



Premiums force surgeons out of hospital

SANFORD — Unable to pay soaring malpractice insurance rates, four emergency room surgeons suspended their practices.

The surgeons, all associated with Central Florida Regional Hospital, were informed by their carriers that premiums, to be paid up front and in cash, would quadruple to about \$600,000 for the year.

"Occasionally carriers will let you split the premium into two installments, but usu-

ally they want most if not all of the money before they issue any coverage," said Dr. Larry Alexander, the hospital's emergency department medical director.

The situation has created two problems for the hospital: one, Central Florida Regional Hospital (CFRH) has lost the services of four of its five general emergency

room surgeons; and two, news of the doctors' decision has generated fear in the community about a potential loss of medical service. Those fears have translated into a drop in the number of people going to CFRH. Emergency room doctors routinely see 90 patients per day. Since the story broke, the hospital is averaging 74 patients.

"The rumors have been outrageous," Alexander said. "We've had people call and say they heard we shut the ER down, that we closed the hospital, that we were turning people away, that the doors were chained up. None of that has happened."

"We are open for business," he emphasized. "We're still taking care of people and we will continue to take care of people. We will not let our community down."

While the surgeons' predicament and the

Winter Park firm chosen to design new station

LAKE MARY — A Winter Park firm Thursday was chosen to oversee the design and construction of City Hall's expansion and the new Rinehart Road fire station.

Following presentations by three area design firms, Architects Design Group (ADG) Inc., was ranked No. 1 by City Commission to provide design professional services for the two projects. The city will now enter into negotiations with the firm for design, cost and other construction elements for the new facilities.

Of the three design groups, which also included Spillis Candela and The Scott Partnership Architecture, commissioners were most impressed with Architects Design Group's commitment to public and employee input while working on a project. Other elements, which tipped the scales in favor of the Winter Park firm, included its pledge to help the city find alternative funding sources and raise public awareness for the projects.

"I want to see our employees involved in this process," Commissioner Gary Brender said. "I want them to take ownership of this project."

Earlier this year, Commission opted to use the design/build method, rather than the traditional bid method, for the two proposed facilities. Since the state legislature now allows for more flexibility when it comes to constructing large capital projects, cities have an alternative to the traditional low bid, one contractor choice.

In the design/build method, cities select a team of professionals, including architects, builders and cost-control specialists. In May, Lake Mary sent out a request for qualifications (RFQ) in order to obtain a list of possible design firms to work on the City Hall expansion and fire station.

Eight companies responded to the request, and a selection committee comprised of City Manager John Litton, Finance Director Jackie Sova, Fire Chief

Man arrested after trying to steal bike from deputy

Last Sunday, a man attempted to steal a Sheriff's Issue Mountain Bike off a Seminole County sheriff's patrol car. Now, he is facing another charge, giving a false identity.

On July 28, a deputy walked out the rear door of the sheriff's District No. 5 substation on SR-436 in Casselberry and noticed a man attempting to take his police

mountain bike from the rack at the rear of his vehicle.

After the man ran from the area, the deputy gave chase and eventually apprehended him in the woods alongside Howell Creek. Pliers, wire cutters, a cable lock and dish towel were found and taken into evidence. The towel was assumed to have been used to hide fingerprints.

At the Seminole County Jail, the man refused to provide officers with his address, work, next of kin, or other information. He, at one point, told an officer his name was John Serra, 38 years of age.

Later, after checking the state of Florida's live scan system and checking Serra's fingerprints, information was received that his true name is Bruce Palmer Johnson, 37.

Initially, charges were, burglary of an unoccupied conveyance, larceny of more than \$300, possession of burglary tools, and resisting an officer without violence. Now, because of giving the false information, he has been charged with resisting/obstructing an officer by a disguised person.

In a court appearance, the judge determined he is to be held without bond.

Authorities say he is also wanted on an outstanding warrant issued in Orange County for violation of probation on a conviction of petit theft, and has an unspecified case pending in Seminole County.

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Sheriff's office aviation team receives national award for infrared operation

SANFORD — In December, two suspects wanted on stolen vehicle and drug charges tried to outrun officers from the Sanford Police Department after bailing out of a stolen car. They managed to elude capture — at least for a short time — by hiding in some underbrush. The pair, however, didn't realize their nighttime escape attempt would be thwarted by two men from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office hovering hundreds of feet above them in the air.

Last month, Pilot Steve Farris and Flight Officer Patrick Rice received national recognition for their efforts in apprehending the two fleeing criminals. The aviation team's video of the event surpassed hundreds of other entries in this year's FLIR Vision Award Contest to win second place.

"Our unit submitted several entries, and we hoped to win something," Rice said. "But, we knew there was a lot of tough competition. You just never know."

FLIR Systems Inc., sponsors the annual contest. It honors law enforcement personnel who use the Forward Looking Infra Red

(FLIR) System — a device that focuses on body heat — in their operations.

Last December, Farris and Rice were on Delta shift when they received a Signal 10 bailout call from the Sanford Police Department. After the helicopter arrived at the scene, it didn't take long for the aviation team and the FLIR System — attached to the bottom of the helicopter — to locate a heat source. They immediately contacted the ground unit, who went into the wooded area at the corner of Persimmon Avenue

The car handles and rides wonderfully, the air conditioning is great, it's much more dependable, gets good gas mileage and there's plenty of room. To top it all off, it looks pretty good, too. There's only one thing I like better about the Dodge.

### Make your choice

With the dog days of summer just beginning, it seems appropriate to kick-off the silly season — Election 2002. This year's election cycle will be considerably more low key, on the local scene at least, than 2000. That doesn't mean the issues are any less serious. In the coming days and weeks, two candidates for Seminole County School Board — Jeannie Morris the incumbent, and Oscar Pendleton the challenger — will begin knocking on doors, mailing literature and greeting strangers in public places to convince voters to elect them as their school board representative. Bill Daniel, the challenger, and Randy Morris, the incumbent, will be engaged in the same activity in their bids to represent District 2 on the Seminole County Commission.

This is a particularly good year to learn where the candidates stand on issues important to you. An uncluttered local election slate will provide candidates will plenty of opportunities to tout their platforms without getting lost in the noise of a presidential election. There are, of course, other primary races occurring, most notably for governor and congress. We don't dismiss this offices. Voters should carefully consider each candidate. But local politics is where the rubber meets the pavement. Roads, schools, public safety and quality of life issues top most people's list of concerns. Those elected to local offices have the greatest impact in these areas, so their campaigns deserve more than cursory consideration. Talk to the candidates, question their positions and make an informed choice.

One other thing: don't forget to vote for your candidate on Sept. 10. What better way to demonstrate the greatness of America than to exercise your right to vote, especially on the eve of the one-year anniversary of the worst terrorist attack in the nation's history.

