

### They'll Make It Tougher To Buy Firearms

WASHINGTON — (NEA)—Private and government pressure is at work to control arms traffic in the United States, a nation where a pistol can often be bought with the ease of a tube of toothpaste.

The death of President Kennedy by mail order rifle bullet and the murder in turn of his accused assassin by a night club operator's pistol have amplified the call for congressional passage of federal small arms control legislation.

The private sector of the country, too, seems determined to make it tougher for citizens to simply walk into a store and pick up a family-sized arsenal. Sears Roebuck & Co. leads the list of mail order houses which are pulling gun ads from their catalogues.

Sen. Thomas Dodd, (D-Conn.), has a bill to tighten existing firearms laws languishing in the Senate Commerce Committee for almost four months. He has now received assurances from more than a dozen senators, including Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, (D-Mont.), that every effort will be made to enact the bill "as quickly as possible."

According to J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, "the easy accessibility of firearms" has contributed significantly to the nation's crime problem. Last year there were 2,000 murders by firearms in the United States.

A fact realized by few people is that in many cities an adult—even though he may be a criminal, drug addict, alcoholic or mentally ill—can buy a gun over the counter in sporting goods stores or pawnshops, no questions asked.

Even more shocking is the mail order business. Any child with \$5 who can scrawl his name and falsify his age on a form can obtain a gun. Anyone with a criminal record can acquire a gun by using an assumed name and a false address or box number and putting his cash on the line.

This is the way Lee Harvey Oswald got the \$12.75 Italian rifle with which he allegedly sent a bullet crashing into the President's brain. This "38 model" Carcano rifle has deluged the United States to the dismay of domestic sporting arms manufacturers, who concede that the weapon is extremely accurate and reliable despite its shoddy external appearance.

The Federal Firearms Act of 1938 is considered inadequate. It controls interstate and foreign movement of all types of guns, even prohibits the shipment of any firearm to a convicted criminal. It is enforced by Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service.

But the law is easy to get around. A New Jersey newspaper proved this when he guided his three-year-old daughter through the steps of legally purchasing a Thompson sub-machine gun.

Dodd prophetically put his finger on the problem when he introduced his bill. "To perpetuate the present loopholes in the Federal Firearms Act is to doom individuals to a senseless death from a gun wielded by fingers responding to the whims and impulses of a disordered mind."

Mail order houses get the weapons in wholesale lots from distributors who purchase them by the thousands as surplus from foreign governments. A rifle can be dipped in acid to clean it, a new stock added and the weapon sold by mail at one-third the price of one produced in this country.

Since weapons cannot be shipped through the mails, express agencies are used for legal delivery. The Senate investigating subcommittee heard testimony on how one Los Angeles dealer would truck a filled gun order to Phoenix, Ariz., where he wrapped it and sent it back to California purchasers via Railway Express.

# Bryant Defends Change; LBJ's Right Questioned

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant, throwing his full support behind last week's re-naming of America's missile test center, said today the state would not have to take further action in approving the change.

President Lyndon Johnson changed the name of Cape Canaveral to Cape Kennedy in memory of the late president.

The Thanksgiving Day announcement sparked considerable opposition, especially from residents of the Cape area in Brevard County.

Bryant said the president telephoned him before the change was made to get the state chief executive's feelings.

"I think Florida is fortunate the president has done this," Bryant said. He said the Legislature could implement the action if it wished in the 1965 session.

Bryant indicated there was no doubt in his mind that the President could change the name of the Cape by executive order.

The governor said other Florida place names had been changed in the past and this one was nothing for residents to get excited about.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said today he might not wait to look at the so-called Genesys program before placing his stamp of approval on policy for the Florida Institute of Continuing University Studies (FICUS).

A proposed policy statement by the board of control governing operation of the sometimes controversial FICUS program was delayed a second time by the Cabinet Tuesday when Bryant said he wanted to make certain it did not conflict with the proposal to extend instruction of the University of Florida College of Engineering to east Central Florida.

