Big Bombers To Scatter For Safety U. S. To Spread Nuclear Air Fleet

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon plans to scatter the U.S. nuclear bomber fleet over twice the airfields now used to combat the growing vulnerability to a Soviet missile strike, Defense officials say.
Under the new plan, to be announced soon, the Air Force will redistribute its 33 B-52 and B-58 bombers over some 70 American airfields in order to complicate the Soviet targeting problem.
Currently the nuclear equipped bomber squadrons of the Strategic Air Command are stationed at 23 bases.
The dispersal program is a direct result of the Soviet Union's stepped up deployment of submarines which could launch nuclear missiles well submerged 1,500 miles from U.S. shores and its development of a fractional orbital bombardment system — FOBS.
Either weapon sharply reduces the amount of warning time which U.S. bombers could get during an attack and raises the possibility that an unacceptable number could be lost on the ground to nuclear bursts. The Nixon administration's Safeguard antiballistic missile program provides for several interceptors to be launched from a submarine-launched missile and the depressed trajectory warheads of the FOBS system being tested by the Soviets.
But the radar is not enough of a countermeasure, officials say. Too many SAC bases are located near coastlines where they could get at best two or three minutes warning of an approaching missile.

LONDON (AP) — The British navy won in record time a competition sponsored by the American entree in the great transatlantic air race reached London in a Gay Nineties swirl and sizzle.
The week-long rush between the top of the General Post Office Tower in London and the top of the Empire State Building in New York, ended Sunday. There was \$14,000 in prizes for winners in 21 categories and a rich harvest of tall tales and publicity for the non-so-far.
With several prizes not yet announced, four Americans were among the winners in the competition sponsored by the London Daily Mail. The race marked the 50th anniversary of the first transatlantic flight by Sir John Alcock and Sir Arthur Brown.