### U.S. Army nurses have come a long way since 1861

Aug. 3 is the anniversary of U.S. Army nurses getting a pay raise, so today, let's discuss not only the army nurses, but all service and civilian nurses.

I feel certain not everyone will agree with this, but nurses I have encountered at the Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford, and the Florida Hospital Fish Memorial in Orange City, (the only two I've been at in the past years), deserve the best pay their employers can give. Talk about TLC (Tender Loving Care), these ladies, and the few male nurses, go all-out in helping the patients. They calm you if you're frightened, help alleviate pain if you're hurting, and take care of most of your needs. They are TOPS, and many of them cut their teeth as military nurses first.

Of course, YOU have to treat nurses with respect in order to have their respect of you as a patient. Get over-demanding and you may not feel they are serving you properly.

Now, let's talk about the nurses who are and were in the U.S. Army. The Army Nurse Corps was started by Gen. George Washington and authorized by Congress on June 14, 1775. Can you guess the pay they received? It was \$2 PER MONTH plus one meal (or ration) per day. You can bet the women who took on those tasks weren't in it for the money. Within two years, their pay was increased to \$8 per month, but still with only one ration (meal) per day.

August 3, 1861 is considered the Army Nurse Pay Raise Anniversary. It took another 84 years before congress authorized the Surgeon General to employ women as nurses for army hospitals at a salary of \$12 per month, (with the same one ration per day).

Now we know that money went much further back in the late 1800s. A loaf of bread was five cents. Most meat sold for about two cents per pound. So the \$12 per month wasn't that bad. But it's still shocking that salaries were so low even back then, for people who often held the lives of individuals in their hands.

For the sake of this article, I attempted to find out what the starting base pay would be today for an Army nurse. I called the local Army recruiting office who gave me a Tampa recruiting office number, who, in turn gave me two Army Specialist Office numbers, only to get no answer on either number. So, we won't even hazard a guess, but it's probably more than \$12 per month.

Army nurses, those with degrees in nursing, become officers, and as such, earn much better salaries than enlisted personnel. They also have better perks such as housing, uniforms, travel, and rather than one ration, three square meals per day.

From what I have heard, military nursing is an excellent profession. You do what you have been trained and educated to do, and get to see the world while you're at it.

Give it some thought, but don't think you'll only earn \$12 per month.

### Huskey suggests items important to city's growth

Dear Mayor Lessard: I continue to read good things about the work you are doing for all of us in Sanford — I am on your team and wish to help in any way that I can.

There are a few items that I think are extremely important on the ongoing growth of our great city.

1. I am enclosing a couple of snapshots of large Canary Island palms on the corner of Plumosa Drive and Sanford Avenue that are gradually dying. You can see from the enclosed pictures that they haven't been trimmed in many years. They need to be trimmed, the base cleaned out and fertilized. I had written letters before to the County Manager who turned them over to the Parks Department, but as you can see, nothing has been done since I brought this to the County's attention over two years ago. I know somehow the City could deploy a couple of men who could trim the trees, haul everything off and do some fertilization in a day's time. We both know it is very difficult for homeowners who take care of their lawns and take pride in their homes when they see this type of thing being neglected by the City. All of these palms are between the sidewalk and the curb, within the City of Sanford's right of way.
2. The second problem is a huge one. Downtown Sanford will never move forward one inch — in fact, it is going to decline — with the present lighting situation. Downtown is almost pitch black at night. Lights are few and far between and it really is unsafe. Unfortunately, the City of Apopka has put the City of Sanford to shame. You should go to Apopka in the evening and look at their lighting.
3. I read with great interest and congratulate you and the City of Sanford for starting to work on

the new river walk section. I think it is going to do more than anything done in the last 50 years to improve the image of downtown Sanford. In conjunction with this, if the sabal palms along Lakeshore Drive on 17-92 towards I-4 are trimmed, it would add significantly to the beauty of the waterfront, which in many ways is one of Sanford's great assets. As an old Central Floridian, I have known for years that Sanford possesses many natural attributes that other cities such as Orlando do not have. Sanford needs to be brought back to what it was many years ago. Over the years, Sanford has done less with more, but I am confident that under your leadership things will continue to get better.

4. For many years I have said that Sanford needs to prepare a brochure about the City, stressing the marina, and encouraging winter residents who traverse to Florida via yacht and the Inland Waterway to come up the beautiful St. Johns River, view "Old Florida" and visit Sanford. This should be sent to major yacht clubs on the eastern seaboard from Georgia to Maine.

5. I know the Department of Transportation is in the process of re-doing the I-4/46 interchange to some degree. I am sure the City has already petitioned the DOT to do some landscaping at the entranceway, but installing lights like those at the other interchanges and continuing the streetlights from I-4 to downtown is needed.

Again, I love Sanford. It is my Home, and I want to see it become the great city it has the potential to become. Please let me know if there is anything I can do to assist. I am 100 percent on your team. I am not trying to be redundant, but just passing on some of the old sayings I coined many years ago.

