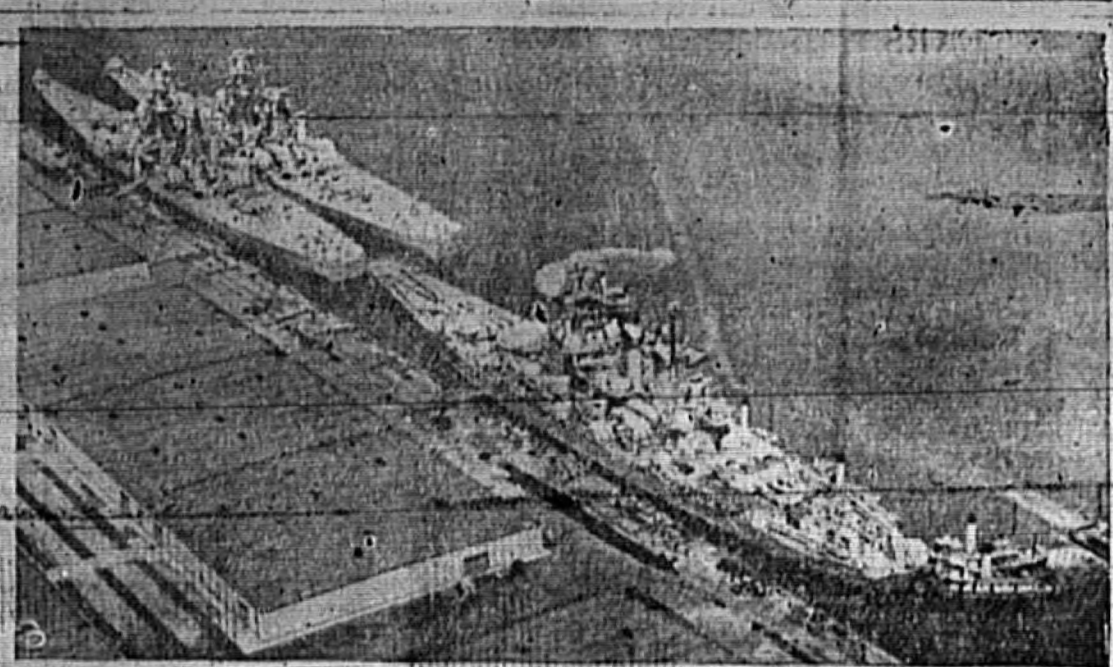

(Continued from Page One) Still in doubt, apparently, is the Senate's willingness to override the presidential rejection of the tax bill. A reintroduction would start the proposed income tax cuts Jan. 1 instead of yesterday's effective date as in the original bill. Speaker Martin (Maas) said House passage of the bill is likely. On other instances, leaders were reported to have decided there is no time to consider military training. President Truman has endorsed this proposal. The House apparently still is determined to block proposals to provide additional government assistance on housing and for federal aid to education. Chairman Taft (Ohio) of the Senate GOP policy committee would seek approval of one or both. Meanwhile, a new political battle erupted between the White House and Republican lawmakers. The GOP congressmen are demanding that President Truman produce evidence that real estate jobsites influenced Congress rent control action. Senator Wherry (Neb.), the Republican who called on the President to order prosecution of any lobbyist he considers guilty of "subversive" activities. Wherry said that if Mr. Truman has no concrete evidence to back up his charges he ought to apologize to Congress. In his message to Congress when he signed the rent control bill Monday, Mr. Truman said the real estate lobby had "displayed a ruthless disregard of the public welfare" by attempting to "break a rent control act away with necessary aid to housing." The President asked for a congressional investigation of what he called the "tragic operations" of lobbyists. He said nothing could be more clearly subversive of representative government than efforts to "block programs so essential to the needs of our citizens." In an angry speech, Wherry demanded that if Mr. Truman had any information on "subversive activities" he submit it to the Justice Department. Wherry said that every Senator has the right to criticize the President of the United States, but as proper for the Chief Executive to criticize Congress. (Continued from Page One) man, came down together from the Hall of Parrots, where the conference had been held. It was reported that a joint French-British announcement would be issued. Molotov, opening today's session, made a five-page statement criticizing the British-French proposals as a threat to the economic independence and sovereignty of the small European nations. "Under these conditions," Molotov said of the proposals, "how would the small countries and in general the less powerful states be able to safeguard their national economies and their independence?" The Soviet government certainly cannot venture along this path and continue to support its proposals put forward at this conference on June 28. "The Soviet government, while favoring the development of international collaboration on the basis of equal rights and mutual respect for the interests of the contracting parties, cannot lend its assistance to anyone in arranging its affairs at the expense of other countries of less strength or size. This has nothing in common with normal cooperation between states. "The Soviet government considers that the Anglo-French plan to set up a special organization for the coordination of the economic activities of the two countries would lead to interference in the internal affairs of European countries. "The Soviet government rejects this plan as being altogether unsatisfactory and incapable of yielding any positive results. "Molotov assailed those parts of the British-French proposals which dealt with Germany as tending to take away the "justified reparations" claims of those allied countries which suffered from German aggression. "The compromise under discussion was offered yesterday by Britain in an effort to keep the conference alive. The conference was called after U. S. Secretary of State Marshall had suggested that European nations should agree among themselves on a plan for European reconstruction for which the United States would consider granting aid. "Before today's session, the fifth of the conference, convened both Britain and France reportedly were ready to go ahead with Marshall's suggestion in the event Russia rejected the compromise. Marshall made his proposal in a Harvard University speech June 5. "A French source said British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin-