The program is called Genesys. The board of control has not completed planning of the Genesys program, but is expected to wind it up at the next meeting on Friday at Boca Raton.

Bryant said his staff was making a study of the proposal and if he was told it did not conflict with Genesys, he probably wouldn't object to the policy statement.

As of right now, he said, he had not seen the Genesys proposal, which couples the use of closed circuit television and on-the-spot instruction to take engineering instruction to the Cape Kennedy area.

Bryant said expansion of the state university system was causing some changes in operation of the Board of Control. He said the board was relying more and more on its staff and on executive directors.

He said the board was acting more as a policy making body and less as an administrative body.

"The board can't conduct the intimate overview of the university operations it once did," Bryant said. He said the proposal to increase the size of the board from seven to nine members would probably make actions of the board more time consuming than ever because of the increased size.

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — President Johnson's switch a week ago from the 49-year-old name of Cape Canaveral for the nation's spaceport to Cape Kennedy is drawing opposition.

Two nearby communities already have gone on record against the surprise Thanksgiving Day decree in memory of the late President and petitions are circulating among area workers opposing the move.

One town questioned the right of a president to change the name of a community in a state.

Opponents endorse the re-naming of the space center itself but the resistance develops in the abandonment of the geographical name of Cape Canaveral.

President Johnson's order renamed the huge space complex the John F. Kennedy Space Center and also erased the name Canaveral from the triangular expanse of sand that juts into the Atlantic from Florida's otherwise smooth Atlantic coastline.

The city council of Cape Canaveral, a tiny municipality south of the missile base, has approved a resolution to be sent to the President and to Florida Gov. Farris Bryant protesting the decision.

The city of Cocoa has taken similar action.

The Cape Canaveral council also asked its city attorney to determine if President Johnson had the authority to change the name of a location in the state.