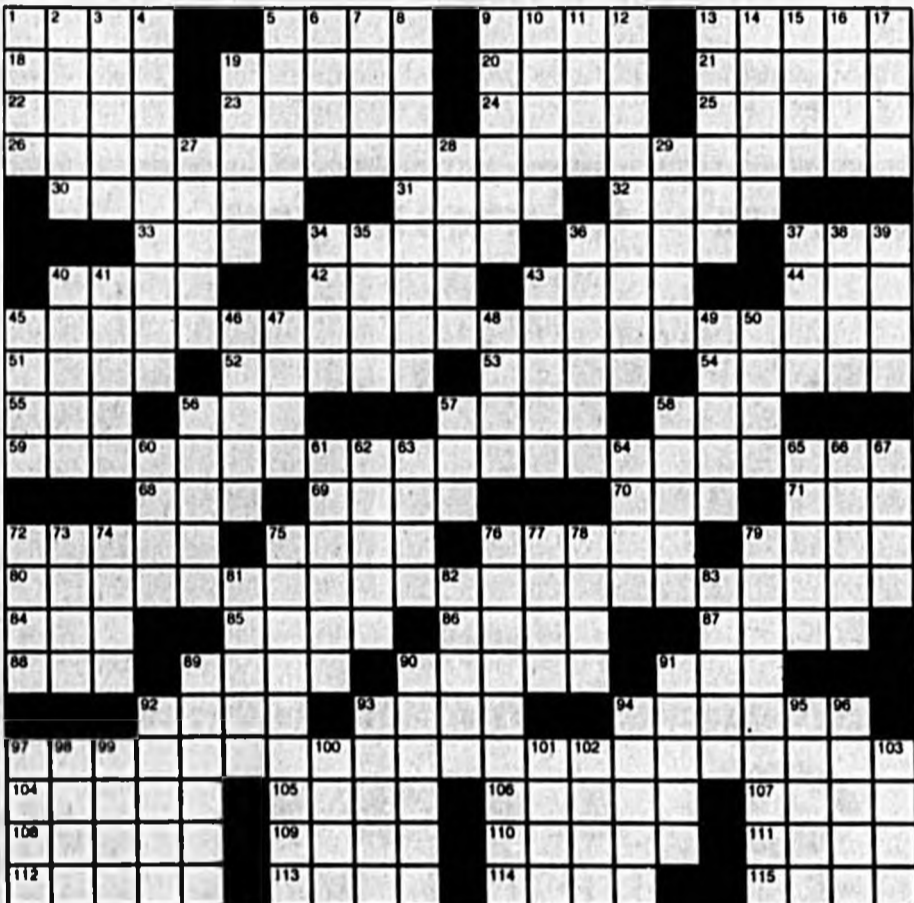

# The Way We Were: Early railroads in Seminole County

The Seminole County Historical Commission recently published a new expanded 2002 edition of "Early Days of Seminole County History." It contains brief histories of each incorporated city in the county

Mellonville, Osceola and Gabriella. There is also a listing of a large number of other settlements and villages that no longer exist, along with dates and locations.

There is information on agriculture, commercial fishing, cattle raising, timber and turpentine, all early industries. There is information on early leisure activities and a large section on transportation. Since I can't remember writing much about early railroads, I will do so today. All of the information comes from "Early Days of Seminole County History" which can be obtained at the Museum of Seminole County History, 300 Bush Blvd. It is free, as is the admission to the museum.

**George C. Brantley's Dream**  
It is possible that the first railroad in the area was in the mind of George C. Brantley who had a place in Mellonville with Michael Doyle. (A picture

of Doyle's store will be in the 2003 Historic Sanford Calendar to be published soon by the Sanford Historical Society).

Brantley also had a store at the end of Tusawilla Road to Lake Jesup where the railroad idea was probably originated. His business entailed hauling by oxcart, goods deposited by steamboats at Mellonville for destinations to the south. Rather than oxcarts, his idea was to build a railroad from Lake Monroe to his Tusawilla Road store and beyond.

In 1878 Brantley went to New York to buy rails and rolling stock for his railroad, but his sudden death there ended the dream.

Thankfully, others took up the dream and by the end of the 19th century, what is no Seminole County was well connected by rails.

**The South Florida Railroad**

A charter was issued in 1875 for the Lake Monroe and Orlando railroad, but no progress was made until 1879. At that time, E.W. Hereck of Longwood, Dr. C.C. Haskell of Maitland, Fredric H. Rand of Sanford and Longwood, procured the articles of incorporation and changed the name to the South Florida Railroad.

In spike of jeers from railroad magnates in Jacksonville, these men proceeded with bonds bought mainly by the owners of the Boston Daily Herald. One of its owners was the brother of Dr. Haskell. This road is often noted as the first and only one built, owned and run by a newspaper. The road was to run from the St. Johns River in Sanford to Charlotte Harbor on the Gulf of Mexico. To highlight the endeavor,

there was a ground breaking ceremony in Sanford on Saturday, June 10, 1880 when the first spade of earth was turned by former president Ulysses S. Grant who, at the time, was taking a tour of Florida. The shovel used is on display in the Sanford Museum. There is an historical marker at the site of the ground breaking ceremony on East First Street.

By Oct. 1, 1880, the line was completed to Orlando by way of Longwood and Maitland, a distance of 23 miles. The following day, an excursion from Sanford was run mainly on flat cars fitted with wooden benches. A cannon was mounted on the last car, wadded with Spanish moss which saluted the occasion enroute. The Orlando residents entertained with a barbeque.

According to Mr. J.B. Clouser of Longwood, "The rolling stock consisted of one coach, one flat car, a diminutive little engine called "the Seminole".

This was the first railroad south of latitude 29 degrees north. In 1884, it was advertised as "The DeSoto Line Through Florida" and in 1897 it was billed as the "Gate City Route".

Three Mason-improved engines were owned by the line; R.M. Pulsifer #7, H.B. Plant #8 and H.S. Haines #9. In 1883 a three-fifths interest in the railroad was sold to the Plant Investment Company (PICO) making it part of the Plant system which then extended the line to Tampa. Since there was no railroad south of Jacksonville at that time, the South Florida

Marine Corps Pvt. Chad C. Bush, son of Lori J. Wright of Sanford, recently completed basic training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C.

Bush successfully completed 12 weeks of training designed to challenge new Marine recruits both physically and mentally.

Bush and fellow recruits began their training at 5 a.m. by running three miles and performing calisthenics. In addition to the physical conditioning pro-

gram, he spent numerous hours in classroom and field assignments which included learning first-aid, uniform regulations, combat water survival, marksmanship, hand-to-hand combat and assorted weapons training.

African nation of Djibouti while assigned to the guided missile cruiser USS Hue City, homeported in Mayport, Florida.

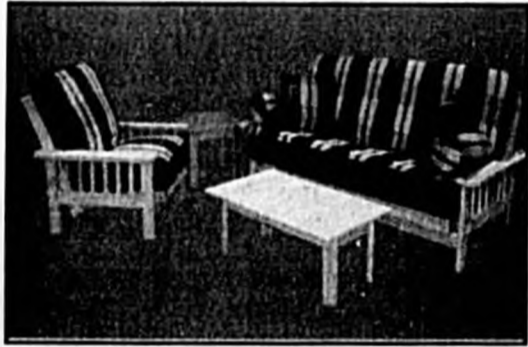

Additionally, volunteers from the unit conducted engineering, medical and dental projects, and delivered school supplies donated by U.S. citizens from Morehead City, N.C.

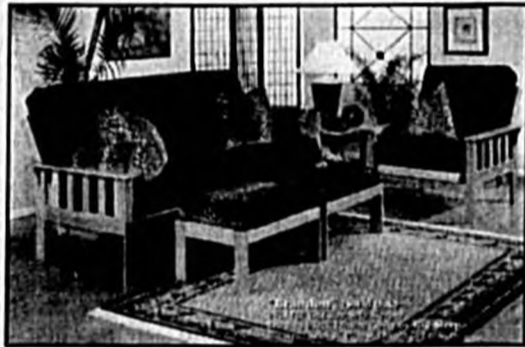
Latimer is a 1996 graduate of Lyman High School in Longwood, and joined the Navy in July, 1996.

Railroad made steamboat connections at Sanford until 1886 when the Jacksonville, Tampa and Key West Railway reached Sanford. In 1899 this railroad also became part of the Plant system.