Congress Warned U. S. Is Nearing Economic Crisis

By MARVIN L. ARROWSMITH WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Dr. Leverett S. Lyon of the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry said today "we have reached a stage where Congress must give consideration to rationing of certain products," including food. Lyon, the association's chief executive officer, said in a statement prepared for the joint congressional committee on the economic report that we are approaching, if we have not already reached, an emergency if not a wartime economy. The committee is considering suggestions on how to avoid a depression and generally stabilizing the nation's economy. Lyon said his analysis of domestic prospects for the next year is pessimistic. He said exports are playing in foreign markets of the United States. "The problem of exports is at present greatly complicated by the fact that they have become an important political tool," Lyon said. "We must distinguish between the exporters to buy imports and manage them to buy foreign goods or to set up the industrial mechanisms of Europe or Asia. By LIDEL SIMS MEMPHIS, Tenn.—Seventeen years ago M. P. Keathley, dead broke and about to lose his job, opened his lunch stall and bit down on a million-dollar idea. When lunch time came at the Ford plant that day, he had a lot to worry about. The depression was on, and the plant was about to shut down. And Keathley—a young fellow with two children—had only \$3.50 besides his rent money. He was sitting there eating when he got in thinking about the little muffin pie his wife had fixed for him. She put them in his lunch every day. The foreman had tasted one, and liked it. So had the other fellows at the plant. What this country needs, Keathley mused, is a good three-cent pie. There wasn't a nickel pie in Memphis. He went home and told his wife about it. They spent the \$3.50 for flour, shortening, filling and went to work in their eight-by-eight kitchenette. The first day a neighborhood store sold 16 dozen pies. "While he carried pie in a basket to the stores and cafes he could reach about. Then he bought an ancient Ford for \$32 and began expanding. The lady next door was hired to help in the kitchen. A boyer for a hamburger chain placed an order for six of his establishments. Within a month, the Keathleys were making 600 pies a day. They moved to another house with six rooms for the family. Here they lived. It was about a year before they rented a commercial building—a narrow little store which is now a part building that includes two dining, five farms, an orchard, a cafeteria, grocery, ice parlor and a big ice cream store.