## Bryant Reassures Seminole Site Committee Board Will Be Fair

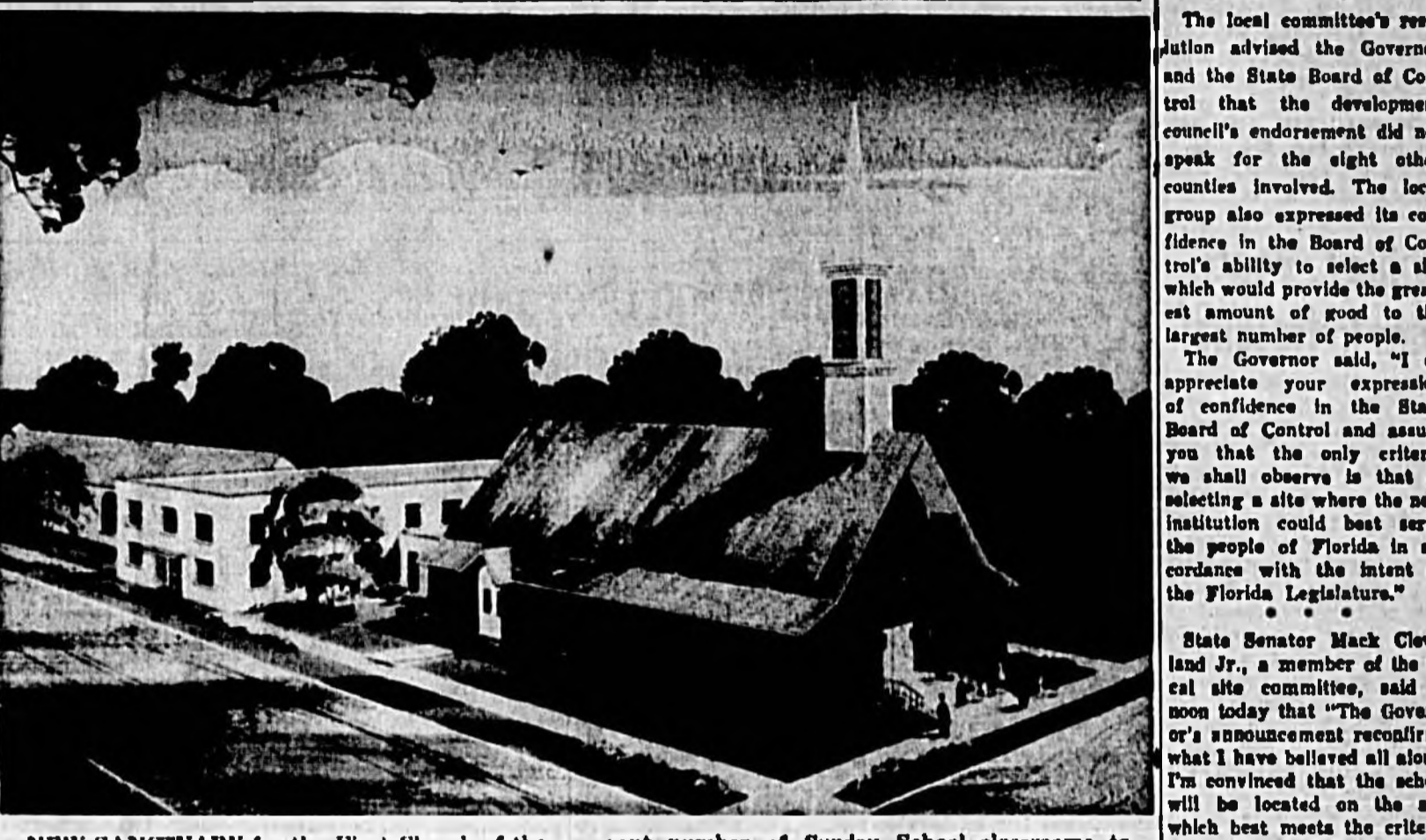
Governor Farris Bryant today told members of the Seminole County University Site Committee that he appreciated the committee's expression of confidence that the State Board of Control would select a site for the proposed East-Central Florida University where the institution could best serve the citizens of this day night by the local university site committee. It called attention to the fact that the Central Florida Development Committee had announced that all of the committees involved in the site selection had endorsed a site in Orange County.

The local committee's resolution advised the Governor and the State Board of Control that the development council's endorsement did not speak for the eight other counties involved. The local group also expressed its confidence in the Board of Control's ability to select a site which would provide the greatest amount of good to the largest number of people.

The Governor said, "I do appreciate your expression of confidence in the State Board of Control and assure you that the only criteria we shall observe is that of selecting a site where the new institution could best serve the people of Florida in accordance with the intent of the Florida Legislature."

State Senator Mack Cleveland Jr., a member of the local site committee, said at noon today that "The Governor's announcement reaffirms what I have believed all along. I'm convinced that the school will be located on the site which best meets the criteria of the Board of Control. I do not believe that it will be a political selection."

Meanwhile, John Alexander, Seminole County commissioner and one of the two members of the East-Central Florida Regional Planning Council, called attention to the fact that the council is not associated in any manner with the so-called Central Florida Development Committee.

The assassins pumped 18 bullets into Leuang's body. Dressed in khaki uniforms, they escaped in two unmarked jeeps.

Leuang, father of nine children, was chief of the doctrine (second) bureau of the intelligence service of the Laotian neutralist faction and reported directly to Premier Souvanna.

Neutralist Gen. Anukha termed the assassination a "well organized plot."

The letter says: "I've just finished reading a lengthy article in a church publication about 'What To Do With Aging Parents.' (Since everybody is aging, the author's meaning is not clear.) An appropriate companion piece might be captioned 'What To Do With Aging Children,' many of whom appear unable to meet either the spiritual or material problems of life as successfully as do many of their parents or grandparents."