In 1902, it was consolidated into the Atlantic Coast Line, which in 1967 merged with the Seaboard Airline Railroad, to form the Seaboard Coastline Railroad. In 1980 it joined the Chessie System, a unit of the SX Corporation.

The meeting of these lines in Sanford made this city a railroad center for many years. Repair and maintenance shops were at French Avenue and Sixth Street, and Union Station was located at the west end of Commercial Street. Sanford was also the earliest Florida City with an integrated rail system of its own.

**Orange Belt Railway**  
In 1885, Peter A. Demans of Longwood bought the charter of a railroad which had been incorporated as the Orange Belt Railway. It was to be built from the town of Monroe (now Lake Monroe) to Lake Apopka, a distance of 35 miles. It was completed to Oakland on the shore of Lake Apopka in November 1886, and despite his financial difficulties, Demans extended the line to Pinellas Point on the gulf which was accomplished in 1888.

Demans wanted the town of Oakland to change its name to St. Petersburg in honor of his native city in Russia, but they declined. Instead, the name was given to Pinellas Point, which has become the city of St. Petersburg that we know today.

When the 117.68 miles of 25 pound rails were completed, the road became the country's longest narrow gauge railroad. This status lasted until 1897.

In 1893, it had become part of the Plant System as the Sanford and St. Petersburg Railway.

The stations listed in 1892 within the bounds of present day Seminole County were Monroe, Sylvan Lake, Island Lake, Paola, Glen Ethel, Groveland, Palm Springs, Granada, Forest City and Toronto, a total of 18 miles.

Next week will be a continuation of early Seminole County railroads.

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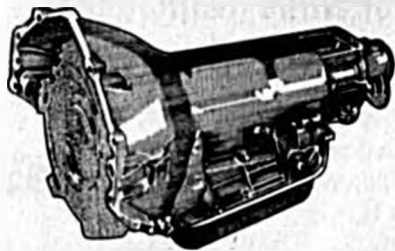


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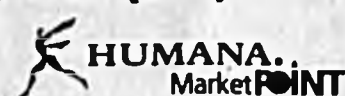

and 8th Street to apprehend the suspects.  
"When the ground unit went in, an officer spotted a cat on the railroad tracks and thought that was the heat source we spotted," Farris said. "The system locates all heat sources, which sometimes can be animals. But, that night we had a strong target, and we knew it was one of the suspects."  
He was right. The ground unit eventually found and arrested the two men. According to the police report and video taken that night, one suspect gave up without a fight, while the other was arrested following some dramatic wrestling.  
"This is just another good case where airborne works well with perimeter units," Farris said. "This changes the rules for wanted suspects."  
The aviation team, however,

doesn't only help in the apprehension of fleeing criminals. Since they began flying for the sheriff's office in 1995, both Harris and Rice have worked on missing persons, robbery and car chase operations.  
Although the two men are currently on different shifts, they received their award as a team. They also received a FLIR Vision Jacket, a personalized plaque, and \$200 to give to a charity of their choice.  
On July 29, the pair donated the money to Kids' House, which helps children who have been victims of crime. Sanford Deputy Chief Mike McCoy, whose officers actually made the December arrests, accepted the donation. McCoy also serves on the Kids' House board of directors.  
"We saw a list of charities, and agreed to give the money to Kids' House," Farris said. "We both thought it was a worthy cause."

Craig Haun and Commissioner Brender narrowed the field to three.  
On Thursday, Litton requested Commission to rank the final three so the city could move forward with the projects before a November bond issue referendum for the fire station.  
The Lake Mary faculties will be added to a long list of projects designed and overseen by the Winter Park group. ADG has

worked on numerous municipal buildings and fire stations, including the Palm Beach Gardens Municipal Complex, the DeLand Government Center, the Palm Bay Municipal Complex, the Largo Fire Department, the Ormond Beach Fire Facility and the Ocoee Main Fire Station.  
The company has also won numerous design awards for its work.  
"We have been doing this for

underlying issues are a growing concern in the medical community, Alexander said emergency room patients should not see a drastic change in procedures. Patients who come into the emergency room with abdominal pain and require surgery but do not have a surgeon of their own are treated by general surgeons on "back-up call." Appendectomies, bleeding ulcers, gall bladder complications, and bowel obstructions

are typical of the operations these doctors treat. Many patients come in with abdominal pains, Alexander said, but only a small percentage require the emergency room surgery.

In July, for example, 259 patients came into the emergency room with pains in their abdomen. Of those, 211 were treated and released, 38 were admitted but did not require surgery, four were transferred to other hospitals at the patients' request, and six

required surgery. It would be possible in many cases to cover emergency surgeries with the hospital's one remaining general surgeon.

"It's obviously not the preferred situation," Alexander said. "If we have a patient who needs a general surgeon and we can not provide that service, our protocol will be to call the closest hospital to find a surgeon who can treat the patient."

Malpractice carriers have pulled out of the Florida market, citing the volume of malpractice cases filed in the state combined with punitive damage awards that can climb to hundreds of millions of dollars. Craig Bair, director of marketing for CFRH, said two years ago 35 different companies offered malpractice insurance. Now only two provide coverage.

"There is no competition in the market, so the carriers can name their price," Bair said. "We're not talking about a bad group of doctors here. This group has an excellent record with an extremely small percentage of complaints."

The group, General and Vascular Surgical Associates, has closed its offices for two weeks, or until affordable insurance can be purchased. Until then, the principals, Dr. John Robertson, Dr. Bill Huether, Dr. Brian Cameron and Dr. Winkle are on sabbatical. So is their staff.

"It's more than just the doctors. These guys have employees — nurses, medical assistants, records technicians, receptionists," Alexander said. "If the doctors can't practice, they can't pay their employees."

"It's unfortunate," UCF defensive coordinator and linebackers coach Bill D'Ottavio said. "We need everybody we can go to battle and Antoine is a guy we think very highly of and we were looking for a big year from him."

Poe, who has not redshirted, won the vacant starting job in the spring, despite missing time with a knee injury. He saw limited time last season due to various ailments and played in one game at Kathleen High School as a senior before suffering a knee injury that delayed his enrollment at UCF. He has tallied 27 total tackles in two seasons at UCF, including nine last year.

