher-scoring ace: of the loaf.

West led the spade king. East overtook with his ace and continued with the spade nine. South ruffed high, cashed the heart king, played a heart to dummy's ace and ruffed the spade seven in hand. Declarer unblocked his two club honors, then led the diamond jack: king, ace, eight. South completed his quest for information by ruffing dummy's last club in his hand.

What had South learned? He knew East had begun with seven spades, two hearts and three clubs. Therefore, his diamond eight was a singleton.

South was left with the 6-5-2 of diamonds and the heart queen. Dummy had the Q-10-4 of diamonds and the heart 10. South led the diamond two from hand and when West covered with the three, South tied a world record by successfully finessing dummy's four.

Pre-empts are double-edged weapons. They make it tougher for the opponents to reach the right contract. But if the other side does win the auction, the descriptive pre-empt will often make it easier for the declarer to place the cards.