Look at our juvenile crime rate. Don't you suppose a lot of grandparents are finding it hard to see what a bunch their well-brought-up children are making of the job of bringing up their own children?

So if you ever start thinking about your aging parents as a problem, just remember you may be a problem to them, too.

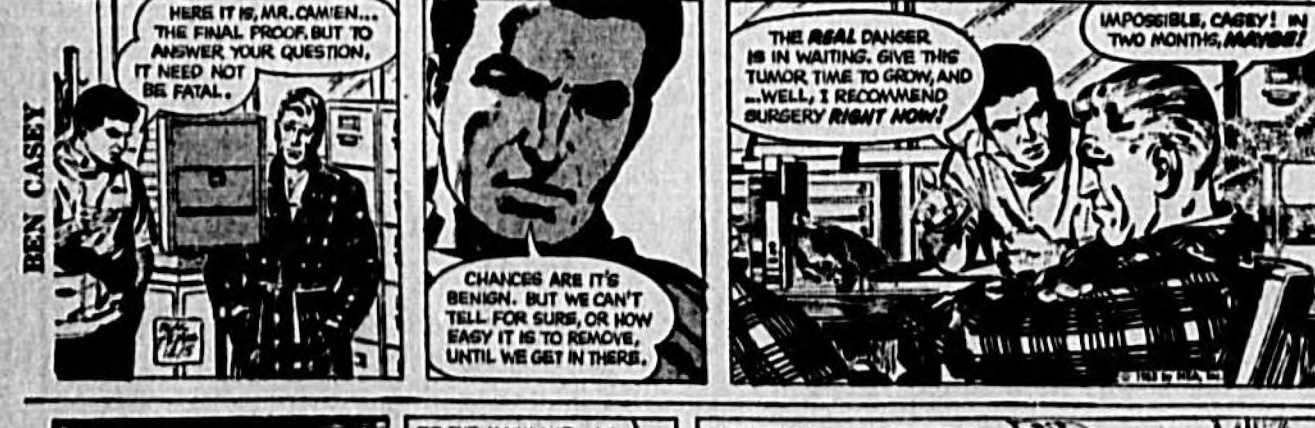
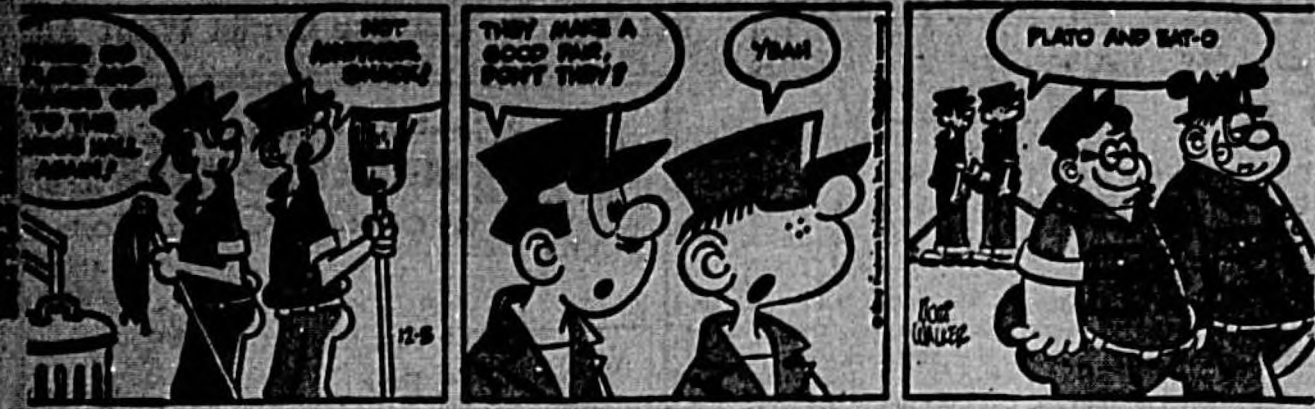

# Board Narrows Central Florida University Sites To Four In Seminole, Orange Counties

## Reaction To Selections Is Mixed

Local reaction to the report of the State Board of Control's decision to narrow the sites for the proposed East-Central Florida University to four was somewhat mixed.