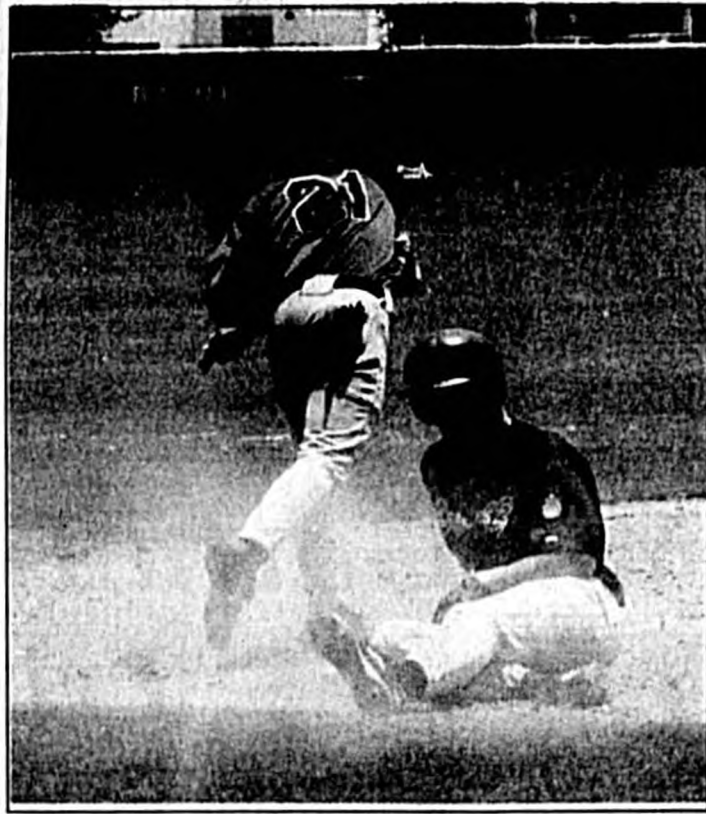

# Magic make moves to retool for new season

ORLANDO — The Orlando Magic have been busy in the past few days, with General Manager John Gabriel announcing the signing of free agent forward-center Olumide Oyedeji (oh-LOOM-uh-day oi-yah-DAY-gee) and free agent guard Jacques Vaughn, the re-signing of free agent forward Pat Garrity, the trading of Don Reid to Denver for a future draft pick and the waiving of guard-forward Jud Buechler.

"Olumide has impressed us during summer league play," said Gabriel. "He brings a lot of energy and addresses some of our needs in the frontcourt. We look forward to his contributions." Added head coach Doc Rivers, "He's active. He's big. He's strong and he's a heck of a rebounder. I'm excited he is joining our team."

Said Oyedeji, "This is a great opportunity. I'm 21 years old and just want to keep learning and playing. I feel I have the energy and intensity that can change a game."

Oyedeji (6'10", 255, 5/11/81) played in 36 regular season games with Seattle last season, averaging 1.5 ppg. and 2.2 rpg. in 6.1 minpg. He made his second career NBA start on Nov. 9 @ Boston. Oyedeji pulled down a season-high nine rebounds on Nov. 21 @ San Antonio. He also appeared in three playoff outings with the Sonics, recording nine points and six rebounds in 17 total minutes.

In the Orlando Professional Summer League (July 9-13, 2002), Oyedeji averaged 7.8 ppg. and 7.2 rpg. in 24.8 minpg. for the Magic. He averaged 15.1 ppg. and 13.9 rpg. per 48 minutes played during OPLSL action.

Born in Ibadan, Nigeria, Oyedeji was originally selected in the second round (42nd overall) of the 2000 NBA Draft by Seattle. He has played in 66 games during his NBA career, all with the Sonics, and averaged 1.5 ppg. and 2.2 rpg. in 6.7 minpg.

Oyedeji played two seasons in Germany for DJK Wurzburg, the same team that once featured All-Star forward Dirk Nowitzki. He was also a member of the Nigerian National Team in 1999.

Vaughn (6'1", 190, 2/11/75) played in all 82 regular season games for Atlanta during the 2001-02 season, averaging 6.6 ppg., 4.3 apg. and 2.0 rpg. in 22.6 minpg. He also made 16 starts, averaging 7.4 ppg., 7.1 apg. and 2.5 rpg. during that span. Vaughn ranked second on the team and 31st in the NBA in assists. He also tied for 14th in the league in assist-to-turnover ratio (3.12, 349/112). Vaughn led (or tied) the Hawks in assists 27 times and in scoring twice.

"We feel Jacques has the ability and experience to deliver the ball and be a team leader on the floor," said Gabriel. "He has earned this right and we look forward to his contributions."

"What impresses me about Jacques is his speed and ability to run a team," said head coach Doc Rivers. "He is young, but has gained some valuable experience in his five years in the league. His ability, experience and this opportunity should lead to an outstanding season."

Said Vaughn, "It's a great day for me. It's a great time in my life. What more could a person ask? You get to play for a coach, who not only had a successful career, but he played the point guard position. In addition, you get to play with a group of guys that everytime they step on the court their objective is to win and play together. For me, this is a perfect situation."

"I think I bring a lot of things to the table; a whole lot of intensity, intangibles also that show up in the locker room and out on the court and I have a knack of getting to know each guy on an individual basis, knowing what they like to do on and off the court," added Vaughn. "As a point guard that's my job and I bring that asset to the table."

Vaughn has appeared in 200 consecutive games, dating back to the 1999-2000 season when he was

with Utah. His streak is the eighth-longest active streak in the NBA. In 2001-02, Vaughn poured in a career-high 20 points on Mar. 31 vs. Sacramento and set a new career-high with five steals against the L.A. Lakers on Jan. 29.

Originally selected in the first round (28th overall) of the 1997 NBA Draft by Utah, Vaughn signed with Atlanta as a free agent on July 30, 2001. He has appeared in 306 regular season games during his NBA career with Utah and Atlanta, averaging 4.9 ppg., 2.9 apg. and 1.4 rpg. in 15.9 minpg. Vaughn has also played in 21 career playoff games, averaging 2.0 ppg. and 1.2 apg. in 7.3 minpg.

A four-year letterwinner at Kansas, Vaughn averaged 9.6 ppg., 6.4 apg. and 3.0 rpg. in 126 career games with the Jayhawks. He was named Second Team All-America during both his junior and senior campaigns by The Associated Press. He concluded his collegiate career as the school's all-time leader in assists (804), finished third in starts (125) and fifth in minutes played (3,807). He was named the Big Eight Conference Player of the Year in 1996 and the Newcomer of the Year in 1994.

Garrity (6'9", 238, 8/23/76) has spent the last three seasons with Orlando. He appeared in 80 regular season games with the Magic last season, averaging a career-high 11.1 ppg., 4.2 rpg. and 1.2 apg. in 30.1 minpg. He also made 43 starts, averaging 12.4 ppg., 5.2 rpg. and 1.5 apg. in 34.8 minpg. during that span. Garrity started all four playoff games vs. Charlotte, averaging 8.5 ppg., 7.5 rpg. and 2.3 apg. in 36.8 minpg.

During the 2001-02 campaign, Garrity led the Magic and ranked 11th in the NBA with a .427 three-point field goal percentage, connecting on 169-of-396 trifectas. He scored in double figures 45 times, including a season-best 29 points vs. New York on Feb. 12. Garrity led (or tied) the Magic in scoring five times and in rebounding nine times, including a career-high 11 boards on

Apr. 4 vs. Cleveland.