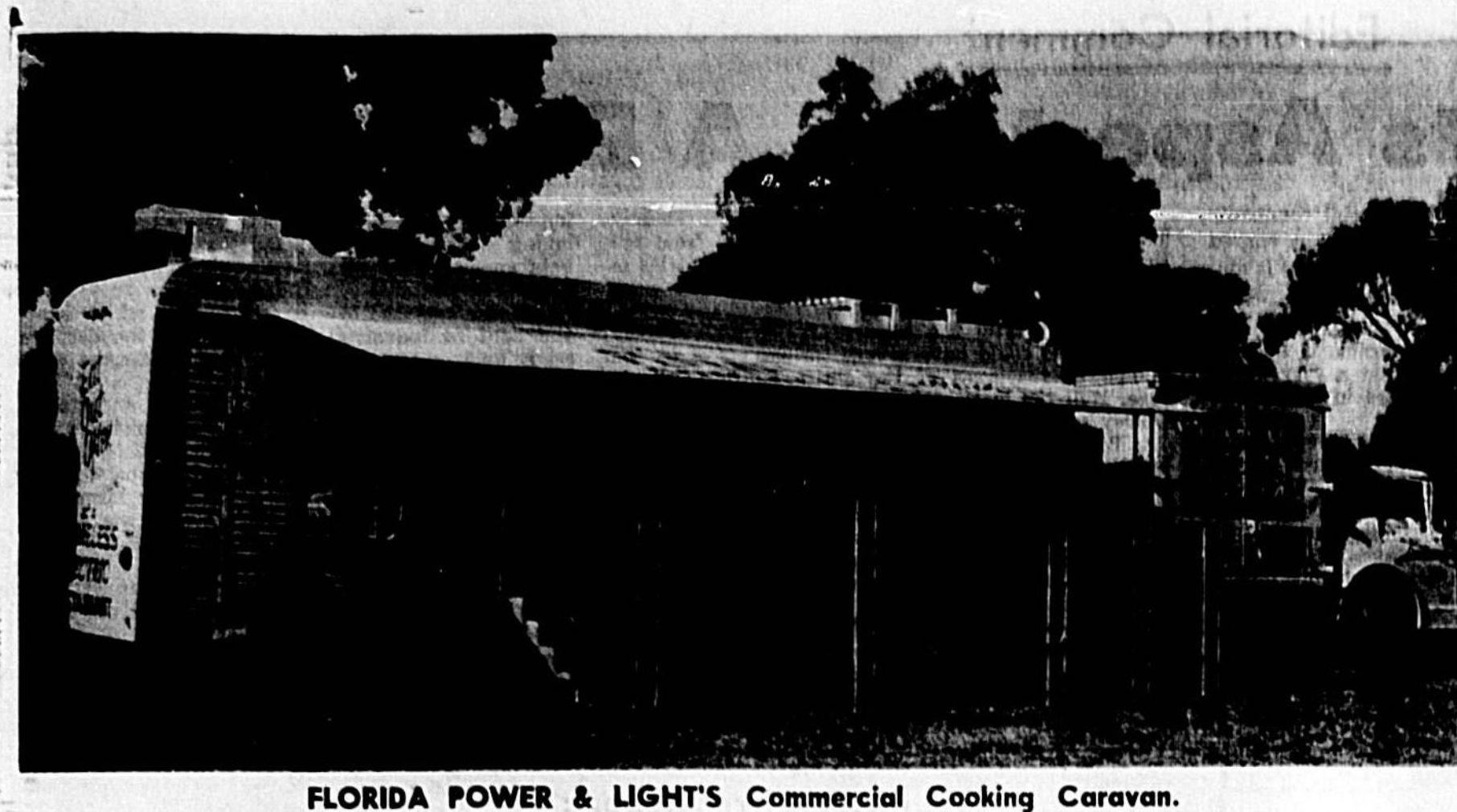

FP&L Cooking Caravan Scheduled This Week

A novel Commercial Electric Cooking Caravan will be in Sanford Tuesday and Wednesday in the parking lot at First Street and Sanford Avenue, adjacent to the Chamber of Commerce, according to Scott Burns, Florida Power & Light Company manager. This is one of many on a tour that will cover all areas in the state served by the Company.
The newly designed Caravan is a "Moose and mountain" concept, which brings the latest in commercial electric cooking equipment—looked up and ready for live demonstrations—directly to operators, planners, designers and directors of food service establishments.
During a similar tour in 1968, the live demonstrations attracted school board members, dietitians, hospital administrators, restaurant associations, military, student groups from junior colleges and many others. The remodeled Caravan, now "The Sunshine Kitchen Caravan," consists of a 18-foot truck and trailer with the truck section housing a fifteen-ton electric air conditioner, water heater and the fresh water tank.
The trailer portion is 30 feet long, with a 16-foot section on one side that is hinged at the top to open from floor to ceiling, and from an awning. This enables a large group to sit outside the trailer, under the awning, while watching a demonstration.
All pieces of electric equipment in the trailer are of the very latest design and installed in an arrangement typical of