While disappointed on the one hand that a final selection was not made, local authorities were elated that of the four remaining sites two resided in Seminole County.

President Francis Roumillat of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce said, "I'm highly elated about the selections. Naturally, I wish a final selection in favor of Seminole County could have been made. However, the reports from Boca Raton confirm my faith in the Board of Control."

Roumillat added, "We of the Chamber of Commerce will continue to do everything we can to bring the university to Seminole County."

The chairman of the county's university site committee, Douglas Stenstrom declared: "We are delighted that Seminole's two sites remain under consideration by the Board of Control. We continue to feel that the Board will make a final decision on the basis of merit."

He added, "We of Seminole County have always wanted the university to be placed where it would best serve the most people, regardless of location. "But," he pointed out, "we, of course, hope that the best site will be in this county."

"I'm happy that Seminole still has a 50-50 chance to land the university," said County Clerk Arthur Beckwith. "I'm looking forward to a final decision on Jan. 10. However, if there is another reduction of sites considered without a final decision, I feel that this county will still have at least one site remaining under consideration."

"Frankly," said Beckwith, "I have an idea that the Board of Control may consider the four remaining sites on a priority basis, numbering them in a selective order. Then," the county official added, "the board could make a final selection by eliminating the priority sites on the basis of soil boring tests."

He is survived by Mrs. Harper and several nieces and nephews.

Graveside funeral services will be conducted at 4 p. m. Sunday in the Geneva Cemetery under the direction of the Oviedo Masonic Lodge.

## Atlantic Navy Air Chief To Visit SNAS

A former Commander of Sanford's Heavy Attack Wing One who now heads Naval Aviation in the Atlantic will visit here next Thursday to acquaint himself with new equipment and facilities at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

Vice Admiral Paul H. Ramsey, Commander Naval Air Force Atlantic Fleet, will arrive at 11:30 a.m. to meet with Capt. James O. Mayo, current Wing Commander, and commanding officers of squadrons under Mayo's supervision. He plans to leave about 2 p.m.

This will be Adm. Ramsey's first visit to Sanford since accepting his current command Sept. 26. Ramsey's "Air Lant" staff is headquartered in Norfolk, Va.

His predecessor, Vice Adm. Frank O'Berne, visited Sanford July 12 as principal speaker at the Wing's Change of Command ceremonies.

Adm. Ramsey arrived at his present post unusually qualified for commanding the Atlantic's jet-age air force. He is fresh from command of the Naval Air Test Center at Patuxent River, Md., where many of the Navy's latest aircraft came into operation under his eyes.

These included the A-3 Vigilante, fast becoming the backbone of the heavy attack program and soon slated to perform reconnaissance duties for the Navy.

As Heavy Attack Wing One's second leader (August 1951 to August 1962) he accumulated experience which would tend to give him further insight into today's heavy attack program.

Adm. Ramsey's service in many of the major battles in the Pacific during World War II earned for him one of the longer lists of decorations among active Naval aviators. These include the highly-respected Navy Cross and Legion of Merit.

## Cape Kennedy Limited To Test Center

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—It's official—the jutting sand spit that houses the nation's chief missile testing center henceforth will be known as Cape Kennedy.

Confusion developed both in Washington and Tallahassee Thursday over the extent of President Johnson's Thanksgiving Day executive order changing the name of Cape Canaveral to Cape Kennedy.

The text of the order indicated that Johnson's action had merely changed the name of the missile test center, and not of the peninsula itself.

Re-naming of the peninsula, sources said, would have to await action by the Board of Geographical Names—a federal agency made up of representatives from 11 departments.