Garrity has led the Magic in three-point field goal percentage for three straight seasons, shooting .422 (345-817) from beyond the arc in a Magic uniform. He was originally selected by Milwaukee in the first round (19th pick overall) of the 1998 NBA Draft, and was acquired by the Magic on Aug. 4, 1999, along with Danny Manning and two future first round draft picks, in exchange for Anfernee Hardaway.

Garrity has played in 277 career NBA games with Phoenix and Orlando, averaging 8.7 ppg. and 3.0 rpg. in 21.7 minpg. He has shot .422 (352-835) from three-point range during his career.

Just this past Thursday, the Magic obtained a future second round draft selection from the Nuggets for Reid and future draft considerations.

"This maneuver allows us to address our recent draft selections, while creating additional flexibility in regard to our current roster," said Gabriel. "Don Reid is a true team player and fulfilled every role we asked of him, but obviously with the number of players at his position, playing time for the coming season would be at a premium."

Reid (6'8", 250, 12/30/73) played in 68 games for the Magic in 2001-02, averaging 3.3 points, 2.6 rebounds and 0.65 blocks. Originally signed as a free-agent by Orlando in August of 2000, Reid has seen action in 402 NBA games with Orlando, Detroit and Washington, averaging 3.6 points and 2.9 rebounds. The Georgetown graduate entered the NBA as the 58th and last pick of the 1995 Draft.

Buechler (6'6", 228, 6/19/68) played in 66 games for both Phoenix and Orlando last season, averaging 1.7 ppg. and 1.8 rpg. in 10.4 minpg. He led (or tied) the Magic in rebounding twice, including a career-high 12 rebounds on Nov. 29 vs. Boston. Buechler was acquired from the Suns on Nov. 16 in exchange for Bo Outlaw and a future first round draft pick.

The Scorpions led 5-0 after four innings before taking a commanding 16-0 advantage after its uprising. Dallas tallied its four runs in the fifth inning.

In the Championship Game, David Waltrip drove in three runs and Ramsey scattered 16 hits in a route-going performance to lead the Scorpions over previously unbeaten Apopka Baseball to earn the gold medal in the Seventh Annual USA Junior Olympic Baseball Championships at the

Roger Dean Stadium complex.

The UCF women's soccer team will not officially start the 2002 season until August 12, when the players hit the field shortly after midnight for their first practice. However, pre-season chatter has already begun for the Golden Knights.

Soccerbuzz.com, the "home of women's college soccer on the web," has ranked UCF's 2002 recruiting class as the ninth best in the Southeast Region. According to Soccerbuzz, UCF out-recruited Florida, Georgia, North Carolina State and South Carolina.

UCF's rookie attack will assist an already strong squad returning to the field after a successful 2001 season. The Golden Knights won the Atlantic Sun regular season by winning nine of its 10 A-Sun games. As an encore, UCF won the Atlantic Sun Championship, bringing their title total to seven. UCF has won three of the last four A-Sun Championships, and again, the Golden Knights advanced to the NCAA

Tournament as a result of the conference's automatic bid.

Amanda Cromwell, in her fourth season at the helm of the Golden Knights, is expecting even bigger things out of her squad this year.

"The players decided what our goals for the year should be," Cromwell said. "Those goals are to physically and mentally commit to every practice and game, repeat as A-Sun regular season and tournament champions, and go past the second round in the NCAA Tournament. Those are my expectations as well."

With nine seniors leading the 2002 squad, UCF has stacked its non-conference schedule. With games against Duke, Syracuse, Florida State and Miami, UCF should be prepared for the strong competition in the Atlantic Sun. Cromwell wisely recruited a large class (nine total) to replace the seniors that will be lost after this season, giving the rookies a chance to learn from a veteran class that has twice advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

"I think we can repeat as conference champions," said Cromwell. "We need to get off to a good start this year and be consistent throughout. It seems we are always the team to beat in the A-Sun and our opponents always seem to play their best against us. I expect we will be deeper than any other team in the conference, and we will need to use that to our advantage."

The reptile ambassadors included Jake the snake and the American alligators Smiley and Brutus. Others attending included Paco the Opossum and Florida panthers Itora, Kacha and Kesha.