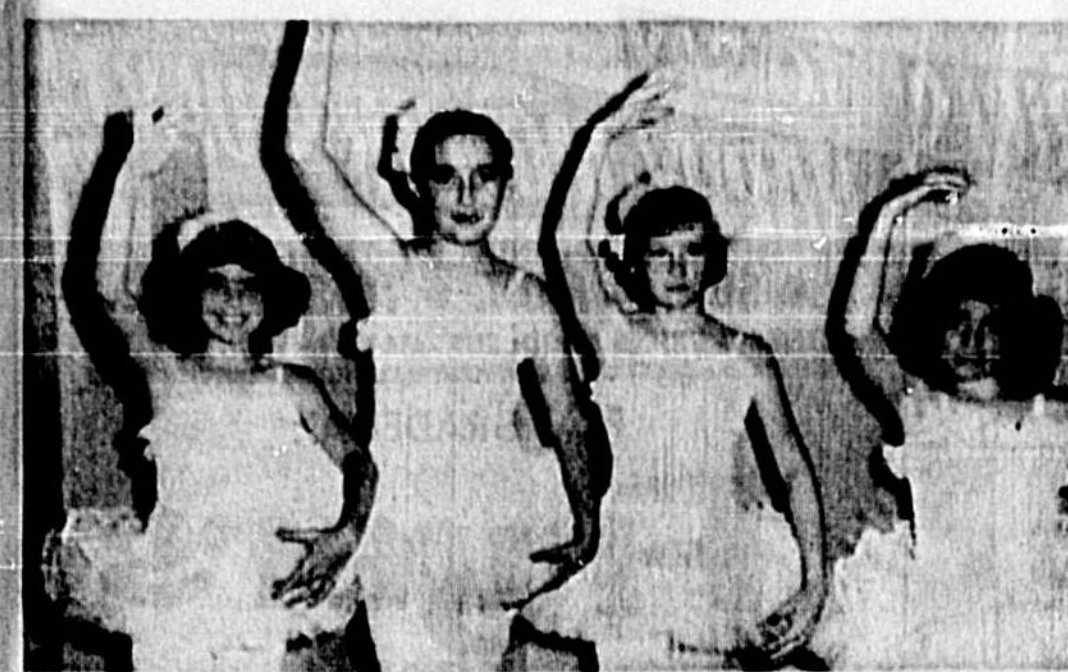

Jurist Grants Leniency

"I'm sorry, Judge. If you'll just give me another chance, I'll never be in court again. I've quit drinking. I'm going to church. I'll do a better job of taking care of my wife and baby. I'll be a good citizen. Give me another chance, please."

This was the plea before Circuit Judge E. Thom Rumberger in Seminole County Circuit Court by a handsome young man dressed neatly in a suit, a little too large for his slight build, as his teenage wife stood beside him sobbing.

"Well, your honor, we were having such a hard time financially," the youth began. "That is no excuse for breaking the law," the judge interrupted.

"Your actions are not acceptable to society," the judge carefully went over information on the youth's background which showed no prior conflict with the law. He listened carefully to the wife's tearful plea for leniency, cleared his throat and declared, "Well, when I came into this courtroom today, I had just about made up my mind to send you to the state penitentiary for five years. Because of your wife and child and your apparent remorse for the crime you committed, I've changed my mind. I'm going to place you on five years' probation."

"I understand all the rules you'll have to follow on probation? Do you think you can do it?" the judge asked and the youth nodded solemnly. And another instance of a judge's compassion was shown. "What of the youth's future?" He told the judge, and the probation officer backed him up that he had a firm promise of a job in a northern state. The judge interrupted.

"Is there anything you'd like to say before I impose sentence?" Judge Rumberger asked in a stern voice. And the youth began the story of the problems that led up to his breaking the law.

"I realize that now, Judge, please take a chance on me."