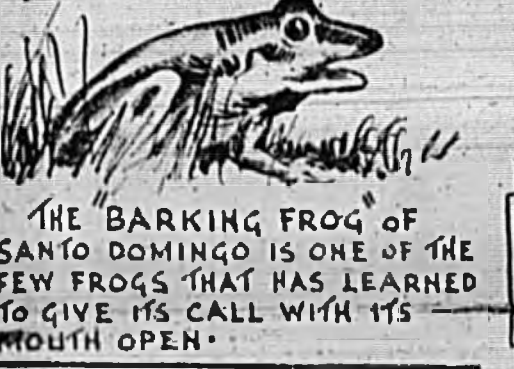

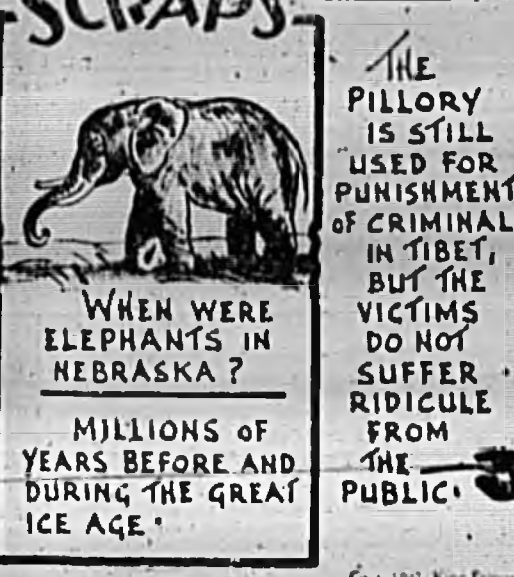

City Seized

(Continued from Page One) as hostages as had been reported previously, the telegram said. Heavy reinforcements of military police were flown to Mindoro to put down the coup after a Philippine Airlines pilot managed to fly to Manila from the embattled capital and reported the uprising. The convicts had seized all local radio transmitters, cutting off communications from Calapan. The following up-witness account was written for the Associated Press by Capt. Manuel Conde, Philippine air line pilot who flew to Manila with the first report of the seizure. I landed my plane at Calapan at 11:15 A. M. suspecting nothing until I noticed our employees were absent from the airstrip. Soon one heavily armed man in a military police uniform boarded the plane and said his superior officer, a Lieutenant Romero, wanted me and my co-pilot to appear before him. He said it was an urgent order. I accompanied the soldier, who presented me to Romero. Romero said he did not want the plane to leave Calapan, and that I should consider myself his prisoner. Romero said his men had captured the town and the governor, the municipal mayor and the chief of police are my prisoners in the Casablanca Hotel in the center of the city. Romero added: "I control land, sea and air communications now and there is no way for a message to get outside for help. I noticed several townspeople held in the prisoner stockade near the MP barracks where Romero had his quarters. There were three girls among them, all terror-stricken. Guarding the stockade were men in the uniform of military police, all armed. I learned later that the jailbreakers had stripped the captured MPs of their uniforms and used them. A few minutes later I heard rifle shots followed by a heavy exchange of gunfire. I dropped flat on the floor and after 45 minutes the firing ceased. Romero was killed by bullets in the head and stomach. I don't know exactly how many more were killed. His men retreated into town about a mile and a half from the MP barracks, which adjoin the airstrip. I found that MPs from neighboring towns had arrived to recapture the airstrip and barracks where the jailbreakers had entrenched themselves. The airstrip is a mile and a half from the center of the town. I was asked to fly to Manila immediately to report to general headquarters of the Military Police Corps and get reinforcements to help recapture the town. Upon landing at the airport here I made my report to Brig. Gen. Mariano Casteneda, chief of the military police command.

Without mentioning any foreign country, Marshall complained that the policies and actions of the United States are "often misunderstood and misrepresented abroad." Marshall continued: "The facts about the United States are withheld or falsified and our motives are distorted. Our actions do not always speak for themselves unless the people of other countries have some understanding of the peaceful intention of our people. I earnestly hope that the Senate will act on this bill at the present session of Congress and not postpone action until next January. We shall have some serious handicaps if the bill is further delayed." Marshall suggested that language of the House-approved bill be revised to make clear that a proposed advisory commission shall not formulate policies to be carried out. "The bill shouldn't seek to remove determination of foreign policies from the responsibilities of the President and Secretary of State," he said. Mundt said the cost of the information program "actually is less than one-third of one percent of what we have already spent on other methods to hold the peace since the war was over." "Gentlemen, none of us would consider building a \$10,000 home and refuse to pay \$30 insurance to protect it against fire and disaster," he told the subcommittee. The two-man subcommittee, Senator Smith (R-NJ) and Hatch (D-NM), indicated approval of the measure which was passed by the House by a three-to-one margin after much debate. Smith, presiding, said a "war of ideas" now is underway in the world and other nations "should know what America is and what America has believed in since its founding." He said he is certain the Congress and taxpayers will not "be negatively" if they understand the proposed program. Hatch interrupted Mundt at one point to say he agreed completely on need for the legislation and funds.

Pessimism was blanketing Downing Street over the prospects of Soviet participation, he declared, adding that although Britain certainly would attempt to carry on under the plan with France and other Western European states, there was no gainsaying the possibility that an effective program for continental recovery might collapse without Russia and Russian-orbit countries. He did not elaborate. Britain, he went on, realized that the present French government, faced with the power of the Communists in that country, would accept only with the greatest unwillingness a plan that might split Europe in two. Bearing these things in mind, the informant added, the British cabinet has revamped the country's entire import program. And, he said, collapse of the Marshall proposals would trigger the curtailed program into action.

Both of the final figures on income and spending were well over \$10,000,000,000 higher than the President foresaw in an estimate 18 months ago, when some administration officials feared there would be a business slump as the nation shifted from a war to a peacetime basis.