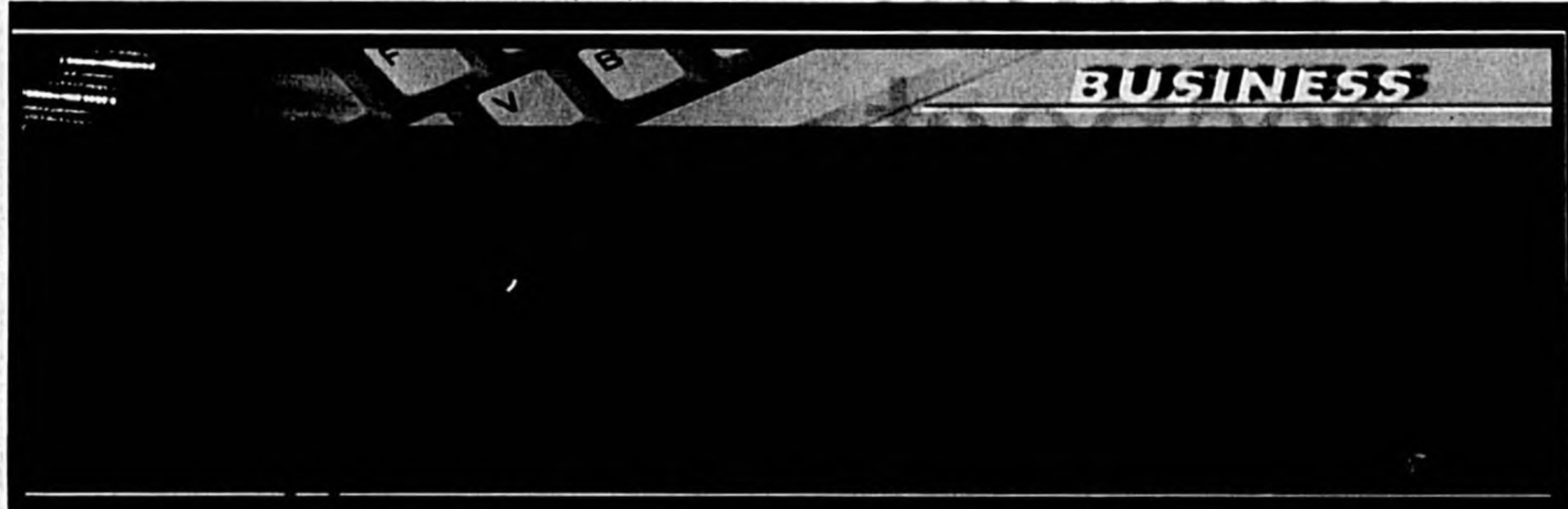

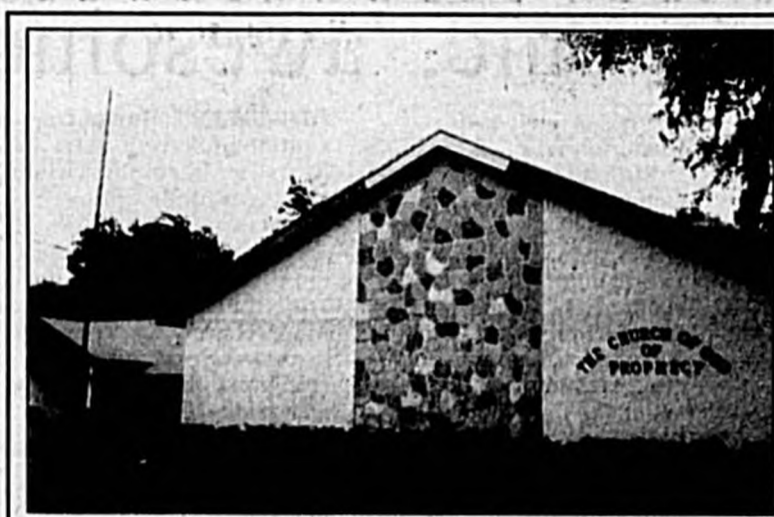

**DR. DOBSON:** Going to a new school or moving to a new town can be an unpleasant experience for children, but there are some ways to make it easier for them. Preparation and forethought

are the keys. Educator Cheri Fuller recommends that those who are about to relocate call a family meeting to talk about what's going to happen. Begin to lay plans together. It's sad to say goodbye to good friends

and it's hard to make new ones. Try establishing pen pals for your children in the new school long before the move is to occur. Relationships can blossom through the mail so that the kids are not entirely unknown in the new location. It's also helpful to create curiosity about the new city or neighborhood you're moving to. Each December, Country Joe Rosier, the storyteller, visits Lake Mary's Holiday in the Park to tell "The Night Before Christmas." He has also performed at Olde Lake Mary Days. He is a writer as well as a lawyer and a storyteller, and a play written and performed by Rosier was well received at last year's Fringe Festival.

Rosier is now off on a new adventure. "Around the USA in Eight Days" could be the title of this jaunt. Joe embarked on a whirlwind tour of America by train! Rosier's odd vacation tested his sitting and sleeping habits in the Amtrak reclining coach seats as he put Amtrak's long distance trains to the test before the whistle blows on their extinction.

When Rosier showed his itinerary to his wife Sarabecca, the only thing she could say was "my back hurts." Others consider him

a little touched in the head for planning this trip.

Rosier's breakneck tour started on Thursday, July 25, at 2:30 p.m. when he left Sanford and headed west on the "Sunset Limited." Brief stops in New Orleans, Houston, San Antonio, El Paso and Tucson followed, and Rosier arrived in Los Angeles on Sunday, July 28.

After stretching his legs, Rosier hopped aboard the "Coast Starlight" at 10 a.m. This train skirted the California shoreline, and at Oakland headed inland to view the Northern California and Oregon forests with arrival in Portland, Ore., on Monday, July 29, at 3:40 p.m.. At 4:40 p.m., Rosier made a fast dash to board the historic "Empire Builder," which left Portland for Spokane, Wash. From there, Amtrak's long distance train traveled through Idaho, Montana and North Dakota. At times, the train was only a few miles from the Canadian border. Brief stops were made at Minneapolis and Milwaukee before arriving in Chicago on Wednesday, July 31 at 4:20 p.m.

Rosier's swift tour of America continued with an early dinner in Chicago's Union Station. He then boarded the "Capitol Limited" at 7 p.m. Short stops were made in Cleveland and Pittsburgh with arrival in Washington, DC, at 1:45 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 1.

Following a late lunch and a quick walk or jog around Union Station, Rosier headed out on the last leg of his "train marathon" when Amtrak's "Silver Service" departed for Florida at 4:45 p.m.

# Blueberries add a little flavor to Central Florida gardens

Two types of blueberries grow well in Florida, rabbiteye and southern highbush. However, only the low-chill cultivars of each are adapted to Florida. The southern highbush cultivars that are commonly grown in Florida are best adapted to areas south of Ocala and north of Sebring.

usually require mulching for optimum growth.

Organic matter can be added to soils by incorporating peat moss prior to planting.

Also, pine bark mulch will eventually decompose and add to the soil organic matter. Blueberries require a soil pH of 4.0 to 5.5. At higher soil pH values, tissue levels of micro-

elements such as iron and zinc become deficient.

Blueberries require a well-drained soil. Blueberry roots exposed to water-saturated soil for more than a few days could be infected from root rot.

### Planting

The best time to plant blueberries is from mid-December to mid-February. Either bare-root or container-grown plants can be used. Plants about 2 feet tall with well developed root systems that are not pot-bound are best. Keep the roots of bare-rooted plants moist but not wet prior to and during planting.

The root balls of potted plants should be broken up slightly and the roots of bare-rooted plants should be spread out evenly in the planting hole. In most situations, dooryard blueberry plants benefit from the incorporation of 1/4 to 1/2 cubic foot of acid sphagnum peat moss into the planting hole. Dig the hole

large enough to accommodate the roots and peat moss.

The plants should be set at the same height as they grew in the nursery. A layer of pine bark 3 inches deep extending about 2 feet out from the plants in all directions, or a pine bark strip about 4 feet wide extending down the row will provide a good substrate for surface feeder roots.

### Fertilization

Blueberries respond best to frequent, light fertilization. A special formulation called "blueberry special" is available in Florida and meets the plant requirements.

A "camellia-azalea" fertilizer can also be used. Spread fertilizer evenly over a circle 2 feet in diameter with the plant in the center. Repeat this procedure in April, June, August and October. If plants are mulched heavily, use 1.5 ounces per plant per application rather than one ounce.

During the second year, use 2 ounces of 12-4-8 per plant per application and spread it evenly over a 3 foot diameter circle. In year three and later, use 3 ounces of fertilizer per plant per application spread evenly over a 4 foot diameter circle, or broadcast in a continuous band 3 to 4 feet wide, centered on the plant row.

### Pruning

Pruning stimulates the

development of new canes which are more productive than older canes. A general rule is to remove about 1/4 to 1/5 of the oldest canes each year. Most pruning is usually done immediately after harvest during the early summer.

### Irrigation

Mature blueberry plants need about 40 inches of water annually. The most critical period for irrigation of blueberry plants in Florida is from early fruit set until the end of harvest. For

most cultivars, this corresponds with a period of high water use by the plants and low rainfall.