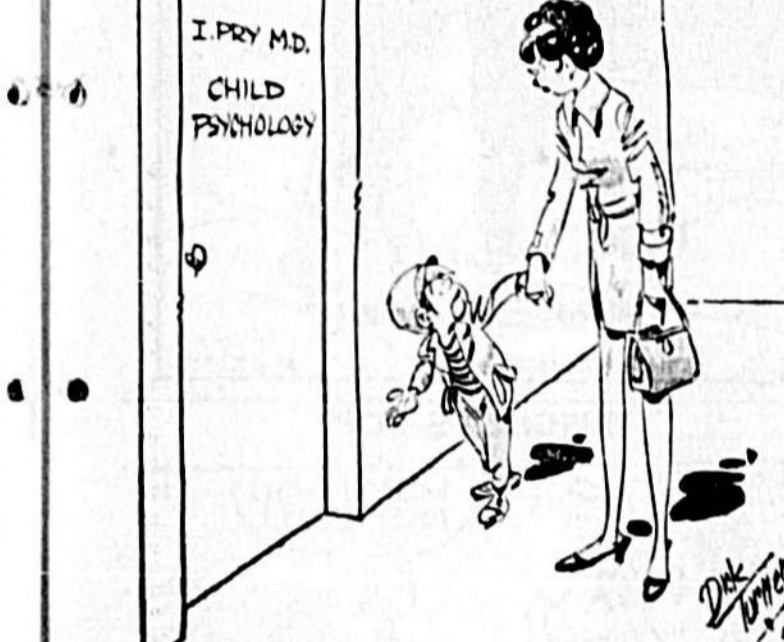

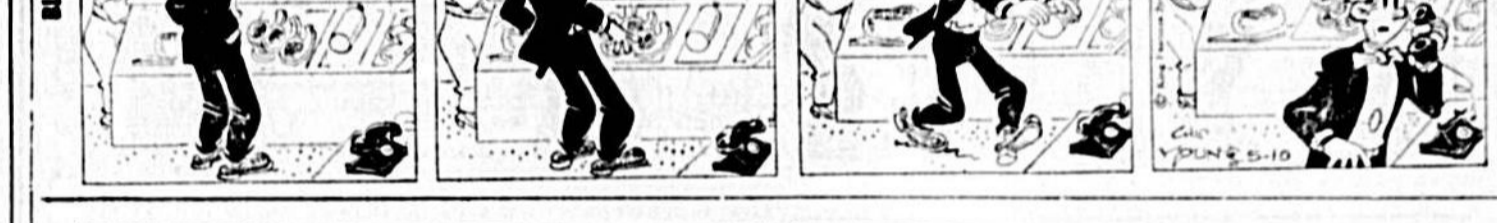
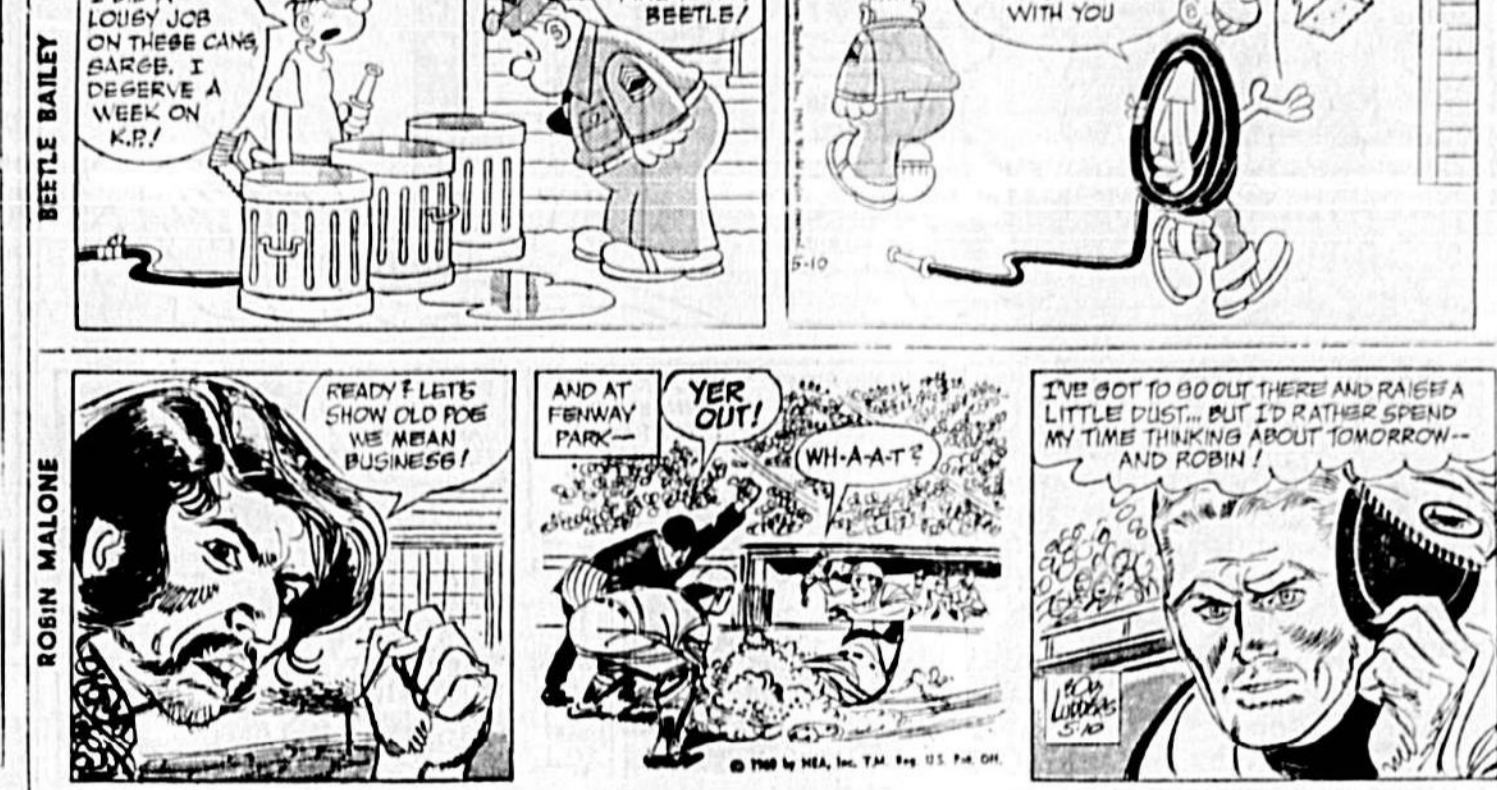