A further check showed, however, that Johnson had cleared his proposal with the board the day before he made the announcement. Arthur R. Baker, a subcommittee chairman of the board, said no additional action was required.

Many residents of the Cape Kennedy area protested the name change both on economic and historic grounds.

They argued that mapmakers have used the name Canaveral to identify the cape since about the time Spanish explorer Juan Ponce de Leon sailed along the Florida coast in 1513.

## Final Selection Set For Jan. 10

BOCA RATON—The new East Central Florida University will be located in Seminole County or Orange County.

The State Board of Control, in session here today, narrowed the site for the new school to four pieces of land in the two counties. These are the Lake Ada and Lee Ranch sites in Seminole County and the Bluestone and Deseret sites in Orange County.

The board split with a three-three vote in that they were divided on the Deseret site which lies in Southeast Orange County. Chairman Baya Harrison broke the tie and voted to include the Deseret site.

The decision not to make a final selection today was reached when the board decided it should make further study relative to transportation, accessibility, population, churches and schools.

Several of the board members indicated they favor the Lee Ranch site and there was no discussion about the Lake Ada site. It was apparent that all board members favor the Lake Ada site because there was no discussion.

The board members indicated they will again visit the four sites and will direct the staff members to enter into further study before final selection is made.

Dr. J. Broward Culpepper, executive director, requested and was granted permission to notify Seminole and Orange County commissioners not to proceed with soil boring tests until the board has narrowed its selection even more.

The board said it would make a final choice at its next meeting Jan. 10 in Tallahassee.

The Lake Ada site, now chiefly given over to cattle grazing and citrus, was promoted by the Sanford City Commission as the site for the new university.

The approximately 1,000 acres, held by nine owners, contains a number of lakes—Hidden Lake, Loch Low, Lake Ada, Reservoir Lake, etc.

The site is bounded by Highway 17-92, Lake Mary Boulevard and Atlantic Coast Line Railroad with Seminole High School adjacent to the north. It includes a number of homes which may be used as residences for faculty members.

County Commission had requested and was refused an interchange connecting Interstate 4 and Lake Mary Boulevard. It is now believed that because of the new university the interchange will be included by the federal government.

## Longwood OKs Annexation Ordinance

An ordinance expressing the City of Longwood's intention to annex territory on the east side of Highway 17-92 from Oak Lane to SR 434 was unanimously adopted after three consecutive readings at the regular December meeting of the City Council Thursday evening.

The annexation ordinance will become final after a period of 30 days.

In other business council reappointed John Reams to a two-year term as a director on the South Seminole Natural Gas Authority. Reams recently completed his first two-year term as a director of the Authority.

Motions were made and approved to donate \$50 to the city's Christmas Party Fund; to spend approximately \$125 for portable lights and other equipment for the fire department and to give a \$10 raise in salary, retroactive to Nov. 1 to Mrs. Ruth Layo, clerk of the police court.

The financial statement was approved and various bills paid. The meeting was adjourned subject to call.

City of Sanford, with state approval, plans to annex the area to further insure adequate fire and police protection, water, sewerage and other utilities.

The Lee Ranch site is held by three property owners. More than 2,000 acres were offered, with the state given a choice of 1,000 acres—in other words, the east 1,000 acres or the west 1,000 acres. The site is north of Chuluota and south of the Econlockhatchee River in southeast Seminole County.

The county also must provide a 50-acre site on water for recreational purposes for the students and faculty.

Churches, elementary schools and utilities are available for the new university.

## VAH-9 Returns To Base Today

Heavy Attack Squadron Nine returns today from the USS Saratoga where planes and flight crews have been engaged in training and fleet exercise operations for several days.

The squadron, commanded by Cdr. James Shipman, is permanently assigned to the Saratoga. It returned in October from a seven month Mediterranean deployment aboard that ship.

The recent exercise, which began Tuesday, is one of the periodic short deployments the squadron makes to maintain operational readiness, a requirement of all heavy attack squadrons.