During March, mature blueberry plants will require about 0.6 inches of water per week. 1.0 to 1.2 inches of water per week will be needed throughout the late spring and summer months.

### Varieties

If you want to grow blueberries in central Florida, southern highbush are preferred to rabbiteyes. Most blueberry cultivars that are grown in Florida are self-fruitful; they require cross pollination from other varieties.

Bees are required for good fruit set. With good pollination, berry yields of 2 to 5 pounds per plant may be expected by the third or fourth year. "Sharpblue," the most commonly grown southern highbush cultivar, can be harvested very early. "Gulf Coast" is an early variety with good fruit quality. "Misty" has become established as the primary pollinizer for 'Sharpblue'.

### Soil Requirements

Both rabbiteye and southern highbush thrive on acid soils which contain more organic matter than is usually found in Florida's soils. Southern highbush blueberries are not recommended for soils with less than 3 percent organic matter and

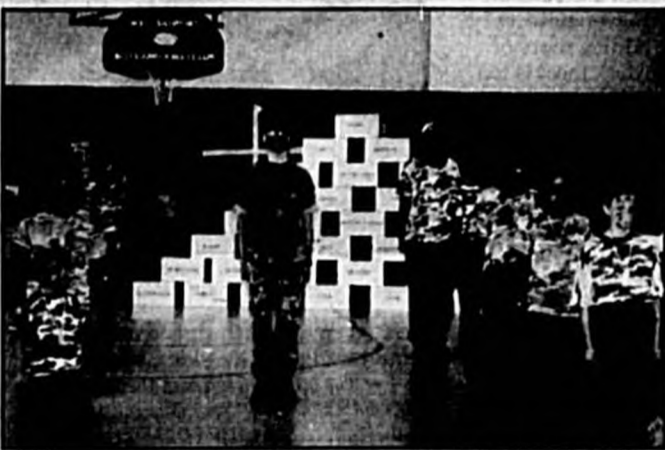

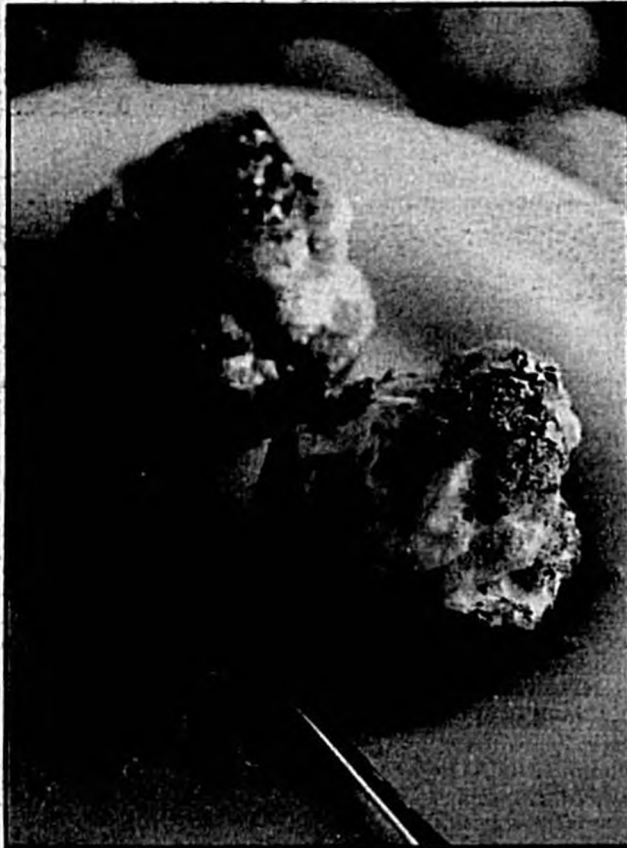

### Grilled Peaches and Cream

- 4 medium-sized fresh, ripe peaches
- 3 to four macaroons, crushed
- 1 tablespoon demerara or light brown sugar
- 1 to 2 tablespoons Cointreau

### Topping:

- 1 1/4 cups heavy cream
- 3/4 cup demerara or light brown sugar

Pour boiling water over the peaches and leave for a minute or two, then pour off the water and cover them with cold water. The skins should then be easily removed. Halve the peaches, discarding pits, and place in a single layer in an ovenproof dish, cut sides up.

Mix the macaroons with the sugar and enough of the Cointreau to make a paste.

Fill the peach cavities

with the paste. If necessary, the peach cavities can be made a little larger by removing some of the flesh, which should be minced and added to the paste.

Whip the cream and spread over the peaches. Put the peaches to chill in the refrigerator.

When ready to serve, sprinkle demerara sugar over the cream and place under a preheated hot broiler until sugar melts.

## How to avoid the lunch box blues

Preparing children for the upcoming school year can mean buying a new school wardrobe, purchasing notebooks, pens and other supplies, and of course, coming up with new lunch ideas.

### Dressed Crab

Serves 1 to 2

In Britain, the most traditional way to enjoy fresh crab is to "dress" it. This enduring favorite is well worth the effort and evokes the feeling of an old-fashioned, English seaside holiday.

- 2 eggs, at room temperature
- 1 cooked crab, about 1 1/2 to 2 pounds
- 1 to 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 cup fresh bread crumbs
- Worcestershire or Tabasco sauce, to taste
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 3 canned anchovy fillets, to garnish
- 3 teaspoons drained capers, to garnish
- 2 tablespoons sliced stuffed green olives, to garnish

- 4 slices whole wheat bread
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1 lime or lemon, cut into wedges

1. To hard-cook the eggs, place them in a small saucepan and cover with cold water. Bring to a gentle boil and cook for ten minutes. Drain and cool in cold water. Peel the eggs and push the whites and the yolks separately through a fine metal strainer.

2. Cook the crab. Scrape all the creamy brown meat from the shell and flake it into a bowl. Stir in the mayonnaise and bread crumbs to bind, adding more of each if the flavor of the dark meat is too strong. Season with salt, freshly ground pepper and Worcestershire or Tabasco sauce.

3. Crack open the claws and remove all the white meat, checking that there are no shell splinters left. Season to taste.

4. Place the white meat from the claws and body of the crab towards the two outer sides of the cleaned and dried shell. Spoon the brown meat into the center, then arrange the chopped parsley on the seams in between. Cover half of the white meat with the egg whites; spoon the egg yolks on the dark meat. Garnish with anchovies, capers and sliced olives. Butter the bread thinly and serve the

dressed crab with the bread and lime or lemon wedges to the side.

Tip: The best way to check there are no shell splinters in the meat is to throw pinches of the meat onto a baking sheet. Listen for the sound of shell pieces: if you do hear any, discard the meat.
